The ISA deadline approaches: making the most of your allowances

It may seem as though the year has barely begun, yet the month of March is already upon us. That means that spring is just around the corner. It also means that the ISA deadline of 6th April is rapidly approaching.

Individual Savings Accounts (ISAs) are tax-free savings accounts open to anyone over the age of 16 to deposit their savings each year. With attractive savings allowances, ISAs have become very popular with people across the UK intent on building a nest egg for their future.

As of the end of the 2017/2018 tax year, the maximum amount you can deposit in an ISA in one financial year is £20,000 per annum, up from £15,240 in the previous tax year.

This limit will remain unchanged into the 2018/2019 tax year. However, as those in the know will tell you, any tax savings are dependent on the amount you deposit into your ISA over the course of the tax year. Deposits cannot roll over from one tax year's allowance to the next, meaning that you can't 'top up' your savings in 2018/2019 using any unused portion of this tax year's allowance. When it's gone, it's gone!

Maximising your ISA allowance is therefore a great way to save for your future. This is further highlighted by the fact that ISA allowances can be split across different financial products, including cash ISAs, stocks and shares ISAs, innovative finance ISAs and lifetime ISAs (LISAS).

Lifetime ISAs, for example, were first launched in April 2017 to help first-time buyers under the age of 40 buy their first home and/ or savers to build a nest egg to use in retirement once they reach the age of 60. Borne of research into economic and behavioural psychology, the Lifetime ISA tackles two problems simultaneously: that many people between the age of 18 and 40 are not saving for a home and nor are they contributing a significant portion of their earnings to a pension.

Making use of an ISA allowance is typically one of the features of sound financial planning. ISAs, though, are just one of many 'tax-wrappers' available - meaning investors can 'wrap' their investment, sheltering them from paying tax on all, or a portion, of their assets. Your adviser will likely talk to you often about the wrappers you are using, how to maximise them and which are the most appropriate for your current circumstances. Editor's comment

WE may be jumping the gun, but borough council officers are said to be reviewing community recycling provision and an ugly rumour is circulating that the closure of the Sandy Lane Recycling site in Stockton Heath is on the cards.

It is only four years since the last attempt was made to close the site. It caused an uproar then and it is likely to do so again.

All the parish councils in the south of the borough objected and many individuals also protested. The arguments then were the same as they are today – that the "Sandy Lane tip" is vital for all the communities of South Warrington.

Its closure would mean people Heath, Thelwall, Stockton Appleton, Grappenhall, Walton, Stretton, Hatton and even Lymm who wanted to dispose of rubbish would be left with the choice of travelling either to Gatewarth tip or Woolston tip. The majority would choose Gatewarth, which would mean hundreds of people making the crosstown journey in vehicles laden with all sorts of waste.

The already heavily congested town centre would become even more so.

In addition, there would almost certainly be an increase in fly tipping across the south of the borough. And closure would also fly in the face of the drive to recycle more waste.

We accept that Sandy Lane is not an ideal location for a community recycling centre and that a few people living near to it would be delighted to see it closed. But in the absence of any other suitable site, it is all we

The borough has to save money – we know that. But we would urge officers reviewing provision for recycling waste to think very carefully. Any savings made in that area are likely to prove a false economy.

IT is good to see the seven parish councils south of the Ship Canal joining forces to fight the borough council's proposals to allow the building of around 6,000 new homes on Green Belt land.

working party representing the parish councils – A Grappenhall and Thelwall, Appleton, Hatton. Stockton Heath, Stretton and Walton – is already preparing battle plans to oppose the borough's "Preferred Development Option."

It is not often that the seven councils come together in this way, and indeed, they may well have different reasons for opposing the development. Some are mainly concerned about increased traffic and pressure on already inadequate infrastructure. Others are worried about loss of open, green,



spaces.

But they are united in saying that development on the scale being suggested is unacceptable.

We congratulate them on their resolute stance - and hope that individual residents will join them in mounting a strong defence of green fields which once lost can never be

mums surprised me by giving birth at sensible times during the day and not in the middle of the night which has happened previously. The twins were born at 9.30am followed by the triplets at 1.30pm. I'm so proud of Rose and Eve and the kids are just beautiful. We're hoping to have them on show to the public in time for the Easter holidays.'

