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Editor's Comment



CONSIDERABLE optimism was expressed at the annual general meeting of the Friends of Walton Estate and this can only be good news.

Plans are afoot to make the hall and grounds more attractive to visitors in the near future, and it seems likely the estate will remain in the hands of

the borough council.

But this being the case, we should not expect too much too soon. We are moving through a period when public spending is being squeezed more tightly than ever before and the council's need to save money is well known. The Friends say they expect a "rush of volunteers" to work on the estate and, no doubt, there will be some enthusiasts willing and able to help. But signing up for a Facebook

campaign is one thing - rolling up one's sleeves and actually doing some work may turn out to be another. In any event, it all seems rather different to the council's grandiose proposals put forward only last year, which talked of making Walton one of the North West's

premier historic estate attractions.

We warned then about the dangers of comparing a beer baron's pile, dating from the 1830s, with

Tatton Hall, built at the turn of the 15th century, Dunham Massey Hall, built on the site of a 1616 Tudor House or Lyme Hall, which has Camellias growing in its grounds which are older than Walton!

So yes, we wish the Friends well and hope their optimism is not misplaced. But let us not get carried away with any ideas that Walton can become one of the region's premier historic estate attractions.

Described by friends as "beautiful, young, talented" Candice Roberts, who worked behind the bar at the club, was loved by everyone who met her due to her great warmth, enthusiasm, capacity for friendship and being naturally funny she always cheered people up.

Councils to join forces over trees

THE parish councils at Stockton Heath and Walton are to get together to consider planting more trees in the area.

Walton councillor Bob Hardy who lives in Stockton Heath says his council have planted additional trees in verges in Walton which had brought about a big improvement in the appearance of the area.

He believed the two councils should work together to get more trees in both areas.

Stockton Heath councillors have agreed – and invited Cllr Hardy to attend a meeting of their Village Committee to discuss the matter further.

Candice from Chiswick Gardens, Appleton, developed Gullain-Barré syndrome, which is a rare illness that commonly follows a mild illness such as gastroenteritis or 'flulike' symptoms. The body's immune system then becomes 'confused' and then becomes 'confused' and produces antibodies that attack its own nervous system. The nerves lose functionality and paralysis of varying degrees then follows, covering partial areas of the limbs or the full body.

The illness has no preference for the age or health and strength of the sufferer, and although over 80% of people recover, 97% fully, healthy Candice did not and died on August 23 last year - on her birthday.

Her mother Karen has set up a special Trust fund in her memory and friends are now helping with fund-

raisiong for the memorial garden.
Friend and local councillor Dr Angie Winnington said: "Candice was a beautiful, young and talented person who was loved by everyone who knew her.

"Now a team of loyal family and friends are working to awareness and funds towards more research into this cruel, and potentially fatal, illness and support the Candice Marie Roberts Foundation.

She said they needed people to help with a memorial garden at Grappenhall Cricket Club, which will be opened officially at a fete on

amended in 2003, and allow parishes who choose to pay a basic allowance each year either to its chairman only or to each of its members to do so. In the event of all members receiving an allowance, the chairman can receive a larger

The farm's 34 ewes have been scanned -

Ihe tarm's 34 ewes have been scanned and all are pregnant.
In total, 11 single lambs, 19 sets of twins and four sets of triplets are expected.
Twenty three of the ewes will be lambing within days of each other during mid-April.
Visitors to the farm during Lambing Week (April 16-22) and in the preceding week can expect to see many woolly new arrivals!

It is the first time in many years that there has been 100 per cent conception rate among the farm's mainly Suffolk cross flock.

There are also four rare breed Leicester longwool ewes expecting six lambs between them.

The Leicester longwools are considered 'vulnerable' on the Rare Breeds Survival Trust watch list and so the addition of potentially six more to the Home Farm flock is very special.

rarm assistant Elly Edwards said: "It is extremely gratifying to have this fantastic success rate. We were quite concerned that the ewes may have suffered due to the particularly harsh winter weather. However, it looks like we will be overrun with lambs by mid April!"

Festival for young scientists

BUDDING young scientists from schools across Cheshire will be taking part in a festival celebrating the appliance of science this month.

Organised by University of Chester, the Science Cheshire Communication (SciComm) festival involves whole classes from primary schools taking part in a competition to showcase their scientific and engineering ingenuity.

The theme communication and entrants are invited to demonstrate their ideas to a team of judges at the university.

Peter York, from the Department of Biological Sciences, said: "The theme of communication can interpreted in many different ways, from the calls birds make to radio waves flying through the air. This event is a great way to exhibit what your school is doing to celebrate science week.

Pupils have until March 11 to develop their project which will be demonstrated at the SciComm event which takes place at the Northwich Memorial Hall, on March 15.

Council unhappy over 'paperless' plans consultation

APPLETON Parish Council has reluctantly agreed to take part in a six month trial of "paperless"

consultation on planning matters.
This follows a request from the borough council who claim 1,200

borough council who claim 1,200 copies of planning applications, each at least 10 pages long, are sent to parish councils across the borough.

