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Editor's Comment

ONE cannot argue with the aims of the borough council's new Corporate Plan. It will indeed be great if, by 2030, Warrington is recognised as one of the best places to live and work in the UK, where everyone enjoys an outstanding quality of life.

But what confidence can we have this will actually be the case? Presumably other towns across the

country, some of which already have a head start on us, have similar aims, so it will take more than fine words to make Warrington 'one of the best'.

Scepticism

Warrington is indeed a place to be Varrington is indeed a place to be proud of, with a strong successful economy. It also has excellent schools. But to say they are among the best performing in the country when another report, produced at the same time as the draft Corporate Plan, speaks of four secondary schools having 'very low' attainment levels invites scenticism levels, invites scepticism.

Similarly, to talk of crime being "relatively low" is not a description too many people will recognise.

No-go area

True, the council and the police have taken steps to make the town centre a safer place, but for most people over the age of 50, and many much younger, it is still a no-go area at night and is likely to remain so for a long time. Indeed, in the absence of national legislation to curb the activities of the more irresponsible sections of the community, it is

doubtful if it can ever change.

What chance does it stand when there are clubs boldly proclaiming opening hours of 'Midnight to 6am'?

So, yes, we can applaud the aims of a Corporate Plan which takes "One Warrington: One Future" as its starting point. We can take pride in the high esteem in which our four star council is apparently held by the Audit Commission. We can welcome the pledges to narrow the gap between the affluent parts of the borough and the disadvantaged communities.

We can even hope for what seems

an impossible dream in Warrington -an end to traffic congestion.

But we would have more
confidence in a document that contained a touch more realism and rather less hyperbole.

Why is it then that so many people seem to be awakening from a haze that has blinded them to the fact that they and only they are responsible for their own lives and







The issues of redundancy

IN these difficult financial times it is important to know your employment rights. A common experience for employers and employees is the issue of redundancy.

In broad terms an employee is redundant if he becomes surplus to his employer's requirements. Redundancy is one of the fair reasons for dismissal, however an employer may incur liability for an unfair dismissal if there is no genuine redundancy situation or the dismissal is automatically unfair. For example if the reason for dismissal was in fact the employee's pregnancy or indeed if he fails to act fairly in all

the circumstances.

The requirement to act fairly obliges the employer to implement fair selection procedure and to consult and consider alternatives to dismissal. In addition to individual consultation to ensure a fair dismissal process in cases of collective redundancies an employer is required to consult with the Trade Union or employee representatives and to notify the Department for Business Linep...
and Regulatory Reform. If an employee has been employed continuously for at least 2 years then he would be entitled to a statutory.


This is redundancy payment. This is calculated by reference to age and length of service based on a notional week's pay which is capped currently at £350.00/week. Certain employees under notice of dismissal for redundancy have statutory rights for reasonable time off to look for alternative employment.

believe that the reason for the dismissal is not a genuine redundancy situation or alternatively that the employer has failed to carry out the proper consultation, selection procedure or has acted unfairly then you may have not only an entitlement to redundancy payment but also a right to claim for unfair dismissal against the employer.

În order to maké such a claim you must make a claim to the Employment Tribunal within 3 months of the effective date of termination. If you pass this date then unfortunately you will not be entitled to make any such

An alternative to taking the case to the Employment Tribunal where an agreement has been reached between employer and employee is a compromise agreement where the terms of any settlement are set out in detail. The effect of a Compromise agreement is to prevent the employee from making any claim to the Employment Tribunal in consideration to a payment which should be over and above that to which the employee is ordinarily entitled. employer is obliged to pay for the employee to have legal advice in relation to this agreement.

If you are in any doubt as to the way in which the redundancy situation is being handled or your



rights then you should seek legal advice as you may be entitled to compensation from an Employment Tribunal in relation to the redundancy

Message from our Chief Executive

In reflecting on our progress during 2008, we see the Foundation continuing to expand delivery of our programmes across the country. A successful application to the Big Lottery meant that we were able to expand our work with victims and survivors to be able to offer opportunities to people living in England who have been affected by political violence from other parts of the world. As a result of this work the Foundation has been asked to join the DCMS Expert Working Group to draft Non Statutory

Strategic Humanitarian Assistance Guidance. We also recently contributed to European policy guidelines for The European Network for Traumatic Stress (TENTS), in the area of psychosocial response following major incidents.

