# Shopping malls and retail security

Well it's close to Christmas and in these days of austerity we may be wise to expect increases in theft and other criminal acts in our shopping malls and other retails centres.

Retail theft can be down to petty pilfering or to organised crime and armed robbery where thousands of pounds worth of goods can be taken at one time. To some it's a threat to livelihood but in other cases it's a threat to life. Only this year we saw the extent of rioting and the effect that it had on retail businesses. Retail theft has always been a problem but since the recession shoplifting has increased extensively as well as the recession shopitfting has increased extensively as well as violence towards retail staff. At least 22,000 retail workers suffered from attacks and £137 million of goods stolen last year (Retail Crime survey 2010) 2010)

Increasing retail security therefore is a must to stem the flow of this criminal activity. But security officers alone although necessary, are not enough to provide effective risk reduction. They have to be combined with good CCTV systems monitored by trained operators on or off site. Other alorg systems need to off site. Other alarm systems need to be used in more vulnerable shops

be used in more vulnerable shops such as panic alarms. Access controls may be required for jewellers shops and the like. Security breaches incur a major cost to retailers who, as well as the financial loss suffer from the business interruption and unplanned downtime as well as distressed staff and gear and inconvenience to the customers and inconvenience to the customers.

In the retail environment, it is a fact that robust security measures are a powerful deterrent and for ensuring immediate police notification, robust evidence and conviction of offenders.

Seeking good solid security advice is very important step for improving your security systems by reliable suppliers and products, CCTV installation, access control, appropriate tagging, and most importantly engaging security officers that are capable of doing the job

effectively in observation, monitoring and response. High quality security officers should

High quality security officers should be used in a retail environment; they should pride themselves in their image, have a professional and personal approach to security and a highly visible presence. They should be able to deal with customers sensitively but with appropriate firmness when required. They should be trained to NVQ level 2 in customer service to help them to deal with customers and should receive specialist training in retail security. They should know how to handle confrontation and difficult members of the public for theft, fraud, employee problems and assist staff and the public in a crisis situation. They should have the skill to deal with disorder and able to escort wrongdoers from the site without any fuss or embarrassment to the retailer.

fuss or embarrassment to the retailer. Officers need to be sensitive to dealing with people suffering from medical, or other disability or and take extra care with the elderly and young people. They must remain vigilant and alert at all times and not be distracted. They should be 'on site' trained to meet the retailers objectives and be a highly efficient deterrent to the 'would be offender'. What provides a major help in deterring retail crime is creating a

deterring retail crime is creating a 'security culture' amongst management and all staff. Encouraging vigilance and quick response in identifying suspects and suspicious occurrences. Prevention is much better than detection and taking on an intelligent approach to crime is a vital ingredient of success.

There are of course many simple things that can be done to prevent crime e.g. not having barriers that would be offenders can hide behind whilst they conceal their stolen goods,

This should be based on teamwork with retail management and staff applying best practice loss prevention techniques and excellent technical support to bring in stock shrinkage control. control.

Employers have to remember that they have a duty of care towards their staff to provide a safe and secure working environment and can be held liable for injury should the liable for injury should the appropriate control measures have not been put in place. Keeping alert to suspicious or abnormal behaviour is an important

part of a security culture. Look out for some of the following: Carrying a very large bag. Constantly looking around and watching the staff

movements. Not looking at any particular products.




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

Recent highlights include our rebranding in the spring and launch of our new website, both of which aimed to highlight the uniqueness of our work and make it easier for people to understand what we do and our success in securing part-funding from the Big Lottery to continue our work with victims and survivors of political conflict and terrorism. The Lottery has funded the first two years of a three-year programme to strengthen our links with academia, which included the publishing of a paper on our dialogue process by Rennes University in France, a joint seminar with Liverpool University on resilience, and the agreement to host a joint conference with Brighton and Leicester Universities in the summer of



#### 2012.

The Foundation continues to gain recognition of its work locally and overseas. Members of the team have spoken at numerous events and conferences in the UK and abroad and the Foundation itself hosted two high profile conferences at the Peace Centre. The first, entitled "International Approaches to Peace Building: From Global to Grassroots", brought together representatives from Governments, Peace organisations and individuals affected by conflict. The second, 'Rethinking Radicalisation', examined the Government's 'Prevent' strategy and the motivations and drivers of people drawn into violence. You can read more about it on page 5.

