Parish Council condemns any plan to close library

MEMBERS of Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Council have made strong objections to suggestions that Culcheth Library might have to close - despite asssurances no decisions have yet been made.

In a letter to Emma Hutchinson, Managing Director of Livewire Warrington, Parish Councillors have made it clear they do not want Culcheth Library to close - although it will be Warrington borough council who make the final decision following appaient public occurcitions

who make the final decision following ongoing public consultations. Parish councillors say Culcheth Library is an asset to the community, and have criticised the failure of Livewire to develop it to include other community uses which are not available in the area available in the area. Cllr Jacqui Johnson says: "No

effort has been made to widen our error has been made to widen our youth provision or increase adult education. The Library could be a hub for our community. The Guides carried out a survey recently which brought out some excellent ideas and showed the enthusiasm of young nearly for their library."

people for their Library." CIIr Margaret Webber adds: "Computer use provided by the Library for those who do not have their own is a vital resource. It will be impractical for many people to access alternative provision at the proposed hubs."

Overall the Parish Council believes that Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft would be getting a raw deal compared to other areas of the Borough.

Cllr Anne Roberts says: "One valued asset of a library is the ability to browse. The locker proposal is expensive, inadequate and doomed

to failure. It is inappropriate for the demographic of the village."

uemographic of the village." Cllr Ben Alldred added: "The Parish has a high proportion of elderly residents. The library is important in reducing isolation and promoting wellbeing. Its use should be expanded."

Cllr Pete Holmes warned: " If the Library building is vacated it could prove unmarketable and become derelict.

Councillors concluded: "We feel that any decision should be delayed until a full discussion about the future use of the Library can be

the future use of the Library can be undertaken." Borough Councillors for Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft, Joan Grime, Matt Smith and Jan Davidson, are also opposed to the plans. They say: "There has been a huge response in our villages in support of the Library. All age groups in the population, have told us of the importance of the Library to them. Many letters have been sent to us and to the Livewire Consultation, all of to the Livewire Consultation, all of them objecting to the Library closure. There is no doubting the strength of

There is no doubting the strength of feeling in the villages on this issue." The Borough Councillors add: "We appreciate what Livewire has done in encouraging sport and physical activity across the Borough, but do not feel they have managed our library with garking like the same Library with anything like the same enthusiasm. The policy has been to cut hours (and then say the use has

dropped) rather than develop the service. Groups that have met there have been told it is not practical to continue. The residents of our villages have been deeply scathing about the consultation process and many people consider it has been totally invalid.

"We call for the plans to close our Library to be scrapped."

LiveWire's MD Emma Hutchinson responded, said: "We have simply released proposals for consultation.

"Nothing is set in stone and we are of the consultation period, a report will be presented to Warrington Borough Council who will make the

final decision on these proposals. "It is vital that we discuss the future of our libraries, as the way they are being used is changing significantly against a backdrop of wider central government cuts. We need to respond to this and examine the options.

"These proposals have been developed by a team of experienced staff from across LiveWire which has included two members of staff who currently hold both strategic and operational roles within the library service and have the correct expertise and experience to develop proposals to reshape the library offer in the town in order to try and increase participation."







Culcheth Library

We are totally opposed to the proposals to effectively close Culcheth Library. It is a well located community asset. We believe there has been no real attempt to create a community hub there nor in particular to compensate for our lack of Council non -sport youth provision.

We do not believe there has been an adequate consultation about expanding, not reducing the use of the library. There is a big opportunity here to develop a community hub.

The proposals do not fit the demographic of the villages and discriminate against those without internet access.

This provided fat to bind the other This provided fat to bind the other ingredients hence, mincemeat. As the meat could often be rancid, dried fruit and other masking elements were added. In fact even the construction of the pies has quite an interesting background. They were originally an open tart baked with a tiny pastry Baby Jesus on top of the mixture.

During the Civil War Cromwell and the Puritans banned any and the ruritans banned any celebration of Christmas, so people began hiding the "baby" under a pastry lid in order to look like an ordinary meat pie and they have generally been this shape ever since. Being a keen chef, Ken interspersed the segment on food with one or two tips for preparing the Christmas lunch the Christmas lunch.

The ancestries of Santa Claus, rottos Pantomime, 1950's Grottos, Liverpool at Christmas time, along with fine renditions of pertinent songs and poems, were encompassed in the presentation and an enthusiastic vote of thanks was given by the ladies for an informative, amusing and very enjoyable talk. park! In spite of this, she passed. Another was a lady who loudly informed everyone that she was a doctor's wife. She had had lessons before, but had not learned much, taking off at 70mph with no thought for others. Yvonne refused to give her any more lessons, and saw her ten years later, still with L-plates! Another lady was told off by her

husband because she stalled the car three times. He said that she would never learn to drive. So she took the car keys, got out of the car, and got a taxi home, leaving him in the middle of a very busy road. Then she secretly had lessons, passed her test, then informed her family. 
