Editor's Comment

IT is good to hear from Cheshire Constabulary that police officers and PCSOs are spending more time in Culcheth now than they did before the new policing system, which caused so much concern locally, came into force.

Senior police officers and the Police and Crime Commissioner always said it would be the case and now they have produced the data to prove it. We have always had faith in

our police and, indeed, national statistics seem to suggest that Cheshire Police are ahead of the game when it comes to tackling crime and, at the same time, cutting costs. We cannot complain at getting a better service for a lower cost than people in other areas enjoy.

But we must confess to be being puzzled at one aspect of the new . service.

In an age when it is possible to speak and have instant visual contact with the crew of the International Space Station, as it whizzes around the planet at about 17,000 mph, 250 miles high, and when an average primary school pupil can keep in touch with his or her parents (and, seemingly, hundreds of friends as well!), why is it necessary for police officers and PCSOs to travel in Warrington every morning to be briefed and then repeat the journey at the end of their shift to be de-briefed?

We accept that local officers are spending more time in Culcheth -



and that is good. But surely they could spend even more time if some way could be found to brief them without taking them, even briefly, off their patch?

£10,000 grant buys club new tractor

CULCHETH Sports Club has won a £10,000 grant from the Premier League and the FA Facilities Fund – enabling the club to purchase a new tractor, with multiple attachments, to improve maintenance of its grounds.

The fund provides grants towards developing new or refurbished grassroots football facilities and the new tractor replace equipment which was around 30 years old. Culcheth Sports Club worked in



partnership with the Lancashire FA to secure the grant.

HS2 threatens years of disruption for villages

THE villages of Culcheth and Croft are facing years of disruption over the uncertain future of the proposed route for HS2 says local businessman Paul Taylor.

No decision has yet been reached on the high speed Golborne Link, which would pass through Culcheth Linear Park, destroying over 700 local jobs, and threatening the future of the communities it passes. However, a representative of

However, a representative of HS2 made it clear at a recent consultation meeting at Warrington town hall that it is intended that it will go ahead, despite reassurances given to many including local MPs that it would be cancelled.

It was also made clear at the

meeting that there might be some small adjustments to the route. The HS2 representative admitted that this would mean moving the line away from some communities but closer to others-comment further.

The line to Crewe will go ahead and be built by 2027, and the line north to Manchester and Golborne will be completed by 2033.

Mr Taylor, from the under threat Taylor Business Park, said: "Construction will bring severe disruption, and the line when

"The decision on the Golborne Link is being delayed in part at least so it can be integrated into proposals for the so-called "HS3", a line from Liverpool to Manchester, Manchester Airport, and Leeds. These are being planned by Transport for the North. "A possible route would be along the existing Chat Moss line which runs through Newton-le-Willows station and along the back of the golf course in Culcheth. A SIX-year-old Culcheth girl will fly to the United States in April to undergo a life-changing operation – thanks to the efforts of local fundraisers.

Heavy vehicle ban would cause 'traffic chaos'

PLANS to ban heavy good vehicles from a busy road at Lowton could cause "traffic chaos" in the quiet village of Croft, according to MP Helen Jones.

She has joined forces with Croft councillor Chris Vobe and Culcheth and Glazebury councillor Matt Smith to oppose the proposals being considered by Wigan Borough Council.

The plan is to "de-prime" Winwick Lane in Lowton where local residents have been complaining about HGVs using the road as a "cut through" to the East Lancashire Road after leaving the M6

Winwick Lane runs through Croft before crossing the borough boundary into Lowton.

The Warrington North MP and the two councillors fear "de-priming" would mean heavy lorries would still leave the M6 at Junction 22 but instead of using Winwick Lane could divert through Croft village instead.

Cllr Vobe said: "Although we sympathise with the noise and the problems residents in Lowton have experienced due to the high volume of heavy good vehicles using Winwick Lane, it remains a primary route.

"If large vehicles are barred from using the lane, and the motorway is

busy, they will clearly divert through Croft to access the East Lancs.

