# Editor's Comment

IT is inevitable that a project as huge as HS2 will split communities and in Warrington it has certainly done that. For every person supporting the proposed new high speed rail link with London, you can easily find another opposing it vehemently.

Some divide on predictably political lines and it's probably best to ignore them. The nature of party politics means that when one side comes up with an idea, the other feels duty bound to rubbish it.

Others may be inspired by the "not in my back yard" syndrome and, understandable as this may be, they are also best kept in perspective.

After all, you can hardly expect someone whose house is to be demolished or whose view spoiled, to be overly enthusiastic about a new

railway. Warrington Borough Council has perhaps wisely, so far been a little a little cagey on the issue. Council leader Terry O'Neill said:

"Officers in our transport and policy teams will be studying these plans closely over the coming weeks and we will be engaging with stakeholders such as parish councils, agencies residents partner

businesses and neighbouring authorities to formulate and submit our official representation to the government.

HS2 does illustrate one thing, however, and that is our continuing obsession with speed. Trains travelling at 225mph are held up as a reason for pressing ahead with the scheme, even though they will lop only about



half-an-hour off journey times betweer Warrington and the capital.

half-an-hour so important? s Particularly in an age when we have been told that the internet and video conferencing make much business travel unnecessary?

Our scepticism about HS2 is not based on whether it will benefit this town or that, or despoil this beautiful landscape or that, but rather on whether it is needed at all.

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






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# Feeling great!

# Town is beating the fly-tippers

A SURVEY has revealed Warrington has one of the lowest rates of illegal fly tipping in the UK. The 2011-12 Environment Agency survey looked at the number of incidents of fly tipping in each area and confirmed that Warrington has the second lowest rate in the North West - and the lowest of any comparable town. Cllr David Keane, the borough council's executive member for environment and public protection, said: "Fly tipping can be a real blight on our communities and I am delighted that the numbers of incidents in Warrington have continued to fall year on year. We take firm action against those who fly tip, including roadside checks, compliance visits to local businesses and by prosecuting those who flout the law. who flout the law.

who tlout the law. "We also provide support to those people who want to recycle or dispose of any residual waste correctly. We are currently considering the responses to our recent consultation on fortnightly bin collections and we will ensure that further actions to tackle fly tipping and to support our local communities are actively considered as part of this process". # A day in the life... Alison White, Matron, St Rocco's Hospice

Alison White (Ali) joined St. Rocco's in May 2012 with a background in specialist community health and hospice care. She is passionate about delivering the best possible care to patients and families and talks about a typical day at St. Rocco's...

"My day starts about 8am when I arrive. My first mission is always to see how things have been during the night for the patients, families and staff on the IPU (In Patient Unit) and the Day Unit. Sometimes there are family members who want to see me or meet with other members of staff to discuss their loved ones' care.

We always encourage feedback from the families we work with to ensure we are delivering the best care we can. Just the other day, a family member asked to see me. He had completed one of our feedback forms but said to me..."there is not a box big enough for me to write what I want to write about the way your wonderful staff have cared for my mum. From the cleaners who came to see my Mum every day to the volunteers who brought cups of tea, the nurses, the doctors -the whole staff- we cannot thank you enough!. There are times for laughter and times for sadness, even in a hospice"

Part of Ali's role is involvement in the strategic direction of St Rocco's and its place in the wider healthcare community. Ali says "Often my day involves internal meetings with other members of the hospice Senior Management Team - meetings which are held regularly to ensure the organisation as a whole is running smoothly and that we are on track with our strategic plans. I also work very closely with external bodies such as the Care Quality Commission (CQC) who regulate care organisations, to ensure the best standards of quality and care for our patients. I sit on the Integrated Cancer Network in Warrington, which comprises of representatives from health organisations across Warrington who meet to ensure quality health care for the whole of Warrington. Similarly, I meet with other members of the Cancer Action Team whose job it is to deliver the cancer strategy for the whole of Warrington including screening and care. It's really important for St. Rocco's to be involved in these groups to see what part we can play as a hospice".

Ali goes on to say "These meetings are really important but I never lose sight of what I am here to do - to support our staff in delivering quality care to the patients and families we work with. For me, the real privilege is to be working in an organisation where we are invited to walk alongside people at the most difficult time in their lives".