As full information on each application is available on the borough council website and lists showing applications submitted for each ward are sent out by email to each ward are sent out by email to parish councils weekly, it was

suggested that if the paper copies were not sent, between £7,000 and £15,000 could be saved in a year.

It was also suggested the parish council could forward comments and objections to the borough council through its website.

Some parish councils in the borough do not review domestic planning applications, it was claimed

Members of the parish council's planning sub-committee are unhappy about the proposals.

They say there are numerous

problems with viewing planning applications on line, including slowness, cumbersome measuring tools and the difficulty in making comparisons on screen between existing and proposed plans which are not to scale.

They feared it would be necessary to print off plans to enable proper assessment by the committee - with increased costs to the parish council.

Members also suggested it would not be possible to review planning applications as thoroughly as in the

Stockton Heath Parish Council heard that the borough council was hoping to get a Purple Flag accreditation for the village.

The recognition, awarded by the Association of Town Centre

Management, is a new accreditation scheme that recognises excellence in the management of town and city centres at night.

It is awarded to entertainment areas that offer "a better night out" to visitors and aims to raise standards and improve the quality of towns and

cities at night.
Dave Watson, the borough's community safety and licensing manager, told parish councillors: "The award recognises the area as 'safe' for people to use. It has been awarded to places such as livereed. awarded to places such as Liverpool and Birmingham.

He was working with police, licensing authorities and businesses in the area, to try to achieve the award. A risk assessment was being carried out at licensed premises to ensure they were operating at a high standard.

Visitors were invited into the church to see an exhibition of wedding dresses - many worn by brides who were married in the church - dating from the 1940s to the present day.

Other events to mark the anniversary include an art competition for local schools and a booklet on the history of the church is being prepared

St Cross Church was built in 1886 by Edgerton Warburton of Arley Hall to a design by the Liverpool architect Edmund Kirby.

It maintains links with the Royal Naval Association originally forged during the war when the Royal Naval Air Station, HMS Blackcap, was at Stretton. There are war graves in the church yard and a war memorial outside the church.

Also outside, of course, is the Thorn Tree, an offspring of the famous Glastonbury Thorn which, according to legend, was brought to Appleton by a Norman knight and planted

In fact, numerous trees had died and the present one is of much more recent vintage.

But it still forms the centrepiece of the annual Bawming the Thorn festival, in which children dance around the tree and decorate it with flowers and ribbons

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Village centre farmers markets

REGULAR farmers markets may soon be held in Stockton Heath village centre with a range of local produce and goods on offer.

Walton Lea Project, which also runs the Long Lane Garden Centre in Warrington, plans to hold the markets on the last Sunday of the month, starting on April 24 or May 29, in Victoria Square.

The charity, which offers supported employment and training to adults

with learning disabilities, previously ran farmers markets at Walton Gardens and the Scout Hut in Stockton Heath.

Fitch, the horticulturist, said the farmers market successfully ran at Walton Gardens for two years. Following proposed redevelopment of the site, the market found a new home at the scout hut in Parkgate Road.

"We went to the scout hut for three or four months, but there was not the same footfall as we were a bit too far out of the area," she told Stockton Heath Parish Council.

The project had been approached a few months earlier by the parish council to see whether it would consider running a farmers market in

the village.

Mrs Fitch told members she had met the Warrington Market manager who had said he had no objection to the market operating on Sundays, but could have problems with it operating on any other day.

She said there were plans to have between eight and 10 stalls and she had up to 15 possible traders who were interested in joining in. Farmers markets had to sell products sourced within 30 miles and that goods on offer would include food, drink and

Police supported the idea and the park warden from Alexandra Park was also involved in the project.

The project has received a grant of £1,000 from the Stronger Together group towards providing gazebos to cover stalls and for advertising the

Cllr Tudor Pole guestioned whether the market would be reliable, as he said space had been reserved for the project at the Stockton Heath Festival and it had not attended.

Mrs Fitch said the previous markets at Walton and the Scout Hut had always run on schedule.

She asked if the parish council could help fund trestle tables which would also be a community resource available to other groups. Members agreed to research organisations who may be able to offer tables on loan.

Is 20 plenty for you?

MOST drivers believe their cars use more fuel and create more pollution at lower speeds - a view perpetuated by car manufacturers who claim that the optimum speed for fuel efficiency is between 50mph and 60mph.

But a number of recent surveys indicate that the reverse is the case and that for some models the highest mileage is achieved at speeds as low as 20mph.

This has been seized upon by the

"20s Plenty for Us" campaign, founded by Lymm resident Rod King but now a national organisation, as further justification for their initiative to make the roads safer for all users particularly cyclists and pedestrians.

So what is the truth of the situation? One study, involving five different vehicles ranging from a 1 litre Toyota to a 2.2 litre Landrover Freelander, show that the most efficient speed for all five was below 40mph and, in the case of two, was 20mph.

Another study found that fuel consumption increases sharply above 40mph and by 90mph has halved.

40mph and by 90mph has halved.
When 30 km/h (18.6 mph) zones
were introduced in Germany, it was
found drivers changed gear 12 per
cent less often, braked 14 per cent
less often and required 12 per cent
less fuel. At the same time, cycling
increased by 23 per cent.

