## Unemployment - the biggest worry for young people

UNEMPLOYMENT and a lack of opportunities for work experience are the main issues worrying young people in Warrington, a survey has revealed.

The survey was carried out by IMPACT, Warrington's youth council, and was revealed at the launch of the organisation's manifesto for 2013-15 at the Town

A total of 2,285 young people

voted in the survey - 11.65 per cent of Warrington's youth population In the manifesto, the youth

council set out a number of proposals for improving services for young people in Warrington.

The result of the survey showed

clearly that young people in the borough think better work experience opportunities should be offered and youth unemployment should be tackled better.

Representatives from schools across Warrington attended the launch and had the chance to ask questions of key figures at the borough council, including leader Cllr Terry O'Neill and Cllr Colin Froggatt, lead member for children

and young people's services. Cllr Froggatt said: "It's brilliant to hear so many young people in Warrington are getting involved and having a say on real issues that affect them. They can make a difference and the whole point of the youth council is to ensure their

voices are heard.

"This was an opportunity for young people to let decision makers aware of what issues they would like to see addressed and it was great to see so many ask questions and get involved."

## MP helps boost employment opportunities

WARRINGTON South MP David Mowat is once again organising a "Jobs Fair" in the town, to help people seeking employment opportunities.

He has been running a jobs club since 2009 and now more than 200 people in Warrington have benefitted from the club, with more than two thirds of those attending subsequently finding a job, starting their own business or going back on a training course.

"Unemployment in Warrington is now lower than it was at the time of the last General Election and it remains below the national average. However, we cannot afford to be complacent and we must strain every sinew to create new jobs and to find people to fill them." Said David.

In 2013 David hosted a Jobs Fair to encourage job seekers to consider alternative paths into employment and to give job seekers the opportunity to meet employers in the area.

"At my last jobs fair, over 200 people were offered follow-up conversations and some were even offered jobs on the spot. I've therefore decided to run it again in 2014 to help more people from Warrington get back into work."

WARRINGTON Youth Club is set to provide further support for the young people across the town with the launch of a special "Skills Bank" On Saturday, December 7.

The aim of the venue based at the former Lloyds TSB Bank in Times Square, is to inspire and motivate young people and to develop their skills and support them into further

training or employment.

The Skills Bank will include a state of the art gym; open for young people up to the age of 25 at a really low cost, along with regular fitness classes to develop fitness and motivation.

Warrington Youth Club will also be running a Job Club from the

venue three days a week which will include activities such as CV writing, techniques and young interview people will have access to computers people will have access to computers directly linked to employment and enterprise websites so they can research a number of opportunities.

Alongside the job club will be regular enterprise projects running as

a three week programme for young people to develop their own business plan including marketing, budgets and creative ideas. They will have the opportunity to demonstrate their entrepreneurial skills and show how they can become the next Alan Sugar

with a range of challenges.
The Skills Bank also houses "The Salon" where young people who are

fully qualified hair stylists are able to rent a chair for up to a third of the price of a salon in the town centre to develop their skills and build up their client list. There are currently a further three chairs available to rent for more information please contact info@warringtonyouthclub.co.uk.

Other schemes which will be running from The Skills Bank include National Citizen Service, Power in Partnership and Youth Graffiti Solutions.

The launch day runs from 11am-6pm and will include all of the programmes along with live DJ's and bands, competitions and a job and apprenticeships fair.

### RSPCA cuts rescue service

WARRINGTON'S RSPCA animal rescue centre is no longer accepting animals from members of the public.

accepting animals from members of the public.

In future, the centre in Slutchers Lane, Bank Quay will only accept animals brought to them by RSPCA inspectors as being in need of rehabilitation. The decision has been made by the Warrington, Halton and St Helens branch of the RSPCA in agreement with the national society.

It is understood the reason for the decision is the growing

number of animals - mainly cats and dogs - at the centre.

Main focus of the centre in future will be will be caring for animals brought in by RSPCA inspectors.

Many animals already at the centre will be assessed and

passed to other branches for rehoming.