# Looking after the people who look after us

## **Professional Training**

Following on from the success of our Emergency Response Seminar in 2010, a number of organisations expressed an interest in learning more about the experiences of people affected by different incidents.

So, in the past few months, the Foundation has been delivering training to professionals who deal with the aftermath of critical incidents including acts of terrorism. These include Local Authorities, Emergency Services and Resilience Workers, Army Officers and Police Family Liaison Officers.

#### **Emergency Response**

During the Emergency Response Seminar, professionals were able to listen to one of our participants who spoke about the impact of losing a parent when she was still a child. This led to a request by Lancashire County Council asking us to run a workshop looking at the needs of children affected by traumatic incidents.

#### **Army Officers**

Drawing on our experience of working with families of soldiers killed in service, we delivered a residential programme for Army Casualty Notification and Visiting Officers (CNO/CVO). These are the men and women who inform and support families of soldiers killed and injured whilst in service. This programme offers a space for CNO/CVOs to share their experiences of breaking the news to families and supporting them in the weeks and months afterwards. During the programme they were able to share tips on things they had learned, and ways in which they could look after themselves. We are also involved in the training of the officers before they are assigned to a family and we have been able to pass on some of our participants' experiences to make sure other families get a good service.

#### Police

The Foundation delivered a workshop to Merseyside Police Call Takers and Family Liaison Officers on the human impact of incidents. The workshop increased the awareness of the impact on people in the weeks, months and years afterwards and help to increase their skills to respond to people better following incidents.



# Hugo Swires MP visits the Peace Centre



Minister of State for Northern Ireland Hugo Swire MP visited the Peace Centre to learn more about the work of the Foundation.

Colin and Wendy Parry along with the Foundation's Programme Manager Kelly Simcock, talked about their work with UK victims and survivors of political violence, young people and their training programmes for the Emergency Services, Army Officers and the Police, those who are first on the scene of an accident and the ones we rely upon who are also affected by these incidents.

Colin Parry said: "Hugo asked to come to the Peace Centre to learn more about our work so it was an ideal opportunity to talk about our history, our work, its outcomes and results.

It's important for us to build new relationships with the Coalition government after 13 years of doing just that with the previous Labour government".

Annie's father was a bomb disposal expert who lost his life when Annie was a little girl. Before becoming involved with the Foundation, Annie found it hard to deal with her past but she has been able to turn her tragic situation into something positive, which is not only beneficial for herself, but for future generations of young people.

# **Making History Real**

My friend James and I, both with sons taking history GCSE at the same school, decided to see if the school's History Department would like to liven up a topic that previous year groups have found difficult to grasp: 'The Troubles'.

James Clarke works for Isis Concepts, part of RM Education and believes passionately that school doesn't have to be just about sitting in rows learning facts. To that end Isis designs furniture for schools that can integrate technology and support learning. RM has a facility near Abingdon called the REAL Centre (Rethinking Education And Learning), which can show schools the potential of their products. I've been involved with the Foundation for Peace for 9 years now and through the Foundation I have been over to Northern Ireland several times and met people who have helped me understand why they turned to violence and what life was like on both sides.

On the last Monday of the summer term we took twenty year 10 students from Icknield Community College in Watlington, a very small town in rural South Oxfordshire, to the REAL Centre. The only introduction to this topic at school had been watching the film Bloody Sunday. The aim of our day was to enable the students to explore and understand what the 'Troubles' were about and to make sense of all the acronyms and terms used.

On arrival we gave all the students name badges with an additional unique label,





such as IRA, UDA, RUC, Protestant, Catholic etc. They had to seat themselves according to their groupings. We sh owed them clips of rioting in Northern Ireland that had footage of both the rioters and the security forces being fairly brutal. We then got them to decide which side they were on and who their enemy was, gave them some paper weapons and let them have a three minute paper fight and discussion afterwards about what they did and why.

We split the students into 3 groups for the rest of the day where they rotated round 3 different activities. I looked at google maps of Belfast and Derry, giving them a virtual tour on a large horizontal screen. We looked at some of the murals and their symbolism, the housing in Catholic and Protestant housing estates, the route of the Bloody Sunday march and the peace lines in both cities. We could change the screen from actually feeling like you were walking down the streets to look up other websites if something came up in the discussion.

