NEWS that retail giant Primark is set to open in the town next year will provide a much needed boost to Warrington's town centre economy.

The new store, which is set to open in Golden Square next year, will attract thousands of new shoppers into the town centre, which will hopefully have a knock on benefit for other town centre businesses.

With two two teenage daughters who used to catch a train into Liverpool to visit Primark -l know first hand how popular this affordable fashion retailer is, especially with

young people.

Work will start on opening a new store next year, which will delight thousands of local shoppers who in a recent survey placed Primark at the

top of their Warrington retail wish list. The former Littlewoods store and The former Littlewoods store untailed the existing New Look store will amalgamate to house the new 56,000 sq ft Primark store while New Look will be moving into a brand new concept store, located brand new concept store, located near H&M within the Shopping Centre, opening early 2013.

With proposals to breathe new life

into the Time Square area of the town centre, also scheduled to start next year, things are looking promising for the future prosperity of our town

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Auto Enrolment... Are you prepared? Whether you are a large or small business, Auto Enrolment is not something you should ignore.



Experts stating that employers should act 18 months prior to their eligibility date in order to that ensure everything is in place within the timescales given.

With effect from

1st of October 2012, large scale employers will be required to automatically enrol employees into a qualifying pension

By 2018, the smallest employers will too. Many still have no idea that this is coming and, even when they do, will have no idea how to handle

it.

There are 54 staging dates in total spanning October 2012 to February 2018. The largest employers (those employing 120,000 workers or more) must have a pension scheme in place from the 1st of October 2012. Employee numbers get a progressively smaller as the staging progressively smaller as the staging

dates head towards 2018.

Running alongside are the minimum contribution levels that rise over time. For employers with staging dates to 30th of September 2017, the total minimum contribution is 2% (1% employer funded). From 1st of October 2017 to 30th of September 2018, the total minimum contribution is 5% (2% employer funded) and from the 1st of October funded) and from the 1st of October 2018 onwards, the total minimum contribution will stand at 8% (2% employer-funded).

All 'eligible jobholders' must be automatically enrolled: this means employees aged 22 to state pension age, working in the UK and earning more than £8,105. Workers outside of these criteria may have the right to join the scheme, and the employer must supply opt-in details-but the employer is not obliged to enrol them automátically.

Employers can use any 'qualifying scheme'. This can be a definedcontribution scheme including a minimum contribution or hybrid scheme meeting certain criteria. Since Defined Benefit schemes are a

dying breed, most employers are likely to opt for the former. The pension chosen can be either an occupational or personal pension scheme. Employers can split their workforce-for example using one scheme for higher-end employees and another for lower-earning or transient ones-as long as both schemes are qualifying.

Employers must register with the Pensions Regulator (www.thepensionsregulator.gov.uk) within 4 months of their staging date to show that they have a qualifying scheme in place and re-register every 3 years. They also have to write to their employees detailing how autoenrolment affects them and of their right to one must within one month. right to opt out within one month. Employers must re-enrol eligible employees every 3 years and must not provide any inducements to opt





# Plaque returned to its rightful place

A plaque explaining the River of Life which was created in memory of all the victims affected by the Warrington bombing, was removed from the wall in Bridge Street, but subsequently recovered by the police and returned to its rightful place.

Wendy Parry said: "Both Colin and I were delighted when the Police informed us that the plaque had been recovered. A few weeks later, at the suggestion of the police, we took part in a Restorative Justice initiative which brought those guilty of the offence face to face with the victims of their actions. The meeting enabled the guilty parties to acknowledge the pain caused by their actions and gave them the opportunity to apologise for the hurt and damage they had caused and it presented the victims with the opportunity to accept their apologies. Unfortunately, since Johnathan's parents, Wilf and Marie have both passed away, and we no longer have contact details for Johnathan's family, Colin and I attended on behalf of all the victims affected by that terrible day.