Department for Transport guidance is that, generally, driving more slowly at a steady pace saves fuel and carbon dioxide emissions, unless an unnecessarily low gear is used.

MPVs are getting sportier

THE popularity of the MPV remains unabated and manufacturers are moving towards sportier looking models to counter claims that multipurpose vehicles are necessarily rather dull.

A range of new or re-vamped models are offered for 2011 including the first ever diesel hybrid, the Peugeot 3008 HYbrid4.

the Peugeot 3008 HYbrid4.

This is really a crossover car, combining SUV feature such as four wheel drive with the practicality of a people carrier.

beopie carrier.

It's stylish, with plenty of load space, flexible seating and CO2 emissions as low as 99g/km, making it exempt from both road tax

and the London congestion charge.

By contrast the re-styled Chrysler
Grand Voyager is bigger than most
other MPVs with almost mini-bus
proportions, seating for seven and
a reputation for reliability.

The Mazda5 was introduced last year, but the New Year has brought a 1.6-litre diesel model in addition to the petrol options. It is a better drive than most, boasts practical sliding doors and has a dramatic style that will impress the kids and also improve the aerodynamics to help reduce CO2 emissions to just 138g/km - and a yearly road tax charge of £110.

Vauxhall's seven-seat Zafira remains a popular choice due to its flexible and versatile seating system and is being given a facelift this

New engines seem likely to be introduced, possibly including a low-CO2 ecoFLEX version.

Chevrolet are entering the MPV market with the Orlando, a seven-seater with a high roof and a massive 1,487 litres of boot space with the rear seats folded.

It's a large, distinctive looking



vehicle with a 2.0-litre engine and will be available in diesel and petrol versions.

The Toyota Verso S is a stylish, supermini-size MPV with a high roofline to make more space for rear seat passengers. It will come with 1.0 and 1.33-litre engines producing low running costs and little environmental impact which is probably why there is no hybrid version on the horizon.

Honda, however, has added hybrid technology to its supermini-MPV, aiming it at younger buyers with distinctive colours and fresh design. Low running costs will give it more practicality and space than most similar sized cars.

Evidence

So there is plenty of evidence to support the argument that lower speeds result in lower fuel bills, as well as reduced pollution and improved road safety.

Despite this, the issue is plagued by controversy, with many motorists refusing to accept arguments based on either cost, the environment or road safety.

Locally, the borough council is to introduce 20mph limits in many residential areas after experiments which are claimed to have reduced the accident rate, so drivers are going to have to show some restraint whether they like it or not.

VAT recovery on fuel expenses

Fuel costs represents a considerable amount expenditure in any business with many ways of dealing with the VAT on these expense. How can you ensure that you claim the most back with the least amount of admin time.

Different methods

The basic options for recovering VAT on

- The basic options for recovering VAI on motoring expenses are:
 Claim all the VAT back on road fuel and pay the motoring scale charge
 Keep a detailed mileage record and calculate the proportion of VAT relating to business mileage
 Pay a mileage allowance and keep the petral receipts: or
- petrol receipts; or

 Don't claim back the VAT on road fuel.

VAT scale charge

If you reclaim VAT on road fuel for private motoring, the VATman will insist that you pay the motoring scale charge. This is based on the CO2 emissions of the car and not the actual amount of private usage. The scale charge must be added to the output tax, which is entered in box 1 of the VAT Return. If the business has a second or more cars and private fuel is second or more cars and private fuel is provided, even with low mileage, there is a second or subsequent, scale charge. a second or subsequent, scale criarge. The only way around this is to have no fuel

provided for private motoring for the

second car.

If a company car driver repays the It a company car driver repays the business in full, for the fuel that they use for private motoring, then no scale charges are due, but the payment they make automatically includes VAT which will have to be added into box 1 on the return. On the plus side, the VAT on all road fuel, both business and private, can be reclaimed, and the system is easy to use On the and the system is easy to use. On the down side, you need quite high mileage for it to be financially viable.

Mileage records
If you do not want to use the motoring scale charge because the charge you pay is more than the VAT on the road fuel that is more than the VAI on the road fuel that you can claim, you can record all of you mileage in a log showing the business mileage and the total mileage. So if 5,000 miles have been travelled in the quarter and 1,000 are business miles then 20% of the VAT can be recovered. This system is accurate and it is possible to reclaim all of the VAT on the business mileage but it is complicated. mileage, but it is complicated.

Pay a mileage allowance

If you don't want to pay the scale charge and the mileage log is too much of an admin burden, then you can pay a

mileage and claim back the VAT on the element relating to road fuel. The AA and RAC publish mileage rates that give the fuel costs per mile for the different engine sizes; these can also be obtained from the VATman's website. It normally works out at between 10p and 15p per mile depending on the engine size. You then apply the VAT fraction to that figure and claim it back. You do need to produce expense forms and petrol receipts to back up the claims. This system is simple and gives good VAT recovery. Where possible this should be the recommended method. The alternative is not to claim back the VAT on any road fuel at all, but that does seem pointless.