The second activity was to film a news report using green screen technology. They were asked to use the internet and copies of newspaper reports of the time and choose to report as if they were from London or Dublin and try and decide how the news would have been biased.

Phil Maslen a former British soldier who served in Northern Ireland (also involved



with the Foundation programmes) joined us for the day. Phil brought to life the third activity as a witness or 'primary source' in history terminology. The students used an acoustic pod and 'internet ready mobile devices' to create a podcast. Phil was able to give them valuable insight in to what it was like to serve in the British Army at the time. They came up with some interesting questions for their interviews and really enjoyed having the chance to talk to someone who was there. Phil also helped them document the political spectrum and he really looked like a professional teacher!

When school starts again in September and the History Department start teaching the topic in earnest, we will be able to see how much they learnt and how much they have retained from our day.

# **Rethinking Radicalisation Conference**

In October, the Foundation hosted a twoday conference entitled 'Rethinking Radicalisation' which explored the meaning of Radicalisation, what drives people into violent extremism and practical approaches to engaging with people and communities at the risk of been drawn into violence.

The event attracted eminent speakers including Professor Ted Cantle, Executive Chair of the Institute of Community Cohesion; DCS Tony Porter, Head of the Counter Terrorism unit for the North of England and Nadeem Siddique, Prevent Coordinator for Leeds City Council. The speakers provided their own perspectives on approaches to working to combat violent extremism and discussed some of the challenges facing communities.

Central to the theme of the event was the Foundation's experiences working in Northern Ireland with people who have been drawn to violent extremism and/or extreme groups. Speaking of the event Programme Manager, Kelly Simcock, said: 'We recognise that the terms 'violent extremism' and 'radicalisation' are now associated as being synonymous with the Muslim community, but our organisation was born of violent extremism of Irish Republican origins and so we are well aware of the drivers and motivations for people becoming involved in extreme groups and behaviour. This was key in our decision to run this conference and provide a space for people to share in our learning, reflect on the lessons from the past and consider approaches to keeping all of our communities safe.

A panel of speakers included former members of extreme groups including: Gerry Foster (Former INLA), Alistair Little (Fomer UVF) and Rashad Ali (Former Hizb' ut Tahrir). These individuals shared their own personal stories describing the motivators and drivers to their becoming involved in violence and extreme groups.

Programme worker, Rosie Aubrey, said: 'The testimonies were crucial to the overall





success of the event. They transcend all rhetoric and theory and put a human face on what we often look at from an objective point of view. Participants find this helps in understanding what motivates and drives individuals to undertake such violent acts'. The event was attended by around 70 participants and brought together professionals working with the Government's PREVENT agenda including police, teachers, local authorities and charities as well as people affected by conflict.









Feedback from the event has been positive. Comments from delegates include:

'What I found most useful is the balanced structure of the event – mixture just right between lectures, participation, group activity and personal experience'

'The sessions were great. There was a lot of real and practical demonstration of effective work'

'I found the various viewpoints of speakers highly eye opening and influential. I have gained further knowledge and practical skills that I can then follow up with my line of work and my own community'

### John's Reflections

'As a peace practitioner, it is always interesting to engage with various actors, communities and agencies involved in preventing violence and building peace.

This conference offered me an opportunity to reflect on my practice, hear various perspectives on the PREVENT agenda and share some of our tools and strategies in challenging extreme behaviour and facilitating difficult conversations. What I found most reassuring was the shared commitment to preventing violence by the different individuals and professionals attending.

Listening to case studies of interventions in schools and communities was also inspiring as it shows that conflict transformation interventions do work and can make a big difference.'

Two REACH participants (aged 14-15) visited Warrington Collegiate as part of their International Peace Day activities to facilitate interactive workshops with Year 1 and 2 Health and Social Care students. These workshops were specifically designed to develop an increased awareness of conflict issues and to promote a variety of key conflict resolution skills and techniques.

