And now there are three

LITTLE more than a year ago, youth worker Andrew Cronin arrived in Culcheth with a challenge – to offer guidance to the young people who hang around on street corners and are so often blamed for anti-social behaviour, underage drinking and other problems.

Today he is still at it - but now leading a team of three. And their

work is being widely praised.

Andrew, 34, has been joined by two other youth workers, Anna Costello and Sean Greenall, both in their early twenties but both gaining considerable experience at how to engage with the sort of young people who do not easily fit into the sort of social scene offered by youth clubs or

Sport.

The initiative is funded by the Methodist Church and it does go into schools and youth clubs. But it also operates on housing estates, street corners and around the village centre. young congregaté.

It has spread its wings too,

operating weekly at Rixton Youth

All three youth workers visit the youth club. Andrew and Anna do quite a bit of work at Culcheth High School and Anna and Sean work at the Methodist Church youth club on Friday evenings.

Andrew concentrates on the streets

however, where he has a good rapport with the local youths.

He believes he can relate well with them because he was once a bit of a tear-away himself.

"They know they are there to help and that I won't snitch on them," he

says.

He has a firm belief that most of the youngsters on the streets are decent people and will not cause much simply offers commonsense advice, urging moderation rather than try to stop them drinking and smoking

altogether.
"That way they listen to me," he

The Methodist Church initiative has been widely praised by police, voluntary groups and local councillórs.

Cllr Peter Caswell said: "Andrew made a big difference in Culcheth as soon as he came. First there was one now there are three.

"We are very fortunate to have them working here in Culcheth and Glazebury.



Green belt extension approved

COUNCIL planners have given the go-ahead for a major extension at a Green Belt house standing in a wooded, six acre site at Croft.

Members of the council's planning sub-committee decided the heavily wooded nature of the location meant it would not be seen from beyond the site.

Croft Parish Council opposed the development in Kenyon Lane on the grounds it would be inappropriate in the Green Belt - particularly as it involved a 64 per cent increase in the size of the property.

But the committee decided it would have no impact on the Green Belt.

The plan involves two-storey extensions on either side of the existing house, along with the removal of some existing garage space. At present, the house has the appearance of being two storeys from the front, but from the rear, because of differing ground levels, it looks like a single-storey dwelling.

Two adjoining outbuildings are to be demolished, or partly demolished, as

part of the scheme.

As part of this the group met the MP and reminded her of the Government's commitment towards the Millennium Development Goals - one of which is to see

the number of people living in poverty halved by 2015.

The MP said that while progress has been made in relation to the numbers of children attending school in developing countries, there is still a long way to go in terms of improving maternal fatality rates. She promised to pursue the issues

at The General Elliot

IT is good to see things buzzing again at Croft's attractive General Elliot pub – and it is easy to see why they are.

Ćo-owner Kirk Garbutt's more than 20 years experience as a chef, including a lengthy spell in top class restaurants in the south of France, is drawing diners from far and wide and making sure they don't go away

disappointed.
The "Elliot" always had a comfortable atmosphere and with the restaurant frequently full and the bor providing a nice blend of ancient and modern, the pub has regained its character. It is certainly difficult to believe that a couple of years ago it was closed and shuttered up and looking as if was going to be added to the sad list of lost country pubs. On a cold winter's night, we thought

there was nothing better to start with than a piping hot vegetable soup. And we were right – it was delicious.

But for those who prefer something different there were plenty of other starters, including Prawn Cocktail, Caramelised Scallops, Portobello Mushroom and Spicy Lamb Koftas.

Kirk has laid on a wide range of main courses to suit all tastes.

We chose Whole Sea Bass and Beef Stroganoff and found both meals cooked to perfection.

Looking around other tables we could see the many other dishes looking equally tempting, including Roasted Lamp Rump, Crispy Belly Pork, Thai Green Chicken Curry and Crispy Chinese Duck.

There were also traditional favourites like Cottage Pie and Cumberland Sausage Casserole and



grilled steaks, gammon and chicken breast – all tastefully presented with either seasonal vegetables or salad.
We finished off with Sticky Toffee

Pudding and Chocolate Fudge, both served with ice cream, and went happily homeward bound - vowing to return again soon.

Fighting crime in



School helps in war on crime

CUICHETH HIGH School has joined in the fight against crime.
The school is working in partnership with officers at Warrington East
Neighbourhood Policing Unit.

The technology faculty at the school has created a special display box that neighbourhood officers can store equipment in while taking part in local

community events.

PCSO Steve Dodd and his colleagues at Risley Police Station regularly visit local schools, senior citizens' groups and local community organizations to talk to them about safety and security - and give out valuable crime reduction advice.

to them about safety and security - and give out valuable crime reduction advice.

As part of those talks they take along a variety of crime busting items - including personal safety alarms, timer switches and locks.

The new display cabinet, which was designed and built by teacher Chris Smith - with the help of students, will allow local officers to keep all of the equipment together in one place - and to transport it easily to each event.

PCSO Dodd said: "We are really grateful to the school for all their help and support. The crime reduction talks are an important part of our role and we spend a lot of time out and about in the local community, meeting people and talking to them.

"The display case will be a valuable tool as it will allow us to keep all the items we need together in one place and we can easily take it with us to each of the

A SPECIAL crime prevention event took place in Culcheth organised by local Police Community Support Officers.

