PLANNING chiefs have given the go-ahead for tree surgery work on protected trees at the rear of new development at Culcheth Hall Farm Barns, Withington Avenue, Culcheth.

The work will be subject to conditions, including no work being undertaken eight metres from ground level to retain the screening value of the trees. Ivy can be removed from the base of the trees to allow for more light and

incréase visibility for tree defects. In addition, willow growing near a pond can be thinned out by 50 per cent.

Retiring councillor 'overwhelmed' at support from residents

A COUNCILLOR who announced earlier this year that he would not be seeking re-election in this month's elections says he has been "overwhelmed" by the support he has received from local residents. Cllr Chris Vobe, a member of the borough council, Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Council and Croft Parish Council, announced in January that he was standing down from all three because of "a wide variety of other commitments" variety of other commitments.

He says he has not previously publicly commented on the feedback he has received to give candidates contesting the elections "breathing

space." But now he has publicly thanked all those who have offered kind words and good wishes since his announcement. He said: "I have been overwhelmed by the many messages I have

received from local residents.

"Whether 'phone calls, emails, text messages, or even those who have stopped me in the street, the feedback from neighbours, friends and those I have represented for the past four years has been humbling.

"I thought it was important to allow Labour's new candidates the breathing room to set out their priorities and vision for our community, breathing room to set out their priorities and vision tor our community, which is why I have not commented publicly before – although I have spoken privately with everyone who has been in touch and offered them my personal thanks for their kind words. "Since before I was first elected, I have been simply bowled over by the loyalty and support that my fellow residents have shown me. "I was especially humbled by the petition which was drawn up locally, asking me to reconsider my decision and seek re-election. That that petition drew such a high number of signatures is something which I find deeply touching.

"However, despite the best attempts from so many of my fellow villagers to twist my arm, I felt it was right to stick to my original

decision. "I am delighted to be able to look back over the past four years and "I am delighted to be able to look back over the past four years and highlight the many positive things we have achieved for our villages - those achievements have come about not because of any one individual, but by our community working together and championing our causes so effectively. It has been my privilege to work alongside so many local people to deliver successful outcomes on wide-ranging issues across Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft."



LITTER louts and vandals have stooped to a new low at a recently refurbished play ground in Culcheth, smearing equipment with dog excrement taken from nearby dog bins. Local resident Nick Taylor was

appalled by what he found at the Shaw Street Recreation Area.

Mr Taylor says the recently refurbished play area has become the target of some fairly unsayoury environmental crimes including repeated littering and emptying of

the litter bins. Bags of dog faeces were taken and their contents spread on ramps in the skateboard area creating an environmental hazard.

with broken glass. Mr Taylor said: "It was distressing to see the mess at the play area and the stench and health hazard it has caused.

Farm office plan approved

NEARBY residents have failed in a bid to block proposals for a single-storey office building at Dingle Green Farm, in Wilton Lane, Culcheth. Borough planning chiefs gave the scheme their seal of approval after deciding

the scheme represented a planning gare ine scheme iner scale of approval and account activity the scheme represented a planning gain. The new building will contain an office, manager's room, storage area, kitchen and toilets and will replace existing temporary buildings. Five letters of objections were received from neighbours who claimed the development would be unacceptable in the Green Belt and would industrialise a rural'area

They said there were existing problems caused by large, articulated vehicles visiting the site via narrow roads importing waste to the site. Residents had "had enough" they said. But planning officers said the new building would not result in an increase in the amount of waste composed on the site. It would simply replace existing,

poorer quality temporary buildings. The new building would be small compared to existing farm buildings on the site so the impact on the appearance of the site would be minor.

Culcheth Community Day postponed

FOLLOWING an emergency meeting of Culcheth & Glazebury Parish Council it was agreed to postpone Culcheth Community Day (scheduled for Bank Holiday Monday May 2) until Saturday, July 9. Recent heavy rain has left the village green in a very poor state with standing water in some areas.

It was agreed by councillors that vehicles could not get on or off the green - with a real danger of them getting stuck!

The event will now take place on Saturday July 9 – with confirmation that all the main attractions scheduled for Monday will be on show on the new date.

The existing offices had been marketed since 2011 without success and it was believed potential tenants had been put off by the possibility of noise and smells from the restaurant below.

It appeared an office use was, therefore, unviable and that a change of use to a cocktail bar, with light refreshment facilities, would enhance the overall vitality of the neighbourhood centre. There would be no changes to

the external appearance of the property.

Members were told the new business would have six staff, including two part-timers.

$\pounds4.5$ million to keep air ambulances flying

MARK Butler, a volunteer speaker for the North W est Air Ambulance, was guest speaker at the monthly meeting of Lowton WI.

In an interesting and informative talk, he explained that the Air Ambulance receives no government or central funding and is entirely

reliant on donations. The three helicopters – two from Barton Airport and one from Blackpool Airport - fly 365 days a year across the entire region, an area of 5,500 square miles. The helicopters attend up to six incidents a day and on average it takes just 14 minutes to reach the scene of an incident, where doctors and paramedics on board can provide life-saving treatment when and where it matters most.

Wherever the helicopters land, they are never more than 10 minutes away from the nearest hospital, overcoming obstacles of distance connection and excess

hospital, overcoming obstacles of distance, congestion and access. The majority of call outs are for road traffic collisions and also sporting accidents. The pilots respond to 999 calls, coastguards . intensive care transfers and hospital transfer transfers.

It costs £4.5 million per year to keep the helicopters flying! Norma Clarkson and


