The Pound – and that sinking feeling!

The Pound is continuing to weaken against most major currencies with further confirmation over the last few weeks that the Brexit negotiations look like being hard fought.

City strategists who make forecasts for a living are now lining up to reduce their own forecasts for Sterling. Personally I have always held the view that trying to predict currency movements is like trying to catch a falling knife. The reasons for this are that a country's currency is calculated by several different measures. One being the balance of payments so, imports v exports. Also, there is foreign investment, as well as the outlook for foreign investment. And there is market speculators or City strategists. If you try to work all this out, you can sometimes be reasonably comfortable with your findings. However, when you try to balance this out with one currency against another, it can drive you insane.

Since the EU referendum the Dollar and the Euro strengthened significantly against the Pound. However, the Dollar has weakened over the same period against the Japanese Yen. So comparing the reasons for the Pound's current weakness against the Dollar and the Euro since 24th June it would appear that the primary reason for the weakness is market negative sentiment against the Pound.

So as the pound falls UK companies face a real threat from imported inflation. This was highlighted in a very public way a couple of weeks ago in the row between Tesco and Unilever over Marmite. The lower the value of Sterling the higher the costs of imports. But, as reported by Bloomberg in a recent report that almost 80% of the UKs top thousand companies use currency hedging to counter adverse changes in exchange rates.

So as we all too often see the financial markets (including currency) shifts in sentiment occurs frequently, and sometimes sends some assets or currencies running for cover. But in the real economy where business and consumers transact, then firms find a way of dealing with matters as they unfold. A case in point being the Marmite situation a few weeks ago.

Editor's comment

LIBRARIES and car parking are the hot potatoes around the villages – in particular the loss of free parking in Stockton Heath and Lymm – and the threat of closure of both libraries in the villages.

Well the good news is Warrington Borough Council has listened to the concerns of the 2,500 who have signed a petition opposing the loss of free parking for an hour on the village car parks – the bad news they have only relented a little – by allowing a 15 minute free period, aimed at allowing children to be dropped off at local schools.

The council proposals are still to be rubber stamped but it would appear that they have actually listened to the public's concerns.

It may have saved a lot of time and heartache if they had actually consulted with local councillors and businesses before implementing any proposed changes in the first place – although this would take time and effort – something the council struggles with during these times of austerity and constant cut backs on staffing resources.

Regarding the libraries the consultation period has now come to an end – again after being extended following a huge outpouring of concerns from local councillors and members of the public, with thousands signing an online petition opposing any closures.

In the grand scheme of things a saving of £300,000 a year seems to be a small drop in the ocean to maintain our existing library services.

Speaking to local councillors and LiveWire there have been plenty of positive suggestions and feedback during the consultation period – and I for one would be very surprised if we saw any library closures in Stockton Heath or Lymm.

Yes there may be some changes – but in a changing world, with fewer people reading books and using libraries, change is inevitable.

At Grappenhall the local community rallied to ensure they continued with a library service and there is also talk of local parish councils helping fund libraries, with small increases in their parish precepts.

If people are passionate enough to campaign for something, I would have thought a couple of pound a year on the parish council precept would be a small price to pay to maintain a library service. Let's face it many of us don't think twice about spending £2-£3 on a fancy coffee once or twice a week. Paying the same amount once a year to maintain a library service is a "no brainer" in reality.



WARRINGTON Borough Council has again appeared to have listened to the people after performing a u-turn on their opposition to an elected Mayor as part of a devolution deal for the borough – putting us in control of our own purse strings, in particular when it comes to business rates.

The decision has been welcomed by Warrington South MP David Mowat, who like many, is anxious that the council now consider doing a deal, with Cheshire, rather than Liverpool, which many believe would bring much better economic benefits to the town.

I for one, with many other business people in the town echo his sentiments. Let's just hope if we do end up with an elected Mayor, we can have an independent one who is not controlled by an allegiance to any particular political party!

Protestors campaign to save Stockton Heath Library

SCHOOL children, teachers, a head teacher, parents and other library users demonstrated outside Stockton Heath library to oppose any plan to close libraries in Warrington.

