IF the Frodsham Town Council elections proved anything it is that the electorate is unpredictable – and can be very unkind.

Among the more surprising results were the defeats suffered by long-serving councillor Pammi Taylor and the Mayor, Allen Wales. Surprising for different reasons, but surprising none-the-less.

Pammi Taylor had been a member of the council for 12 years and no councillor in that period has worked harder for the local community than she did. She was a stickler for things being done properly and spent many hours making sure they were. In the days before the council's website was handed over to "experts" she was largely responsible for its maintenance and the most noticeable difference after she relinquished control was that things went wrong

more often!
Allen Wales could not claim a similar length of service on the council. In fact, he was never actually elected, having been co-opted to fill a vacancy that occurred mid-term. But he proved to be an excellent councillor and stepped in to take on the role of Mayor at a time when noone else really seemed to want the

As his successor has already pointed out, he fulfilled the role in a quiet and dignified way.

When the electors rejected him, he displayed no rancour but took advantage of his last official duty as Mayor to praise council staff and fellow councillors for the hard work they put in for the local community and also said how honoured and privileged he had been to be Mayor of Frodsham – a "fantastic place to live

Pammi and Allen were both members of the council's World War One Commemoration Group and we are pleased to note that as they are both to continue as volunteer members, their experience will not be lost.

The new council is very different to the old. Half its members are new and many will be inexperienced.

Several people have already

expressed the hope that its members will work together, co-operatively and in harmony, for the good of

Frodsham.

We echo that sentiment – but the jury is still out.

Council chairman elected for fourth term

CLLR Mark Warren has been re-elected for a fourth year as chairman of Frodsham Town Council.

He was elected at the annual meeting of the council – but only after Cllr Frank Pennington had proposed that newly-elected Cllr

Tom Reynolds be elected chairman.

Cllr Pennington said it was a new council which should move in a new direction. Cllr Warren had been chairman for three years and he helieved it was time for a new he believed it was time for a new chairman to take the council in a new direction.

Cllr Alan Oulton seconded the proposal – but it was put to the meeting and failed to find further support.

After being re-elected, Cllr Warren said he regarded his appointment as a transitional measure. He had never intended to remain chairman for so long but he was aware that half the council now consisted of new members and believed it was important that there should be an orderly transition.

"I would like the council to accept this as a transitional measure,"

Gardens to open for caring charities

MANY of the most beautiful gardens in Cheshire will be open to the public this summer as part of the National Gardens Scheme.

This offers an opportunity for people to visit showpiece gardens – and also raises money for charity.

The gardens range in size from the big publicly owned gardens, such as Tatton Park, Dunham Massey Hall and Norton Priory Gardens, to privately owned gardens, often of modest size.

Among local gardens to open

Manley Knoll, (pictured) Manley Road, Manley on Sunday June 21 from 12 noon to 5pm:

This six acre gardens was created in the early 1900s and is divided into different "rooms" encompassing parterres, clipped yew hedging and ornamental ponds.

Banks of rhododendron and azaleas frame a far-reaching view of the Cheshire Plain. There is also a magical quarry/folly garden with a waterfall. Admission: £3.50, children free. Home-made teas.

Bowmere Cottage, Bowmere Road, Tarporley, on Sunday, June 21 from 1.30pm to 5.30pm: A mature 1-acre country style garden around a Grade II listed house (not open). Mixed shrub and herbaceous borders, pergolas, two plant filled courtyard gardens and small kitchen garden. Shrub and rambling roses, clematis, hardy geraniums and a wide and colourful range of plants make this a very traditional English garden.

Cobbled drive and courtyard. Gravel paths. Admission: £4, children free. Home-made teas.

Clemley House, Duddon Common, Tarporley, Sunday June 28, 12 noon until 5pm: A two acre organic, wildlife friendly, gold award winning cottage garden. Features orchard, wildlife ponds, wildflower meadow, fruit and veg areas, badger sett, rose pergola, gazebo, summer house, barn owl and many other nest boxes, gravel and shade gardens, shepherd's

hut and poly tunnel. Year round interest. Admission: £4, children free. Home-made teas. Home grown organic fruits used in jams & cakes.

Since 1927, the National Gardens Scheme has raised more than £45 million for nursing and caring charities.

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Anyone for a Picnic?

Well, summer is just upon us and what better way to celebrate than with a picnic in the sunshine? But what to put in your picnic basket? Wine, cheese, crackers, pate,

cured meats, sausage rolls, pork pies, fancy crisps, chocolate, patisserie... the list just goes on and on. So to help you out, this month we will be taking you through our perfect picnic wines.

All good picnics start with a sparkler and where better to start than with a lovely Prosecco? Picnics alfresco are just not picnics without a glass or three of fizz so we've chosen La

Farra Prosecco Extra Dry (£12.95). This is a classic style of Prosecco fresh, light, delicately fizzy with honey and lemon flavours and a lovely long finish. Great with some smoked salmon and cream cheese blinis.