The two people involved in the removal and unlawful taking of the plaque, have no previous criminal convictions and were happy to voluntarily undertake actions agreed at the meeting as

a form of pay back' to the community for what they had done. The Foundation is a Conflict Resolution Charity and for us restorative justice is an ideal way for making amends.

We would like to thank everyone involved



in bringing this incident to a close and to everyone who offered to replace the plaque. The Foundation and Warrington Council received an overwhelming number of calls from individuals and businesses and we would like to take this opportunity to thank them all for their kindness."

# We are a Charity that turns lives around

Over the past 12 years the Foundation's work has evolved to one which operates nationally and internationally. Our programmes help young people and adults affected by conflict to move forward in their lives and do something positive. To date we have supported over 25,000 individuals to do just that.



The Foundation works with victims of terrorism to rebuild their lives, reduce the feeling of isolation and to share experiences with others to promote understanding.



We support ex-soldiers and their families and emergency responders including ambulance and police men and women, who may have been traumatised by what they have witnessed while doing their job.



We work with people affected by faith and race hate crime; educating young people to be tolerant of each other's differences, reducing prejudice and discrimination and building stronger communities.

#### We help people to do something positive following their experiences; for example:

- A serving soldier volunteering with the Foundation to meet radicalised young people, talking to them about the effects of prejudice and violence and what he has seen at war as a result.
- A veteran who was involved in an IRA ambush meeting with families of other veterans; helping them by sharing
  his own experiences of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder to help others to cope with their own family's trauma.
- A survivor of the 7th July 2005 London bombs meeting with members of the Emergency Services to help them to be better prepared to help victims of future critical incidents.

## **Programme update**

The last few months have been an interesting time at the Foundation with new developments in our programmes and progress on many fronts. Our work with victims of terrorism continues to be the focus of our work - providing them with support to rebuild their lives. The Foundation continues in its important work in preventing violence and understanding the factors that turns people towards violent extremism. This has led to work with students and police officers as part of our contribution to help communities and professionals deal with difficult situations.

#### Highlights from recent programmes we have delivered:

#### The Northern Ireland 'Troubles' conference

The Foundation organised a conference in Brighton in collaboration with the University of Brighton and University of Leicester. The Northern Ireland Troubles in Britain - Impacts, Engagements, Legacies and Memories Conference tackled the lack of research into the impact of the Troubles in Britain and brought together academics, journalists and community activists to examine the legacy of the Northern Ireland conflict on people and communities in Britain. The Foundation team and its founder Colin Parry were joined by some of our programme participants who all spoke about their personal experiences and the impact of the conflict from their own perspectives.



#### Training with a difference



The unique work and expertise of the Foundation in supporting victims of conflict and trauma has seen an increase in requests for specialist training from professionals whose work involves handling potential conflict situations and supporting those who are experiencing trauma. Last year in response to this demand, we launched the Resolution Training Company, as a subsidiary of the Foundation, to run alongside the Foundation's core programme work. The company uses the Foundation's extensive experience and input of participants to pass on their knowledge and experience in order to help teach conflict resolution techniques which they can use in their own work environments. Over the past months we have provided training to Association of Greater Manchester Authorities, Warrington Borough Council, Golden Gates Housing Association, British Red Cross, Cheshire Police and Lancashire County Council on themes including: radicalisation and preventing violent extremism; developing strategies to respond to conflict and approaching difficult conversations around prejudices and discrimination; and understanding the medium to long term needs of people affected by critical incidents.







#### Israeli and Palestinian Families Supporting Peace and Reconciliation

The Foundation held 'Sharing Stories for Peace', workshop which looked at how storytelling can help with the legacy of conflict. As part of the programme we were delighted to be able to welcome Seham Abu Awwad and Robi Damelin from the Parent Circle to talk about their inspirational work in Israeli-Palestine. The Parents Circle

is an organisation bringing together both bereaved Palestinians and Israelis to promote reconciliation as an alternative to hatred and revenge. This programme focused on those directly impacted by conflict and terrorism and showed how storytelling can bring personal healing by developing a greater understanding of conflict.


