Political Risk and Volatility

There are all types of risk that anybody who wishes to save money should consider. And there is now another risk to consider which is political risk.

Two monumental results in 2016 have changed the political landscape. In June 2016, we had the UK referendum, and at the end of 2016 Donald Trump's victory in the US presidential election. Both results have the potential to cause a lot of uncertainty for obvious reasons. And going forward 2017 will see further elections, first in France and later in Germany. In France, this Spring I have no doubt that Marine le Penn is relishing the prospect of her big chance.

One thing is for certain is that it would be a brave person to place a bet on the outcome, especially given what we have seen in 2016. It is the fact of the unknown which can cause investors to run for cover. Other people could say it represents a good buying opportunity because everything in the end may be alright. Either way politics is starting to play a part in the riskiness of portfolios and this is difficult to avoid.

Inflation – I saw a headline in the press last month stating that inflation was ready to rocket up to 4%. I recall at the end of 2011 when it was just over 5%. So, is this a problem or is it just high drama headlines from the press? It is certainly the latter. There are many economists who would argue that we need a good bout of inflation anyway. But the issues here are how inflation is measured.

Just over 12 months ago the same people were telling us it was all doom and gloom as we headed for deflation (negative inflation). This was largely brought about by the falling price of oil.

Now that the low oil prices have filtered through the system and starting to drop off the inflation measuring scale, we are now seeing the reverse.



Editor's comment

IN all that has been said and written about the plight of libraries in recent months, little time seems to have been devoted to working out why the number of people using them has plummeted.

Yes, we have heard all about the influence of the internet, e-books, smart 'phones, etc. But surely this influence is felt universally, not just in places like Stockton Heath, Grappenhall, Lymm and Warrington Lymm?

It is true that many libraries have been losing readers all over the country. But while there has been a 32 per cent decline in visits to libraries in Warrington, near neighbours Cheshire East came top in a survey of in Warrington, library use in the country's 55 unitary authorites.

Nearly 5,300 books were borrowed per 1,000 members, making Cheshire East the lead unitary authority for library services. Their biggest library, at Macclesfield, was the busiest in the North West.

So why are people on one side of the common boundary between Cheshire East and Warrington using their libraries more than the other? Is it that people in places Is it that people in places like Knutsford, Congleton, Crewe and Macclesfield have resisted the advance of technology more than those in Warrington?

Or are people on the Warrington side of the boundary less literate?

We can't pretend to answer the question, but it does occur to us that while everyone has been quick enough to heap blame on the borough council and library operators LiveWire, the real culprits could be the public. Let's face it, if Warrington could claim to be top of the league for library use, there is unlikely to have been any talk, or even thoughts, of saving money through closing libraries.

A curious choice of word, we think. Why did they not simply say everything is legal and above board?

Well, comfortable they may be, but from what we hear, a good number of people in Stockton Heath are far from comfortable. They include shopkeepers who have experienced a decline in business, and householders who have experienced an increase in the number of cars blocking the roads outside their homes.

The council has promised a review of the situation later this year and we accept it is far too soon for such a review to be carried out yet. But when it comes, we hope it will look at traffic, congestion, and footfall in the village and not just whether the changes have resulted in a bigger profit for the council.

Borough council "comfortable" over car parking charges

CLAIMS that the borough council's decision to increase parking charges at Stockton Heath and Lymm was illegal have been refuted by the council's transport chief.

Cllr Hans Mundry (pictured right), lead member for transport, said: "We are comfortable that we have followed all the correct procedures in introducing these charges.

"The pricing is appropriate and comparable with neighbouring authorities but we will continue to review the citystian." review the situation.

The claims came from Lymm parish councillor Anna Fradgley after the borough introduced a new charging system on Stockton Heath's Forge car

park and at Lymm. She raised a number of Freedom of Information questions with the council and claimed that the borough's parking task group had received inadequate information received inadequate information before it reached its decision. As a result, she argued, the new

charges contravened the Traffic Management Act 2004.

She demanded a review of the situation by the borough's legal department and said if she did not receive a satisfactory response she would have no option but to raise the matter with the Local Government Ombudsman.

Cllr Fradgley said: "I certainly don't regard Cllr Mundry's response as

being adequate. I am still awaiting a response from the council's legal department but I do not believe the council have followed correct procedures.

"Nor are the charges comparable with comparable authorities. You can park for 10p in Altrincham and for free in Northwich.

The changes at Stockton Heath and Lymm involved abolishing a free one hour parking period and replacing it with a 15-minute free period and increasing the minimum charge from 50p to £1.

