The partners have worked very hard to get this project off the ground and obtain funding to sustain it. My PCSOs attend every Friday evening and work with the youngsters and it's a really positive vibe'

The project was launched October last year and is managed by Bridgewater Churches Together, in partnership with the police, Youth for the borough council and Bridgewater High School.

Its aim was to address anti-social behaviour issues in South Warrington

and it followed on from work carried out by Bridgewater Churches Together at Aléxandra Park in Stockton Heath. It started with small numbers of youths playing football but developed rapidly to encompass many other activities such as swimming and dance. The age range involved is 12-17.

The initiative has, apparently, reduced complaints of "nuisance youths"

and confirms our view that many of these complaints arise not from any real anti-social behaviour but merely from young people trying to enjoy themselves in, perhaps, not the most appropriate places.

We hope to see the Broomfields Youth Project continue and go from strength to strength. It will, of course, not solve all problems but it is providing a growing number of young people with worthwhile things to do without causing problems for anyone else.









Christmas comes early at Euclid Park

Coun Dorothy Robb said she had

spoken to a number of people who had asked for the bench to be returned.

She said: "Elderly people do appreciate the bench as a place to rest, especially if they are carrying

"It is a good resting point for people" walking back from the village.

Parish council chairman Coun Mike Biggin said: "Members of the public have been very supportive and have responded to the consultation

Oil leak closes police station

A MAJOR oil leak has caused the temporary closure of Stockton Heath Police Station on health and

safety grounds.

Members of the public have been concerned that the station is to be closed permanently, but Warrington South Police Inspector Gary McIntyre said this was not the case.

He told Stockton Heath Parish

Council the station was closed temporarily for maintenance and his were working out of Warrington and Lymm police stations. Earlier PCSO Peter Crellin told the meeting that the fuel tank in the station had collapsed, and that 1,000 litres of oil had drained into the concrete. Fumes were strong and officers were only spending a "minimum time" on the premises.

Insp McIntyre said the old boiler was being taken out and a new gas

central heating system installed.

The station would be open again as soon as possible.

No free bus service

LATE night revellers in Stockton Heath over the festive season will not be provided with a free bus service to Warrington. Stockton Heath Parish Council, which has previously funded the

service, has decided not to do so this year.

Members heard the costs of providing the service for six nights

Chairman Graham Roughsedge was in favour of the service, and said he would rather pay the money than have people "hanging around" the village.

Members were concerned there could be a safety hazard posed by the missing bars as people could wander onto the road. They agreed to ask the borough council to look at the stability of the railings.

Currency is the Barbadian dollar, but US dollars are widely accepted.

I have just returned from a fantastic five night stay at the Fairmont Royal Pavilion, which is situated on the west coast of the

The hotel has seventy-two rooms, all facing the ocean and spread out over eleven acres of beautifully manicured gardens alongside a delightful beach. The hotel was closed in September 2010 for a total refurbishment and was scheduled to



open again on the 1 November 2010. Sadly, Barbados was hit by hurricane Tomas (albeit not as bad as St Lucia) and their re-opening was delayed slightly. However, somebody from above was taking care of us because as we arrived at the hotel on November 7 to find that the hotel had just opened it's doors that day! I would like to add that this was made. would like to add that this was made possible by the hard work and dedication of ALL staff members at the hotel.

As soon as we were greeted in reception with a cool towel and fruit cocktail I knew we were in good hands! Guests at this hotel (and believe me there are many repeat guests) are sure to find their own private slice of paradise. In fact, a stay here can often feel like you have arrived at your very own colonial, west coast mansion with each Deluxe Oceanfront room boasting a private terrace with beautiful sea views. Shopkeeper launches CCTV petition

A STOCKTON Heath shop owner who has been burgled three times in a year is spearheading a campaign to get more CCTV cameras in the village.

Tracy Dolan, of Dude's n Diva's on Walton Road, has collected about 800 signatures on a petition calling for round the clock CCTV cameras to help prevent crime.

She has been liaising with Inspector Gary McIntyre, of Warrington South Police, and they are seeking the views of people and business owners in the village.

Insp McIntyre told the Parish Council there was some CCTV coverage in the village, which could be targeted at traffic or the "night time economy" to prevent trouble.