## Sef Townsend - Leader for Peace

Sef Townsend, from London, is a professional traditional storyteller who has lived on all five continents and has been working for many vears with diverse communities in London and internationally to help people to transform their lives. Sef has personal experience of conflict - in 1992 he survived an IRA bombing but lost his hearing in the explosion. Sef continued his work and in 2008 became involved with the Foundation's programmes. Sef has spent much of his life helping others to tell their stories through music and traditional story. In 2009, he participated in the Foundation's 'Storytelling' residential, where he met others affected by bombings and war. Meeting others affected by conflict was a healing experience for him and he realised that he had his own story to tell and could use this to help others.

"I'd not spoken much about the effect the bombing had on me, (apart from the obvious deafness), but I was now given the permission and the space to do so. From then on, I realised I could help others get to that difficult but important moment of leaving something behind and going forward with other things. It was a good feeling."

Following participation in the Storytelling residential, Sef became involved in a dialogue programme, with a partner organisation in Ireland.

"Meeting someone who had actually been involved in planting bombs was an extraordinarily weird feeling, that I'm not able to describe, but after we'd shared our stories each of us was in tears, having been moved by what the other person had said."



Sef became involved with the Foundation's leadership work in 2010 and facilitated a workshop at the Foundation's International Peace Conference in 2011. Sef is a graduate of the Foundation's 2012 Leadership for Peace programme, a programme that saw participants develop their skills and

understanding of conflict, prejudice and discrimination and increased their leadership, facilitation and peacebuilding skills. Following his successful completion of the Leadership for Peace programme, he was invited to facilitate on a 5 day Leadership programme with young people from Priesthorpe High School in Leeds. Drawing upon his experiences, both professional and personal, Sef worked with the group exploring deeply held attitudes and ideas they had developed through prejudice, fear and identity.

"It was great working with young people, who had so much to say, but who hadn't confronted their own prejudices before. Through the exercises and games, they could lead, make a difference, and improve a situation rather than just follow ideas that were nowhere near as good as their own. The realisation of their own potential was a wonderful breakthrough – and they'd had such a good time too!"



#### Legacies: An investment for the next generation

## A deposit, or not a deposit

Over the last few years there has been a significant increase in the private rental market. The slowdown of the economy has caused many would-be home owners to seek refugee in the realm of Private-Landlords waiting for the housing market to stabilise. This has, in turn, seen an increase in the regulation of the Landlord Tenant relationship, none more so than in the area of a deposit.

A deposit is usually paid at the beginning of a tenancy to cover any unpaid rent or damage caused to the property. All Landlords are required to place their tenant's deposits in registered Government schemes. The purpose behind this is to protect the tenant in case the landlord was to become bankrupt or an unjust deduction was being taken for damage to the property. In the event of a dispute the matter would automatically go through the scheme's mediation service without having to be dragged through the court system. The importance of

registering the deposit, and informing the tenant where the deposit is held, can be seen in the sanctions that may be applied where a Landlord has not complied. This could be by not registering the deposit at all or not registering it within the required 30 days period to failing to provide the tenant with the statutory information about where the deposit is held. These sanctions cause the Landlord could find it difficult to take possession of his property as they could not rely on an accelerated possession and could be found liable for up to three times the deposit in damages.

This area of once clear ground for Landlords has been further turned into a battlefield of regulation and litigation with the stance that the once safer option of rent-in-advance now being seen as a deposit also and as such falling under the requirements of registration. Once seen as an easy alternative to the reams of red tape that come with the Tenancy Deposit Schemes and

the potential penalties for non-compliance rent-in-advance has now become a battle ground where each case can differ only slightly and have vastly different consequences.

Where rent is now paid before and rent is due under the tenancy agreement it is now being viewed as a deposit and should be registered as such. Where rent is paid in excess of the amount due under the tenancy agreement for that rent period (usually monthly) the excess should be treated as a deposit and therefore registered.