Branch chairman Cathy Mitchell said the branch trustees believed that animals coming via RSPCA inspectors had to

be given the highest priority as many had suffered abuse and lack of care. She said: "Whilst this means that the centre will no longer

be able to accept animals direct from the public, it is hoped that supporters will fully understand that priority has to be given to assisting those animals most at risk. We hope that donors will continue with their generosity to ensure animals

The operational changes mean that a number of cats and dogs at Warrington are desperate to find new, loving

## Lecturer's book an internet sensation

Warrington Collegiate lecturer Ian Stewart penned his book, Burden of Proof, he had no idea just how popular it would become.

The murder mystery, based in Manchester, became an internet phenomena, and demand grew so much that it is now available in print

on Amazon.
Ian said: "I've always known I could write a book, but as a busy lecturer I had no time to get a publisher so I decided to make it available as a download. Soon, over 1,000 people had read it, and I was being contacted for a print version as well. One of the murders in the book is really chilling and people really seemed to enjoy a really good

murder mystery.

"Most detective stories feature partnerships, based around one main character. In mine I've developed character. In mine I've developed several lead characters, including a very strong female lead. The descriptions of the places are all real, which'I think draws the reader into

which I think draws the reader into the story and there's a particularly chilling death that readers have commented about – it seems to make the book memorable.



## Police drop-in facility at Sikh temple

A NEW police "drop-in" facility has been opened at Guru Nanak Gurdwara, in Warrington – Cheshire's only Sikh temple.

It was officially opened by Cheshire Police and Crime Commissioner, John Dwyer at the invitation of President H. Grewal during celebrations for the Hindu festival of Diwali.

It consists of a special, locked box where people can drop-in their telephone numbers to that relies can contact them.

The initiative was the idea of PCSO Steve Parr who has been visiting the temple for some years as part of his beat patrols and who holds regular

He said: "I wanted to provide community members who might not speak English as their first language or who might wish to interact with the police in confidence, the opportunity to contact me privately.

"A special locked box has been provided for people to drop-in their telephone number so that I can contact them confidentially. I think this initiative will be positive as I work alongside Constable Herminder Hira who

initiative will be positive as I work alongside Constable Herminder Hira who speaks Punjabi and can cross the language barrier and is able to connect more easily with the females in the congregation."

Mr Dwyer said: "I am pleased to open this facility which provides a crucial link between the Sikh Community and the police.

"It is important to me that all people have access to police services and I welcome the initiative undertaken by two local officers. I especially enjoyed the privilege of entering the inner temple and offering flowers as part of the ceremony. There is an amazing atmosphere of peace and community cohesion in the temple and they made me feel very welcome."

He said: "Diwali is an important festival and I always enjoy celebrating it in Warrington with the local Sikh community. It was also great to welcome our Police Commissioner to the event this year."

## Who will you make peace with?

The Foundation's 20th anniversary Peace Lecture was delivered by Martin McGuinness, deputy First Minister of Northern Ireland. The lecture was delivered as part of a global event, Peace One Day, to promote global ceasefire and non-violence and to encourage people everywhere to take brave and courageous action to promote peace and in 2013 posed a question - who will you make peace with?

Colin and Wendy Parry extended the invitation to deliver the lecture in support of the core purpose of the Foundation to promote non violent conflict resolution amongst people at risk of violent extremism, whether as victims or perpetrators, and to encourage the reconciliation of those who have been victims and perpetrators of terrorism.

The Foundation successfully facilitates difficult conversations and specialist meetings between the likes of former British soldiers and former IRA volunteers. Such meetings demonstrate that reconciliation is both possible and beneficial in dealing with the pain of the past and creating peace.

Colin Parry said: "It is because Martin McGuinness has embraced mainstream, constitutional politics in order to pursue his goal of a united Ireland, that I invited him to deliver the lecture.

"I am fully aware of his past life as an active member and leader of the IRA, but he has, since the negotiations leading to the Good Friday Peace Agreement, fully committed himself to peaceful and constitutional methods of building the Northern Ireland peace process.

"Such activities are entirely consistent with the founding principles of the Foundation and with the ethos at the heart of the work we do in memory of my son and Johnathan Ball, because by doing so, we are doing something positive in their names in order to address the personal and community impact of extremism and terrorism."

The lecture gained a huge amount of international attention.

