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What is the tapered annual allowance and how could it affect you?

One of the key advantages of saving for your retirement through a pension scheme is the tax relief you receive on the money you contribute, usually available at your usual rate of tax. The 'Annual Allowance' limits the amount of contributions both you and your employer can make to your pension in a year which benefit from tax relief and is currently set at £40,000.

However, in April 2016, the government also introduced the 'Tapered Annual **Allowance'**, which reduced annual limit for those whose total income exceeds £150.000. This amount includes your salary, bonuses, dividends, savings interest and employer pension contributions. For every income above £150,000, your Annual Allowance will be reduced by £1, up to a maximum reduction of £30,000. So that those who receive a one-off increase in pension contributions from their employer are not unfairly caught out, the government also ensured that the Tapered Annual Allowance only applies to those whose taxable income before employer pension contributions is above £110,000.

Looking at some examples shows how the Tapered Annual Allowance works. Andy receives a salary of £160,000 in the 2017/18 tax year, with a further £16,000 of pension contributions from his employer. This gives a total income of £176,000, which is £26,000 over the £150,000 limit. Andy's Annual Allowance is therefore reduced by £13,000 (half

of that amount), meaning the amount of his pension contributions which can benefit from tax relief during 2017/18 is lowered from £40,000 to £27,000.

Bethany, meanwhile, earns a salary of £195,000 in the same year, with her employer making £15,000 of pension contributions. Her income from rental properties, savings and a share portfolio amount to £20,000, giving Bethany a total income of £230,000, exceeding the £150,000 limit by £80,000. As half of this amount is £40,000, Bethany will receive the maximum reduction of £30,000. She will therefore only receive tax relief on up to £10,000 of her pension contributions in 2017/18.

If the Tapered Annual Allowance affects you and you're wondering whether there are any legal workarounds which can be implemented to avoid being hit by it, the short answer is that there aren't. Of course, if your total income decreases then your Annual Allowance will increase again. But apart from either earning less or reducing the amount you and your employer contribute to your pension. Now with the possibility of a huge distribution centre on Green Belt Land at Grappenhall bordering with nearby Appleton, things seem to be going from had to worse

going from bad to worse.

Although this is still at the speculative stage with a scoping application it is clear developers have their eyes on this huge area of rolling farm land which includes a historic monument and six residential properties.

Having visited the site which is close to the motorway roundabouts and Poplars Truck Stop i can't think of anything worse for this location.

I am realist and realise that some Green Belt land will be developed but I haver to say I believe this site is totally unsuitable for a distribution centre the size of 45 rugby pitches!

The traffic from the nearby Distribution Centre at Appleton Thorn, compounded by the huge numbers of HGVs visiting the Poplars Truck Stop, make this land totally unsuitable for a development of this scale on traffic grounds alone - not to mention pollution and litter.

We await the council's final PDO announcement following the consultation with great interest, especially involving this area of land. Meanwhile I have been given

Parents to tackle Three Peaks Challenge for school

A TEAM of 13 parents from Stockton Heath Primary School will head for Scotland on July 6 – to start an attempt on the Three Peaks Challenge.

At 7.30am the following day they begin their ascent of Ben Nevis – and the clock will be ticking away the 24 hours they have to climb all three peaks.

The other two, of course, are Scafell Pike and Snowdon – and the total walking distance is 23 miles (37km) and the total ascent is 3064 metres (10,052ft).

Training began in February with a cold walk at Trentabank Reservoir near Macclesfield, and come June they will be walking Snowdon twice on the same day to complete the main training

training.

By the time they start the challenge, they will have walked Snowdon six times.

Opposition mounts to Green Belt distribution centre

PARISH councils and local residents are voicing their opposition to any plans to allow a major distribution centre the size of 45 rugby pitches on green belt land at Grappenhall.

A request for an environmental impact assessment scoping opinion in relation to the proposed development involving 325,150m2 of employment floorspace on the land - adjacent to junction 20 of the M6 and junction 9 of the M56 been lodged with

Warrington borough council.

Agents Spawforths, on behalf
of Langtree Property Partners and
First Panattoni, are drawing up
plans to submit an outline planning application for the development of

The site, bounded by Grappenhall Lane and Cliff Lane to the north and the motorway slip road to the east, includes an ancient monument, a farm and six residential properties which are now under threat.

Warrington Borough Council's local plan preferred development option (PDO) has earmarked the area, which is currently Green Belt, as future employment land as an extension of the Barleycastle Trading Estate.

A scoping opinion seeks the authority's formal view on what issues an environmental statement should contain in the event of a planning application.

Local resident Bill Roberts, who been campaigning development on green belt land in the area, local residents and local parish councils have all voiced their opposition.

He said: "This is designated Green

Belt, includes an ancient woodland and ancient monument and moat with a public right of way. It is hardcore do not touch land and this is the first speculative step towards a planning application.

"Enough is enough. We need to stand together for the sake of ourselves and our children and protect this green belt which provides a buffer between Grappenhall and the motorway.

"Before we know it we will have another Omega development!" Grappenhall and Thelwall Parish Council has also voiced major concerns saying the request for scoping opinion is extremely premature. They say the land has not yet been confirmed or disregarded as employment land and will not be until at least Autumn.

In a letter to borough planning officer Michael Davies they say: "We are aware that the land was put forward as a 'possible' site for B8 employment land in the PDO, but the fact that there was unprecedented and massive local opposition to the PDO consultation (4000-6000 consultee responses), on the grounds of inappropriate loss of Green Belt and lack of proposed infrastructure traffic improvements/ (including upgrade), then even carrying out an EIA at this stage is wholly inappropriate and far too early. The PDO was put out as a 'consultation' and should not be taken as a 'given'.