Only 24 hours notice was given of the demonstration or, organisers believe, even more people would have turned up. BBC television were present to film the protest.

Local schoolgirl Freya Macormac, aged 10, said: "We need our library because not only is it part of our community, but people of all ages love to read books

and not everyone has the money to buy them or travel further afield to get them. "Some people aren't lucky enough to have access to the Internet either and your local library provides this service.

"Our school uses the library a lot and the best part is the summer reading challenge. They can't take that away from us. The summer reading challenge encourages children 4-11 to read at least six books during the summer holidays. Over 640 children signed up at the beginning of summer when I joined.

Meanwhile Appleton Parish Council also lodged objections to any closures. Letters of objection have been sent to library operators LiveWire and Warrington Borough Council, who pay LiveWire an annual management fee to provide a library service.

In a statement, the parish council said: "The planned closure of both Stockton Heath library and Lymm library will result in no library provision, other than a 'lending locker' in the South of Warrington and this is unacceptable." The parish council says it is concerned that there is no firm commitment for a

"hub" in South Warrington, despite the proposals to reduce services.

Closing any library in Warrington will result in a loss of community facilities. Stockton Heath Library provides free wi-fi access, computer access and printing

and scanning facilities. There are no plans for any digital library in the South of Warrington and no plans for the replacement of the library service. A spokesperson for library operators LiveWire said: "It is vital that we discuss

the future of our libraries, as the way they are being used is changing significantly against a backdrop of wider central government cuts. We need to respond to this and examine the options.

The final decision on any library closure will be taken by Warrington Borough Council - and a number of councillors have already spoken out against any closures.

Walton Hall conservatories revamp moves closer



WORK to breathe new life into the famous Walton Hall conservatories is set to take a big step forward, thanks to a new funding bid.

Warrington Borough Council's executive board has approved the submission of the 'Walton Estate Conservatory Range round 2 bid' to the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF).

The bid is a major part of the plans to rejuvenate the conservatories - which have fallen into disrepair - so that they can become an iconic centre-piece for Walton Hall once more.

The executive board approved the submission of the round 1 bid to HLF in March 2015 and the council was informed in November 2015 that this bid had been successful.

Heritage Lottery Fund applications are a two-stage process to ensure that development proposals are robust and risk managed. The round 2 bid, if successful, will confirm funding to deliver the full project and the council will enter into a 20-year contract with the Heritage Lottery Fund.

It would pave the way to the restoration of the conservatories, with the council responsible for the management and maintenance of the buildings, and providing a high quality public venue for learning, skills development, volunteering and public.

Executive board member for culture, leisure and community, Cllr Tony Higgins, said: "Walton Estate is one of the jewels in Warrington's crown – a first class leisure destination which is steeped in history. The conservatories are an important part of that history, which is why we are working hard secure their future.

"This bid is a major part of our ambition to build an even better Walton Estate. Securing this funding would be a huge success story for Warrington, enabling us to bring these stunning conservatories back to life to be enjoyed by visitors for generations to come."

Key to the plans are the Friends of Walton Hall and Gardens. They were the catalyst for the project when work started and continue to support its development.

From the start of the Heritage Lottery Fund bid process, the council has partnered with Myerscough College, specialists in education and training for land based industries, and with Walton Lea Partnership, a successful local charity providing supported employment for adults with learning disabilities. They have provided expert input, ensuring that the outcomes are deliverable and robust. It is planned that Myerscough College will operate a satellite centre

for full-time students within the newly restored buildings, working on projects to benefit students and the wider estate.

The council is in discussion with other partners to deliver additional activities, to make maximum use of the restored site and surrounding areas.

The round 2 detailed bid will be submitted in November 2016.

Restaurant's awning plan is thrown out

PLANNING chiefs have thrown out plans for a retractable awning over a Stockton Heath restaurant's outdoor eating area.

Members of Warrington Borough Council's development management committee decided the awning at Ego, in Walton Road, would have a harmful impact on the street scene and also have a detrimental effect on an adjoining business. Almost 150 people had written letters supporting the restaurant's application,

but Stockton Heath Parish Council had objected on the grounds the design and appearance of the structure would impact on the overall visual amenity of the street.