He said Tracy had been burgled three times and, as a result, had decided to try to get more cameras in

the village. The extra cameras she proposed would give police a "starting point" in finding offenders. Tracy said: "About 85 per cent of

people who signed my petition come into the area to shop because they like the area.

But she was concerned about the impact of crime in the village, especially in the Walton Road area. A jewellers which had been raided three times had now closed and was

not re-opening.
She told the council she had installed new alarm systems and shutters at the front and rear of her property but was concerned that she would have problems getting insurance when the premium needed

"We may not be able to get insured and would then have to close that would be another shop closing,

"They came in when the shop was closed - what would happen if they came in to rob when people were in the shop," she added.

Action was needed before someone was hurt.

Insp McIntyre said: "It is a nice area 'and attracts criminals because there are nice shops, selling nice

things."

He said police were investigating providing cameras on the major exits from the village - London Road, London Road down the Wilderspool Causeway and Walton Road. If offenders' vehicles were identified by the cameras it would give police a starting point.

Police were investigating various types of CCTV system and were visiting other businesses in the village to see if they wanted to get involved in the project.

Bakery café plan opposed

PLANS for a Chinese bakery/cafe in Stockton Heath were strongly opposed by the parish council.

Members were concerned the site was in a conservation area, and that there would be extra traffic congestion, problems with deliveries and waste materials. Objections have been lodged with the borough council.

The application is for a change of use from a jewellers in Walton Road. The proposal is for a 20seat café on the ground floor and bakery on the first.

parish council was concerned the property is only accessible through the front and is on the narrow part of Walton Road near the junction with London Road. Members were concerned at the lack of an on site refuge storage area and parking

Farmers' market moves closer

A PLAN to get a regular farmers' market in the centre of Stockton Heath has moved a step closer.

Stockton Heath Parish Council heard charity group the Walton Lea Project - which has previously organised a market - is interested in pursuing the idea.

The charity had decided to discontinue its farmers' market at the Scout Centre, Parkgate Road, Stockton Heath, as after the first one it

Coun Stephen Taylor said he and two staff from the project recently met staff from Warrington Market about a proposal to hold a market in Victoria Square.

He said: "There is some resistance from Warrington Market regarding a Saturday market. They are worried about the village market drawing trade away from Warrington Market. "I doubt if it would be the same

people shopping there who would shop in the Stockton Heath market. We suggested a trial period and it seems to be that Sunday would be the best day.

Members agreed to invite representatives of the Walton Lea Project to its next, meeting to talk about the proposal.

Coun Taylor said if the market went ahead, Warrington Market would loan stalls and equipment.





Radiographer Paula wins UK title

AN Appleton woman has won the UK 'Radiographer of the Year' title after being nominated by her colleagues at Warrington Hospital.

The award is given by the Society of Radiographers to a radiographer who has made a significant contribution to the profession.

Paula Evans, aged 35, clinical lead for plain imaging at Warrington and Halton Hospitals NHS Trust was nominated for her work in setting up new, innovative initiatives and systems of work to smooth the patient's pathway through the department.

Senior radiographer Maureen Taylor, who nominated her for the award, said: "She is very focused on the quality of service we provide for the patient and has driven forwards a patient centred approach regarding their experiences and care received within the x-ray department.

"This is an ongoing process incorporating patient satisfaction surveys and teamwork in sharing best practice and innovative ideas across the trust

"She has taken a lead in improving quality and has set up a theatre coordination system to ensure smooth and effective utilisation of both staff and image intensifier. She has also developed links and communication between the radiographers and orthopaedic staff, resulting in improved understanding and relationships between the two professions."

Hospital in 1997 after graduating from Liverpool University.



Filling a gap in a family's history

As a result Cathy received an email

from the Summerville Nursing Home, where Mr Fussey once resided

They have been able to put Cathy in touch with his daughter, Hilary Morphy of Appleton, and they are now

communicating.

Mr Fussey has now died but left a written account of what happend the night his plane went down, which is being sent to Cathy.

Wind turbine threat to airport satety

AN 18 metre high wind turbine at Appleton could confuse air traffic controllers at Manchester Airport, leading to pilots receiving wrong information, a planning inspector has ruled.

He has thrown out an appeal against the refusal of planning consent for the turbine and awarded costs against the appellant because he pursued his appeal in an unreasonable manner.