"The parish council originally objected to the PDO consultation on grounds that the need for new homes and employment land (partly on Green Belt) is based on over-optimistic projections. There are no 'exceptional circumstances'demonstrated to justify that Green Belt land needs to be utilised. Also, the concept of a 'New City' has no demonstrable public support and is not based on any feasibility or viability work that might



suggest this option is deliverable.

"Any subsequent submission of an outline planning for this site (either before or after the release of the revised PDO/Local Plan) will be met with opposition from the Parish Council. It is our firm belief that development should not take place on Green Belt land, as no 'exceptional circumstances' are demonstrated."

In a similar letter Appleton Parish Council has voiced the following concerns: "The opinion of the parish council that any proposal for any planning application on this land would be unacceptable. The land is Green Belt and therefore should be protected from any development of any kind. The land is of high landscape value and is valuable greenbelt. Bradley Hall is a site of historic value and this and the surrounding fields must be protected from any sort of development due to environmental and ecology reasons.

"The parish council also feel

the development of land is not acceptable due to the traffic implications. Any additional industrial/distribution hub will be entirely dependent upon Heavy Good Vehicles. The existing local roads and motorways junctions could not cope with any additional traffic.

"The parish council are increasingly concerned with the amount of litter around the Appleton Thorn trading estate and any future development would just increase litter issues around the area. The parish douncil have major concerns regarding additional pollution problems and as such, any development of this land is not acceptable.

Meanwhile all the South Warrington parish councils are working together the employ a planning consultant in readiness to respond to the revised Local Plan, due in the autumn.

This same working group is currently working on a joint response to the request for a scoping opinion.

Planners find fault with tennis club's floodlight scheme



STOCKTON Heath Tennis Club has failed in a fourth bid to gain planning consent for floodlighting on its courts at Delphfields Road, Appleton.

The borough council's development management committee refused permission for the scheme after nearby residents lodged objections on the grounds it would lead to a loss of residential amenity.

Appleton Parish Council also objected and the committee was told there had been opposition from 19 nearby residents and a protest petition signed by 46 people. Officers had recommended the scheme be approved.

The club has twice before had similar applications turned

down, in 1994 and 1995 and withdrew a third application

Currently, when members need to play under floodlights, they use courts at the nearby Bridgewater High School.

The committee was told neighbours were worried about the glare of the floodlights affecting homes and the possibility of noise and disturbance of an evening.

Officers argued that the lights would be designed avoid spillage of light into neighbouring homes and gardens. They proposed a condition to prevent the lights being used after 8pm during the week and to prevent their use at all on Sundays.

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Petition launched to save Sandy Lane tip

AN online petition has been launched in a bid to secure the future of the Sandy Lane tip at Stockton Heath.

More than 900 people have already signed the petition created by local councillor Judith Wheeler.

She says Warrington Borough Council is considering the provision of waste services throughout the town and Sandy Lane is once again faced with possible

Cllr Wheeler says it is important to secure the future of the recycling facility. Opening hours at Sandy Lane have already been reduced and any closure would mean residents of South Warrington being faced with journeys across the town, to recycle their rubbish.

"This only contributes to Warrington's traffic congestion, something we wish to reduce," she said.

She is urging people to sign petition to urge the Council to keep Sandy Lane open - or provide alternative recycling facilities in South Warrington.

A storm of protest erupted in June 2014 when a proposal was put forward to

close Sandy Lane to save an estimated £450,000.

By the September the controlling group were accused of performing a "cheeky u-turn" over any closures while an affordable borough wide strategy could be developed.

A council spokesman said: "Officers are currently reviewing the CRC provision within the borough, the results of which will be presented to a future executive board meeting.

Trivial benefits

You can only very rarely look at the tax system and admire it's generosity towards payments to employees. Whenever possible, therefore, where this is possible then consideration should at least be given to taking advantage, however small that advantage may be. One exemption which is frequently overlooked is the exemption trom income tax and National Insurance of "trivial house".

A trivial benefit is one which costs the employer less than £50 to provide. Whilst this may at first seem to be too trivial to bother with, this may change when it becomes apparent that this is not per employee but per benefit. For example, providing a Christmas Gift costing £45, a Birthday Gift costing £45, a Birthday Gift to the employee's partner of £45, and a further gift of £45 on the birth of a child, adds up to a total of £180. However, as each is below £50 then they are all exempts. from tax. This is equivalent to providing a gross salary of about £265 at an after-tax cost to the employer of about £145.

There a number of conditions that must be met for the exemption to

- 1. The benefit must not be cash or a cash voucher. In other words, the voucher must be exchangeable for cash.
- 2. The cost of the benefit must not exceed £50. If it does then the whole
- of the benefit is taxable and not just the excess above £50. 3. There must not be a contractual obligation to provide the benefit, nor must it be part of a relevant salary sacrifice arrangement. Care must
- be taken not to create an implied contractual obligation, for instance by providing a trivial benefit on a recurring basis. Normally, it seems unlikely that Christmas and Birthday gifts would be challenged.

 4. The benefit must not be provided for particular employment services performed by an employee as part of their duties, nor in anticipation thereof. Benefits may be challenged under this provision if they are provided on a regular or frequent basis, or the benefits in total are overly generous.
- 5. The costs of the benefits to any director or office holder, including any benefit provided to their family members who are not, themselves, employees must not exceed £300 per annum. If the total cost of benefits exceeds £300 then the total cost of the benefit that takes the total above £300 becomes taxable, as does any further benefits provided in that year. For instance, an employer provides trivial benefits to a director and their family members totalling £260 and then provides a further benefit costing £49 taking the total cost to £309. As that takes the total above £300 then the whole cost of £49 is taxable, not just the surplus of £9, as well as any further trivial benefits provided during that tax year.

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Apple Jacks Adventure Farm - fun for all the family
