ISA v **SIPP** — Where should you invest?

It all depends on your own personal circumstances. At present you can contribute £15000 to an ISA, or NISA as they are now known. With a SIPP you are limited to the Annual Allowance which is £40000. A 25 year old investing £2000 into both a NISA and a SIPP will receive tax relief immediately on the SIPP making the total investment £2500. The NISA does not receive tax relief. If both investments grew by 7%pa after charges, then at age 65 the NISA would be worth £29949, and the SIPP £37436. However at retirement you can only take 25% of the SIPP fund tax free, so £9359. The remaining £28077 is taxable at your rate of tax at that point. With the NISA you can have it all tax free, or take a tax free income from it.

There is no doubt you have greater flexibility at retirement age with the impending rule changes in April 2015. But as always it is probably wise to have a mixture of a few investments or tax wrappers as they are referred. There are also other areas of investment such as Venture Capital Trusts or VCT's as they are known, which attract valuable tax incentives. But I shall cover these another time.

Editor's comment

A TOTAL of 53 villages and small towns entered this year's Cheshire Community Pride competition – the vast majority from Cheshire East and Cheshire West and Chester.

Only one was from Halton and only two from Warrington – and we feel we must ask the question: Why?

Now it is true that the two Cheshire districts have a lot more villages and small towns than either Warrington or Halton. In fact, depending on one's definition of a village, it can be argued that Halton doesn't have any, although the residents of Daresbury (which didn't enter the competition) or Hale, Widnes (which did) might beg to differ. But Warr

Warrington has 18 parish councils, some of which cover more than one village. Yet it was left to two of the smallest – Hatton and Winwick - to represent the borough in what is undoubtedly a prestigious

Both got mentions - indeed Hatton, population less than 400, was highly commended in four categories.

So we must repeat the question: Why don't more Warrington villages enter?

We have heard the "we don't stand a chance" argument many times. Usually because of litter or some specific local eyesore that nobody will take responsibility for. In fact, it was only a couple of years ago that Frodsham didn't enter and yet this year they came first in the 5,001-10,000 population category.

So anything is possible. Nothing ventured nothing gained. We think Warrington villages are attractive enough and sufficiently well cared for to figure among the prizewinners.
Let's hope that next year, more of

them will make the effort.

them will make the effort.

Meanwhile, if you still haven't visited the Walled Garden at Grappenhall Heys since the £1m Nationally Lottery restoration work was completed, we suggest you do.

It is one of South Warrington's

hidden gems and has been steadily gaining in popularity over the years.

The lottery grant has seen the former greenhouses restored to their



former glory and the cafe facilities have also received a major makeover.

Added to the attractive grounds it makes for a very enjoyable visit, especially for creams teas and home made cakes!

Congratulations to all those hard working volunteers and the local parish council who have put in so much time and effort over the years.

Their hard work and endeavour has certainly paid off!

Ted is 'Pride of Britain'

SEVEN-year old youngster Ted McCaffery has won a Pride of Britain award for his fundraising efforts for Alder Hey hospital.

from Stockton underwent a major heart operation in February last year and completed a fundraising mini-triathlon just eight weeks after leaving hospital.

Ted a pupil at Grange Junior School received his award, in the Young Fundraiser of the Year category, during the glitzy Pride of Britain ceremony that was broadcast on ITV1 recently.

Ted's desire to raise money for the hospital arose as he awaited lifesaving heart surgery. When the television in the hospital did not work, Ted resolved to raise enough money to provide a new television so that the boredom of an extended hospital stay could be alleviated for future children.

The operation itself took six hours to complete and it was a number of weeks before Ted was allowed to come home. Just eight weeks later, however, Ted completed the mini-triathlon and raised over £1000 for the hospital. Ted was exhausted by the end of the challenge which entailed scooting for 150 metres, cycling 600 metres and running 200m.

"It was really hard but I told everyone I was going to do it and I just wanted to stick to my promise," reasoned Ted.

After completing the challenge and raising the money, Ted was asked by Alder Hey to become a children's

ambassador.

Charity seeks donations of furniture, bikes and gardening tools

LOCAL charity, the Walton Lea Partnership, is requesting donations of unwanted furniture, bikes and gardening tools from people in the local community.

The charity runs two sites based in Warrington, the Walton Lea Walled Garden in Higher Walton and the Long Lane Garden Centre in Orford, and provides supported employment for adults with learning difficulties, mental health challenges and the early onset of Alzheimer's.