Peter plans to organise a competition for school children to win the chance to name the new arrivals.

He said: "First off I am raising funds for Holidays for Heroes in Jersey who send sick and injured veterans and service personnel on holiday along with their families. We benefitted from a one of these holidays, so I know first hand the benefits they bring.'

"As part of my fundraising year I've organised two charity functions. First one is an 80s concert at the Parr Hall with Nathan Moore and Owen Paul with special guests Electro80s.

Costa Rica - Through the eyes of our lovely clients!

A bespoke guided tour through five locations in Costa Rica. Inspiring, enlightening and educational.

Our clients visited in January this year and have been kind enough to write a short blog for you all to read. They flew into San Jose for the start of their journey, then to Tortuguero, Arenal which is dominated by the spectacular Arenal Volcano. Monteverde followed, which takes you 1400 metres high and

the final destination of Playa Quisales for a relaxing beach stay. Please enjoy! Our journey began in San Jose and the mountains above the Central Valley. On our way to 5000 feet we visited a coffee plantation then climbed to a spectacular high valley with torrential waterfalls that strides the continental divide. Water flows east to the Caribbean west to the Pacific. Exotic butterflies, hummingbirds and huge diversity of bird life.

Tortuguero in Caribbean rainforest. Hotter and much more humid than the central valley. Our jungle lodge was on a 200m wide strip of land between the Caribbean Sea and the Tortuguero river. Last leg of our arrival was a ninety minute flat bottomed boat



through the rain forest with plenty of wildlife to watch out for. We saw the previously unimaginable sight of tree sloths at close quarters in the wild. We met with an 'Attenborough-worth' of rainforest biology; birds, bats, trees, flowers in species and varieties too numerous to list. We got up close with iguanas, spider monkeys, howler monkeys and white faced capuchins.

From the Caribbean coast we headed back towards the central mountains then north to the volcanic area of Arenal. Our stay in Arenal was perfect with more time hiking through rainforest though at a slower more considerate pace with an outstanding guide who saw everything and spent time to ensure we did too. On our own - or in a large group we would have been lucky to see 10% of what he revealed to us. On our second day we went hiking alone trying to put into practice the observation skills we'd learned. Throughout our stay in Arenal the volcano stayed almost entirely free of cloud. We shot a thousand pictures but could never reproduce what we saw with our own eves.

We left the rain forest on the foothills of Mount Arenal to climb to the cloud forest of Monteverde. A lovely journey beginning with a long boat ride across lake Arenal then a 30km climb on unmade road to Santa Elena. Bumpy,

but unforgettable views.

The cloud forest sits atop the continental divide and its unique environment is maintained owing to the interaction of the Caribbean and Pacific wind systems that collide there creating an almost permanent mist. Rainfall here is about a third of the rainforest area but the cloud forest is bathed in moisture creating a unique atmospheric environment in which to walk and observe the incredible

complexity and genius of nature.

The cloud forest of Monteverde was our fourth of five locations on this wonderful trip. From there we drove down to the Pacific coast and sailed across to the Nicoya Peninsula to indulge in a few days of beachside relaxation at Tango Mar - truly a

paradise on earth.

Throughout our trip we stayed in beautiful locations with first class accommodation as we experienced the magic of this extraordinary country. We were guided through all of the key areas of the trip by accredited private guides and drivers who were all super professionals and gave us a real education. Costa Ricans are enthusiastic and passionate about their country. They truly believe in the leadership position Costa Rica has in ecology, environmentalism and conservation and they are all proudly and fiercely protective of it.

Seven parish councils unite to fight Green Belt housing

ALL the parish councils in the South of Warrington have agreed to unite to fight the borough council's proposals to allow the building of about 6,000 new homes on Green Belt land.

A working party representing the seven councils – Appleton, Grappenhall and Thelwall, Hatton, Lymm, Stockton Heath, Stretton and Walton – has already met twice this year

already met twice this year.
Chairman Cllr Cliff Taylor, of
Grappenhall and Thelwall Parish
Council, said: "We have agreed to unite
on this issue and to prepare for battle."

It was in July last year that the borough council issued its "Preferred Development Option" – a precursor to the Local Plan.

