Opinion

IT is inevitable that a project as huge as HS2 will split communities and in Cheshire it has certainly done that. For every person supporting the proposed new high speed rail link with London, you can easily find another opposing it vehemently.

Some divide on predictably political lines and it's probably best to ignore them. The nature of party politics means that when one side comes up with an idea, the other feels duty bound to rubbish it.

feels duty bound to rubbish it.

Others may be inspired by the "not in my back yard" syndrome and, understandable as this may be, they are also best kept in perspective.

After all, you can hardly expect someone whose house is to be demolished or whose view spoiled, to be overly enthusiastic about a new railway.

Cheshire East Council and Cheshire West and Chester Council have both welcomed the proposals because of the economic benefits they are supposed to bring.

economic benefits they are supposed to bring.

Warrington Borough Council has, on the other hand, so far been a little cagey on the issue.

far been a little cagey on the issue.

Council leader Terry O'Neill said: "Officers in our transport and policy teams will be studying these plans closely over the coming weeks and we will be engaging with stakeholders such as parish councils, partner agencies, residents, businesses and neighbouring authorities to formulate and submit our official representation to the government."

HS2 does illustrate one thing, however, and that is our continuing obsession with speed. Trains travelling at 225mph are held up as a reason for pressing ahead with the scheme, even though they will lop only about half-an-hour off journey times between, say, Warrington and the capital.

Is half-an-hour so important? Particularly in an age when we have been told that the internet and video conferencing

make much business travel unnecessary?

Our scepticism about HS2 is not based on whether it will benefit this town or that, or despoil this picturesque village or that, but rather on whether it is needed at all.

HOW'S this for a masterful example of corporate spin?

Cheshire East Council announces that it has made public a previously confidential report on controversial proposals for a theme park within historic Tatton Park to raise public awareness of the proposals.

In fact, of course, it has made the document public only

In fact, of course, it has made the document public only because it was ordered to do so by the Information Commissioner following a complaint from a local resident.

No wonder the Save Tatton Action Group (STAG) has dismissed the council's explanation as "flim flam"!

What was in the report that made it necessary to keep it confidential? We don't really know - unless it was the council's pledge to loan £5 million to the theme park developers at the same time as announcing plans to cut 1,000 council jobs.

Of course the council has already spent more than £78,000 on various surveys in connection with the plan and agreed to stump up another £1.5 million on infrastructure, including a car park, should the scheme win planning consent.

Cheshire East's enthusiasm for the theme park stems from a desire to see Tatton Park become "self sustaining" for years to come.

Given that it already attracts more than 800,000 visitors a year and is one of the top-10 visitor attractions in the country, we think it is already rather more than self-sustaining.

Carvings celebrate Queen's Diamond Jubilee

SEVEN schools in Appleton, Stockton Heath and Stretton took part in a special project to mark the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

Knutsford Academy pupils Laura Downes and Abigail Chetham, both aged 12, qualified when they sang at Manchester's Palace Theatre.



HS2's major impact on rural communities

THE HS2 high speed rail link looks set to have a major impact on rural communities across Cheshire and a chorus of critics has raised concerns and - in some cases - outright opposition.

Villagers from Pickmere, Tabley, Mere, Millington, High Legh, Ashley, Rostherne, Little Bollington, Lymm, Rixton, Croft and Culcheth are questioning whether the claimed economic benefits of the new railway outweigh the environmental damage it would cause.

There is anger in particular over the fact that the

areas likely to suffer most will gain least.

"All pain, no gain" is a frequently heard protest.

From the north of Crewe, the HS2 line follows the West Coast Main Line until the point where it is crossed by the A530. It then passes beneath the A530 and diverges away to cross the A54 and A533 corridors between Winsford and Middlewich.

The route then crosses a 750m long viaduct crossing

both the River Dane and the Trent and Mersey Canal. It is then elevated to cross the Middlewich Branch Line and the A530, before heading towards the east of Lostock Gralam.

The route crosses over the Mid Cheshire railway line

before crossing over the A556/A559 junction.

It then passes to the east of Pickmere, to the west of junction 19 of the M6. It crosses over the M6 and then beneath the realigned A50 between High Legh and Bucklow Hill before arriving at a junction south of the

One branch of this junction heads north crossing beneath the M56 before crossing over the Bridgewater canal to the east of Lymm, skirting Warburton to cross the Manchester Ship Canal at an elevated level around Hollins Green, continuing on through parts of Croft, Culcheth and Lowton.