Many local shopkeepers claim the

changes have resulted in a loss of

Disused nursery building can become a home

PLANNING chiefs have given the goahead for the conversion of a disused agricultural building to a dwelling despite strong objections from local councillors.

The development is at the former Ramswood Nurseries in Mill Lane, Walton – and the objections from local councillor Sharon Harris and from Walton Parish Council were based on the belief that the building had been erected as a dwelling in the first place as a means of circumventing planning restrictions in the Green Belt.

Walton Parish Council argued that the property should be demolished and the site returned to the Green They believed that approving scheme would prevent the from ever being returned to

agricultural use.

Members of the borough's development management committee were told a number of alterations would be necessary to the building, including replacing a door and inserting two new windows in the southern elevation, inserting three new windows in the northern elevation and providing two roof lights.

Two roller shutter doors in the eastern elevation would be replaced with patio doors and two windows in the western elevation would be replaced with patio doors and a new window.

Replacement windows would be installed in existing openings.

A new vehicle access would be

provided to Mill Lane to the west of

an existing access.

Planning officers said the building had been disused since 2010 and that any agricultural use of the

surrounding land had ceased in 2014.

The applicant had stated that there was no intention to resume agricultural work on the site.





Tax returns on time

As we start to relax after the January tax return mayhem, our elation at getting everyone's ("almost") return submitted by the deadline is mixed with regret that the clients who left getting their information to us until the last minute may not have received the same quality of advice as those who gave us their information earlier. Therefore, before we start the next cycle we would like to

emphasise that the DUE date is not 31st January. That is in fact the FINAL DATE.

The actual submission date for a tax return is any time between 6th April to 31st January. This is a period of TEN MONTHS in which to collate the necessary information and deliver it to your agent. It is with frustration that we receive the information we need to prepare an accurate tax return on behalf of our clients in the final few days of that ten months, especially if there is a need to complete an annual set of

accounts.

At the start of December there were nearly 300 clients who were still to deliver their information to us. Whilst a large number of these clients delivered their information just before or shortly after Christmas some waited right through to the end of January. The last two sets of accounts were delivered to us at 2.30pm and 4.30 pm on 31st January, resulting in the "almost" at the top of this article.

Please put this in your diary the due date for submission of tax returns is from April 6th and it is to your advantage, as well as our's, to prepare and submit the returns as soon as possible.

1,000 can vote in village referendum

JUST over 1,000 people at Appleton Thorn will be able to vote in a referendum

on March 2 – the first of its kind to be held in the borough.

They will be asked: "Do you want Warrington Borough Council to use the neighbourhood plan for Appleton Parish Thorn ward to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?"

If residents vote "Yes" the neighbourhood plan – drawn up by local people with input from the parish council – will have to be taken into account in determining local planning applications.

local planning applications.

It will not mean local people have the power to block planning applications,

but it will give them a bigger say for the next 20 years.

The plan has already been subject to independent examination to ensure it meets with legal requirements.

Pipeline peril for country lanes

WATER company chiefs have pledged to avoid major events at Tatton Park when they install a controversial 4.4km waste water pipeline along country lanes in the Mere and Rostherne area over the next few months.

The route for the pipeline has already been amended to meet protests that it

would impact on a Site of Special Scientific Interest at Rostherne Mere.

But local residents, who have been fighting the proposals for several years, still say the pipeline should not be installed at all.

United Utilities says the work is essential to prevent waste water overflows at

a nearby pumping station and treatment centre.

They claim the new pipeline – which will be of a wider diameter than the existing installation – will reduce incidents of overspill to a once-in-30 years level. They say they have been consulting with residents since 2014.

The new pipeline will run along Mereside Road, Cicely Mill Lane, Marsh Lane and Birkenheath Lane. The country lanes – which can all attract traffic when there are events at Tatton Park – will have to be closed for periods of three to four week potyeon March and June. four weeks between March and June.

United Utilities say they are working with Tatton Park to ensure the works will not coincide with any major events.

Events at the park during the period include the "Landscapes and Gardens of Tatton Park" exhibition from March 25 to July 30, Lambing Week at the Home Farm from April 8 to April 17 and the Tatton Park Country Show on May 13-14.

It is thought the work will have been completed by the time of Tatton's biggest event of the year, the RHS Flower Show, from July 19-23.



Library's future back in the melting pot

is back in the melting pot following the decision by the borough council's executive board to set up a working group to develop a sustainable library

But Cllr Tony Higgins, the borough's lead member for culture and leisure, said: "We have never closed a library and we don't intend to.

