Opinion

MAURICE, the last Lord Egerton of Tatton, may well turn in his grave at the prospect of a theme park being developed amid the sprawling acres of Tatton Park.

Indeed, if the terms under which he gifted his estate to the National Trust, following his death in 1958, do not contain some legal clause to prevent such a thing from happening, it is probably only because in his lifetime, he could not have conceived such a possibility.

Still, the bachelor baron is long gone, and in any case, a man who built a castle in Kenya from which women were banned, can hardly complain about the eccentricities of modern leisure pursuits. Indeed he has probably been revolving in his grave for years as his Kenyan castle is now used as a wedding venue!

Of more relevance is what people living near Tatton Park

today think of the proposals, put forward by Cheshire East Council and a Norfolk-based theme park.

In the recent past, some Knutsford residents have complained about open-air concerts and firework displays at Tatton. There have also complaints about the traffic chaos which accompanies the annual RHS flower show

If the proposed adventure park contains nothing more than the existing one in Norfolk - treehouses, zip wires, jungle bridges, storytelling, boat trips, etc - then it may not raise noise issues. But these developments have a tendency to grow and the prospect of something like Alton Towers, with its rides, restaurants, bars, shops, etc., is one that might not go down too well.

Tatton is already an award-winning attraction, attracting 800,000 visitors a year. We wonder whether this is not enough.

IT will be interesting to see what effect the separation of the popular Stockton Heath Festival from the equally popular Stockton Heath Walking Day, will have on the two events.

Hopefully, none, for both occasions have, in the recent past, benefited from strong support from the local community and both deserve to continue to do so.

Last year, after hearing talk about changing the date of the Festival so that it did not coincide with the Walk, we

urged caution. Why, after all, change a winning team?
In fact, the change has happened by accident rather than design. Neither organisation has changed its date but the complexities of the Gregorian Calendar led to some confusion leading to the Festival starting five days after the Walk instead of three days before it!

By the time the error was discovered, bookings had been confirmed and it was too late to change them.

Taking a positive view, both Festival and Walk now have an opportunity to see how they manage on their own. It will be no new experience for the Walk, as it has a history stretching back more than 100 years. The Festival, on the other hand, will be going it alone for the first time - in its important Fifth Anniversary Year.

We urge local people to support both events. They help keep the village on the map in their own different ways and that can only be for the good. Next year will be time enough to decide whether they should come together again or not.



'Library' is back in business

GRAPPENHALL Library is back in business but still looking for a new name.

More than 3,500 books line its shelves and

volunteer "librarians" are there to help. Hundreds of people packed into the building in Victoria Avenue when an open day was held to spotlight the services available.

The library - closed as a result of Town Hall spending cuts - is now run by volunteers from

the Friends of Grappenhall Library.

A competition has taken place to decide a new name for the centre.

Eventually the building is likely to be used for a wide range of activities.

Festival goes it alone – by accident!

THIS year's Stockton Heath Festival will be the first since it was launched five years ago NOT to coincide with the village Walking Day.

Walking Day will be on Saturday July 7 while the festival will run from Thursday, July 12 to Sunday July 15. Festival founder Tudor Pole said:

Festival founder Tudor Pole said: "Neither of us have changed our dates - it's happened by accident really.

"Stockton Heath Walking Day is traditionally held on the second Saturday after Warrington Walking Day, which is on June 29 this year.

"But we thought the village walk was on the second Saturday in July and went ahead on that basis, not taking into account that June 30 was a Saturday.

"There was some talk last year about moving the festival so it would not clash with the Walk, but it has happened by accident.

"It will mean the festival will miss the 'magnet' of the Walk to bring people into the village on the Saturday, but on the other hand we will be free to plan our Saturday events without worrying whether they will clash with the Walk.


"So what we lose on the roundabouts, we may gain on the swings.

"At least we will find out whether or not either event suffers and will be able to plan accordingly next year."

When the festival was launched in 2008, it was felt that by overlapping with Walking Day, both events might benefit. At that time, Walking Day was thought to be losing its appeal and in need of a boost.

But in the years since, the Walk has regained its popularity and is attracting larger crowds than ever.



Hall ready to open to public

TATTON Hall opens to the public again on March 24 - after undergoing its annual winter clean.

Every room and practically every precious item in the former stately home of the Egerton family will have had its condition checked and been thoroughly cleaned.

In particular, two large Regency candlesticks by the early 19th century silversmith and sculptor Paul Storr have been carefully cleaned with conservation grade silver dip, under the direction of a National Trust conservator.

Silver gilt, or 'vermeil' is made when a solid silver object is overlaid with a thin layer of gold. The technique has been used for thousands of years but was extremely popular in Europe from the early 18th to late 19th centuries.

These costly decorative candlesticks, surmounted with lion rampants, the crest of the Egerton family, would have been brought out for very special occasions. They may well have graced the dining table when the Prince and Princess of Wales were guests of Wilbraham and Elizabeth Egerton in 1887.

Legislation update

Do you have any sports fans amongst your employees who may already have been allocated tickets for the Olympics or at least will want to watch the main events on telly? Have any of them volunteered as helpers for the games? Where do you stand if several staff want the same time off over the 2 weeks the Games are on?