The second branch heads east to the north of Rostherne Mere and south of the M56 junction 8, then

south of Ashley before crossing beneath the M56 around junction 6, with a new HS2 station serving Manchester Airport and the Airport City Enterprise Zone.

Both Cheshire East Council and Cheshire West and Chester Council have welcomed the proposals which they believe will provide a massive economic boost. Warrington has been more cautious and says it wants to engage with residents, parish councils, businesses, etc before making any representation to government.

A number of protest groups have already been set up promising a determined fight against the proposals.

High Legh Parish Council has set up a working group to ensure local people are represented in any debate on the HS2 proposals.

Pickmere Parish Council says the rail link would have the most significant impact on the area for generations and hopes to collaborate with neighbouring parishes to

Maths students strike gold

STUDENTS from Warrington's Priestley College achieved three golds, seven silvers and 11 bronzes in this year's UK Mathematics Trust Senior Maths Challenge.



More than 98,000 pupils from across the UK entered the challenge with the top 10 per cent receiving a gold certificate, the next 20 per cent silver and the next 30 per cent bronze.

Matthew Cummins and Ben Stratulis, both 17, were two of 4,000 of the top students who were invited to take part in follow-on competitions.

Maths tutor Wendy Brennan said:
"This competition is an extra
challenge for students who choose to
take it on.

"It provides extra preparation for their exams because it is done under test conditions, but they also enjoy taking part."

The Senior Maths Challenge is aimed at those in years 13 and below.

Priestley students sat the challenge in college and those who received

were some strange questions, but it was interesting."

Former Bridgewater High pupil Matthew Cummins, who studies Maths, Further Maths, Chemistry and Physics at Priestley, reached the BM01 round.

That posed six questions giving students three and half hours to answer in detail showing all their workings out.

"I like how once you know your maths you learn how to apply it and you always have a definite answer," he said

Legal aid for divorcing couples axed in April

IT will be no April Fool's joke on April 1at for separating and divorcing couples who will lose the right to claim legal aid, warns Stockton Heath based QualitySolicitors Forshaws Davies Ridgway (FDR).

After April 1st, only people who have suffered proven domestic violence or forced marriage will be able to apply for legal aid. Everyone else will have to fund their own legal work or represent themselves in court.

Audrey Venables (pictured), the firm's head of family law, believes the Government's decision is going to have dire consequences for many vulnerable people and low income families.

people and low income families.

She said: "Since the previous Government first proposed this cut in 2009, the legal profession has

been campaigning against the decision. We are very concerned it will leave the most vulnerable people in our society without the ability to access legal advice and representation.

"For example, a mother and father who cannot agree on the arrangements for their children will now have to represent themselves in court if they cannot afford a lawyer. As well as those on benefits, stay-at-home parents will also be disadvantaged because they may be forced to represent themselves against their more affluent partner who is able to hire a professional advocate.

"These cuts will cause huge inequalities and an imbalance of power for parents who have chosen to stay at home with their children. People will be tempted to cut corners and not get professional advice, potentially signing up to damaging arrangements which could badly affect them the rest of their lives.

"The loss of legal aid is also bound to have an adverse effect on court waiting

"The loss of legal aid is also bound to have an adverse effect on court waiting times, as cases will inevitably take longer to be heard. The change is going to impact on everyone, not just those who lose the right to free representation," she added.

To ease the pain for those who will lose access to free help, family lawyers at QualitySolicitors Forshaws Davies Ridgway have come up with a package of easy payment measures which will help spread the load. This includes a fixed fee menu of prices or a pay-as-you-go system, enabling clients to select help when they need it most.

Anyone who may be eligible to continue to seek legal aid due to domestic violence is encouraged to seek help from the police or their GP.

Fraudsters target cash points across Cheshire

POLICE are warning the public to be on their guard following a series of cash point scams that are occurring across the county.

Fraudsters are targeting cash machines positioned outside post offices, convenience stores and other outlets across Cheshire and the key message from the police is to be on your guard before you use a cash machine and be alert to

operation Astoria has been put in place by the Economic Crime Unit to concentrate on crime related to ATMs (cash machines) within the Cheshire Force

Many of the tactics being used by fraudsters to target machines are card skimming, card entrapment and cash trapping.

There are three main ways in which the fraudster will commit fraud:

Card Skimming - This involves the use of the video recording element of mobile telephones to capture the pin numbers of innocent ATM users. These adapted mobile telephones are usually hidden above the pin number area. The fraudster will also attach a false mouth piece which will read and copy the details on the magnetic strip of the card. Once these details have been copied, this information can be transferred on to a new card and, with the pin number, they can withdraw money from the victims account.