Our Youth and Community programmes also expanded and we are now delivering programmes to young people aged 5-25 years in Cheshire, Yorkshire and Wiltshire. In remembrance of the Warrington Bombing . . .

Joe Tierney creates a Facebook page

March 20th marked the 16th anniversary of the IRA bombing of Warrington in which both Tim and Johnathan lost their lives and 56 other people were injured.

This year, the call for remembrance came from a local young man who, two weeks before the anniversary, set up a Facebook page to remember the event, and within a few days over 4,500 people had joined in the remembrance, with many posting their memories of the day.

Joe Tierney, from Sankey Bridges in Warrington, set up the page after searching for something on the bombing on Facebook. Joe says: "I was surprised when I found there was nothing about the bombing on Facebook and felt that there should be. I have been amazed by the response and the number of people who have joined the page. I contacted the Foundation to see if they could help me raise awareness of an event on Saturday, 21st March, as this will be the day before Mothering Sunday – the same day the bomb went off.

"Many of the people who posted called for an event which the community could get involved with at a time to suit them. Therefore although the

actual anniversary is on the Friday, we agreed with the Council that people could lay daffodils at the site of the plaque on Bridge Street throughout Saturday. We ask everyone to remember all those who were affected on that day."

Over the last decade Liverpool's John Moores University has invited some of the country's leading personalities to speak at its most prestigious showcase event, 'The Roscoe Lecture'.



Invited by the Lecture's organising host, Lord [David] Alton, Colin delivered his lecture - 'Tyranny & Terrorism: How it Will be Defeated in Northern Ireland' on March 31.

The central theme of Colin's lecture was that the return of Republican violence through the activities of the Real IRA and the Continuity IRA was not only unwelcome after so much political progress had been made in the province, but also that the violence was entirely futile because it would not turn the clock back to the dark days of the 60's, 70's, 80's and 90's when daily atrocities occurred.

Roscoe helped transform 19th century society by campaigning against the evils of slavery. More than 200 years after his death, as democratic life in the UK faces radical challenges, it's more vital than ever to give a platform to a plurality of voices and opinions.

Through the Roscoe Lectures, LJMU is able to give people from different walks of life the opportunity to exchange ideas, forge connections and hopefully gain greater understanding in a time of increasing diversity and change.

"In a way it helped define me as a person and the way I view others and myself"

Swindon programme

Between October and December of 2008, the Foundation delivered four Leadership Development residential programmes to a total of 91 young people from Swindon. Students from The Ridgeway School, Churchfields School, Swindon College and New College participated in the five day long programme focusing on how conflict between groups and individuals can be identified, expressed and more usefully managed.

On average twenty four young people attended each programme. The groups comprised of young people from the schools accompanied by four college students who acted as peer mentors during the process. The idea of having Peer Mentors from the colleges proved to be very useful for all concerned. There was clear development and progression of understanding on the part of the college students themselves with the school pupils commenting on how they found it to be helpful to have approachable young adults taking part who were not teachers.

Themes and issues tackled within the programme included

looking at stereotypes, prejudice and discrimination with a focus on how those things played out and affected people's lives in their own communities. These issues often led to challenging debates and discussions with diversity of opinion! On evaluation of the programme, one young person commented that

"The programme has given me confidence to confront people when I hear something racist being said. I challenge my family now if I don't like what they're saying-I am not afraid to voice my opinion."

The students were taken through a range of activities in small and large groups, some of these involved

physical challenges and some involved the recreation of real life conflicts that would then be worked on. The interactive aspect of the work was inclusive at

all times and the group was regularly consulted about the associations between the exercises and their everyday lives and experiences.

"I split up an argument between my sister and her friend. I get on with things easier than before. I don't just use the rejection button!"