The first thing to do is talk to them. Find out whether you have a potential problem. If you find you have, then it may be as simple as setting a limit to the number of staff you can afford to be off at any one time without affecting performance — you may already have a policy on this — and then dealing with requests on a first

come, first served basis.

You might find staff want to watch specific events so you may want to think about whether they can watch it on their computers, without it affecting their work of course, or consider getting in a big telly (or two depending on how many people you have and where they are situated) for

the duration. It might limit absenteeism. Similarly you may want to consider requests for more flexible working hours whilst the games are on. Coming in and leaving earlier, split days, compressed hours etc may suit employees and as long as they work for the business too may be a good solution for everyone.

Remember all of these are your decision and although your staff may hear on the radio or TV that they are entitled to time off etc. The fact is that you are doing them a favour.

Nuclear waste breakthrough

Oak you like, oak you don't

TMO, Too Much Oak.....it's a fact, our tastes are changing, we now prefer to taste the fruit in our wine rather than the oak.

The loose term 'Too Much Oak' is generally applied to the cheaper mass market wines, where it is often used to mask impurities in a wine or to generally cover up a thin, tasteless wine.

The fact of the matter is most of these cheap oaked wines, as they are called, haven't even seen the inside of an oak barrel. Why? Well, because oak barrels are expensive. So, I can hear you asking, why then do they taste so oaky? Chips..... no, not the potato kind, oak chips in a large tea bag style container that is swirled around the vat of wine for a while. What this does is impart a dominant oaky character, almost confected in its style in an attempt to enhance the flavour of average quality fruit.


But love it or hate it, oak, when it is used in the right way, can both enhance and compliment a wine. The key is quality fruit and a jolly good winemaker; this can make all the difference in getting the right balance for an elegant oaked Chardonnay or a good quality Rioja. With genuine oak ageing, oxygen, through the pores of the wood, provides ideal conditions to soften harsh tannins and increase the complexity of the flavour compounds. It can increase the ageing potential and help to prepare the wine for bottle ageing, a fundamental factor for maturing fine wines.

Whether you like oak matured wines or not is a personal choice, but if I had a £1 for everyone that told me they didn't like Chardonnay but they loved Chablis I would be sitting on a beach somewhere drinking the stuff!! Did you ever think that it might be the oak you don't like and not the grape variety? In a recent tasting I asked people to raise their hands if they didn't like Chardonnay. I couldn't believe the result; over 60 out of 80 people raised their hands. However, after trying one of our elegant Chardonnays, over 40 of those people had to admit they were impressed and liked the wine and I bet there would have been a lot more if I hadn't told them it was Chardonnay.

Basics for business

Step 1 Importance of Record Keeping • to include the logging and retaining of any and all source documents which relate to the operation of the business .e sales invoices, purchase invoices, business bank account statements, paying in books, cheque books, business credit card statements, HP and/or agreements and where applicable copies of quarterly VAT

Step 2 VAT Implications to the business

Importance of keeping an eye on turnover – There is a limit to how much turnover one can achieve before compulsory registration, please note! this is subject to change, usually every April. *Remember* This has to be monitored on a rolling 12 month basis. *Be aware it is your responsibility.* many cases an accountant will not know your turnover level until they start to prepare the accounts and this may be months after the threshold has been reached. (If you don't know what the threshold then either ask your accountant or go on-line to find out)

THE chairman of Cheshire Police Authority - which defied the Government by increasing their part of the council tax - has also been stressing the importance of volunteers in the fight against crime and disorder.

Margaret Ollerenshaw spoke up for "Specials" at a passing out ceremony for 26 men and women who had just completed their initial training to become Special Constables

They will work with many of the Neighbourhood Policing Teams across the county.

Mrs Ollerenshaw said: "Specials today work alongside regular Police Officers in a wide variety of policing tasks. They are a familiar sight on the streets of our towns and villages, playing a key role in combating anti-social behaviour.

"This is especially true on Friday and Saturday nights. The volunteer officers patrol areas which are busy with people enjoying a night out and call at pubs and clubs to carry out licensing visits.

"The sight of them provides reassurance for people who just want to enjoy a

night out and is a deterrent to those who are out to cause trouble."

. Later, Mrs Ollerenshaw announced that the authority was to increase its element of council tax by 3.94 per cent - the equivalent of 11 pence a week for an average Band D home.

She said the small increase would help maintain frontline policing and keep the people of Cheshire safe, although it would still require a reduction of 25 officers.

It was the last budget to be set by the authority, before it is replaced by a Police and Crime Commissioner in November. Mrs Ollerenshaw described it as "arguably the most difficult of the 17 budgets set by the authority".

Simon Roberts, chairman of the Cheshire Police Federation, praised the authority for its "brave decision."

He said: "I am personally aware of the political pressure that has been placed

on this police authority to accept a freeze on council tax.

"It pleases me that they have resisted this temptation and made the more difficult but correct decision. We face uncertain times ahead with this police authority being replaced by a Police Commissioner.

"I hope that this person, whoever it may be, shows the same political independence as this police authority in the future and does not look for the often easier short term fix.
