WHEN residents of Howey Lane appeared before Frodsham Town Council expressing concern over traffic issues there were some councillors who appeared to guestion why the matter was before them.

They didn't exactly say "We an't do anything about it so why are you wasting our time" but, briefly, that was the impression the residents were given. Fortunately councillors went on

to offer sympathy and support so no lasting harm was done so the residents went away reasonably satisfied that THEY had not been wasting their own time.

the incident But perhaps highlights the relative inexperience of some members of the present council.

council. It is true that Cheshire West and Chester (CW&C) is the highway authority – not Frodsham Town Council. It follows, therefore, that If anything major is to be done to solve the undoubted traffic problems of Howey Lane, it is CW&C that will have to do it. But this does not mean that the

But this does not mean that the Town Council is quite powerless. If nothing else, it can make a noise! It can apply pressure, not just on CW&C but on all sorts of

organisations. Pressure which might eventually force them to act. Perhaps even better, it can work in partnership to get jobs done which might not otherwise get

done. There are numerous examples of partnership working in the recent past which have borne fruit. Not least, the pedestrian crossings at Netherton Hall and Weaver Vale Primary School which would probably not have been provided if residents had not raised concerns,

initially with the Town Council. It can work in reverse too. Unwelcome developments – such as an entirely inappropriate plan



to convert the former Frodsham Library into homes – can often be blocked if local councillors raise their voices

There have been so many changes at the Town Council recently that it is not surprising that some members have not yet realised just how much influence they have – if they choose to use it.

Council votes to move home again but only just

A DEPLETED Frodsham Town Council has voted – by the narrowest of margins – not to stay in its present home on the ground floor of Castle Park House.

Two members were absent, the council currently has two vacant seats and the remaining 12 members voted 6-6 at their monthly meeting when asked if they wished to continue with the present arrangements – occupying the ground floor of Castle Park House, providing front office reception and dealing with event management in the building.

Chairman Cllr Judith Critchley used her casting vote to oppose continuing with the arrangement.



This leaves the council with three other options:

1. Moving out of the ground floor into first floor offices in Castle Park House when they become available.

2. Moving out of the building altogether and taking permanent accommodation elsewhere in Frodsham.

3. Moving into temporary accommodation elsewhere in Frodsham while new, purpose-built offices were built on Town Council land.

The council was told continuing with the present arrangement would involve them taking a 10-year lease and it was unlikely there would be a reduction in rent. There would need to be a full reorganisation of the ground floor layout, investment in décor, furnishings, publicity, promotions, etc and employment of an events management company or their own events management team.

This would involve potentially costly initial outlay but this was likely to be recovered by future income.

Cllr Critchley said this option would only be viable if it had the full support and active engagement of the council – and she questioned whether there was enthusiasm for taking on an events management role.

A suggestion that events management could be done by volunteers was dismissed by Clir Mallie Poulton. "Events management for a house and grounds the size of this cannot be done by volunteers" he said

Cllr Tom Reynolds believed it was a "no brainer" – the council should continue with the present arrangement. There would be a net cost of £10,000 a year, plus rates, but there would be hidden benefits such as the free use of the main function room for meetings which, if they moved elsewhere they would have to pay for. No decision was taken on

No decision was taken on the alternative options but it was agreed that Cllr Paul Martin would investigate the availability and cost of using an events management company.

In praise of the oboe

SPEAKER at the monthly meeting of Frodsham Recorded Music Group was Alf Pollard, lifelong enthusiast of the oboe.

He presented a number of recordings of works in which the oboe had pride of place, whether as soloist or accompanist to vocalists, and recounted the history of the modern oboe with its rival components, principally the French and German schools. He showed examples of the two, illustrating the differences between them.

Paris and Vienna were the main seats of this rivalry, and he admitted, apparently with personal reluctance, that the French style, richer and more luxuriant, had latterly prevailed in popularity.

However, with the repertoire for the instrument having expanded very fast with recent interest in "early" music, he thought the German sound was nearer the authentic clean quality required.

Dr Pollard made reference to the supreme skills of the recognised masters in the recording era, while acknowledging the evidence in the music written for earlier players that they had abundant skills, often despite the limitations of instruments of the period.