## **Former Warrington** MPs issue joint statement

Mike Hall, the former Warrington South MP, and Doug Hoyle, the former Warrington North MP and now Lord Hoyle, were both in the town centre on March 20, 1993 when the IRA detonated two bombs in Bridge Street, killing 12-year-old Tim Parry and three-year-old Johnathan Ball.

They were attending a meeting at the Parr Hall and saw at first hand the devastation the bomb caused.

In addition to the death of Tim and Johnathan the explosions also injured 54 other people and led to the death of Bronwen Vickers.

Although they accept Mr Parry made a "brave and controversial" decision, they believe he was right to invite the Northern Ireland deputy First Minister to Warrington.

The two ex-MPs, in a joint statement, say: "At the time of the two Warrington bombings we were unaware that Martin McGuinness, on behalf of the IRA, was in secret negotiations with the British Government to call a ceasefire, end the Northern Ireland conflict and start peace

"Before the Bridge Street bombing we did not know Colin and Wendy Parry or Wilf Ball and Marie Comerford. But from that moment we worked closely with both families and to this day we remain good friends and strong supporters of Colin and Wendy.

should Colin have invited McGuinness to give this 20th anniversary peace lecture?

"The five cardinal issues involved here are peace, reconciliation, justice, contrition, and forgiveness but these are not mutually inclusive

Historically wherever armed conflict has existed it has either been resolved by the bloody subjugation of one side of the argument or by a negotiated cease to hostilities followed by peace and reconciliation.

"There are many examples throughout the history of the world but none as powerful as the creation of a democratic South Africa. If Nelson Mandela and the African National Congress (ANC) had refused to talk to President FW de Klerk and the governing National Party we would still have apartheid, racial segregation and violent unrest in South Africa.

'There is no doubt in our minds that McGuinness as head of the IRA leadership at the time of the Warrington bombings shares the responsibility for the murders of Johnathan and Tim and the death of

"Likewise there is no doubt McGuinness as an IRA leader played a paramount part and shares responsibility for bringing to an end the Northern Ireland conflict and the creation of an enduring peace.

"John Major and Tony Blair were right to negotiaté with McGuinness because the prospect of achieving a lasting peace in Northern Ireland would save the future lives of countless British citizens and mean bloody tragedies like the Bridge Street bombing and its needless loss of innocent lives would be a thing of the past.

"Colin was right to invite McGuinness to give the Warrington Peace lecture. It gave McGuinness the opportunity to come to our town and explain his part in the whole issue as a leader of the IRA and his reasons for giving up the bullet and the bomb to become a dedicated peacemaker. The event was an important milestone along the route of peace and reconciliation.

Of the five cardinal issues peace and reconciliation have been achieved. Justice, in the form of capturing the Bridge Street bombers and bringing them to trial, remains to be done. Contrition is a personal issue which McGuinness has yet to offer. Likewise forgiveness is personal. Colin and Wendy have not forgiven those responsible for the untimely death of their son Tim.

Twenty years on we are proud to look back at the tireless work Colin and Wendy have put into peace and reconciliation and their continuing efforts to build a lasting legacy in the names of Tim and

Johnathan.

"Inviting Martin McGuinness Warrington in 2013 cements another pillar of support into the Northern Ireland peace process. We wish Colin and Wendy every success in the years to come and that they continue to be a force for good in the wider world."

## Going from strength to strength — Young Ambo

## Young Victims in New York

In early June, Programme Manager Jo Dover and Foundation student placement Harriet Vickers travelled to New York to take part in Strength to Strength's Young Ambassadors Programme. Strength-to-Strength is a United States based charity which was established to support victims of terrorism around the world with long-term psychological needs.

Like the Foundation, Strength to Strength helps victims of terrorism to share experiences and empowers them to live life to their best potential. The Young Ambassadors Programme brings together young people aged 14-20 who lost a parent or immediate family member in a terrorist attack or were injured themselves.

Harriet's mum, Bronwen Vickers was injured in the Warrington bombing that took place twenty years ago. Harriet was only 13 days old and along with her sister Hannah, aged four at the time, and their dad Paul, escaped serious injury. Just over a year later Bronwen lost her brave battle for life through cancer.

Harriet, who is a second year student at

Lancaster University studying English Literature, worked with the Foundation over the summer and her experience in New York will be used to plan out how she helps develop our ground-breaking work with young victims and survivors of violent conflict.

