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One-man protest over bank closure plan

A HELSBY councillor has staged a one-man protest outside the Frodsham branch of the NatWest bank, calling on bank chiefs to think again about a decision to close on Thursdays – the town's market day.

Cllr Lance Yates carried a placard bearing the slogan "Keep this bank open on Thursdays" and asked customers leaving the bank to sign a petition.

He stood outside the bank from 9am to 11.45am on three



Thursdays and collected more than 200 signatures. Cllr Yates said: "I didn't take

Cllr Yates said: "I didn't take signatures from people who were just passing. I just approached people leaving the bank. "Everyone was utterly opposed

"Everyone was utterly opposed to the closure proposals – some people were literally incandescent. They were all bank customers."

NatWest have announced plans to close the branch on Thursdays from June 1 and also to reduce opening hours on other week days.

In future the bank will open at 10am instead of 9am, although it will stay open until 4pm instead of 3.30pm as at present.

3.30pm as at present. Cllr Yates said: "I have contacted the bank and they say Thursday is a quiet business day. But it is market day and the town is packed with people. Many market traders use the branch to bank their takings. I don't see how it can be a quiet day.

don't see how it can be a quiet day. "In addition, most people who signed my petition didn't even know about the proposed changes because the staff were not giving out leaflets. Originally the plan was to closed on May 16 but when I pointed out that leaflets were not being given out they postponed the changes. They have even had to have new leaflets printed. "They told me people can use

"They told me people can use the hole-in-wall machine – but a lot don't want to. They say people can do online banking – but many older people can't. People are thinking it's the thin end of the wedge and will lead to the branch eventually closing altogether."

The petition has been sent to the chief executive of NatWest and Weaver Vale MP Graham Evans has also agreed to write to the bank urging them to think again.

A spokesman for NatWest said whenever they changed bank opening hours it was in response to demand. When Frodsham was looked at, Thursday was found to be the quietest day of the week.

He added: "Banking has changed significantly over the last few years and the way our customers want to interact with us is also changing. We have to continually adapt to meet our customers' needs and to ensure we remain viable and relevant both now and in the future. We review our branch network regularly to make sure the services we provide are appropriate for each local community, based on our customers' usage and other ways to bank in the local area."

Why did "normal people" shun the annual town meeting? Councillors should be talking council to move forward and serve Frodsham.

IT was a Saturday afternoon and the sun was shining. Frodsham's broad, tree-lined Main Street looked a picture.

Main Street looked a picture. The car parks at Castle Park were chock-a-block and in the park itself, people sprawled on the grass or wandered among the trees enjoying a brief glimpse of summer. But only yards away in Castle Park House, at the Annual Town Meeting, the main opportunity for Frodsham people to call the Town Council to account. councillors Council to account, councillors outnumbered members of the public by two to one.

One exasperated resident said: "There's more councillors than 'normal people'"

The question was why? One member of the public said that after months of reports of councillors being suspended, bullying and councillors resigning, it was hardly surprising attendance

was poor. Deputy Mayor Cllr Mallie Poulson suggested that a sunny, Saturday afternoon was not the best time to hold the meeting. People would not want to spend it sitting in a room with councillors who had put the

Cllr Frank Pennington (right) said Frodsham had had 12 years of "bad council". But people should not blame the present council for what had happened in the past. He believed there was now a better chance for the new council to put Cllr Tom Reynolds (below far right) said the council had spent too much time talking about highfalutin

ideas without making about mighabuth ideas without making any progress. Chairman Cllr Judith Critchley, who only joined the council in January and was elected chairman the following month, believed there was now a greater focus and strong commitment within the

Resident Nick Smith said he was optimistic for the future. But he appealed to the council to "listen to the people."

He said a lot of council overspending had been due to "personal crusades" with the people not being consulted. He hoped spending in future would be kept in line with the budget.

But another resident said the Annual Town Meeting was one of the best kept secrets in Frodsham.

The meeting was told the council's expenditure in the year ending at the end of March was £350,667 compared with budgeted spending of £303,500. This meant £62,028 was required from reserves to balance the budget. But overall there had been £106,000 more income than projected and the level of reserves needed to balance the accounts was £59,000 less than projected.



Hourly rail services arriving in two years?

