But of course, the issue of usage lies at the heart of the problem. If libraries had been in recent times attracting readers as they once did, there would never have been any question of closing any of them.

Residents of Culcheth and surrounding areas are, as we have already said, a pretty literate bunch, but they are vulnerable to the lure of the internet and social media as anyone else.

An impressive number of voices were raised in protest when it was first suggested the library might be in danger. Let all those people now put their money where their mouths are and make sure they use the library.

Directed by Jane Lyne, the show promises plenty of laughs, songs to join in with and of course plenty of audience participation.



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
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Friends group expect library to stay open

THE Friends of Culcheth Library now expect to see the village library stay open, following the decision by the borough council's executive board to maintain all existing library provision in the

existing library provision in the town. But the borough's commitment is subject to a "robust business case" being established for each individual library – and that may prove more difficult at Culcheth than in some areas because of the condition of the building.

Costly roof repairs are needed which means the borough will have to I explore the possibility of capital investment to enable potential partners who have expressed an interest in renting space in the building, to develop their offer. But the land on which the library

is sited is subject to a covenant that it should be used for a library or similar community use, which strengthens the case for maintaining

the library. Cllr Joan Grime, a member of both the borough council and Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Council, is secretary of the Friends

Council, is secretary or the of Culcheth Library. She said: "We now expect to see the library stay open and will be very active at looking at ways to opsure it continues. We have to show there is a robust business case for keeping the library open." The Friends have already launched a drive to find "well-being

champions.

The idea is to find about 30

volunteers who would be trained by a specialist social enterprise to learn how to practically reduce anxiety and help others grow their own positive well-being. Teenagers, working age people and older people are needed as "champions" 'champions'

Once trained the champions, based at the library, would would volunteer their time to support and help others to champion positive well-being support across the village.

Grime@warrington.gov.uk The "rescue plan" for libraries across the borough was approved unanimously by the borough council's executive board after they had received a report from chief executive Steven Broomhead, chairman of a working party set up chairman of a working party set up to review library provision.

Four recommendations approved. were

To commit to maintain Warrington's existing libraries provision and keep all existing libraies open, subject to robust business cases that deliver the outcomes of a new Libraries Partnership Group. These matters will be delegated to the Director of Corporate Services in conjunction with the Deputy Leader and the Portfolio Holder for Leisure and Community.

2. To support the Vision for Warrington Libraries.

3. To provide up to £1 m in the council's capital programme to support a planned programme of repairs, maintenance and investment identified in the investment, identified in the individual library cases and to support the investment in the book tund.

4. To approve the development of a new Libraries Partnership Group chaired by the director of corporate services which will oversee the development of a new partnership strategy for libraries and establish a new set of performance measures. The council's lead member for

Ihe council's lead member for leisure and community, Cllr Tony Higgins, outlined the proposals saying there had been no "u-turn" by the council as the decision was being made following extensive consultation. He said: "I've said from day one that we will listen closely to residents on this important issue

residents on this important issue. These recommendations are the result of months of hard work, with the views of local people always at the heart of the discussions.

"I would like to thank all members "I would like to thank all members of the working group who have worked so hard and so positively together. The financial climate is not getting any easier, but I have been enthused by the ideas put forward by local communities on how libraries can work in partnership with local groups, particle councils

Inbraries can work in partnership with local groups, parish councils and small businesses. Clir Russ Bowden, deputy leader of the council and lead member for corporate finance pointed out that the council still had to achieve £300,000 savings within the budget, so it was important for the Rusiness Cases to stock up

Business Cases to stack up. Under the plans, libraries operator LiveWire and the council will maximise resources by working with external partners at a number of libraries to create "mini hubs", with integrated services focusing and learning, wellbeing and learning, wellbeing community.





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
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Crimefighting Fund celebrates a successful first 18 months

A Crimefighting Fund set up by Cheshire Police is celebrating a successful first 18 months supporting community organisations. The fund was created for supporting organisations which help the police to protect and support victims of crime. An initial £25,000 was donated to the fund in April 2016 – cash which was generated from the auction of seized and unclaimed property – with a further £40,000 donated in Sontamber.

September. The funding is then distributed with the advice of the Cheshire Community

Foundation. Chief Inspector Alan Fairclough said: "I have the pleasure of working with the Cheshire Community Foundation Grants Panel which has provided me with improved knowledge of charitable law and applications which I have cascaded to our staff who volunteer in charities. "So far the Crimefighting fund has granted £51,000 to help 11 local charities to provide support to over 6,500 beneficiaries to reduce vulnerability, crime and improve safety. This includes Cheshire Anti-Slavery network, The Hardman Trust and Women's Housing Action Group. "I was particularly impressed with the Youth Federation bid in July 2017 who are tackling the growing concerns around cyber security threats and the shortfall in cyber professionals. "Through school events across Cheshire, the half-day sessions are enabling over 200 female students to learn more about the cyber industry, cyber security careers and to take part in coding and encryption challenges.

cyber security careers and to take part in coding and encryption challenges. As a result of the events more young girls will also be better informed about their career options in the cyber industry." Zoe Sheppard, CEO of the Cheshire Community Foundation, said: "We are thrilled with the impact the Cheshire Crimefighting Fund has had over the last 18 months and the partnership that has developed between our two organisations. Cheshire Police have funded a great number of incredibly worthwhile projects tackling issues which are prevalent but widely overlooked, including modern slavery and cyber-crime which can have a devastating effect on our local community." Acting Chief Constable, Janette McCormick, said: "We are delighted that we have been able to support so many people locally who are in real need of support. Cheshire Community Foundation has connected us to some incredible charities who are working with people in our local community to

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
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12 Daisy lends Mr Tumble a hand on CBeebies

Local charities and community organisations are able to promote themselves on Community Day with stalls and displays and there are also attractions for local children.

Cllr Keith Bland said: "Some people are asking why the work is not being down until after May but we have to try and make sure the weather is suitable for the work to be done.

"Weather permitting, Community Day will go ahead as usual. But we will probably have an emergency back-up plan again, with the event being switched to Shaw Street if necessary."


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New honour for World Cup winner Roger Hunt

The role of women in World War One

MEMBERS of Culcheth Women's Institute were told of the role women played in World War One at their annual meeting. But guest speaker Chris Wilkinson

when women were the property of their husbands and one man sold his wife for one shilling "with all her faults.

In the Victorian era, London was the largest city in the world, and the country was reliant on coal to drive the new industries.

Women were in service or worked in the mills. Even Queen Victoria objected to women having any rights – she said that "Equality is a mad and evil folly". In the 1870s, a college for women was opened at Cambridge but there were no degrees awarded until 1948

until 1948

When the war started in 1914, men were encouraged to join the army to fight, so there was a shortage of labour. The average number of men joining up was 20,000 per week. One million women joined the workforce, in jobs previously done by men. The men were sure that the women

but they surprised everyone. Many middle-class women had trained in first aid and nursing. They

offered themselves as volunteers, but the government declined so they went over to Belgium, where they were welcomed.

By this time, the farms were suffering from a shortage of workers,

and there was a severe shortage of food. Many women then joined the Land Army and went to work on the

Land Army and went to work on the farms, along with injured soldiers and prisoners of war. The middle classes were told to cut down on the amount of bread they ate, and to eat oysters, lobster and crab instead!

The war ended in 1918, and, as the men returned, women were told by the government to go back to cooking, cleaning and having babies!