This year's event took place in New York City and included participants from Ireland, Spain, England, Uganda, Algeria, Argentina, Israel and the United States. The programme included visits to the United Nations and the 9/11 Tribute Centre and 9/11 Memorial as well as the Intrepid Museum and chances to socialise together. The young people also participated in interactive programmes to assist them in building a global peer support group — knowing that they have friends all over the world that understand what they are going through and they can share with them going forward.

Harriet shares her experience of the visit with us:

"Having known about the Foundation, and the work they do in aid of helping people affected by political violence, I Sinte

jumped at the chance to participate in a programme that united young victims and survivors of terrorism from around the world.

I don't consider myself a victim of terrorism, because I was so very young when the Warrington bomb occurred, and I have absolutely no recollection of my mother or the bomb, but I have always had a very strong interest in terrorism and political violence.

I have, of course, been affected by the actions of those responsible for the bombing in Warrington, having lost my Mum at such a young age, and as I became more politically aware of the world we live in and the events that take place in it, I have always been motivated to be involved in work that seeks to prevent political violence from occurring; and I am certainly not of the opinion that you should fight fire with fire.

When I was asked to take part in the programme in New York, targeted at uniting young people that had been affected by terrorism, I jumped at the chance, as it not only gave me the chance to meet other young people that had been affected, but it also allowed me to look into the process behind supporting young people and using one's experiences to effect a positive change or outlook.

We spent some time "sightseeing" and

also had the chance to meet with the Israeli Ambassador to the United Nations, These experience were perhaps more fascinating and engaging for me being the oldest participant in the programme, but I also felt they were important for the whole group, as preventing and combatting terrorism, along with the ways different countries respond to acts of terrorism, were discussed.

There were some particularly challenging and emotional things during the week, for example a trip to the 9/11 tribute centre, and the memorial. Seeing the plunge pools inscribed with the name of every person who died, at the place where the two towers stood 12 years ago, and speaking to some of the victims families was particularly difficult. My biggest question has always been, and always will be, why.

The week taught me a great deal, and I was privileged to meet some amazing people. What I took away from the week was a much greater understanding and appreciation for people who had been affected by terrorism. The week was about uniting a group of young people, to inspire us to use our experience in a positive way, to effect positive change. I learnt a great deal during the week, but perhaps the most striking thing was



that no matter what race, or religious or ideological beliefs we have, we are firstly human, and we need to accept that regardless of religion or politics, that no one should suffer the pain that acts of terrorism cause. That is what the Foundation seeks to do, and the chance I was given to take part in something that seeks to promote this attitude was humbling and inspiring."

Does society make it difficult for a survivor of political violence to stand up for Peace?

Earlier this year The Foundation held a number of events to mark not only 20 years since the tragic events which led to its creation, but also to celebrate the 20 years of working for Peace; and how we can look forward to building a more peaceful future. One of the events was a conference called 'The Cost of Peace' among the speakers was Jason McCure, and a quote from him has stuck in my head ever since.

'Next time a survivor stands up; we should stand up alongside them'

In the same week, were press reports which featured an interview with a senior anti-terrorism police officer. In them, he stated that each year since 7/7, an attack of the same size and scale had been prevented. Initially, I was terrified by this; though it wasn't a surprise to me. Seeing it online provoked many of my fears and brought back emotions from 8 years ago. I never want to see a day like that again.

Sadly since then, we have seen the awful attack at the Boston Marathon, and also the very sad event in Woolwich. Although smaller in scale than London, both of these events resulted in the tragic loss of life; and also witnessed quite literally, a change in the way political violence is reported – the combination of smart phones and real time 24 hour news footage.

The result of this isn't only the availability of video footage which can be used as propaganda to further the cause of the extremists responsible, but also a much more 'speculative' style of reporting by media channels in the immediate aftermath and confusion following these events. This speculation is often unhelpful, and promotes the fear and hatred the people responsible wish to create.

As a survivor of an act of political violence, one of the things I have struggled with the most, is society's expectation of hatred from me. I am a disappointment to the vengeful society we live in. I do not apologise for that.