Eric Jennings thanked the speaker.

Residents want action over Howey Lane "rat run"

ANGRY residents of Howey Lane, Frodsham, are calling for urgent action to solve the problems caused by heavy lorries and speeding cars

by heavy tornes and speeding cars using the narrow road as a "rat run" to avoid the town centre. They attended the monthly meeting of Frodsham Town Council to highlight their worries – and sounded a warning that sooner or later there would be a fatality if pathing was done nothing was done.

Resident Debbie Albeson told the council: "I hate to have to say it, but something major is going to happen – some Mum or Dad is going to lose a child." Mrs Albeson said traffic traffic



problems had been in an issue in Howey Lane for many years. But the traffic had got worse in the last

year and safety was critical. In addition to speeding cars, there were heavy tankers and car transporters using the road. There was noise and pollution caused by diesel engines in low gear as well as the safety hazard.

In places there was no footpath. One cottage had been hit by vehicles at least five times. A sandstone wall had been damaged and overhanging trees had been

damaged. Children going to school used the road and there were too many gates to the Churchfields playing field which children could run out of into the path of traffic. Existing traffic calming measures were of little use as they did not slow down the traffic

Mrs Albeson said possible solutions would be to have a 20mph speed limit on the road and another would be to make it one-

Cllr Frank Pennington said the council were to blame for trees hanging over the road. They should be cut back. He agreed the traffic

be cut back. He agreed the traffic calming was useless. "You could drive over those humps at 80mph" he said. Cllr Alan Oulton said it was a serious problem. One solution would be to make Howey Lane a

cul-de-sac but the cost would be 'phenomenal'

Chairman Cllr Judith Critchley said the residents had the council's sympathy and support. But it was an issue for Cheshire West and Chester Council as the Town Council was not the highway authority. But CW&C member Cllr Andrew

Dawson stressed the importance of partnership working between the Town Council and Cheshire West. The very fact that the issue came before the Town Council increased the amount of debate.

While the Town Council may feel it did not have any power, the very fact it was debated and reported upon could make a difference.

After colleagues enjoyed a bar and supper, Annual Recognition Awards were free Staff presented in three hotly-contested categories.


Marcus Lightfoot from Helsby

Helsby baffled by gypsy site bombshell

HELSBY has been hit by the bombshell news that a site in the village is on a shortlist of 26 potential locations for a new gypsy and traveller site. The proposed traveller site would by on the former BICC site, in Chester Road, Helsby – although locals are baffled as to where it could be as most of the site is already earmarked for other developments. already has planning consent. The list, drawn up by consultants retained by Cheshire West and Chester Council, was revealed at a meeting of the authority's local development plan working group – but only after an intervention by Frodsham's Cllr Andrew Dawson

He argued that the list should be published in the interests of openness and transparency so it could be exposed to full democratic scrutiny and eventually won the day.

The consultants had rated the sites Red, Amber, Green according to what they judged to be the planning and physical constraints – and the Helsby site was judged to be "Amber".

After the meeting, Cllr Dawson said publication of the list could now be seen as the start of a lengthy consultation process. Everyone would have an opportunity to have their say. But he pointed

out that the detail provided to the working group was insufficient to identify precise locations.

precise locations. Certainly, the news puzzled people in Helsby. General view was that the consultants had gone back to an earlier shortlist, drawn up in the days of Vale Royal Council. Former parish councillor Frank Thomas said: "This looks like an old list to me. One was drawn up by consultants for Vale Royal. It included the BICC site at Helsby and Saltworks Farm at Frodsham. "But Tesco's has been built since then, plus about 50 retirement homes and other housing. Planning permission has also been granted for more housing and for the new Helsby Sports and Social Club. "I just can't see there being any room left for a gypsy and traveller site." Saltworks Farm is not on the new shortlist.

Homes plan for old library is thrown out

PLANS to convert the former Frodsham Library building into 14 dwellings – with 14 car parking spaces – has been thrown out by Cheshire West and Chester planning chiefs.