With significant consequences for both landlord and tenant when a deposit is not correctly registered it is important that you clarify your position before you lose out. 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

The vehicle breaks new ground in terms of weight, costs and energy usage over its lifecycle, and is an evolutionary stage of Audi ultra - the lightweight construction principle from Audi.

An innovative and efficient plug-in hybrid drive based on a purpose-designed

designed.

1.5-litre three-cylinder TFSI and two electric motors redefines the benchmark, with potential fuel economy returns equivalent to 256.8 mpg and CO2 emissions of just 26 grams per km.

The result is a sophisticated vehicle that will appeal to young customers in particular, thanks to a removable roof and the customisable services available under the Audi connect concept.

The Multimaterial Space Frame of the compact coupe comprises three materials - aluminium, carbon fibre-reinforced polymer (CFRP) and glass fibre-reinforced polymer (GFRP). The car has an unladen weight of about 1,390 kg, including the large lithium-ion battery.

The plug-in hybrid drive, which is described as a dual-mode hybrid, is as innovative as it is efficient. It comprises a combustion engine, two electric motors and a single-stage transmission. It sprints from zero to 62mph in 8.6 seconds, and in pure electric mode takes 9.8 seconds. The car's top speed is 113mph. It offers the potential for up to 256.8mpg and emits 26 grams per km of CO2. The lithium-ion battery has an output of 17.4 kWh, sufficient for an operating range of around 53 miles in the electric mode.

The car is classed as a 2+2-seater and is 4.21 metres long, 1.88 metres wide and 1.51 metres high, with a wheelbase of 2.56 metres. Its body design comes across as powerful and striking, and it already provides a foretaste of the design language of a future generation of Audi Q models.



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#### Changes to the PAYE system

We seem to be concentrating on employers at present, but there are many pitfalls awaiting anyone who is brave enough to think about providing a job to someone. These pitfalls will multiply next year when "Real Time Information" (RTI) comes into force. The tax office has said that this is to make tax office has said that this is to make things simpler for employers. This is a contortion of the truth, which is that it will make things easier for the tax office at the expense of employers, who will be faced with a multitude of penalties for making innocent mistakes.

There are a number of practical changes to the PAYE system, but we only have space here to consider one. We will look at other changes in future articles.

Currently, an employer makes a return of tax and national insurance deducted from employees and payable to the tax office. This needs to be made each month by a set date in the following month, and penalties follow if this is not done. In the future, however, a return must be made of payments and deductions, if any, made to employees, and this needs to be made on or before the date of payment, otherwise penalties will again be payable.

This may not seem a big change, but

there are a number of traps laid for the

winwary.

Firstly, the new system applies to all payments made to employees which are subject to PAYE, even if there are no deductions to be made. For instance, there deductions to be initiate. The installate, lineletes is currently no reporting requirement on an employer in respect of a part-time employee being paid at a rate not incurring any tax or national insurance liability, and who has made a proper declaration on a P46. However, once RTI is introduced then these payments must be reported. A small change? Not necessarily. An employer currently operating a monthly payroll may now find themselves having to run a weekly payroll as well just to record the payments made to an office cleaner who is paid weekly.

Secondly, the exact nature of payments made to employees is not always absolutely clear. One example would be absolutely clear. One example would be an advance on salary. For instance, a monthly paid employee may request an advance on salary due to an unexpected expense, and the employer may agree to make that advance. By the end of the month, once the payroll is run and the individual paid the balance of the net salary, the payroll and associated records. salary, the payroll and associated records


accurately reflect the salary paid. However, unless a loan agreement is signed by the employee, then the advance would probably result in the employer contravening the RTI regulations and making themselves liable to a penalty at a level making the rates charged by Wonga.Com look like an early Xmas

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
















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## Culture for the people

## New hub to tackle drink and drug addiction

A RECOVERY hub believed to be the first of its kind in the country for those addicted to drink or drugs has been officially opened in Warrington.

The hub in Museum Street has the unique factor of tackling both drug and alcohol addictions together, and on one site.

## Mortgage help for teachers