Vanessa Conlin, organiser of the event at Warrington Collegiate, said "It has been a great pleasure to work alongside Kerry and her team on International Peace Day. Kerry's group of young mentors proved to be a great hit as they effectively delivered Conflict Resolution Training to two groups of collegiate students. The feedback received from both students and staff who took part has been extremely positive."

The REACH participants also benefitted from this experience as they were able to take on challenging roles and responsibilities within their community.

Alongside youngsters from REACH, volunteers from St Andrew's Primary School, Orford Library, Orford Neighbourhood Enterprises, Creative Remedies and Planet Blue Youth Club all took part in the project to produce the stunning artwork currently catching the eye of passersby on Winwick Road.

REACH participant Nathan Jones, aged 15, said of the project: "It's been great to work with different groups from the community to make this artwork. Not only did we get a chance to do some art ourselves but we also got to work alongside other community groups – including putting on activity mornings for St Andrew's School. It felt really good to be part of the community and I hope everyone appreciates the effort that's gone into making this artwork."

The artwork was completed and sited with the kind support of Decathlon and will be in its current site until completion of the building works when it will move into the park itself.

# The Tim Parry Leadership Development Programme

This summer I had the opportunity to participate in the Tim Parry Leadership Development Programme (TPLD) hosted by the Foundation. The programme included two residentials – one took place in Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland in May and another one in Warrington and Bradford in September – and brought 15 young people from various cultural, ethnic and religious backgrounds together.

Let me start by saving that the programme was not what I expected it to be. Briefly said, it was both - stimulating and challenging at the same time. Stimulating because within only a few days I met so many new people with stories and backgrounds that are so different from my own; challenging because all these people (including myself of course) brought different expectations and interests to the programme. The programme facilitators, however, anticipated this and made sure everybody was included through a wide range of activities that covered formal as well as informal ways of learning. During the first residential in Northern Ireland our group went on a city tour through Belfast to see the physical reality of segregated communities, played various team-building games to discuss issues of leadership and conflict, listened to former combatants who shared their personal stories of the conflict in Northern Ireland and learned more about Irish culture and traditions on a good night out at a pub.

Out of the many great things to take in, I was personally most intrigued by seeing what life looks like in a post-conflict environment. I have been studying Peace Studies at the University of Bradford for the past two years and I'm quite familiar with the literature around peacebuilding and conflict resolution. However, visiting Belfast and speaking to former combatants and the Irish participants of our group has helped me understand the everyday struggles of life in Northern Ireland. From my personal perspective, it was a unique chance to go beyond mere theory and to explore the challenges of the peace process in a safe and personal environment.

A few months later the second residential took place in England and this time we explored various themes of conflict and leadership within ethnically mixed communities in Britain. On a daytrip to Bradford our group visited the Manningham area where South Asian, Eastern European and white working class communities live next door to each other and listened to community leaders who spoke about the challenges of growing up as a British Muslim in Bradford and the conflict between the Bradford's Muslim population and rightwing extremists such as the BNP and EDL. Reverend Chris Howson gave a very inspiring talk on the practice of liberation theology and social justice in Bradford. Later that day our group enjoyed dinner at Karachi, one of Bradford's most famous



curry houses – judged by the faces of some of our Irish participants, a truly unique experience!

I guess what we all enjoyed most about the second residential was to work again as a group together. Whereas there were a few queries and misunderstandings at the first residential, this time our group developed a real team spirit and everybody made sure that we provided a friendly and harmonious atmosphere for one another. Overall the Tim Parry Leadership Development programme turned out to be a very enriching and rewarding experience. Not only have I learned a lot about Ireland, leadership and conflict resolution, I have also learned a lot about myself and the way I approach new situations and people. What I enjoyed most was the opportunity to come out of my academic bubble and to experience learning in unconventional and participatory ways.

# My Journey by Gemma Benns

I first got involved with the Foundation at the age of 14 when I participated in the Tim Parry Leadership Development Programme. I enjoyed the experience so much I decided I wanted to become more involved and that's where my journey began.

I became a volunteer and got more involved on a day to day basis. I soon realised this was what I wanted to do as a career and grab any opportunities I was offered. The Foundation made it possible for me to be formally educated in Conflict Management and I received a salary too...I couldn't believe my luck!

