BREXIT – In or Out? – That is the question

There is only one subject up for discussion this month and that's BREXIT. Personally I have never seen anything so important that I am being asked to make a decision on, but nobody can give a straight answer. I suspect that is because nobody actually knows the answers.

When I have attended Investment fund groups recently they tend to be guiding away from a leave vote. The main reason for this is uncertainty, because financial markets hate uncertainty. However, you do have some 'heavyweights' like Peter Hargreaves cofounder of Hargreaves Lansdown publicly campaigning for a decision to leave.

So will there be market volatility on the lead up to June 23rd? Yes, there will be. And if there is a leave vote there will be further volatility, both in the UK and in European markets. But, short term volatility comes and goes in financial markets. There is risk for the economy if we leave the EU, and that is why institutions like the Bank of England and the CBI are warning of this risk, as they should do. But to exactly what those risks will eventually look like I am not too sure that anybody really knows the answer.

I think that there is a distinct possibility of a leave vote, despite Cameron and Osborn's (and more recently Obama's) scare stories. I also think that when politicians only give you a scare story, it does make you go away from their own argument. I also think if Cameron thinks a leave vote would be so catastrophic for us then why would he let us vote anyway! It does

There are other issues for ordinary people as well as financial markets and trade. There is security, control of our own borders and immigration, and of course the biggest issue of all - democracy. We have a right to get rid of bad governments and unjust laws if we so choose to vote to get rid of them. But the United Kingdom's Parliament or Courts are no longer sovereign, supremacy resting instead with European Union & The European Court of Justice. EU law takes priority over conflicting laws enacted by individual Member States. And at a time when governance is being handed down more locally to regions, here we are centralising it in Brussels.

I think this race is too close to call personally, despite opinion polls and bookmakers odds saying the remain camp are well in front. But just remember on June 24th if there is a vote to leave, the sun will still come up, firms will still make things and people will still want to buy things. We may just have to sell things a little further afield, that's all.

Editor's comment

TWO things occurred to us after studying the results of last month's parish council elections.

Firstly, the number of candidates who were elected uncontested – in some cases whole councils being elected without a contest taking place.

Secondly, the number of candidates who chose not to align themselves with any political party, nor even describe themselves as "independent." In some cases, these were well known political figures who DID represent political parties when they also stood in the borough council elections.

The first point is worrying because it indicates, even more than generally low turn-outs by the electorate, just how few people are interested in their local communities. Parish

councils, we are told, are becoming more important as more and more responsibilities are devolved to them from the borough council.

But a council that is elected uncontested really has no mandate from the electorate – unless it be one to do whatever it likes!

The second point is, however, encouraging. We have argued for years that party politics have no place on parish councils. Indeed, seldom if ever, do they play any part in the decisions parish councils make. Once elected, councillors tend to forget their political differences and, generally, let common sense prevail.

So it has always seemed strange that at election time they fly party colours, wage aggressive campaigns and sometimes even say nasty things about each other.

Pupils growing seeds from outer space

PUPILS at Grappenhall Pre School are getting a taste of becoming space biologists after embarking on a voyage of discovery growing seeds which have been into space.

Last September, 2kg of rocket seeds were flown to the International Space Station (ISS) on Soyuz 44S where they spent several months in microgravity before returning to Earth in March 2016. The seeds have been sent as part of Rocket Science, an

educational project launched by the RHS Campaign for School Gardening and the UK Space Agency.

Grappenhall Pre School received packet of 100 seeds from space, which they are growing alongside seeds which haven't been to space so they can measure the differences over seven weeks. The children won't know which seed packet contains which seeds until all results have been collected by the RHS Campaign for School Gardening and analysed by

professional biostatisticians.
The out-of-this-world, nationwide science experiment will enable the children to think more about how we could preserve human life on another planet in the future, what astronauts need to survive long-term missions in space and the difficulties surrounding growing fresh food in challenging climates.

Stacey Seed, the setting manager with the perfect name for this experiment, at Grappenhall Pre School, said "We are very excited to be taking part in Rocket Science. This experiment is a fantastic way of teaching our children to think more scientifically and share their findings with the whole school as well as the

community".

Rocket Science is just one educational project from a programme developed by the UK Space Agency to celebrate British ESA astronaut Tim Peake's Principia mission to the ISS and inspire young people to look into careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths) subjects, including horticulture.

Lib Dems claim 'domination' after the elections

Liberal Democrats "domination" of borough and parish council seats south of the Manchester Ship Canal after the results of the "all out" elections were declared.

Cllr Bob Barr, leader of the Liberal Democrat group on the borough council said the party held the 10 borough council seats in Appleton, Stockton Heath, Grappenhall and Lymm North and Thelwall with substantial majorities.

Their representation on parish councils – increasingly important as environmental services were increasingly devolved from the borough – was also very strong.

He said: "When we are judged on

our service to the local community, voters have turned to us in large numbers because they know that Liberal Democrats work hard and keep in touch through local newsletters whether there is an election or not.

"Following the major set-back of last year's General Election the Liberal Democrat fightback nationally is based on being best at representing our communities."

In fact, a number of well-known beral Democrats, notably at Liberal Democrats, notably at Thelwall, chose to be nominated as individuals, dispensed with the party description and were elected uncontested.

Cllr Barr said this was inappropriate as party politics seldom, if ever, were an issue at parish council



Take advantage of tax free loans from your company

DIRECTORS LOAN

Provided a director sticks to the rules they may borrow money interest free from their limited company. This action may generate tax bills for both director

may generate tax bills for both director and company, provided it is executed properly, this can be avoided, how useful.