Next we move on to a delicious white wine from Italy, Torre del Falasco Gargagena (£7.95). Have you ever heard of the white Italian wine, Soave? Well, this is made in the same region and using the same grapes, but as some of the vineyards are situated just outside the Soave region, it has to go by the name of the grape, Gargagena, instead. This "baby-Soave" is 50% cheaper than most Soave, but what is the wine actually like? Well, it's crisp and dry, but there's a depth of honeysuckle, orange peel and elderflower on the nose and palate belying its price. Try this with some Perl Wen cheese and Chive Crackers, or some Mushroom Pâté.

If one of your picnic party prefers rosé to white wine, try a cracking, dry rose from the south of France

Williams Chase Rosé (£13.95). Maison Provence Made at Château Constantin in Provence, the winery is owned by Chase Distillery, who make fantastic spirits and liqueurs from their base in Herefordshire but have recently added wine

making to their CV. Crisp, dry and incredibly refreshing, with strawberry and raspberry fruit, zippy acidity and a more-ish finish. If you have any left after the Prosecco, this rosé is not only perfect with some smoked salmon but also with snacks like Italian Tarali or Spanish Picos.

the store and store With the picnic in full swing and everyone enjoying the sunshine, it's time for some smoked duck with cherry purée to have with our perfect picnic red wine, Casa Silva Cool Coast Pinot Noir (£14.95). Picnics are perfect for Pinot. Big reds are too over-the-top and really need BBQs whereas picnics call for something a little softer, more delicate, more refined. This coastal region Chilean Pinot Noir is eminently fruity, but is delicate enough to match with such picnic fare as Smoked Duck or a rich venison pate.

So there you have it! The perfect picnic needs perfect picnic wine, but the road to perfection requires practice, so try a few out before you go! My advice? Stock up now so that you can picnic the minute you see the sun!



Town Council moves into new offices

FRODSHAM Town Council has moved into new, more spacious offices.
They have taken over the ground floor of Castle Park House, enabling all council activities to be together under one roof.

Meetings of the full council and all its committees will, in future, be held in

the house.

Previously council staff had to struggle in cramped accommodation at the Footman's Cottage in Castle Park and meetings were held either at Frodsham Community Centre or Castle Park Arts Centre.

The council has also taken over responsibility for letting accommodation on the ground floor of Castle Park House, including for weddings.

They have a number of desk spaces available for small businesses or individuals.

The move has involved an increase in staff which means a reception desk will be open from 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday, although office hours will remain 9am to 1pm as previously.



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Storm over email to Heritage Lottery Fund

AN email was sent to the Heritage Lottery Fund accusing Frodsham Foundation of a lack of openness and transparency.

It was sent in the run-up to the May council elections by Tom Reynolds, a candidate in the elections but "bounced back" and was re-sent by Mr Reynolds after the elections, by which time he had been elected a member of the Town

In the email, Cllr Reynold said if Frodsham Foundation wanted credibility within the Frodsham community it would have to start operating in an inclusive fashion, not an exclusive one.

He said the Foundation had decided only members could speak or vote at its annual general meeting and that a condition of membership was that members should not criticise the Foundation.

The Frodsham community contributed more than £40,000 to an organisation which claimed to be open and transparent, but was neither, he alleged. "I do not want the Heritage

Lottery Fund to get caught up in something it is unaware of because of biased information provided by Frodsham Foundation alone," he

wrote.
"I am now an elected member of Frodsham Town Council and intend

to make Frodsham Foundation accountable for its actions as never before.

The email was read out at a stormy annual meeting of the Town Council by Kate Dodgson, executive director of Frodsham Foundation.

She said it related to an application to the Heritage Lottery Fund for a grant to redevelop the Goods Shed, at Frodsham Railway Station, for community and business use.

Mrs Dodgson denied that the Foundation would not let members criticise the Foundation. But there was a condition that they should not misrepresent the Foundation

She said the Foundation had held a total of 35 community events to engage with the public, who had indicated they supported redevelopment of the Goods Shed for community use. Cllr Reynolds had chosen not to attend any of

them yet accused the Foundation of a lack of openness.

"I know of no project in Frodsham that has had this level of openness and engagement with the community," she added. Mrs Dodgson said in another

email, Mr Reynolds had claimed the project would result in the loss of 50 parking spaces. But the architects who had designed the scheme had advised that land to the east of the Good Shed was more than adequate for the development.

She did not know where the rumour had come from but it was a

"complete lie."

Cllr Reynolds said that the figure of 50 lost parking spaces had come from several people in business in Frodsham who were concerned at the leek of parking. There was no the lack of parking. There was no proof that the figure was incorrect.

If the council support the Goods Shed project they could potentially be disenfranchising 50 people who would lose parking spaces, he warned.

Chairman Cllr Mark Warren said a consultation carried out by the council in 2013 indicated that the people of Frodsham wanted the

Goods Shed to be redeveloped for

community use.

He called for a show of hands in support of the scheme and, on receiving, it, said he would write to the Heritage Lottery Fund indicating the council's support.

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
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Paying tribute to the fallen of World War One