The charity has a number of ongoing projects which enable its beneficiaries to learn skills in gardening, floristry, woodwork, conservation and customer service in a therapeutic manner. It is searching for material donations to ensure beneficiaries can continue to gain from its services.

The 'Recycled Cycles' project restores bikes of any condition and needs bike parts plus both adult and children's bikes. The 'Take a Seat' project, which restores furniture ranging from tables and chairs to picture frames and everything in between requires unwanted furniture, paint and wood for up-cycling and restoration. In addition, both sites have gardens and nurseries and have also asked for gardening tools to help with the maintenance.

The charity relies on donations and support from Trusts and Warrington Social Services, but also depends on sales from visitors purchasing its produce, upcycled furniture and plants, in order to finance the work that it provides for its beneficiaries and the wider community.

Commenting on the call for donations, manager at the Walton Lea Partnership, Kate Fitch said: "Of course monetary donations are important to keep the charity running for its beneficiaries and for the Warrington community. However, this is a call for material donations, and we're asking people to have a look around for furniture they are looking to throw away, gardening tools they no longer use, or any storage solutions they do not need, and get in touch, as we're always so grateful for such donations.

"I believe Walton Lea Partnership is a fantastic asset to the Warrington area, but to keep it going we have to occasionally ask the generous people within the local area for their help. We would be so very grateful to anyone who donated, as it really does make a difference."

Homes plan is 'thin end of the wedge'

VILLAGERS and local councillors have expressed dismay over a planning decision which they believe could mean the end for the "green" gap between Thelwall and Lymm.

Planning chiefs have given the goahead for four houses with detached double garages in the grounds of historic Bridge House, in Stockport Road, Thelwall.

The locally listed former farm house is said to be the last remaining smallholding in the village and is on the edge of Thelwall Village Conservation Area.

A disappointed Cllr Mike Biggin said: "This could be the thin end of the wedge and mean the end of the gap between Thelwall and Lymm.

"It makes one wonder what the point of conservation areas is when proposals like this are allowed to go ahead.

"This is quite a serious precedent and local residents will be very disappointed."

Cllr Biggin, together with Cllr Wendy Johnson, Cllr Ted Finnegan, eight local residents and Grappenhall and Thelwall Parish Council, had lodged objections to the scheme put forward by developers Redwaters Elite.

They argued the scheme represented over-development of the site and was little different to an earlier scheme refused two years ago.

There were also road safety issues arising from a new access in Bell Lane



and increased traffic at the junction of Bell Lane and Stockport Road.

Existing flooding problems could be worsened because of inadequate drainage facilities and extra sewage could contaminate a natural pond inhabited by Great Crested Newts and other species of wild life.

Planning officers recommended the scheme be approved. They said the conservation area already contained a mixture of old and new properties and the proposed houses would be in character with the immediate vicinity.

Although contemporary in design, they would reflect the agricultural character of the existing farmhouse and barns.

Exciting new building project

WITHINGTON Girls' School is delighted to report that first foundations have been laid for the construction of a new Junior School building and a central social 'Hub' at the heart of the School.

The new Junior School and Hub will help to ensure that Withington remains at the forefront of girls' education nationally in the way our founders intended, offering exceptional opportunities for personal development - academic, cultural, sporting and social - and encouraging independence of mind and high aspirations".

Historic walled garden glasshouses now open after £1 million restoration

HISTORIC glasshouses, restored with the help of a £1,056,600 grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund, have now been formally opened to the public.

A special opening ceremony at Grappenhall Heys Walled Garden marked the completion of a lengthy project to transform a derelict eyesore into a thriving community asset.

It was opened by Cheshire gardening expert Sam Youd, former head gardener at Tatton Park and a representative of the Heritage Lottery Fund.

The Grappenhall Heys estate dates

from 1830 and originally consisted of a house with formal gardens, parkland and a walled garden.

After passing through several ownerships, the house fell into a state of disrepair and was eventually demolished.

The walled garden, however,

survived and many historic features were retained including the glasshouses – although they were in a poor state of repair.

Grappenhall and Thelwall Parish Council launched the glasshouse regeneration project and won support from the Heritage Lottery fund.

Janet Richards, a member of the working group which steered the initiative with support from the Friends of Grappenhall Heyes, said: "We are thrilled to open the glasshouses which have several new amenities to make the visitor experience more enjoyable.

"The transformation is remarkable and can be witnessed on a time lapse video available online via You Tube".

Sara Hilton, head of Heritage Lottery Fund North West, said: "The Walled Garden at Grappenhall Heys is a much-loved local heritage treasure, and we are delighted to see that our funding has made the restoration of these magnificent glasshouses possible.