Reading media reports and indeed live

broadcasts news following Woolwich and the death of Drummer Rigby I couldn't help but be worried, very worried about the impact Islamaphobia is having on society. Fuelling hatred, fuelling racism and political violence; not only from the very tiny minority within the Muslim community holding extreme views, who feel further alienated by such poisonous rhetoric; but it also fuels hatred from other groups. Islamaphobia is fuelling hatred, particularly from far Right Wing groups. This threat, just as volatile as the threat from alienated Muslim communities, is just as real, and just as potentially dangerous, and it's growing, and potentially deadly.

Extremist groups feed off each other. The events in Woolwich fuel the arguments of groups such as the EDL, and in turn the actions of the EDL fuel the arguments of Islamic Extremists; and so the cycle continues. Speculative and inflammatory press reporting of both of these groups furthers both of their arguments; and feeds into the recruitment of isolated individuals who are at risk of joining either extremist group.

The day Osama Bin Laden was killed, the first phone call I received was from a member of the press asking 'if I was happy at the news.' No I was not. To quote Martin Luther King 'I cannot take pleasure in the death of another man'

Frequently, I have been asked 'how do I feel about Muslims now?' I have been asked this question by people of all faiths and people of no faith; I have also been asked by Muslims. From my Muslim friends I've seen them brace themselves ready for a response of hatred, waiting for a hurtful or insulting remark. I've seen the look of relief and surprise when that's not my response. From those who don't follow the Islamic faith, I've been confronted by the expectation of hatred, then confusion, surprise, and even criticism for not feeling vengeful or hateful.

What purpose would it serve if I was? Would I have a healthy life if I was filled with hatred for people who share the same religion as the person who hurt me? Who would benefit if I did live up to the expectation of hatred? Not me. Not you.

I am sure it would help marginalised groups at each end of the spectrum to feel vindicated in their cause. They may even believe it would give their cause a mandate. I am a disappointment; their violence or potential violence is not in my name. Their cause is not in my name.

I am a victim in the eyes of many, a survivor of political violence, and I am standing for peace. I stand against all violence, no matter what the cause, no matter who the perpetrator. I do not support violence from groups you would call terrorists, nor do I support State sponsored violence.

I may not have a degree in peace-building or international relations, but what I have learnt from my experience, is that if one group, or very small part of the group take to violent measures, then other groups opposed to the first group, are more likely to retaliate. Separating people into 'groups and then alienating those groups, causes and fuels conflict – we focus on differences rather than the fact we are all human beings, living in the same place. This further fuels the desire for violence, and before you know it, you have a conflict which will take generations to resolve.



## Kelly represents the Foundation at The Radicalisation Awareness Network

The Foundation's Programme Manager, Kelly Simcock chairs the European Union's Radicalisation Awareness Network working group on preventing violent extremism.

The network is a leading international body of practitioners, policy makers and researchers seeking to share approaches, practices to influence policy and Government across the European Union.

Kelly leads the Foundation's work in violent conflict prevention and resolution, community cohesion and in challenging violent extremism. She has been working with individuals, groups and communities nationally and internationally for over a decade. Her work includes projects with communities divided by sectarianism and prejudice in Northern Ireland, dialogue and conflict resolution with Palestinians and Israelis; and work with a number of inner city schools in Britain with young people divided by faith and race.

The Foundation represents the United Kingdom on a number of European and International organisations and co-chairs this EU network group in association with the Political Capitol Institute in Hungary.



Kelly said: "The next meeting in Berlin will explore the challenges we face to 'win the hearts and minds' of those individuals who are being targeted to support and follow far right and Islam inspired extreme groups. We will be bringing together leading figures from across Europe asking what is leading to the sort of incidents we recently witnessed in Swindon and who is doing the best work across member states to help us all develop the tools and

approaches to tackling this serious issue.

"I feel privileged to chair this European group and help the Foundation to continue to develop our ground breaking and unique approach to the prevention and resolution of violent conflict. The Foundation has offered its expertise to the UK Government Task Force and is continuing to develop and deliver programmes that explore, challenge and change the underlying causes of violent conflict relating to prejudice, attitudes and behaviours".