It had been expected that a decision might be made in March but it now seems likely to be November before recommendations are put forward.

The working group will be chaired by the borough council's chief executive, Professor Steven Broomhead and is to consist of two council officers, three officers from library operator LiveWire and two independent advisors.

But Stockton Heath Parish Council which has already indicated a willingness to contribute to the cost of their local library – has written to the borough asking that the working group should include someone from south of the Manchester Ship Canal.

Chairman Cllr Peter Walker said: "We want to make sure the working group acknowledges that Stockton Heath Library is, in fact, the library for most of the south of the borough,

not just Stockton Heath.
"We have already asked other parishes in the south of the borough if they are prepared to contribute to funding the library."

The working group was set up after a consultation exercise carried out by LiveWire resulted in a public More than 10,000 people signed a petition opposing any library



There was particular anger over any threat to Stockton Heath Library, which is the best used in the borough.

The council's lead member for culture, leisure and community, Cllr Tony Higgins, said: "The significant public feedback we received during our consultation has shown us how passionate people are about the future

of library services in Warrington. That's why it's vital that we examine all of the options very carefully, to make sure we get it right. The working group will help us achieve this.

"There are real challenges ahead. While it's crucial that we modernise our libraries service in order to make it sustainable for generations to come, we are faced with huge government cuts which are impacting on all of our services.

The group will, initially, meet every three weeks. Meetings will be held in public - except for when discussing information considered confidential under Access to Information Rules.

It is expected to make recommendations for consideration by the executive board in November.

Warrington Hospital could move to south of borough

WARRINGTON Hospital could move to the south of the borough as part of modernisation plans.

The posisble move was discussed during a recent meeting of the Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee at Warrington Borough Council Warrington and Halton Hospitals CEO Mel Pickup was invited to attend and share her vision of the future.

She says some of the hospital estate is now over 100 years old and now is the time to consider planning for a new state of the art modern hospital – although no specific new locations have been considered at this time.

Ms Pickup said: "Warrington Borough Council has just

completed consultation on its Local Plan where intentions to build more than 5,000 new homes and add nearly 300Ha of employment land have been approved. It is therefore essential to consider the impact on the town's existing health infrastructure which includes a growing elderly

population and is already struggling to cope with demand. "Some of Warrington Hospital's Estate is now more than 100 years old which does not provide a good patient experience and essential maintenance costs are spiralling. Anyone who uses the hospital will recognise that the site is completely gridlocked.

"Now the time to consider planning for a new state-ofthe-art modern hospital for the people of Warrington and Halton. No specific new locations have been considered at

But a possible move to the south has sparked outrage from Warrington North MP Helen Jones who described any plan to move the hospital to the south of the borough as "outrageous" and unacceptable.

She said: "This plan is outrageous and would massively disadvantage my constituents in Warrington North. This would create a Warrington Hospital which would be inaccessible for most of Warrington.

"I will do everything in my power to oppose these plans. Whilst a new hospital building would be welcome, it would need to be at a site which is accessible to the majority of the town. This proposal would benefit rural Cheshire much more than Warrington.

"I will be seeking an urgent meeting with the Chief Executive of Warrington and Halton NHS Hospital Trust to discuss these plans.



Village roads to go on priority list

MEMBERS of Stockton Heath Parish Council have drawn up a list of areas in the village they would like to see receive attention from the borough council's environment services team.

The list is to be considered by the parish council's Village Committee, which will place the areas in priority order before forwarding it to the borough.

Parish council chairman Cllr Peter Walker said: "It is an extensive list and has been drawn up by members after very careful and detailed consideration.

The borough's environment services department

has an eight member team deployed to look after landscape and street cleansing services in Stockton Heath, Appleton, Grappenhall and Thelwall, Lymm, Walton and Latchford.

Priority is to be given to maintaining the main access areas to the borough in order to create a good first impression.

Grass verge cutting will take place every 6-8 weeks, compared to every 2-3 weeks in 2015. But new machinery has been purchased to efficiently manage the growth to enable longer intervals between cuts. Grass cuttings will be left on the ground.

A number of pilot schemes are to be trialled to use refuse collectors to improve efficiency. A partnership with the Friends of Alexandra Park will enable refuse collectors to empty bins near the park entrances as part of their route.

Another trial will involve the refuse team emptying litter bins on London Road fortnightly at the same time as collecting commercial waste in the area.

The borough council believes initiatives like these will enable the borough to maintain acceptable standards of cleansing and landscaping.