"I feel very blessed to do what I do, to do the job I have wanted to do and trained to do since I was eighteen years old. I feel proud and honoured to wear my uniform and to call myself a nurse. I look forward to the future and building on the achievements of this wonderful organisation we call St. Rocco's Hospice"

# Little things make a big difference

Last year, St. Rocco's purchased a portable ultrasound machine, after months of fundraising and kind donations. The ultrasound machine was critical to patient services as Dr Esraa Sulaivany, Senior Medical Officer at St Rocco's, explains:

"Ultrasound is a safe, rapid imaging technique which is widely used in palliative medicine to assess the presence or absence of fluid in certain areas of the body that may then need medical intervention for the comfort of the patient. Before we had the portable ultrasound machine, patients had to be referred from the hospice to a hospital out-patient department, often waiting several days before being seen. Patients are then sent home or back to the Hospice to wait; sometimes for up to a week for the results!

"This had a very detrimental effect on patients, adding to their fatigue and stress.

"I can't tell you what a difference the purchase of this machine has made to the quality of life of our patients! They can now come to the hospice for intervention, reducing waiting time, offering immediate symptom relief and reduced stress on the family"

"Perhaps the best way of understanding the benefits of the machine are from the perspective of a patient who has used it.

St Rocco's patient Carol Reilly developed fluid in her abdomen (ascites) and had to live with it for months before she found comfort at the Hospice".

As Carol said... "The ascites affected my quality of life, my confidence, everything. I felt very sad and



worried. One morning, I had a phone call from one of the MacMillan nurses to tell me that she had spoken to St. Rocco's. She said the hospice had an ultrasound

machine and that their senior doctor was specially trained to perform drainage procedure. I cried and cried, I would not have been happier if I was told that I had won the Euro Millions lottery. I felt like I gained hope for the future, I was excited and told all my family and friends about this. On the same day, I met Dr Sulaivany, who performed the Ultrasound scan and agreed to drain the fluid. Within hours it was all done and I was able to go back home. I felt very special and privileged.

So thank you all for giving me back my life...."

# Second phase of flood defence work

WORK on the second phase of Warrington's new flood defence scheme will get under way this summer, following completion of the first phase currently reaching an advanced stage at Latchford. The second phase involves a series of flood walls and embankments at

Howley. The third and final phase of the scheme will be constructed in Woolston, Padgate, Kingsway North, Cinnamon Brow and Latchford East and is scheduled for construction in summer next year, with completion in spring 2015.

The finished flood defences will reduce the risk of flooding to more than 2,000 homes and businesses in Warrington from the River Mersey and its tributaries.

The £23 million scheme has been made possible thanks to a partnership between the Environment Agency and Warrington Borough Council, who are jointly funding the new flood defences.

Flood Risk Manager for the Environment Agency, Mark Garratt, said: "The Environment Agency continually monitors flood risk and identified that thousands of homes and businesses are at risk of flooding from the River Mersey in Warrington.

"We prioritise our funding so that we protect as many people and properties as possible, but even with the support of government funding, this scheme would not have gone ahead without the support of Warrington Borough Council and the local community."

# Policeman's marathon effort

# WARRINGTON Policeman Andy Blizard, 29, is running the London Marathon in memory of his wife's 18 month old son who died tragically of meningitis.

He will be cheered on by his wife Kelly-Ann, 33, whose son Daniel Cain died of the disease in 1996.

Despite never having run more than three miles before, Andy has vowed to complete the run and raise \$1,500for Meningitis UK.

To get in training he has "ditched the chips and burgers" in favour of a more healthy diet. Kelly-Ann, who is also a police officer, is supporting him

He runs four times a week to train for the race on April 21, and plans to run the Wilmslow Marathon on



March 24

Andy said: "Based on my running times at the moment I should finish the marathon in ground four hours 30 minutes, but I'd like to get that down to under three hours.