When a director borrows from their company, there are two potential tax charges. A comparatively small one for its director, and although short - lived, a much greater one for their company, however, the rules which determine when each charge applies are very diff

when each charge applies are very different. Since 6 April 2014, the most a director can borrow interest free from their company without it being considered as a taxable benefit is £10,000 (this was previously £5,000) so provided the borrowing is kept below the limit at all times there will not be any tax payable by them. The position of the company is a bit more complex....

COMPANY TAX

The company must pay tax equal to 25% (32.5% for advances after 5 April 2016) of the amount owed to it by each director on the last day of its financial year, unless..... the director repays what they owe within the next nine months Example below:

At end of Limited Company A's financial year 31 March 2016, on that date its only director owes the company £9,500. On 20 September the director uses their overdraft to repay their loan to company A. On 21 October 2016 the director then borrows £9,500 from company A and repays their overdraft By using this arrangement the company.

21 October 2016 the director then borrows £9,500 from company A and repays their overdraft. By using this arrangement the company side-steps any tax charges, and because the amount borrowed is less than the £10,000 it is also tax free to the director.

There used to be a method which enabled the director to work around the 9 month rule and thus avoid the tax charge as follows:

At the end of the company's financial year (31 March 2012), if the director shareholder owed say £12,000 to the company the potential tax charge of £3,000 could be avoided by lending the director a further £12,000 this was done by 30 September 2012 and used to repay the initial loan. By 30 September 2013 the trigger point for tax on the replacement loan, the company could have repeated the process again to avoid the subsequent tax charge. This method, christened bed & breakfasting, would have meant the company could dodge the tax charge indefinitely.

Predictably, the government introduced anti-avoidance rules to put a stop to the 'bed and breakfasting' of directors' loans. These new rules have applied since 20 March 2013. Now if a company makes a loan in the 30 days before or after a director repays a previous loan, the repayment is ignored for the purpose of working out if a tax charge

Mr McIntyre said: "People are coming into the village to visit M&S and parking for an hour for free.

"But this doesn't give them time to visit any of the other shops. Every trader I have spoken to has complained of a drop in footfall."

Mr McIntyre and parish councillor Sue Barlow had walked the village with a borough council officer looking for places where existing parking restrictions could be removed or relaxed or parking bays provided to make more parking space available. recommendations will be

studied by highways chiefs.

But in the long term, Mr McIntyre believes more radical measure are necessary – including a second tier of parking on the lower section of the

Forge car park.

He said: "The upper tier would be about the same height as the upper section of the car park so it would not be overbearing. This would obviously cost a lot of money, but there are ways of raising money, including, of course, the additional revenue there

would be from parking.
"The days of free parking are over.
But I think if people could have three hours for £1, giving them time to do their shopping, look around our great village shopping centre and perhaps have a coffee or a snack, they would be prepared to pay."



What's on Russian culture on its way to Warrington

A PIECE of Russian culture is on its way to Warrington thanks to a Russian language school in Grappenhall following dialogue between the Mayor of Warrington and the Russian Embassy.

Last February Konstantin Shlykov, Head of Press and Culture Office from the Russian Embassy wrote to the Mayor of Warrington Cllr Geoff Settle, saying "The renowned Russian sculptor Leonty Usov from Tomsk has approached us with the proposal to donate his wooden portrait of the Russian Nobel prize laureate in Literature Mikhail Sholokhov to a town in Britain."

Mr Usov is an acclaimed artist, who

has had a number of international exhibitions, including in Britain. Previously he donated his wooden sculpture of Shakespeare to the Shakespeare brittplace Trust in Stratford As it because Wassington Stratford. As it happens Warrington has an Avenue named in honour of Shakespear whose birth 400 years ago is currently being celebrated. Another coincidence is that Shakespear Grove backs on to Cossak Ave and Sholokhov, best known for the epic "And Quiet Flows the Don", which he wrote about the fate of the Don Cossacks. Cllr Settle said: "I was delighted

as we already have two famous sculptures in the Town Hall lobby one of Lord Winmarleigh and one of Gandhi. I thought that if we

could accommodate the sculpture of Sholokhov we would have a wonderful addition. I googled the artist and the Nobel Prize Laureate and realised the exciting potential and provisionally accepted."

The Mayor had recently opened a new Russian Language Saturday School at St Wilfrids CE Primary School in Grappenhall and asked their advice.

Yuliya Crane immediately wrote back saying "I am very happy to hear that the sculpture is likely to find its place in the Town Hall, which is a wonderful location for it. Warrington Russian Language School would be very happy to join unveiling ceremony

very nappy to join unveiling ceremony for this sculpture (and if appropriate can prepare a song/dance/poem reading by our pupils)."

Konstantin Shlykov informed the Mayor that "2016 has been declared UK-Russia Year of Language and Literature run jointly by the British Literature, run jointly by the British Council and the Russian Ministry of Foreign Affairs. This gift is a fantastic opportunity for a friendly and nonpolitical gesture that such a donation

would represent.

The Mayor has sent a formal letter of acceptance and received letter of acceptance and received the following reply from the Russian Embassy "This is excellent news indeed. We are now talking to the sculptor to find out when exactly he'll be in Britain – most likely it'll be in late May-early June. As soon as we have specific dates, I'll get back to you to arrange the donation."