By the use of creative and expressive techniques the

participants were able to contemplate some very relevant and challenging issues in a safe environment. Alternative strategies were explored and rehearsed so that common tensions could be dealt with in more productive ways in the future.

As a result of the Swindon programme we are beginning to get requests to deliver further programmes for groups of young people in the area.

The feedback from the school staff, pupils and college students has been very positive many of them found the experience stimulating, challenging and fun. Almost without exception those who took part would like to do something similar again and would recommend it



to their friends.

"I didn't like the idea of you pushing us outside of our comfort zone, but I'm glad you did. It has helped me a lot with my confidence."

"I hope there is a heaven so Tim & Johnathan can look down and see how great place this "

"I learnt how to handle things when I do something wrong, and not to try and put the blame on others. I'm more confident now"

"If you get involved and join in you understand things more."

"Before I went on the residential I was mugged and it was dropped from the crown court, now I look differently on it. I now have a lot more confidence, as when it first happened my confidence literally went."



The Northwich Project

During 2008, the Foundation was approached by Cheshire Police to develop and deliver a citizenship and conflict transformation project with young people from the Rudheath area of Northwich. The project addresses issues of anti social behaviour, conflict and community cohesion with the aim of enabling the young people to effectively manage conflict in their own community. The project brings together a number of agencies working in the Rudheath area including Cheshire Police, Youth Offending Team, Connexions and Rudheath High School.

Young people were invited to attend preliminary sessions with Foundation staff to identify and explore the issues facing the young people of Rudheath. The sessions also helped them to develop ideas and strategies for the development of the project. Seventeen young people then



participated in a threeday residential programme at the Peace Centre which explored and developed important skills and understanding in effective leadership, communication, problem solving and conflict management which will

help them to make Rudheath a safer and more peaceful community.

Throughout the residential programmes the young people faced many personal and group challenges although they worked hard to support and encourage each other and successfully overcame obstacles to complete the programme. The young people showed a great sense of pride in their achievements and we are working with them to provide further opportunities to build on their successes.



There are plans for the young people to continue their involvement with the project and some follow up activities involving other community members, residents and agencies working within Rudheath will be organised. The project will culminate in an intergenerational community event to identify key issues and to develop plans for the future of the Rudheath area based upon encouraging awareness, tolerance and support for all groups within the community.

Excitingly, The Foundation recently secured funding to develop and deliver a 12-week project with Victoria Road Primary School in Northwich to address issues of community conflict and peer mediation. Thanks to M&S Money and MWH Uk Ltd, the project will specifically target young people who are facing difficulties within the school and community. The programme will aim to teach them the knowledge, skills and understanding necessary to peacefully and effectively manage conflict.

Through the combination of these two projects the Foundation aims to bring together various groups within the Rudheath area and to provide opportunities for them to take ownership for the future development of their community.

Full On and Presentation Evening

Since September, Foundation has been delivering its Full On courses to eleven schools in Warrington, Stockport, and Wigan. These courses have examined issues ranging from self confidence to diversity, social with tremendous success. students have worked hard to develop strategies for making positive choices and built the skills needed to effectively address conflict in their lives. work Their hard commitment throughout their courses is evident with an enviable success rate of 88% of the students' achieving formal accreditation from the Open College Network (OCN).

The Foundation is now offering a new menu of units which enables students and their schools to achieve performance points. These points help to increase the student and the schools' overall performance rating and have therefore proved to be successful with many of our service users. Through the Step Up units we have been able to both address the underlying issues that may limit young people's aspirations for the future, and also provide them with the qualifications they need to achieve in school and make their goals a reality.

The Foundation recently celebrated the achievements of

our students at a Presentation Evening held on the 26th March 2009. This bi-annual event recognises the young people's successful accreditation on their courses, as well as their effort and dedication in achieving this goal. We are very proud of their accomplishments and wish them all the best in the future.



Young people's group 'Purple'

The Foundation has recently rejuvenated its youth group to bring together young people who have previously been involved in our programmes with the aim of providing long term opportunities for them to re-engage with the Foundation. However, any young person can join – the only criteria for getting involved are to share the passion for peace-building and positive change!