The planning committee voted 6-5 to refuse permission after visiting the

site. Frodsham councillors Andrew Dawson and Lyn Riley opposed the proposals.

Afterwards, Cllr Dawson said: "The coach which took members of the committee to visit the site had the greatest difficulty in parking and I think this

"Councillors saw the traffic congestion for themselves. "The developer suggested that car ownership is low in Frodsham but I would say that on average there are two cars per dwelling in the town so 14 parking space for 14 properties would have been totally inadequate."

Donkey Derby cancelled after 30 years

FRODSHAM Cricket Club's annual bonkey Derby – a popular event in the town's calendar since 1987 – will not be held this year. The club has reluctantly taken the

decision to take a break this year because of falling profits – with last year's being the worst ever.

But it is hoped to bring the event back – possibly in a slightly different form.

Club chairman Peter Bottome said: "We realise it is a much loved event in Frodsham and this will be a disappointment to many supporters, sponsors and Frodsham families. "We would like to thank all those

who have contributed sponsorship of donkeys and races, taken advertisements in the programme and the people of Frodsham who have attended the event since the first one was brought into being under the stourdbin of the late under the stewardship of the late

under the stewardship of the late Don Mellor in 1987. "The event has generated many funds over the years, allowing us to build our own pavilion, maintain our playing facilities, field four senior teams at the weekend and provide cricket for the youngsters of Frodsham. All our cricketing activities will continue as usual but our fund-raising, this year at least, will have to take another form." Falling profits are the main reason for the cancellation. Last year's were not thought to justify the effort involved in organising the day.

day.

It has proved increasingly difficult to find sponsors and advertisers for

the programme. In addition, it has proved more difficult to find volunteers to sell programmes doorto-door – and it was also felt householders had become less willing to welcome people knocking on their doors of

people knocking on men agons or an evening. Costs have risen over the years – particularly the cost of hiring donkeys, insurance, the venue, prizes, and programme production. It was also harder to find volunteers on the day to ensure the event was run safely – an increasing event was run safely – an increasing

concern these days. Mr Bottome added: "Hopefully, a bigger and better Donkey Derby will return next year."

In the meantime the club is examining changes that could be made.

made. Door-to-door selling will cease, it is suggested, with the public paying on the gate. One idea is to promote the event through schools and another to have more events on the field – with perhaps an "open mic" to showcree Eradsham talent showcase Frodsham talent.

In the meantime, other fund-raising ideas are being explored – including sponsoring the ball at home matches for £30.

There are still two vacant seats on the council, created by the resignations of Clare Collins-Doyle in Lakes Ward and Laura Watts in Waterside Ward.


Will to Work welcomes the summer

Busting the Myths for Co-Habitees

Common Law Marriage

Cohabiting couple families are the fastest growing family type in the UK, with over 3.1 million opposite sex cohabiting couple families and 90,000 same sex cohabiting couple families in the UK in 2015*.

Many people think that unmarried couples who live together for some time or perhaps have children together have a "common law marriage" which gives them the same legal rights as married couples. This is not legally the case. There is currently no such thing as "common law marriage" in UK law.

So what happens if an unmarried partner dies without a will?

Unmarried partners have no automatic legal rights

to each other's estates on death.

If one of them dies without leaving a will then the intestacy rules would apply, dictating where their estate should pass. If they own assets jointly with their partner (such as a house owned as 'joint tenants' or a joint bank account) then these would pass to the partner as the surviving owner, but otherwise the assets would pass to the deceased's children if they have any or to other family members if they don't.

The surviving partner may have to make a claim on the deceased's estate for financial provision – which can mean a very stressful not to mention costly application to Court at an already difficult time. This means that it is essential for unmarried couples to have up to date wills, to ensure that if one of them dies the other will not lose out.

What about Inheritance Tax?

Married couples enjoy the benefit of certain inheritance tax advantages – not least the ability to pass the unused tax-free nil rate band from one to the other on the first death.

Unmarried couples potentially face higher inheritance tax after their deaths unless they carry out some careful estate planning. There are steps that unmarried couples can take, such as the use of trusts in their wills, to ensure that their estates are not subject to significantly more



inheritance tax than they would have faced if they had been married.
