

planning Warrington's Now committee has turned down his retrospective planning application - which means he must either appeal. reach agreement to alter the structure or demolish it.

committee The was neighbours claimed the extension was "unreasonable", out-of-character, too high and of poor build quality. Thev claimed the householder had wilfully ignored his original planning approval in an attempt to circumvent the planning process.

Appleton Parish Council believed the extension was too high, bulky, overbearing and out-of-character with adjacent properties. But planning officers, while admitting that the development had not been carried out in accordance with the submitted plans, felt it did not have an unacceptable detrimental impact on the street scene , the amenity of neighbours or highway safety. They recommended approval.

But the planning committee voted 4-2 to refuse permission.

Opinion

IT is now more than three years since a redundant telephone box at Hatton took on a new life as a book exchange – in effect, a mini-library.

At the time, it seemed to us to be a novel idea, but now books are appearing in old 'phone boxes all over the country – including a few in Cheshire. The latest we have heard of is at Thelwall but there are others at Cotebrook and Lach Dennis. Most, if not all, are as a result of an initiative by the local parish council. There is even a growing national

There is even a growing national list of telephone box "libraries" on the internet!

It is, of course, all part of a determined drive by book lovers, partly in response to library service cutbacks but also, perhaps, to try and stem the tide of e-books.

stem the tide of e-books. And it is not confined to phone boxes.

A book exchange at Appleton Parish Hall, run by WI volunteers, is flourishing and expanding. Volunteers are running a community library at Great Sankey and, as we reported last month, the Grappenhall Community Library, also run by volunteers, is proving so popular that it has undergone an extensive makeover after receiving grants from Wren and the Big Lottary.

the Big Lottery. These larger facilities enable the volunteer organisers to expand and offer a wider range of service to the local community. We welcome all these developments. We understand the need for local authority cutbacks and we are not opposed to e-books – anything that encourages more people to read is useful. You can read an e-version of this magazine at www.village-life. co.uk – and many people do. But we still believe in the printed

But we still believe in the printed word and hope enough people in authority think likewise to ensure there will be no further library closures. If we are to be disappointed in this, all power to the volunteers, whether in phone boxes or village halls.

'KEY to the sustainability of an estate is the ability to know the market in which it operates and to identify its assets and how best it can utilise these.'

The quote is from Brendan Flanagan, visitor economy manager at Tatton Park – and with the park attracting more than 840,000-a-year it is one we cannot argue with.

But do the Tatton team – or rather, the National Trust, which owns the estate, or Cheshire East Council, which manages it - still know the market in which they operate? We ask the question because of

We ask the question because of the controversial proposal, apparently supported by both the Trust and the Council, for a £50 million theme park within the estate. Opposition to this scheme suggests that a sizeable proportion of Tatton's "market" does not want it and while theme park supporters may suggest that they are merely a vocal minority, adopting a "not-in-my-backyard" philosophy, we wonder if this is the case.

According to Tatton's own figures, their most visited attraction is the 1,000-acre parkland, with its deer, its lake and its open spaces.

Will the people who enjoy Tatton for these qualities appreciate the presence of a theme park, with its inevitable noise, traffic, litter and general disturbance? Could Tatton lose on the roundabouts what it gains on the swings?

Foodbank opens at village store

SHOPPERS at a village Co-op store can help make sure local families living below the poverty line can still put food on the table.

The store, in Knutsford Road, Grappenhall, has become an official collection point for Foodbank – an organisation that provides emergency food supplies for local people in need.

Customers are encouraged to buy one extra thing during their weekly shop and place it in the charity collection point at the store. Tinned foods, dried pasta, cooking sauces, as well as tea, coffee and toiletries are all welcome.

Store manager David Appleton said: "The economic climate is tough, and many families are feeling the strain. Donations don't have to be expensive, from a tin of beans to a packet of pasta, just one extra item in your weekly shop can make a real difference to those in need."

Foodbank co-ordinator John Dolan said: "It's awful to think that any of our neighbours would be going hungry. Having a collection box in The Co-operative food store is a convenient way of enabling customers to help out those people living in food crisis."

New head praised as school improves

STOCKTON Heath Primary School, which was twice placed in "special measures" has improved significantly - and its new head teacher highly commended.