Fighting terrorism and violent extremism is not only a question of security. Prevention begins with stopping people from getting involved in violent extremist or terrorist activities in the first place, or to convince them to turn away from such ideas and methods. In order to help the first-line local practitioners and to facilitate the exchange of experiences and best practices between them, the European Commission set up the Euwide Radicalisation Awareness Network (RAN). RAN comes under the "PREVENT" strand of the EU Counter-Terrorism strategy and is guided by the EU Strategy for Combating Radicalisation and Recruitment to Terrorism.

### New children's book

Pupils from Barrowhall Lane Primary School have been learning about the Warrington bombing and Irish history thanks to a new children's book.

The book aimed at primary school aged children was written by author Richard Holland using simplified language to explain the background to the incident, the book also explains what has happened since to demonstrate how good can come from evil.

Deputy Head teacher Jane Dilorenzo at Barrow Hall Primary School, which is where Tim Parry and his brother and sister were pupils, said "She hopes the book will be included on the school's curriculum in the future. A lot of children know it happened but don't understand the background in terms of terrorism and conflict and it deals with it in a sensitive way that isn't threatening or frightening."

Wendy added: "There is a strong message about the positives which came out of the bombing. We have to thank the Golden Square team as we wouldn't have been able to do it without them and we hope more schools will get in contact with us and use the book in their lessons. I don't understand why the Government doesn't put peace study on the curriculum. After watching a number of tragic events during this year, children must have so many questions but who can they ask who is informed enough to answer them?"



lan Cox, general manager, said Golden Square bosses were keen to help create a lasting legacy with the book in Warrington.

### WHAT year five pupils thought of the book:

Jack Reeves, aged 10, said: "I thought it was so good I read it twice. Leo Kilpatrick, aged 10, said: "It was really interesting the way they described it. Before I read the book I only knew that Tim and Johnathan had been injured."

Eve Ramshaw, aged 10, said: "It didn't just tell me about what happened in Warrington but also about other (acts of) terrorism. It was really interesting."

Olivia Broughton Milby, aged nine, said:

"It told me about the Warrington bombing and how upset people were and how many people were injured. "It made me a bit teary."

## Maori head arrives back home

THE Toi Moko – or Maori mummified head – kept in Warrington Museum and Art Gallery for 170 years, has arrived back in New Zealand following a repatriation ceremony last month. One of eight Maori heads in England, Ireland and Guernsey, it

is now at Te Papa Tongarewa, the national museum of New Zealand.

Representatives from Warrington Representatives from Warrington
Borough Council, who owned the
head, and Culture Warrington,
who run Warrington Museum
& Art Gallery, were joined by
delegates from Te Papa at a
traditional repatriation ceremonal
traditional repatriation ceremonal at Warrington Town Hall before the delegates travelled to the other side

delegates travelled to the other side of the world with the head which was packaged in a special crate. The signing of an official document by Cllr Terry O'Neill and delegates from Te Papa marked the handover of the Toi moke from Warrington Barough Council to the Warrington Borough Council to the New Zealand authorities.

Once back in New Zealand, the Toi mokos were greeted with an outpouring of grief from Maori residents and were welcomed with a traditional Maori ceremony at Te

Maureen Banner, chairman of Culture Warrington said: "We have been prepared to repatriate the Toi Moko, which was held in Warrington Museum, for a long time and we recognise that the time and we recognise that the right thing to do is to return the Toi Moko to its home. We respect the

Maori culture and were delighted to be asked to be involved in the

repatriation ceremony".

Cllr Kate Hannon, Exec

Community and Culture Executive Leisure, Warrington Borough Council said: "It was a pleasure to be asked to be involved in the asked to be involved in the repatriation ceremony and it has been a privilege to work closely with Te Papa. We have a good understanding of different cultures and know it was appropriate to repatriate Toi moko. This special item is now back where it belongs in its Maori homeland." in its Maori homeland".

Herewini, Herekiekie repatriation manager at Te Papa Museum said: "It has been a privilege to work with the Warrington Borough Council and Warrington Museum to achieve the return of the Warrington Toi moko to his homeland. This generosity of spirit by the Warrington Borough Council and Culture Warrington reminds New Zealanders of our long standing relationship between our two peoples."