HOURLY trains from Frodsham and Helsby to both Liverpool and Chester could become a reality from May 2018 – the forecast date for the re-opening of the Halton Curve.

The Liverpool City Region Combined Authority has given its backing to the £10.4 million project and work to re-signal and renovate the single line track could

start in June next year. Weaver Vale MP Graham Evans has welcome the news as "a huge

boost" to the region's economy. He said: "I've been campaigning for the re-opening of the Halton Curve line as I believe that it's a cost effective way of connecting Halton, Cheshire, and North Wales

"It'll provide a huge boost to the local economy and will make Weaver Vale an even better place

to live, work and invest in. "This good news means we could see direct trains from Frodsham

and Helsby to Liverpool as soon as

and Helsby to Liverpool as soon as May 2018. The Halton Curve has been closed to regular passenger services for more than 40 years. But it has been kept alive thanks to the running of an annual "Parliamentary train" which carried local councillors and rail campaignees to liverpool campaigners to Liverpool.

There are concerns, however, that the re-opening of the line could result in increased parking problems in Frodsham as a result of commuters leaving their cars in the town while they travel to Liverpool by train. Traders

have warned that shoppers' parking spaces could be taken up by people who leave their cars in Frodsham all day.

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Answer:

Yes, under the new rules introduced on 1st April 2016 you are now required to pay the increased level of stamp duty on your second home.

However, if you are intending to live in this new home and sell your original home it may be possible to apply for a refund on the extra stamp duty you have paid on the new home, if you complete the subsequent sale of your original home within 36 months.

The changes in Stamp Duty were brought in by the Government in a bid to free up housing for buyers. The additional 3 per cent charge applies to anyone owning a second property that isn't their main residence. For example; parents buying a property for their children or a couple purchasing a home together where one is already a homeowner. This meant that a home worth £250,000 will now accrue an additional £7,500 taking the total bill to £10,000.

Only houseboats, caravans, homes under £40,000 and some multiple purchases are exempt.

There are options worth considering;

- Buy-to-let landlords could incorporate their business into a limited company so they'll pay corporation tax instead of income tax, which is lower. However, companies owning more than one property will also be hit for increased tax.
- Helping your children get on the property ladder? The only way round this would be to buy the home in the child's name outright as joint name ownership will still make you liable for Stamp Duty payment.

In the second half, Helsby used their experience to keep the ball and defend brilliantly.

At the end, midfield dynamo Harris Yassin lifted the trophy and goalkeeper James Knipe was named man-of-the-match after making some excellent saves.

Earlier, Helsby had defeated Ellesmere Port in a penalty shootout, Neston 5-1, OBA 6-2 and Fallibroome, in the semi-finals, 1-0.

Busting the Myths for Co-Habitees

Part two - Moving in together By Donna Eland, Wills and Probate Solicitor and Director of Rowlinsons Solicitors

This month we'll be looking at the issues which are important for unmarried couples to consider before buying a home together. When buying in joint names you have two options:

Buying as 'Joint Tenants' 'Joint Tenants' means that both names are recorded on the deeds at Land Registry, and each of you owns all of the property. When you sell the property in the future you would each be entitled to 50% of the sale proceeds. If one co-owner dies, the surviving owner automatically inherits the whole property.

Buying as 'Tenants in Common'

'Tenants in Common' means that each co-owner has a separate and distinct share of the property. This is usually a reflection of the financial contribution you have made towards the purchase price of the property. For example you can declare that you own a property 50-50, or in unequal shares such as 70-30.

your Usually ownership shares are recorded in a separate document called a 'deed of trust', which can also set out your agreement about other property matters such as who is responsible for paying the mortgage, and who decides when the property is to be sold. It can also include a mechanism for one party to buy the share of the other at current market value, how this right can be invoked and how the market value is to be decided.

If one of you dies, your share will not pass automatically to the survivor but will pass according to the wishes expressed in your will. It is therefore essential to make sure that you have an up to date will in place if you decide to own your property as Tenants in Common.

Cohabitation Agreement If you are an unmarried couple perhaps thinking of living together for the first time then you could consider entering into a 'Cohabitation Agreement'.

The Agreement can include provision for the retention or sale of the property (if owned) and the division of equity, maintenance for one party or for the children, settlement of joint debts and liabilities and ownership of other assets such as cars.