Education watchdog Ofsted has ruled that the school no longer requires "special measures. The school's overall effectiveness has now been graded as "requires improvement" - the equivalent of "satisfactory" under Ofsted old framework. the Leadership and Leadership and management and behaviour and safety of pupils have both been graded "good". Headteacher Dan Harding management Haddeacher Dan Harding (pictured), who only joined the school in September, said: "We are pleased with this outcome and feel it is well-deserved. "We believe it is a pivotal moment

in the school's recent history and is the first important step towards achieving our goal of making this school 'outstanding' in all areas. "The incredible hard work and commitment of all the staff here and the unwavering support of our governing body and parents are key factors in our continuous development and therefore this recent judgement."

It was originally in June 2008 that Ofsted inspectors stunned the school team by placing it in special measures. Education chiefs appealed against the ruling - but Ofsted reaffirmed its decision in September the same year. Former head Lynda Carnes left

after a lengthy period of sick leave. In June 2011, Ofsted ruled that the school should remain in special measures and in January last year, a further inspection revealed it was still making "inadequate progress" A temporary acting head was brought in from another school.

Mr Harding, formerly acting head of Plantation Primary School, Halewood, Liverpool, was appointed last May and took up his post in September. He is highly commended in Ofsted's latest report. Ofsted state: "He has made an excellent impact on school improvement. The very strong team of headteacher and deputy headteacher are providing an excellent lead in driving forward In particular, cant weaknesses improvements. previous significant weaknesses in teaching and the leadership structure have been eliminated. Highlights also include pupil's exemplary conduct and their positive attitudes to learning. The report states: "Pupils feel safe. They are courteous and show respect for the adults who work with them." new creative Α curriculum is highly commended as is the

impact of local authority support. More examples of "good and better teaching" were observed and it is noted that "previously outstanding teaching has been maintained".



Are you a 'bawmer' of 40 years ago?

This year, a Spitfire fly-past has been arranged and a "flight" themed fancy dress parade will take place - marking the area's links with the former Stretton airfield, which closed after the end of World War 2. But the thorn tree will be decorated as usual and school children will sing the "Bawming" song as they dance around the tree. According to legend, the hawthorn at Appleton Thorn grew from a cutting of the Holy Thorn at Glastonbury, which was said to have sprung from the staff of Joseph of Arimathea. The current tree was planted in the late 1960s by the local Women's Institute after the previous one blew down in a storm. The former chairman of St Rocco's Hospice was awarded the MBE in 2005 for her long service to the community.





Tatton Park is one of 21 outstanding examples of how funding can be raised

For more than 50 years it has provided a wide variety of visitor experiences to generate sufficient income to offset the significant costs of maintaining the park. These include a number of diverse

These include a number of diverse attractions, the most visited of which is the 1,000-acre parkland, more than 100 events a year, shopping and dining, comprehensive corporate and function facilities and an award winning education programme.

Tatton has a five year plan to develop its visitor activities – a key part of which is the controversial plan for an outdoor adventure attraction for families to be operated by a company who already run a similar operation in Norfolk.

The proposal has the backing of Cheshire East Council, who manage the park on behalf of the National Trust, who own it.

Visitor economy manager Brendan Flanagan said: "Key to the sustainability of an estate is the ability to know the market in which it operates and to identify its assets and how best it can utilise these. For most parks their main asset is the wide open spaces that provide huge benefits for the local community in terms of health, work opportunities and the economy."

Help to find our ancient trees

THE Woodland Trust is calling on people across Cheshire to go out and record old trees and add them to its Ancient Tree Hunt database - a living database of ancient trees started nearly 10 years ago.

More than 100,000 trees have been recorded, mostly by volunteers -including 314 in Cheshire, of which 16

are classed as being "ancient." Others are classed as "veteran" or "notable" trees.

As trees age at different rates, they are said to be ancient at different ages.

Yews, for instance, have to be at least 800 years old to be considered ancient and it is generally believed the oldest specimens may be older still.

"Veteran" trees are 500-1200 years old and "notable" specimens are 300-700 years old.

Interesting trees recorded in Cheshire include the Ancient Marton Oak, which could be more than 1200 years old and is the largest oak tree and one of the oldest trees in England and the yew tree in St Boniface churchyard, Bunbury. Still growing, the yew has a girth of around 19ft 6

inches, including a "new" stem. Other "ancient" trees in Cheshire include an oak at the junction of Peacock Lane and Broadoak Lane, High Legh, a hawthorn and an oak in Tatton Park, a willow at Pedley House Lane, Great Warford, an oak and a yew off Sand Lane, Nether Alderley, a hawthorn between Mobberley and Ashley and an oak off the A34 at Marton.