## The perils of a criminal record

People who are arrested and appear before the criminal courts often ask how their employment prospects might be affected. This year the government has introduced new rules governing this area of the law. A new body, the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) replaces the Criminal Records Bureau and the Independent Safeguarding Authority who were previously responsible for administering criminal record information.

For most occupations, convictions and cautions need not be declared once they become spent, as defined by the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974. The rehabilitations periods are related to the type of sentence or disposal and have been relaxed by new legislation which is about to come into force. However different rules apply to 'excepted positions' which entitle prospective employers

to apply to the DBS for a certificate detailing an applicant's criminal record information. There are 2 types of DBS check: a standard check for professional careers, occupations that require a licence and those who have regular contact with children or vulnerable adults; and an enhanced check for positions involving sole care, training or supervision of children or vulnerable adults.

In a standard check and most enhanced checks the information will be filtered so that the certificate will not contain the following: for those aged 18 or over at the time of the offence, if it did not result in a custodial sentence and is not on a list of serious offences relevant to safeguarding, it will not be included if 11 years have passed since the date of conviction (there must be only one offence) or 6 years since the date of a caution; for those aged under 18 the

same rules apply, except the relevant time periods are 5.5 years for convictions and 2 years for cautions, reprimands or warnings.

An enhanced check can also reveal non conviction, non caution and filtered information if the police believe it to be relevant to the position applied for. This might include police intelligence or information related to investigations which resulted in no further action. An individual can make a Subject Access Request to the relevant police force to check on information held which might be disclosable. A decision to disclose such information can be challenged by making representations to the police initially or by requesting a review by the Independent Monitor.

The new, eight lane, 400 metre, blue athletics track has state of the

art sports pitch drainage, specialist materials and has been installed to UK Athletics national quality standard.

There is a new open age rugby league/football pitch in the centre of the track while field events such as javelin and pole vault have been relocated to the outside of the track

The opening of the track came just two months ahead of Warrington Athletics Club celebrating its 130th anniversary.

Club chairman Joanie Smythe said: "I am sure that I can speak on behalf of all the athletes, coaches, parents and committee to express a huge 'Thank You' to Warrington Borough Council, specifically the managers and groundsmen, for all their valued support that they provide to the club which without we would struggle to provide the outstanding open meeting, training sessions etc

"In addition, the club have seen great success with its athletes gaining international honours at both junior and senior level over the last 40 years, but the club is most proud of its achievement and tradition of developing local young athletes to compete to the best of aminetes to compete to the best of their abilities, to develop them as young adults and to establish friendships that last into our senior

Major policies in next year's budget The Chancellor has announced that the Autumn Statement, which gives notice of the major policies to be announced in next year's budget, will take place on 5 December. However, we already know of two changes

that are coming to effect over the next couple of years. Firstly, the new Employment Allowance, which is worth up to £2,000 to all employers has been confirmed by the Government, having been first announced in the 2013 Budget.

The Employment Allowance will reduce a business's or charity's national insurance contributions (NICs)

bill by £2,000 over the course of the year's PAYE payments. Employers will need to confirm their eligibility through their regular payroll process. The Prime Minister said: 'Small business and entrepreneurs are the lifeblood of our economy and this Government is firmly on their side', and according to Government estimates. according to Government estimates, more than 90% of the benefit of the allowance will go to small businesses with fewer than 50 employees. John Allan, National Chairman of

the Federation of Small Businesses

commented that: 'Our members have said they'll spend the savings on their business, either through investing in the business, increasing wages or taking on staff.'

Secondly, more than four million married counter and si

married couples and civil partners

married couples and civil partners will be entitled to a new transferable tax allowance from April 2015, the Government has confirmed.

Under the scheme, eligible spouses and civil partners will be able to transfer £1,000 of their personal income tax allowance to their partner, where one is a basic rath their partner, where one is a basic rate taxpayer and the other earns less than the income

the other earns less than the income tax personal allowance, resulting in a potential saving of up to £200 a year.

Couples will be eligible to claim the new allowance from the year of marriage, which brings back memories of Spring marriage bulge when people married just before the end of the tax year to get the full year's "Married Man's Allowance"!. The allowance will not be given automatically, and claims for the allowance will need be made online.

The confirmation of a married couples' tax allowance is one of a series of recent Government measures.