"The project has also created a number of exciting volunteering opportunities and space for events and educational activities, meaning people from across the community will benefit from the fantastic achievements of the parish council and Friends group."

The restored glasshouses and back rooms will allow plant propagation and display. Other areas will be used for practical work and demonstrations.

There is also a multi-purpose community space which will be used as a café at the weekends and to deliver educational workshops, events and exhibitions for an array of visitors including schools, families and adult groups, during the week.

Ian Fountain, treasurer of the Friends of Grappenhall Heys Walled Garden said: "A well equipped kitchen and improved cafe facility means visitors can relax in the glasshouses and at new picnic tables while enjoying homemade cakes and hot drinks. They will also be able to overlook the beautiful kitchen garden."

The walled garden is managed by gardener/manager Graham Richardson and supported by volunteers.

It is hoped more volunteers will come forward to help with gardening, co-ordinating events, marketing roles and working in the café. Anyone interested should email friends@ ghwalledgarden.org.uk

Money Column

Statory Residence Tests

It is now over 12 months since the Statutory Residence Tests were introduced. Residency is an important concept which affects people with foreign income but, surprisingly, it was only defined in law last year.

The tests consist of a three part process as follows:

• Firstly, non-residency is defined in three ways. If a person falls into one of these definitions then they are "automatically non-resident". The three ways are:

1. he is resident in the UK in one or more of the last three preceeding tax years, and he spends fewer than 16 days in the UK in that year

he is not resident in any of the last three preceeding years, and spends fewer than 46 days in the UK in that

year 3. he works full time overseas and spends fewer than 91 days in the UK in the tax year.

Secondly, residency is defined
 in two ways. If, and only if, the first tests fail to apply then these are considered. If a person falls into one of these definitions then they are "automatically resident" The two

1. he spends 183 days or more in the UK

2. he spends at least one period of 91 consecutive days in the UK, of which at least 30 fall in the relevant tax year, and he has a home in the UK in which he spends at least 30 days during the tax year, and he has either no overseas home or had an overseas home in which he spent fewer than 30

days during the tax year (phew!!)

Thirdly, if none of the above two sets of definitions apply then a "sufficient ties" set of tests are applied. There are five elements to this test, and these are:

1. a family tie

an accommodation tie

a work tie a 90 day tie

5. (only if he was resident in the UK in one or more of the three preceeding tax years) a country tie
The number of elements required to

be non-resident depends upon

the number of days that are spent within the UK during that tax year,

whether you are arriving within the UK or leaving it



We do not have enough space to go through these "ties" in detail. However, most people will be either "automatically resident" or "automatically non-resident" and only a very small number of people will need to consider the "sufficient ties" set of tests.



Community orchard plan in jeopardy

A QUESTION mark hangs over the future of a proposed community orchard – because Warrington Borough Council wants to store leaves on it.

The land, off Cliff Lane, Grappenhall has lain unused for 25 years but three years ago a committee was set up years ago a committee was set up—with the backing of Grappenhall and Thelwall Parish Council—to press forward plans for a community orchard. Cliff Lane Community Orchard Committee opened a bank account with around £2,000 in it committed towards funding the project.

The borough council was approached and although though the project is thought it

and, although they at first thought it was not their land, were supportive. Local borough councillors backed the idea as did Warrington South MP David Mowat.

Cllr Dave Hockenhull, chairman of Grappenhall and Thelwall Parish Council, said: "Three years have elapsed with no final decision made by the borough council - and then, right of the blue, two council employees turned up with a JCB to re-establish the site entrance which had been sealed for years to keep travellers off.

"No approach had been made to the community orchard committee, the parish council, the local borough councillors nor the MP.

"Apparently the borough has suddenly decided it needs the land to store leaves - although I'm sure there were just as many leaves to dispose of last year."

Borough councillor Mike Biggin, who is also a member of the parish council, said: "This represents shameful duplicity on the part of the borough council and clearly illustrates they had absolutely no intention of supporting the project from the beginning.
"It is also another example of a

worthy project in South Warrington being deliberately derailed. What is

most appalling is that it appears to have been under a cloak of secrecy.

A council spokesperson said the community orchard committee had been informed some time ago that the future of the site would depend on an ongoing depot review.

When the review was completed, the site might, or might not, become surplus to requirements.

In the meantime, the council had a need for leaf storage in the south of the borough and the Cliff Lane site was considered ideal.

"The council's present requirements outweigh future external requirements."