On a day to day basis I am involved in everything from generating ideas through to the delivery of our education programmes with young people and adults. I have helped to deliver Leadership Development programmes in Leeds to young people who are divided by race and faith, worked with young people in Warrington on the Reach Project, and been able to participate in an International Youth Programme which brought together young people from Palestine, Israel, England, Ireland, the Basque Region and South Africa to explore issues of conflict and how it can be resolved non-violently.

Last April, I was lucky enough to secure an apprenticeship funded by the Rank Foundation....things just keep getting better and better! All RANK funded participants



become RANK Fellows and follow their philosophy of 'paying it forward' something I'm already trying to do by helping young people to make a difference in their communities.

In the future, I would like to continue working with young people and continue to work with those affected by conflict. The Foundation gave me the opportunity to make a difference, to study at college but to do this work at the same time, which has been a perfect way to develop my skills and understanding.

# Motorists in for a bumpy ride

## MOTORISTS in rural areas look to be in for a bumpy ride as eight in 10 councils experience a loss in funding.

Eighty per cent of councils say they have suffered a real term loss in road funding over the last 12 months. And 89 per cent of RAC patrols -

who use the roads more than most people - say they believe current road conditions show the effects of under-

investment in road repairs. However, 80 per cent of councils are confident they are well prepared to deal with another harsh winter.

Research conducted by the RAC among councils and its own patrols has revealed widespread concern about the state of the road network, particularly in rural areas, as cuts to council budgets are increasingly bitting home hitting home.

The survey reveals that a year on from the Comprehensive Spending Review, 80 per cent of local authorities have experienced a real term reduction in funding to their road maintenance budgets - with 55 per cent of councils seeing an outright reduction in funding. A further 25 per cent reported that

funding had stayed at the same level, meaning a loss in real terms due to

inflation in materials and labour costs required for road maintenance

Even with the budgetary constraints, 50 per cent of councils reported a focus on permanent long-term fixes but 20 per cent reported they are prioritising short-term fixes for safety reasons. Looking ahead to this winter, 80 per cent reported that they are well prepared for another winter of extreme weather and 50 per cent mentioned their well stocked salt and grit supplies.

Three quarters of RAC patrols think the condition of rural roads is poor or very poor, with just two per cent saying they are in good condition. In addition, two-thirds of RAC patrols think that suburban roads are in poor condition

Condition. Motorists are equally concerned about roads - 92 per cent of those questioned as part of the RAC's "Report on Motoring" said that they feel the condition of local roads is getting noticeably worse compared with 78 per cent who feel similarly about main roads. about main roads.






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# **Disability tournament** comes to Town

# **£inancially** yours By David Watkinson Changes to the value of which VAT is paid

Many of you will have bought bargains on-line from Tesco, Amazon, other major retailers, made possible by the retailer by posting these goods directly to the customer from a supplier in the Channel Islands. The most common items are CDs and DVDs, but more recently there has been an extension to other goods such as printer consumables and cosmetics. Provided the goods are of relatively low value then no VAT is payable, giving either an immediate saving to the customer or extra profit to the retailer of 20%.

The tax office have decided to change this. They state that this will 'ensure that UK companies, especially small and medium sized enterprises, can compete on a level playing field". As a firm we applaud these sentiments. After all, most of our clients are small, local businesses. However, the contempt with which the tax office treats small businesses generally suggests that this is much more a measure to raise taxes assist small business

assist small business. This change has already started. As from 1st November the value above which VAT must be paid when goods are imported from the Channel Islands was reduced from £18 to £15. From next April the exemption will be removed completely, and VAT will have to be paid on all from the Channel Islands. Yet another area of tax evasion has been identified. The latest "Tax Catch Up Plan" relates to tutors and coaches. Anyone receiving untaxed income of this

Anyone receiving untaxed income of this Anyone receiving untaxed income of this nature and not declaring it have until 6th January 2012 to inform the tax office of your intention to make a disclosure, after which any tax due will need to be calculated and paid by 31st March 2012. In the case of financial hardship to prestite provent it may be possible to negotiate payment terms. After this opportunity has passed then the tax office will use legal powers and other methods to obtain details from various sources of individuals receiving undeclared income.

If you make use of the tax catch up an then penalties in most

circumstances will be capped at 10%, although may be 20% in the case of deliberate underdeclaration.