Free bells that can be attached to a purse or bag to deter theft were handed out at the crime reduction and safety advice event.

Almost 100 people attended the event, in Sainsbury's car park, organised by PCSOs Steve Dodd and Wendy Stanley. Cheshire Police's exhibition

vehicle was on site. Officers venicle was on site. Officers talked to residents about a variety of issues including security in the home, keeping your vehicle safe and personal safety. They also handed out the free bells, which can be attached to a purse or bag

Officers security marked valuable items, including approximately 20 bicycles, 30 mobile phones, lap tops

and ipods.

PCSO Stanley said: "This event provided the ideal opportunity for people to come along and meet local officers face-to-face and have a chat.

We were on hand to offer key crime reduction advice and community safety advice to members of the public and we also encouraged local people to bring along any valuable items to be security marked.

"Many people who turned up on the day brought along valuable items that they had been given for



Christmas.

He said valuable items should be security marked so that they can be retuned to the owner if stolen and recovered.

PCSO Stanley said: "We do recover many items, which we suspect are stolen, but one of the issues we have is that we are often unable to trace the owners as there are no security markings on the item. This makes it very difficult for us to trace who the item's belong to as there

is very little to go on."

Wardens from Stronger Together also attended. They gave advice to visitors and handed out items including personal attack alarms, shed alarms and door chains.



L-drivers duped by rogue websites

THE Office of Fair Trading is taking action against websites that charge administration fees to learner drivers to book their driving theory

or practical tests without clearly explaining the additional fees.

Action was started after the AA highlighted cases where learners unwittingly paid surcharges of up to 65 per cent by booking their test. of per cent by booking their test through third-party websites rather than directly through the Driving Standards Agency (DSA).

The complaints related to commercial websites that invite learners to enter their details and preferred dates for a DSA test. The details are the same as the learner would enter if booking directly with the DSA - which charges no booking fee. Some sites include 'DSA' in their Google search listings or web page headings, which can make it confusing as to whose site a learner is

Learners were then charged more than £50 for a theory test for which the DSA charges £31, with the difference being described as an "administration fee".

Others were hit with fees of up to £30 to book a practical test - on top of the standard DSA fees of £62 for a weekday test or £75 for a weekend or weekday evening - while bookings for extended tests attracted booking fees of up to £40. The AA's Simon Douglas said:

"There is no place for websites that charge learners huge fees to book

their test without clearly explaining those fees. Learners can easily book directly with the DSA for no extra charge. 'Lookalike' sites that rip off learners must be shut down.

"Learning to drive is an investment in a valuable skill for life. But forking out big admin fees for do-little test

'booking services' is a waste of money few families can afford."

To avoid extra charges learners should book directly with the DSA, for the standard fee of £31 (theory test); £62 (practical test, weekday) or £75 (practical test, weekend or weekday

Volvo sales on the up!

VOLVO has announced that global sales were up by 11.2 per cent last year - a total of 373,525 cars.

Top selling model was the XC60, with sales of 80,723, with the V50 second with sales of 56,098.

The UK was the Swedish company's third biggest market, with 37,940 cars sold compared with 34,371 in 2009.

Increased production led to Volvo recruiting about 500 additional people at plants in Torslanda, Sweden and Ghent, Belgium.



A satnay that says sorry?

HELP could one day be at hand for drivers who feel the urge to destroy their satnay after it has led them up the garden path.

In the future, satnavs will be able to tell when they have upset their driver and respond accordingly, possibly by saying sorry, according to Prof Peter Robinson, of Cambridge University's emotional robotics department.

He said: 'I love gadgets like GPS satellite navigation systems but I hate the fact they are so difficult to use. I think they were designed by sadists. The problem is computers don't react to how I feel - if I'm pleased or annoyed they just ignore me. We're building emotionally intelligent building intelligent computers that can read my mind and know how I feel.

"Computers are really good at understanding what someone is typing or saying. But they need to understand not just what I'm saying, but how I'm

The technology being developed utilises a number of sensors, capable of tracking things such as facial expressions, hand gestures and voice. So the driver who shouts, waves his arms about and scowls at the satnay might one day get a sympathetic response rather than the more usual, bland suggestion that he should do a U-turn on a dual-carriageway!

Planning problems

YOUR January editorial on the latest Risley Landfill site decision, highlights one of the problems caused by giving delegated powers to planning officers without auditing their decisions taken on behalf of our elected members. Apart from complying with planning regulations, the planning process should also be democratically and transparently conducted to enable the public to fully understand and voice their concerns about schemes which might have serious impacts on their lives and amenities. Not forgetting that most planning consents usually undertake to protect the amenities of those closest to the scheme. This does not always bappen with delegated responsibility. does not always happen with delegated responsibility.

As you point out, planning officers - certainly those in Warrington judging by the weight of complaints in the local press - regretably seem to consider that the planning regulations are paramount, which they have "no alternative" other than to apply, whilst considering the democratic process to be a minor irritant.

The problem with this sort of delegated responsibility is that it amounts to all delegation, and no responsibility. Planning Officers do not have to seek reelection. If and when they face the people most affected by their decisions, they claim expediency and shelter behind the latest copy of the planning regulations. I wonder if the Biffa application might not just be the tip of the iceberg of delegated responsibility? How many more planning decisions taken on the expedient grounds of "no alternative" without any democratic input? I doubt we will ever find out because those decisions seem not to have been audited.

Village green drainage