They pointed out the property was located directly on the border of the London Road Conservation Area.

Four other objections were also lodged – including one from neighbouring business Costello's Bar.

Planning officers had recommended the scheme be approved.

Aegean gems

The Cyclades is still very popular; largely due to Santorini and Mykonos, but for those who are less keen to share their holiday with the tourist mass, there are the lesser-known islands of the Sporades.

The beaches are unspoiled, food is cheap and delicious and the atmosphere is wonderfully easy going. Lying off the eastern coast of Greece in the Aegean, the Sporades, meaning 'scattered ones' consist of 24 islands, most of which are permanently uninhabited, save for four -Skiathos, Skopelos, Alonissos and Skyros (the hardest to reach and the least visited of the four).

Unlike other sun-parched Mediterranean islands, the Sporades are swathed in pine forest, making for a surprisingly green archipelago, and between them they are home to beautiful beaches.

home to beautiful beaches. **SKIATHOS** - The most popular and cosmopolitan of the Sporades Islands is also the easiest to reach. As well as its international airport, there are daily ferries and hydrofoils connecting Skiathos to its three siblings, making it the perfect starting point for an island-hopping holiday, and is home to about 65 sandy beaches (a pebble beach on Skiathos is so rare that they offer boat excursions to the one at Lalarial). The beaches are kitted out for both families and couples, offering umbrellas and loungers for hire, and plenty of beach bars. All are blessed with water so blue and clear that you would think you were in the Caribbean if it were not for the backdrop of pines that often lines the beaches. Skiathos town is very attractive and during the day the town can appear rather sleepy, but in the evenings the waterfront hums with life and a daunting array of restaurants. Nightlife could mean a quiet cafe, a lively bar or an up-to-the minute music club - whatever your taste, Skiathos can accommodate it.

club - whatever your taste, Skiathos can accommodate it. SKOPELOS - The sleepy, low-key island of Skopelos has seen an influx of tourism since Mamma Mia was filmed there in 2007. Skopelos is still very much a working island, it has a more 'Greek' flavour than its glamorous neighbour Skiathos, and a lower pace of life. Strong traditions and considerable beauty combined with its delightful town and relaxed atmosphere, make Skopelos an Island to savour. If a Mamma Mia pilgrimage is not your thing then Skopelos offers excellent walking, mountain biking and kayaking opportunities. There are now four marked trails, most taking in a monastery or town

(the countryside is dotted with historic churches and monasteries, three of which are inhabited). The Town of Skopelos is one of the most characterful island ports in Greece. Strict building and preservation orders have kept it colourful, clean and neat with narrow climbing streets, countless tiny chapels (over one hundred in all!) and houses linked by bridges in the special architecture of the Sporades. Mulberry trees line the waterfront and shade numerous cafes and restaurants. Skopelos Town also has some good quality shops selling local crafts.

ALONISSOS - is a tiny, quiet island that brims with Greek chrisma. Home to about 3,000 people, its remoteness renders it ideal for clients craving total peace and quiet. Ferries and catamarans leave regularly from the main port of Patitiri for Skopelos, only 20 minutes away, and for Skiathos, another hour further to the west. This makes the odd day excursion easy, as well as twin-centre holidays. Old Alonissos, high above Patitiri, boasts stunning views and is certainly picturesque. Abandoned in the 1960's, the old houses are now largely restored and favoured by artists and writers. The village

has a dozen tavernas, several cafes, a couple of bars and a mini-market; and is particularly atmospheric in the evenings (it is recommended all visitors go for dinner there at least once). Alonnisos was one of only 22 areas from more than 1000 in the world to be awarded a Quality Coast Certificate in 2013. The seas around the island are designated a National Marine Park, set up to protect the indigenous Monk Seal.

Each of the Islands can be reached with flights from Manchester and even in early May the weather is warm enough for sunbathing, and the islands' pretty ports, restaurants, cafes and beaches feel lively but not overcrowded, making them all the more appealing for clients seeking true relaxation.