Card Entrapment - The fraudster will use an adapted mobile telephone to record the pin number being inputted by the victim but will use a device to trap the victims card once it has been placed into the machine. The victim usually believes

that the card has been retained by the cash machine due to a problem. The fraudster will recover the original card and the pin number and is then ready to use

Cash Trapping - The fraudster will place a device over the area where the money is released from the cash machine. The device traps the money making the victim believe that the machine has a problem and is not releasing any funds. The fraudster will then collect the device and the money collected.

In the North West, card fraud has dropped considerably over the last five years

but still accounts for £21m making Cheshire the second worst in the UK.

DC Tony Condon, from the Economic Crime Unit said: "There have been an

increasing number of attacks on ATMs across Cheshire, where the fraudsters are using all three methods to obtain money from innocent victims. ATM users do not know they are victims until they realise their account balance has reduced more than normal.

Village shops hit by parking charges

FOOTFALL has dropped in Stockton Heath's village shopping centre since the free period on the local pay-and-display car park was cut from two hours to one.

This is the view of shopkeepers quizzed by a local councillor.

Cllr John Price - a member of neighbouring Appleton Parish Council - ventured over the border into Stockton Heath to carry out a survey of shopkeepers in London Road.

He said: "I was not acting as a councillor - it's not my parish! I was just an ordinary member of the public. But I had heard claims that shopkeepers supported the reduced free parking period which I just could not believe. And I was right. I visited every shop that was open in London Road, between Victoria Square and the Manchester Ship Canal and I found that they were 100 per cent opposed

to the changes.
"I also discovered that doctors at the local medical centre were being inundated with requests for notes from patients who had been 'booked' on the car park because they had been unable to get back to their cars within one hour. It's almost as if the parking wardens lie in wait for elderly or sick people who have been delayed at the medical centre. Businesses such as hairdressers and opticians, whose customers take longer to deal with, were particularly affected.

"Overall there was a general view that fewer people were shopping in

the village since the reduced free period came into force."

Cllr Price took his findings to Stockton Heath Parish Council - who decided to raise the issue with Warrington Borough Council, who

warfington Bolodyii Council, who imposed the changes.

Cllr Price said: "The last thing we want to do is drive shoppers away. There were five empty shops in the street when I did my survey. We don't want any more. The borough council seems to be out to increase revenue from the car parks - but if one more shop closes they will lose a lot more in business rates."!



Basic points to remember about RTI

The starting date for Real Time Information (RTI) reporting is approaching fast. If you have employees then you need to ensure that you are ready to implement it from 6th April. There is plenty of guidance on HMRC's website, but there are a number of basic points that you should be aware of if you

wish to avoid penalties.

RTI requires all payments to employees to be reported to the tax office before they are made. There is one class of employee for whom this may present particular difficulty, and that is the director/shareholder of a family company. There may be a temptation at present for the director/shareholder to "draw" an amount of money each week or month, and to allocate these "drawings" to salary and/or dividends at the end of the year. In most cases this treatment will not be acceptable under RTI.

The requirement to report to the tax office before the payment of wages means office before the payment of wages means that the exact nature of each payment must be known before it is made, and all payments must be properly described in the records and fully supported by backing documentation. Director's wages should be paid separately from all other payments and supported by entries in the payroll. Similarly, dividends should again be paid separately from all other payments and supported by evidence of their legality as well as board minutes and dividend vouchers.

It is inevitable that the nature of payments to directors will be examined in detail during a PAYE or other tax office review of a company's records, and may lead to the tax office contending that the payments are wages and therefore covered by RTI. The chance of being able to successfully resist this contention will be greatly reduced if proper records and supporting documentation are not maintained. If the tax office succeeds in

maintained. If the tax office succeeds in their contention then substantial additional tax, penalties and interest will follow. In a small number of cases RTI may not present any difficulty for the director/shareholder. If there is a sufficient balance in the director's loan account with the company then all "drawings" can properly be described as loan repayments. At the end of the year, the company could then vote a dividend and salary to replenish the loan. Unfortunately, the economic downturn in the past few years has resulted in many of these loan accounts being depleted due to lower profits so this option is available to fewer and fewer companies. companies.

The above is only one instance when RTI will lead to increased burdens on employers. There are other instances

including when an employer not only has employees from whom tax and/or NIC is deducted, but other employees not earning sufficient for these deductions to apply Currently, the reporting requirements only relate to employees suffering deductions. However, under RTI all payments must be reported even when no deductions are


