So I suspect it will only be a matter of time before some kind of development is given the green

The land is adjacent the site of the former Culcheth Hall, a medieval moated site. Cheshire Archaeology say no developemnt should take place until an archaeological survey takes place.

One wonders why these historical

sites only become important when threatened by development.

If more was done to highlight areas of such historical importance, may be the threat of development would never arise in the first place.

Too many historic buildings and areas of archaeological interest have disappeared over the years, not just in Culcheth, but in villages up and down the country.

More needs to be done to protect these areas but I suspect with so many cut backs taking place at local authorities, there are not the resources available to fund them and these days it is often the developers who have to foot the bill for such surveys - and that beas the question will they be impartial?

I am not suggesting anything untoward should a survey be required for this particular site - but if it is of such historical importance may be an independent survey should be carried out. After all this moated site was at

one time one of the most important residential homes in the area!

According to local history the first definite mention of the village was found in a survey dated 1212 AD that records that Gilbert de Culcheth building the first Culcheth Hall in or around the year 1200.

Twenty years of garden waste converted into compost



Bents Garden Centre at Glazebury has converted twenty years of garden waste into compost.

The garden centre has been growing and nurturing plants at its on-site nurseries for many years. During this time it has endeavoured to recycle as much garden waste as possible and has now created one very big, natural and nutritious pile

of compost.

Over the past 20 years, all plant and green waste from the nurseries and throughout the centre has been collected and stored on site. The waste storage had built up to such a size that the decision was taken to convert the well-rotted material into

compost.

A local farmer who specialises in recycling plant waste visited Bents to take on the task. His specialist equipment was used to convert the plant waste into compost; shredding and riddling (sieving) the waste to extract the goodness and convert into a high-grade growing material.

Taking just over three days to complete, the process converted over

20 years of garden waste into 1000 cubic tonnes of quality compost which will now be used throughout Bents, on the nurseries and in Bents' environmental gardens. It will also be available to allotment owners at Bents' community allotments located just across the road from the Centre.
Matthew Bent, Managing
Director at Bents Garden & Home
said: "Despite all our growth and
development we are plant people at heart and have always been hugely committed to growing, nurturing and protecting the environment around us. Our Five Green Footprints outline our aims for a healthier and greener future. This latest project is in line with our first Footprint, Recycling, which outlines our commitment to recycling and composting all the green waste from our growing nursery whilst at the same time actively encouraging our customers to do the same through

our customers to do the same intrough the promotion of compost bins." Now the goodness has been extracted, the remaining garden waste will be used to start the process

waste will be used to start the process again, ensuring the natural recycling process continues at Bents.

Bents Five Green Footprints include Recycling; Water Efficiency - Bents 3.5 million gallon reservoir was built in 1976 and helps reduce Bents impact on the environment by collecting all rain and run off water throughout the Centre to be re-used on the nurseries and plant area; Healthy Living; Social Responsibility; and Trading Fairly and Responsibly.

Inspector upholds resident's appeal

A GOVERNMENT-appointed planning inspector has upheld an appeal by a Culcheth resident against the refusal by Warrington Borough Council to

grant permission for home extensions.

The appeal was by Mrs Angie Hindmarch and involved converting a garage into an annex at her home in Lodge Drive, with a first floor extension above the garage and a two-storey extension at the rear.

There was also a proposal for a dropped kerb to provide an in-out

The inspector, Mr G M Garnham, concluded there were no highway safety issues and that the proposals would not materially harm the living conditions of neighbours

However, he imposed a condition that obscure glazing be used in the first floor extension to prevent overlooking resulting in a serious loss of privacy for a neighbour.

- Time to plan any changes in the garden or any new varieties you might like to try
- Tender vegetables can be started from seed in a heated greenhouse

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Housing scheme thrown out

PLANNING chiefs have thrown out controversial proposals for nine houses on land off Culcheth Hall Drive, Culcheth after hearing claims that trees had already been felled on the site.

Nearly 60 nearby residents had lodged objections to the scheme and there was also opposition from Culcheth and Glazebury Parish

It was the second time developers Evoke Homes had submitted proposals for the site to the borough's planning committee.

An earlier scheme involving 11 houses was withdrawn last May.

The parish council, represented by Cllr Jacqui Johnson (pictured right), expressed disappointment that the opportunity to alter the plan had resulted in a reduction of only two houses.

They believed the development was still too large, with far too many dwellings using the same access.

There had also been a loss of

vildlife habitat arising from the thinning out of trees.

Residents argued that narrow Culcheth Hall Drive had not been designed to cope with the increase of traffic that could be expected from nine new houses. Road safety hazards could arise - particularly as the road was used by pupils from Culcheth High School. Some residents believed access would be better from Withington

There was also concern that a historic building, known as the Tithe Barn, had been demolished.

Cheshire Archaeology noted the site was adjacent to the site of the former Culcheth Hall, a medieval moated site. They said no development should take place until an archaeological survey had taken

Planning officers said the principle of residential development was acceptable. But the proposals should be "low impact" and of

appropriate scale.
There were significant concerns about the impact on highway safety and protected trees which were a landscape feature in the area. They recommended the proposals b refused - and the committee agreed.

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Company cars with no benefit in kind?

If a company car qualifies as a pool car then it will be exempt from the benefit in kind rules. Given that the value of a car benefit can be as much as 35% of the list price this is potentially a very valuable relief and so, as you'd expect, has a number of strict conditions, for example the car has to be used by more than one employee.

HMRC apply these rules
rules

which we thought worthy of note
here.

In this particular case the company's only two employees were the directors. They had other cars for private use and argued that the "pool cars" were used solely for business with shared use by both directors. They claimed that the cars were kept at their homes every night because of the risk of vandalism and theft if left outside their business premises.

The directors failed in their claim for the exemption from the benefit

in kind charges on the following grounds:

a) There was no documentary evidence to demonstrate that the cars were not ordinarily used by one director to the exclusion of the other.

b) There was no paperwork to demonstrate that private use was prohibited.

c) The cars were normally kept overnight at the directors' homes. The risk of vandalism is not a reasonable excuse.

If you are claiming the benefit in kind exemption for pool cars, then we recommend that journey logs are maintained and a written Pool Car Policy put in place to reinforce the fact that the cars are intended for business use only.

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
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Tutors getting Bloomin crafty

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