Residents fear Grappenhall Heys development is 'done deal'

RESIDENTS fear plans for 400 homes on green field sites at Grappenhall Heys are a "done deal" which will have a major impact on the local community.

Although local residents have always known the land has been earmarked for further development there are concerns over the scale of the proposed development which has been outlined by the Homes and Communities Agency - and lack of facilities to support the community.

The proposed development of 400 properties will include a mix of 2, 3, 4 & 5 bed homes, including town houses and 30% (120) will be affordable homes. There are also future plans for a further 550 homes on land at nearby

Pewterspear Green and Appleton Cross.

Local resident Jonathan Hatto said: "The public exhibition was low on information with no handouts or electronic copies to take away on the day although we were able to leave contact details to receive electronic copies after the event.

He said the consultancy hired to produce the plans, Atkins, had presented the proposed development as a 'done deal' and seemed reluctant to answer any

concerns from residents. Mr Hatto added: "Many residents thought that the plans had completely ignored the negative effect that 400 extra houses would have on the area, in terms of loss of green spaces and addressing the concern around insufficient infrastructure to support the development. Atkins basically stated that any issues brought about by the development would be the council's problem!

'Whilst the residents understand that the development will more than likely go ahead at some point, it's key for us to ensure it doesn't have a detrimental effect on Grappenhall Heys and the wider community." He said there were concerns around increased traffic volumes - which had already been identified by Atkins - which show that there are already problems on

Lumb Brook Road where it meets Grappenhall Road and around Stockton Heath.

"The addition of several hundred cars on the local traffic network will only exacerbate the current problems. Any planning application put forward to the council needs to have a great deal of thought put into it on how to mitigate these issues," added Mr Hatto.

Child Benefit -**Pension Contributions**

After new rules were introduced 7th January 2013, the Inland Revenue emphasised that if a parent earns more than £50,000 and are receiving child benefit, they may have to pay all or some of the benefit back.



It has been established that it is highly likely that many parents do earn more than the £50,000, possibly in the region of £53,000 - £54,000, what these parents may be unaware of is that they may be able to receive

the child benefit without having to claim it back later. It has been reported that around 1.1 million families would have been affected by the new rules which was dubbed as "a new tax on children", officially known as the "high income child benefit charge". Those parents who chose to carry on receiving the child benefit would have had to complete and submit a Self-Assessment Tax Pattern as well as baring to party outs a two parents in 1% Tax Return as well as having to pay extra tax. The tax charge is 1% of the amount of the child benefit for each £100 of income between of the amount of the child benefit for each £100 of income between £50,000 and £60,000 and for those earning £60,000 the charge is 100% of the amount of the child benefit, so in effect they will actually be no better off. i.e for a family with two children where one parent earns £54,000, the child benefit would be £1,752 per year, the tax charge would be 40% of £1,752 which is £700, if that same parent's income was £62,000 the tax charge would be the full £1,752. What many parents do not realize is that they can still receive

What many parents do not realise is that they can still receive the benefit without paying tax by reducing their top line income, this needs to be sufficient to take them below the £50,000, thus avoiding any tax implications. There are three potential ways to

- avoiding any tax implications. There are three potential ways to reduce the income as follows:
 Contribute into a personal pension plan
 By increasing charitable giving, the adjusted net income is the gift aid donation "grossed up" amount, i.e the amount donated plus the basic rate of tax. So for every £1 of gift aid donations made, £1.25 is taken off your income.
 Consider using salary sacrifice and opt to have some of your pay paid in the form of childcare. Childcare vouchers are taken out of income before tax is deducted so taxable income will also be reduced
- reduced
- A further option may be to buy extra holiday from your employer via a salary sacrifice, i.e say have an amount taken off gross salary for an extra weeks holiday. Whichever way you arrive at your adjusted income you will have to provide proof by submitting a Self-Assessment Tax Return to the Inland Revenue. Unfortunately it is too late for the paper version, submission date is 31st October, there is still time for the submission of the online version which is by 31st January 2017.