The young people came up with the name 'Purple' for the group which stands for 'People Uniting to Realise

their Potential and Lead by Example'. They felt that it was important to have a name which represents the aim and focus of the group's work and highlights the strong element of unity that exists within the group. (We also love these little acronyms at the Foundation!) They were also keen to identify the importance of their previous involvement with the Foundation.

The overall aim of the group is to continue to build upon the knowledge, skills and understanding gained from previous programmes and to have the opportunity to continue to learn and develop the confidence to apply those skills and share them with others.

The Foundation hopes that the young people involved in PURPLE will soon be taking the lead in delivering programmes to their peers and will be helping to raise awareness about how to make a positive difference in their communities.

We first became involved with Foundation in 2007 when we were selected to represent Warrington on The Tim Parry Leadership Development programme. As we lived and learnt alongside our Irish counterparts, we quickly made new and lasting friendships. Those friendships exist to this day as legacies of what was a life changing experience for us both.

We were so inspired by our journeys on the programme that we continued to meet with the Foundation team and other young people on their programmes. These days, we are members of the PURPLE youth group and we meet regularly to discuss and work on issues of conflict in our communities. Our group will soon start on a Peace-Building programme designed to develop our skills in facilitating conflict resolution style workshops with our peers.

We have represented the Foundation at different workshops and events including the design of a piece if graffiti artwork facilitated by legendary artist Mohammed Ali! In 2008, we were nominated to Liverpool JM University for a 'Young Citizens' award and received our award from Senator George Mitchell – someone who was an influential player in the Northern Ireland Peace process.

In November 2008 we became non executive Trustees of the Foundation's Board and now get the opportunity to make sure that young people's views and ideas are heard.

Over the past 14 years the Foundation has run an annual programme involving young people from Warrington with young people from both the North and South of Ireland. Lasting friendhave been developed and we hope to continue making a difference to the lives of these young people on both sides of the Irish Sea.





'Survivors for Peace' programme

The 'Survivors for Peace' programme is designed to help people who have been bereaved and/or are survivors of political violence and conflicts in the UK and other parts of the world. This programme also includes former soldiers, families of soldiers killed in conflicts, and Emergency Services workers who attended incidents. It gives participants the opportunity to use their experiences to make a positive contribution to peace in their own communities and lives. In practice this means those people who are bereaved, injured and affected by conflict are offered the chance to meet with others to gain support, take part in educational programmes and develop leadership skills as well as the opportunity to advocate for themselves and others.

Re-dedication of a plaque to remember my brother

On 4 February 1974 our family lost a very dear brother and son Terence – Bombardier Terence Griffin from the 8th Bty Arracan, Royal Artillery. Having spent the weekend at home Terence went off to catch a coach back to the barracks. At approximately 12.15pm a bomb which had been placed in the coach exploded, killing many ex-servicemen, civilians and two little boys. 12 people killed and 42 survivors, many of whom were maimed and injured.

A year after the bombing a plaque was erected on the outside wall of Hartshead Services on the M62 motorway as this was the service station where many of the injured and survivors were

taken. Over the years, I visited the plaque to pay my respects and lay flowers but as the service station was extended, the surrounding area became noisier and I often complained about how the plaque was treated.

The final straw came in July when I went to put flowers down and there was no place even on the floor underneath the plaque

for me to lay flowers. There was lots of merchandise underneath the plaque in large metal crates and with the loud music blaring I just stood there feeling so much grief and sadness.

When I returned home I wrote to Welcome Break and they called me to arrange a meeting. They said they would be willing to help with moving the plaque to a more suitable place and a lawned area by the flagpoles was chosen. I made contact with the other families and with the help of the British Legion and Life for a Life, started to make arrangements for the re-dedication service with the additional support from the Foundation.

As well as it being an emotional day, it was also a very uplifting day for many people. Old wounds were opened, but also many ghosts were laid to rest and in a way it was a very healing experience for me. Many people attended and this proved to be so very heart-warming and is an experience I will never, ever forget.