This has the potential to cause traffic chaos in our village. Many of the roads the HGVs would use are narrow and do not have pavements – they are totally unsuitable for this type of traffic. Our highway infrastructure cannot cope with an increase of this type of traffic through our village, and

the disruption to residents' lives and amenities will be devastating." Cllr Vobe said he would work with villagers to oppose the proposals.

Ms Jones said: "The 'de-priming' Winwick Lane will cause more

problems than it solves. "We do not want to see large

afforded to everyone. "When local councillors consulted with residents, they told us that their biggest priority for investment was the play

for investment was the play area and sports facilities on Eden Avenue – they are simply not fit for purpose anymore! Cllr Matt Smith and I visited the site with young people from the area, and they spoke to us passionately about what needed to be improved and how much residents would benefit from up to date equipment and provision. "We have been very forthright and determined in our campaign, and have

in our campaign, and have simply not let the matter drop with the council. Now, it appears that our lobbying has been successful.

been successful. "Once the project is placed in the council's capital programme, the next stage will be to consider a range of designs and consult with local people on the specifics – what kind of equipment they would like to see installed, which design they prefer."

Protecting our Village Green

The Parish Council has recently funded the installation of new "knee rails" around the village green in Culcheth. By the time you read this article, work should have begun on putting the new rails in place. The objective of this scheme is to ensure that access to the common is restricted and our valuable open spaces are protected as best they can be from the prospect of any incursions by members of the travelling community. The new rails will not impact upon any of the organise events which take place annually on the village green.

Budget setting - No rise in your precept

The Parish Council has unanimously agreed our Budget priorities for the year ahead. As you may know, just like the Borough Council, we are obliged to set a legal budget and ensure that a responsible and considered approach is taken to the way that your Parish precept (the money you pay as part of your Council tax bill which is overseen by the Parish Council) is spent. Councillors continue to liaise with residents on the kinds of things that we fund, or part-fund, locally. Any expenditure made by the Parish Council goes towards local projects and initiatives, for the betterment of our villages. We are delighted to inform resident that there will be no increase in the amount of money you pay to the Parish Council in your Council tax this year. We will continue to strive to provide good value for money and a high standard of service for local people.

HS2 update

Your Parish Councillors have recently reaffirmed their commitment to oppose the HS2 "spur" which the Government has indicated may run through our villages. A recent briefing by representatives from HS2 Ltd indicated that the "spur" is likely to go ahead, with no precise confirmation so far on the route that it will take. We await an announcement from the Government Minister on the details. In the meantime, Councillors continue to meet regularly and maintain a dialogue with households or business premises who may be affected by the plans. We have also arranged to meet with CADRAG, the local action group who represent our village in discussions with HS2 Ltd. The Parish Council will be supporting CADRAG and ensuring that strong representations are made on behalf of our community. When firm information is released by Government, we will of course keep residents apprised.

Speed activated signs

The Parish Council has completed negotiations with the police and are now in a position to proceed with the ordering and installation of two "speed activated signs" for the parish. These signs are being installed as a direct result of the feedback that has been given by local residents about speeding traffic and form part of our efforts to reduce inconsiderate and dangerous driving on our village roads. The Parish Council has worked with the police and Borough Council officers to progress this initiative and Cllrs Chris Vobe and Matt Smith have visited key locations throughout Culcheth and Glazebury with officers to identify where the signs (which are the "moveable" type) can be sited. We look forward to monitoring the effectiveness of the signs after installation is complete.

And last but not least.. as this is the first Parish Council report of 2016, may we take this opportunity to wish all residents in Culcheth and Glazebury a very Happy New Year!

"We were happy to hear the Commissioner confirm that Risley Police Station will not be closing and that it was his intention to spread out the use of local police posts such as the one we now have at the Scout Centre in Culcheth.

"We were also happy to have the Chief Inspector confirm that recent data showed that officers were now spending more time in our villages since the new system had been put in place. This is great news for the residents of Culcheth and Glazebury and we fully support the great efforts being put in by the men and women of Cheshire Constabulary on our behalf."

Controversial Labour councillor to stand down