It proposed taking a large part of South Warrington out of the Green Belt and to allow the building of about 6,000 homes over a 20-year period.

The public consultation which

followed revealed deep seated anger among residents.

All seven parish councils opposed the proposals and there were more than 4,000 responses from members of the public and local organisations.

Cllr Taylor said: "There was enormous public anger at the proposals themselves and also at the unsatisfactory way in which the consultation was handled, with a deadline that was too tight and with queues forming to view the proposals. The borough council now intends to issue an amended plan, which is expected in the autumn or winter

"When the revised plan is issued for consultation, we will have a fully-briefed professional planning consultant already in place and ready to argue our case.

"The existing Green Belt was only put in place by the borough council itself in 2015 and the united parish councils have already prepared a brief for the consultant with the objective of defending the Green Belt as it stands today.

"The consultation made it very clear that our Green Belt is highly valued by the people of South Warrington. We all know that if it goes, it will be gone for ever. That is simply unacceptable.

"If the borough council decides to push ahead with its original proposals in spite of the feelings of residents, we are determined to be in a position to defend the Green Belt to the very best of our ability".



Residents celebrate after bus route altered

RESIDENTS of All Saints Drive, Thelwall are celebrating after bus chiefs announced that the Number Six service would no longer go down their road.

The announcement by Network Warrington, at a special roadshow at Stockton Heath, to introduce their new Cheshire Cat service in the south of the borough, came after an 18-month campaign by residents to get the service re-routed.

It was originally introduced as a cost-cutting measure to turn down All Saints Drive, instead of continuing

along Stockport Road, turning left down Lymm Road and then past the Pickering Arms.

Over the past 18 months, residents and local councillors have opposed the decision to use the residential avenue, calling it "disruptive."

Now residents have expressed relief

that the bus company has listened to their concerns.

A spokesman said: "We wish Network Warrington well in the future in providing a comprehensive and hopefully profitable bus service with both the existing and new Cheshire Cat services."

Trading and private income

with any evidence to support where unidentified, untaxed income has

The amount(s) discovered may have been legitimately received from non-business sources, i.e gifts or loan(s) from triends or family during the tax year of enquiry. If you are unable to show to the complete satisfaction of HMRC that these amounts are something other than untaxed, undeclared business income, the end result on those amounts not proven could be as follow, tax payable, possible class 4 National Insurance, interest, and penalties. Worse still, HMRC may assume that the same circumstances arose in earlier and subsequent years which have already been reported. They can then raise assessments for tax etc. An example of this is shown below:

HMRC opened an enquiry into a taxpayer's tax return for 2009/2010. The taxpayer had moved from Ghana to the UK, with family members still living in Ghana and two brothers living in London. A bank account existed in the name of one brother, the taxpayer had been granted access to the account for his business income. HMRC determined that this bank account was a business account and that cash receipts of $\pounds 6,740$ and bank deposits of $\pounds 14,160$ paid in during 2009/2010 were undisclosed taxable earnings.

The tax payer advised the Inland Revenue that the £6,740 had been deposited by members of his family in order to support him whilst in the UK. His mother, a teacher, had set up a school in Ghana to which he had contributed £21,000 towards the cost of setting it up. Additionally a friend of his wife's made a loan of £14,160 to help toward the contribution he had made for the school and had been deposited in the bank account, his father subsequently agreed to repay the loan.

A tribunal concluded that the tax payer had demonstrated that the monies paid into the bank account in 2009/2010 were not undeclared taxable earnings. It was also their view that the other years could only be assessed on the 'presumption of continuity', if there had been a pattern of conditions established. In this case the tribunal were unable to see any such predictable patterns.

NOTE: It is prudent to keep records and documentary evidence supporting the source and nature of any non-business income, reducing the possibility of HMRC attempting to argue that the receipts signify undeclared business income, possibly seeking to charge additional tax, interest and penalties.



"I have put in a formal complaint


on the basis that the borough is discriminating against a section of the community - largely the elderly and vulnerable.

"If I don't get some satisfaction I shall be complaining to the Local Government Ombudsman."

"Customers could subscribe to the scheme in libraries and Golden Gates Housing Trust offices. Here, staff would support customers to subscribe online, reducing the cost to the online fee."