Many old trees are on private land and cannot be viewed without the permission of the landowner. Others can be seen from public roads.

Information on the Ancient Tree database can be used locally or nationally to highlight the importance of trees, promote their value and encourage their conservation.

Most of the old trees on the Woodland Trust database have been recorded by volunteers - and the information on the database can be used to oppose developments which



threaten ancient trees manv of which provide unique habitats for wildlife

The locations of ancient, veteran and notable trees can be found on the www.ancient-tree-hunt.org. website uk - and the Woodland Trust welcomes

information about old trees which have not yet been recorded so they can be added to the database.

The website offers a facility to record trees - and photographs are welcome.

Money Column

Rights to holidays and holiday pay

This month we will look at the rights of employees to holidays and holiday pay. These rights are in the Working Time Regulations, and cover all workers without exception.

The regulations give the right to 5.6 weeks' paid holiday including bank holidays. This equates to 28 days for someone working 5 days per week. New employees accrue holiday at a rate of one-twelfth of the entitlement, rounded up to the nearest half day, on the first day of each month of the first year worked. All holidays up to the statutory minimum must be taken within the holiday year, but additional days over this minimum may be carried forward by agreement. If a leaver has taken fewer holidays than their entitlement then they should

If a leaver has taken fewer holidays than their entitlement then they should be paid in lieu of the holiday. This does not need to be rounded up. Alternatively, If they have taken more than their entitlement then a relevant agreement may provide for the excess to be deducted from their pay.

An employee must give notice in writing of his or her intention to take any holiday. The notice required is twice the length of holiday requested. If the employer is unable to let the employee take the time off they must tell the employee in writing within a further time period equivalent to the length of time of the holiday request. An employer can fix some or all of the holidays in which case they will need to give notice in writing to each worker, which should be equivalent to twice the length of time of the holiday to be fixed.

Payment for statutory holidays is based on the normal weekly hours worked at the workers' normal rate of pay. If hours or pay rates fluctuate then holiday pay is based on the average pay received in the previous 12 weeks. Additional holidays, if any, are paid by agreement.

are paid by agreement. All workers are covered including part-time and casual staff, as well as the self-employed. Complaints about holiday entitlement are made to an employment tribunal, and employees can claim unfair dismissal if they are dismissed for asserting their rights under the Working Time Regulations. The usual two years' service requirement does not apply. Therefore, it is vital that these matters



are covered by a written contract of employment. WatkinsonBlack have contacts with a number of organisations who can help with these if necessary.



Cricket 'star' Rob spreads some joy

ONE of Cheshire's most promising young cricketers is back home after leading the England Under-17 team to four wins out of six matches in South Africa - and also bringing some joy to some of the country's poorest children.

Rob Jones, aged 17, from Stockton Heath is a regular member of Knutsford-based Toft in the premier division of the Cheshire County League.

A student at Priestley College, Warrington, Rob was selected as captain of the England team for the tour of South Africa.

But in addition to playing cricket, he delivered supplies – paid for by fellow students at Priestley – to South

African township youngsters. He said: "What I learned was to never take anything for granted and what a fortunate position I am in.

"We met children who had to walk a couple of miles to school every day, but all of them seemed so happy and had big smiles on their faces when we turned up.'

It was an eye-opener for Rob, formerly a pupil at Bridgewater High School, who was amazed to see the children take a nap during the day on the bare stone of the schoolroom floor.

"They are only 10 hours away on a plane, but their lives are completely different to ours," he said. "When they saw us they wanted our

autographs because they thought we were famous, but I am just a normal kid who is at college.

On the cricket field, Rob led the England side to four victories.

He said: "The South Africans played tough, competitive cricket so it was good for me to learn about how to manage my players. "I would have liked to have scored

more runs, but I felt my leadership



was good. "I felt some pressure as captain, but our goal while we were out there was to improve as competitors and our skills and not necessarily to win the matches."

It was the second foreign tour for Rob who played in India last year where he was named man of the match for his performance in the Cricket Club of India stadium after taking 4-29 off 10 overs.

Now he is re-focusing his efforts to ensure another appearance for his country next year.

"I'm hoping to perform well this summer and be chosen for the World Cup squad for the Under-19s next 'I've got a lot of games coming

up this summer for Toft and I will be doing my best for them.