I feel being involved with the Foundation has helped me enormously in many ways. When I first made contact, I was in a different place in as much as I had unresolved grief issues surrounding how my brother lost his life. I also had lost my confidence due to stress and felt unsure about many things, but attending story telling workshops brought many things to the surface and whilst in some ways it was painful, it was also cathartic for me.

Being part of Survivors for Peace programme has shown me that it is much easier for me to work towards peace and reconciliation than to feel bitter about what happened. I know I have come a long way and have still some way to go, I still miss my brother and always will, but without the Foundation, I think I would not have come as far as I have.



Mohammed, a Trustee of the Foundation, took part in the South Leeds High School programme in 2008. The programme had such a positive effect on Mohammed that he decided to take part in our storytelling programme – Survivors for Peace. Written by Mo, this is his account of the residential weekend.

There are a range of projects offered by the Foundation, all of which are absolutely fascinating me. Armed with the knowledge that I wasn't too awful at being a team leader for a group of high school students in a previous residential, I agreed with Jo Dover to take part in a "storytelling" residential. It was much gentler, much shorter and had a different focus to the previous residential. I was curious to see this other facet of our charity, and how it worked.

The residential was to be run from Friday to Sunday, so I did not need to take any time off from work, but it seemed to me that there would be a weeks worth of activities crammed into one short weekend! I met with Jo during the week to go over the agenda, paperwork and confidentiality forms and things, and so she could give me a chance to run away screaming if I thought it was all too much. If anything though, I became more interested and eager to find out more about this wonderful project.

To summarise, the "storytelling residential" is a chance for people from all walks of life, all communities, to come together for a weekend and tell their own story. Victims of politically motivated violence, their families and soldiers, in fact anyone who has been affected by conflict and lives in the UK is eligible. It wasn't a counselling session; it was more akin to a first step towards counselling, if you get what I mean.

I was curious to see who would be in the group I would be attached to, not to mention excited and nervous in equal measure. The groups were adults this time and I was the youngest member and the least interesting. I had my own story to tell, but compared to what I heard, I was almost too embarrassed to share with a group comprising members who had suffered bombings, assassination attempts and other terrifying things.

I arrived on the Friday complete with "an item which is important to me" according to Jo's instructions. I chose something from my last residential. At the end of the week, the young people who had taken part all wrote messages on an outline of my hand and it symbolises a lot of things that are precious to me, the memories, the hope, how much I learnt and it was very fitting to be returning it to the Foundation for this new residential.

At around 7.30pm I met the whole group for the first time. We all clicked straight away, and within the first five minutes, were cracking jokes and having a good time. Every now and then I overheard snippets of conversations about things that they had experienced, which served to remind me that this friendly, funny bunch actually had some very harrowing stories to tell.

The first activity was an introductory one, where we all spoke about each other and ourselves, and showed what we had each brought. It was really interesting to see what each person had brought, and why they had chosen it. From toys that they had kept since childhood which reminded them of happier, simpler times, to parts taken from a periscope of a helicopter, right through to a goose egg and personal photos!

After the first introductory sessions,

expectations we had for the weekend and what we hoped to gain, we wrapped things up for the night. I challenged one of the participants to a game of pool, thinking I was a dab hand and pretty useful with a cue, this would be an easy win for me. The participant smiled slyly to himself and beat me hands down once, twice, three times . . . he made me look like a complete beginner! By the end I was almost in tears and he admitted that he was actually a specialist soldier, and his training had given him outstanding hand/ eye co ordination, one of the benefits being that he was absolutely unbeatable at games like pool and darts! It didn't stop me from trying to beat him all weekend though.

where we discussed things like what

Saturday morning dawned and almost as soon as breakfast was over we began our activities for the day. I would be in the group led by John Kabia and Jo Best. My nerves about telling my story mounted with every minute. The format was that each person would talk, uninterrupted, for 45 minutes each, about their story. For many this would be a chance to talk about things that they hadn't been able to talk about ever in their lives. When you think about it, few of us ever get the chance to talk for so long knowing that we will not be interrupted, we would have an avid audience and whatever we said would be treated in the strictest of confidence.