The appeal related to a plan to erect a wind turbine at Oaklegh Lodge Farm, Barleycastle Lane, Appleton to provide electricity for a home and smallholding. Borough planners had earlier

refused consent for the development.

The appellant argued that the turbine would be sited 40 degrees off the runway alignment and planes approaching thei airport flew at high altitude over his property.

But technical information submitted by the National Air Traffic Services suggested that air traffic controllers would see an X on their screens which would be indistinguishable from an

Such an unexpected reading could lead to planes receiving instructions to take avoiding action at a busy and critical location.

scheme was "totally unacceptable."

Andy Farrall, the borough's director of environment and regeneration, said costs had been awarded to the council because the appellant had pursued the appeal in unreasonable manner because his evidence failed to show that the scheme would not affect the safe operation of the airport's radar

overcome the problem even though the council had notified him the application had no reasonable prospect of success.

Mr Briggs said that following desilting/redevelopment of the site, members had agreed a vision statement to support pit management in luly last year. in July last year.

Day to day management of the site had been undertaken by the Ackers Pit Management Group, including parish councillors and members of Warrington Anglers Association.

then including planting trees and

shrubs, repairing eroding banks and building up the banks. Mr Briggs added: "A hard standing

area of approximately 15 square metres for duck/swan feeding was established in April adjacent to the weir on the Mill Lane footpath side.

"This is to encourage the concentration of feeding from here instead of the nearby banks with the consequential damage to the grassed.

consequential damage to the grassed area. This has proved its worth with the subsequent seeding of the bare area successful.

Other work has included tackling the continuing problem of weeds overgrowing paths. A damaged bench has been replaced, footpaths

strimmed and hedges cut.

The group is also looking at provision of a 5-10 year management plan for the pit, but costs have so far proved too expensive.

Coun Peter Walker said: "We should ask the borough what the real additional costs are of having a parish council election on the same day as a borough council election.

He pointed out the borough council

had to provide polling stations, staff and ballot papers for its own election.

"As far as I can see the only additional cost is the actual cost of counting parish votes," he said.

Appleton Parish Council has also

voted to stay with the status quo.

Members felt that to add to existing

costs through additional administrative calculations for the contributions from parish councils seemed inappropriate.

They also felt that to impose the cost of any by-elections on parish councils would deter such elections being called due to the cost that would be incurred by the parish.

This was likely to impinge on democracy.

Money Column

Important tax dates 2010/11

We are now nearly two thirds of the way through the current tax year 2010/11. So this seems a good time to remind you of some important dates for both businesses and individuals that you may want to put in your diary covering the current tax year

31 January 2011

Last day for submitting the 2010 self assessment tax return. If you have not already submitted your return you will have now have to do so online at www.hmrc.gov.uk as paper returns can not be submitted after 31 October 2010. Failure to submit return by this date will result in automatic penalty of £100.

Payment Date. Any self Tax assessment tax due (income or capital gains tax) for the tax year ended 5 April 2010 must be paid by this date to avoid charges to interest for late payment. In addition the first self assessment payment on account of tax estimated as payable for the year 20010/11 falls due.

28 February 2011

Tax Surcharge Date. You will be

automatically charged a 5% surcharge on any self assessment tax outstanding for the year ended 5 April 2010 on this date. This charge is in addition to interest that will already have been accruing.

6 April 2011

2011/12 Self Assessment Returns issued. The start of the new tax year sees the issue of the self assessment returns or if you have filed electronically in previous years a statutory notice to complete a return rather than a form itself.

19 April 2011

Employer PAYE Payments. For those who employ staff any outstanding PAYE and Class 1 national insurance contributions (NIC) for the 2010/11 tax year must be settled in full to avoid interest and potential penalties.

The 19th of each month though out

the year represents the due date for PAYE/NIC/CIS payments for payments deductions made in the previous calendar month. Also the due date for the submission of monthly CIS returns.


19 May 2011

Employers (regardless of how many employees they have) have to file their 2010/11 Employers Annual return (P35) Online. This is the last date for the submission of forms P35/P14. Penalties are chargeable on any forms received after this date – the penalties are automatic for any return received after 24 May.

31 May 2011

The last day for employers to provide employees with forms P60 (Certificates of Pay & Tax deducted) for the 20010/11 tax year.