If you do not have a cohabitation agreement in place and your relationship



breaks down, there is very little legal provision to assist in the separation of assets. Legal proceedings can be lengthy and very costly.

Car Parking in Frodsham We all know that car parking is one of our pressing problems. The prospect of the Halton Curve opening in a couple of years and the welcome increase in train services this will bring is only likely to make car parking more of an issue. We've asked the ruling Labour Group on CWaC to ensure that every resident will be involved in the council's consultations and the two sessions planned with their consultants on 21 June. Labour has refused to commit to doing this. Instead they want us to nominate 'stakeholders.' In other words they want the meeting stage managed – apparently just how Labour are doing it in Chester. We've told them every resident is a stakeholder (along with businesses, the health service, the emergency services, rail services etc.) and we want every resident to be involved.

Household Waste Recycling Centre Everyone should have received a leaflet from the council about Everyone should have received a leaflet from the council about waste collections. Make sure you take the opportunity to have your say about our 'local 'tip.' The consultation is open to 10 June. We've been able to keep the site open – and potentially secure some improvements to it – however the site is only likely to be open 5 days a week. It will be open at the weekends – but on which two days should it be closed? We've asked CWaC to see if the tip could be moved from the station – perhaps to Mill Lane. This could free up space for more car parking at the station. Moving the tip is, however, only a suggestion. It is not a firm proposal. You can find the consultation on CWaC's website.

Gypsy and Traveller site consultations Labour run CWaC sneaked out a consultation for up to 26 new Gypsy and Traveller sites in the Borough without the usual 7 days advanced notice that the item was to be discussed. The explanation given was the council wanted a 'quiet' meeting. We have protested at this outrageous, cynical manipulation of the usual democratic

processes. On the casting vote of the Labour chairman the LDF Panel refused to revisit the item to allow for the expected scrutiny. The nearest site under consideration to us is by Tesco in Helsby.

Fracking policy Labour cabinet member, Cllr Brian Clarke has submitted proposals to the council, which if approved will regulate fracking in the Borough from a planning perspective until 2030. This is after CWaC Labour went into the last election claiming that they would bring about a moratorium on fracking in the Borough. This moratorium policy was declared unlawful by the council's own Borough Solicitor and Monitoring Officer. We are still waiting for Labour to explain how and why they made such a fundamental mistake. Did they not know, or was it deliberate? Either way it raises many issues about competence, respect and integrity.

We don't think the policies proposed by Labour are anything like strong enough so we have tabled a series of amendments to strengthen the proposed policy. The proposals are all aimed at making developers be open, honest and accountable. To make them demonstrate safety, protect human health and the environment, safeguard communities and crucially engage honestly with communities and course their approach with with communities and secure their approval to their proposals such as through local referenda.

Neighbourhood Plan

Neighbourhood Plan The neighbourhood plan is where Frodsham residents get to have a direct say in what goes where and what we want for the next generation. Do please get involved – as this is our and our children's tuture. For the plan to be approved it needs to be checked by a planning inspector Work on the neighbourhood plan is underway but we in We strongly believe that this using local referenda for the big issues and especially when it comes to controversial development, is the only way to go.

Council Tax and Special Expenses Earlier this year Frodsham was hit with the highest council tax rise in the entire Borough of 5.13%. This was down to what we see as wrong and poor decision making at both CWaC and FTC. CWaC was responsible for close on 4.5% of the rise through 3 separate decisions – all of which came together to hit us hardest. One of those decisions was the reduction of the share of the council tax charged to communities as special expenses. Special expenses is the way in which CWaC seeks to avoid communities like Frodsham paying twice for services they receive once. This can happen where services in one location are provided by the town or parish council where in other communities those services are provided by CWaC. The change brought in means that Frodsham is being forced to subsidise other communities. A working party has been set up by CWaC to look into this. We will be arguing that Frodsham council tax payers need to be protected from double taxation and this tax payers need to be protected from double taxation and this forced subsidy of other communities.

Innovation and devolution

CWAC is facing some big challenges. If it is to maintain quality services and find ways to keep investing in the things that matter to us locally it will have to innovate and invest.

We continue to work and alongside local MP Graham Evans to help deliver an ambitious devolution deal with the Government and the investment planned in key local infrastructure.