"My wife is over the moon I'm raising money to help put a stop to meningitis. I have always said I wanted to do it, but never got round to it before. She told me to just get on with it. There's no doubt I'm going to get to the finish line – even if it's on all fours

Kelly-Ann was only 17 when Daniel became ill. He started having convulsions and was rushed to hospital

By 9am the following morning, his condition had deteriorated and he was transferred to Pendlebury Hospital. But the disease had taken hold and Daniel died in the ambulance before reaching the hospital. Andy said: "This is my challenge,

it's personal to me as losing a child to meningitis is something my wife went through. I can see the effect meningitis has had on her and continues to have to this day.

'Meningitis is a horrible disease and happens so quickly. Daniel died within a day and a half of becoming



# The dangers of penalty points

Endorsement of penalty points is obligatory for many of the more common driving offences. Most drivers will be aware that if they accumulate 12 or more penalty points in a 3 year period they will be liable to disqualification from driving for a minimum period of 6 months, or longer where there has been a previous ban.

A court can decide not to impose penalty points for an offence which carries obligatory endorsement in very limited circumstances amounting to 'special reasons'. Where those circumstances do not apply a defendant should consider whether it is advisable to argue in court that exceptional hardship would result from disgualification.

The facts of the offence and ordinary hardship arising from disqualification are not relevant. This means that it is often necessary to demonstrate that the

ban would affect people other than the defendant, for instance where a relative who is elderly or infirm relies on the defendant to provide transport. Similarly if a ban would result in loss of employment and this would damage a business or the livelihood of others then these would be relevant considerations. The court will consider the effect of a ban on the defendant alone if the result would be particularly damaging, such as default on a mortgage or bankruptcy. The court will look very carefully at whether the defendant or others affected would have access to alternative means of transport. If the court is persuaded that exceptional hardship would result it can exercise its discretion to either disqualify for less than the mandatory minimum period or not to disqualify at all. However the penalty points are not wiped clean from the licence so drivers

have to exercise particular caution after а successful exceptional hardship argument because they will not be permitted to make another one for 3 years.

Drivers who have only recently passed their test need to be aware that if they accumulate 6 or more points in the 2 year probationary period following their test their licence will be revoked. This is not the same as disqualification but means that the driver will revert to provisional licence holder status and will have to pass a test again before regaining their full licence.

# **Real Time Information reporting approaching**

date for Real Time (RTI) reporting is fast. If you have The starting Information ~ approaching fast. If you have employees then you need to ensure that you are ready to implement it from 6th April. There is plenty of guidance on HMRC's website, but there are a number of basic points that you should be aware of if you wish to avoid penalties.

If you do not currently need to operate PAYE then the introduction of RTI does not alter this. Generally, this will apply if no employee either earns above the National Insurance "Lower Earnings Limit" or has another employment. However, if you currently operate PAYE then RTI will apply to all employees however little they earn. You may, for instance, have a number of full-time employees and additional parttime employees earning below the Lower Earnings Limit. Currently, PAYE reporting only applies to those employees where tax and/or national insurance is deducted. However, from April you will need to report payments made to all employees, including the part-time people. There are a number of implications of

the above:

If you operate PAYE for any employées you must ensure that you have the information required by RTI for all employees including those not presently on the payroll, and that it is fully up-to-date. Whilst this information is basic, such as name, address, national insurance number, gender, etc. If any of this information is missing, you will not be able to submit the necessary reports in time, resulting in possible penalties.

2. It is possible that, even if all of your employees generally earn below the Lower Éarnings Limit, an employee may temporarily increase their earnings sufficiently to become subject to PAYE; for instance if they cover for a colleague who is on holiday or on sick leave. This will require you to operate PAYE and, therefore, will bring all of your employees into the RTI reporting rearing regime.

# £34 million loan to head off street lighting crisis

WARRINGTON needs to borrow £34 million over a period of three years to head off a crisis facing street lighting across the borough.

The "invest to save" project will replace 22.000 existing lanterns with modern, low energy lamps and also replace deteriorating lighting columns.

It will also avert the very real possibility of the borough council having to switch off half its 27,697 street lamps.

Soar

Current spending on street lighting energy is more than £1.4 million representing 17 per cent of the borough council's energy costs - and within five years it is expected to soar to £2.4 million.

In addition, 61 per cent of lighting columns are 25 years old or older and 36 per cent are older than 40 years - with the average life of column put at 25-30 years.

This means about 17,000 columns are in need of replacement, with 10,000 at high risk of failure.

Basic cost of replacing a lighting column is £950 which means the cost of replacing all 17,000 aging columns is £16 million. Replacing 10,000 "high risk" columns will cost £9 million.

Current budget provision would allow an average of 500 columns a year to be replaced

#### Carbon emission

Street lighting also accounts for 17 per cent of the council's carbon emissions.

Interestingly, the council has no statutory duty to provide street lighting, the original purpose of which was to prevent crime. It was unrelated to highway safety - however it is recognised that it does contribute to road and community safety.



# Stadium plans welcomed

WARRINGTON Town Football Club's ambitious plans for a 5,000 to 6,000 seater stadium at Omega, the £ 1 bn, 233 ha (575-acres) mixed-use development site at Junction 8 of the M62, have been welcomed by the site's delivery partners.



Mr Sutherland added: "As OWL has said throughout, the main focus for this major site is the Growth Agenda and the securing of jobs for the people of the North West, whether via permanent or construction-led opportunities. The partnership has been working hard to achieve this and we have seen a quantum leap in demand from occupiers over the last few months meaning hundreds of jobs can be delivered in the next couple of years." In December 2012, Omega Warrington Ltd announced the first occupier for Omega North and Brakes, the grocery & fresh food suppliers, is now on site and due for completion by the end of the summer 2013. This first occupier will bring hundreds of new jobs to Warrington and a series of further investments, by occupiers looking to expand, are about to be announced. These are likely to generate in excess of 2,200 further long term jobs in the next couple of years plus around 1,000 construction jobs.

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## Now we wait Arpley tip appeal

COUNCIL chiefs at Warrington are now waiting for the almost inevitable appeal against the planners' decision to refuse to allow a 12-year extension to the operational life of the giant Arpley landfill site.

As things stand, the tip must cease operating in October. But site operators Waste Recycling Group are likely to appeal before then - particularly as they allege the borough council has failed to follow correct procedures in the run-up

to the application. More than 100 local people attended a special meeting of the borough council's development management committee at the Parr Hall and heard councillors unanimously decide to refuse consent. Cllr Bob Barr, a member of the committee, expressed disbelief at what he described as the

applicants' apparent naivety. He said: "They cannot have failed to realise that the people of Warrington would not tolerate any extension to the operation of the tip. When planning permission was originally granted for 25 years expiring in 2013, it meant precisely that - no extension. Protests about the operation of the tip, the noise, the pollution, the traffic and the breaches of operating conditions must have been heard by the applicants who should have known that there were overwhelming planning reasons to refuse the application.

"Yet they came to the meeting putting up a last minute legal challenge to some minor aspects of the handling of the application, rather than explaining how they would satisfy residents. That was because they knew they couldn't persuade the people of Warrington to tolerate this noxious site anymore.

The proposals united political parties with Labour, Liberal Democrat and Conservatives opposing the application.

## Clay pigeon plan thrown out

A CONTROVERSIAL plan to establish a

A CONTROVERSTAL plan to establish a clay pigeon shooting club on Green Belt land at Rixton, Warrington has been thrown out by planning chiefs. Members of the borough council's development management committee voted unanimously to refuse permission for the change of use of land at Prospect Farm, Prospect Lane, Rixton. A total of 358 individual objections were total of 358 individual objections were received, plus two petitions signed by a total of 269 people. There were also objections from Birchwood Town Council, Rixton-with-Glazebrook Parish Council, the Campaign for the Protection of Rural England, Warrington Nature Conservation Forum, the borough council's natural environment officer, Risley Moss Action Group and Woolston Eyes Conservation Group.

The plan involved using farm land for a clay pigeon shooting club, with a clubhouse and associated parking spaces. The committee was told that clay pigeon shooting was allowed on clay pigeon shooting was allowed on 28 days in a year without planning consent. But if the application was approved it would take place two or three times a week throughout the year. The applicants - the Prospect Target Club - claimed the development would provide acceptial and soore training for

provide essential and secure training for amateur and professional shooters.

Ten new jobs would be created and five existing jobs retained and the facility would attract £400,000 a year in consumer expenditure at local hotels, food, retail and leisure outlets.

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