One interesting task was "beads on a string" Describing it sounds ridiculous, but actually doing it, I found it to be helpful and it triggered a lot of

forgotten memories. There is a table full of beads of different sizes, shapes and colours. Each person is given a piece of string and told to put the beads on their string to remind them of something, for example a bright round yellow bead reminded me of the sun, and a summer I spent as a kid, and so on. You use the beads to

build up a coherent recollection of the story you are about to tell.

I sat on the far end of the sofa, the three sofas forming a U shape, and I decided that I would tell my story last. Most people who know me, know that I'm a very quiet, introverted person most of the time, and don't really contribute to group discussions unless its by way of sarcastic one liners, I fall apart when it comes to talking in a group at the best of times, but here I was about to speak about things I've

never spoken about to anyone, in front of a room of strangers!

Everyone has a story to tell; mine is unusual for someone born and raised here in the UK who's never been part of the army. My story is a bit dark in places and a bit sad in others, but compared to the stories I heard, it pales into insignificance. I wish I could tell of the things I heard, the suffering that man can inflict upon his fellow man, and above all how we manage to come

through even the worst tribulations and just get on with our lives as best we can. That seemed to me to be an underlying theme in all stories; no matter when or where someone was born, or what they went through, we all seemed to just epitomise the "stiff upper lip" and get on with things.

Another impressive thing was just how much support by way of counselling organisations and charities there are in Britain to help people who have been affected by a wide range of things. It really makes you appreciate how great this country is, and how humane it really is. It's easy to forget the good things and the good people in this little island of ours, when people always want us to focus on the negative.

Like a man waiting for his walk to the gallows the storytelling moved inexorably down the line, to land squarely on me. I began to speak, and within a few minutes I settled down and told my story. It felt like I was

extracting a poison from within myself, the more I spoke the more this tension was leaving me. My own story was trivial, but this storytelling had a massive effect on me. I can't begin to imagine what those who had kept their story secret for 20 or 30 years felt like. There was a lot of emotion in the room when we all were telling stories; it brought us all so close together.

By the end of the day everyone in the room had told their story. We were all



a bit shaken up and emotional, which was why the decision by Jo to go out for a nice meal was a masterstroke. It provided a change of scenery and allowed us all to come together again and let off some steam. Highlight of the meal: the best waffles for dessert I've ever had!

When we returned to the Centre, we all sat in the lounge watching England get absolutely annihilated in the rugby by Ireland, much to Jo Best's delight. We sat around chatting and one by one we all drifted off to bed.

Sunday was the final day of this particular residential. The activities of the day were focused on the next steps; storytelling isn't a counselling service, it's an initial step towards it. We were given advice, and we all spoke about our feelings and what we had learnt and gained over the weekend, and any final thoughts.

One by one, in our own time, we stood

up and retrieved the items we had brought with us. It seemed fitting that at the beginning of this residential, we had all brought symbols of ourselves from our various walks of life, and placed them on the same table, symbolising our coming together, and now we were retrieving them, symbolising our return to our lives. I doubt that as a group, we will all be together in the same way again. All of the people in my group I would love to stay in touch with, even if it is on an

individual basis, rather than a group basis.

The time eventually came for us to part after lunch. We all sat around the same table, and there were a lot of unsaid things which passed between us; the appreciation for each others company, the relief to have got so many things off our chests, the sadness at our parting, and finally the hope that we would stay in touch. In a short time the very nature of the activities we had done had forged a

bond between us, and given us all tools with how to deal with what we would have to face.

On my way back from the Centre, as I was walking to Warrington Central, I ran over the last few days in my mind. It's hard to summarise what I feel in a few words, but I think my final thoughts at the end of the activities kind of sum it up,

"We have all suffered, and had things done to us, and been through problems. We all come from different walks of life, born in different times and situations, but we all have something in common: we've kept this darkness inside us for so long, and we never knew that the help was out there, but it is. And this Centre, and others, are here to help us. They can't stop the past from happening, but they can try and stop it happening again to others. It gives us hope, and sometimes, maybe that's all you need"


STEPS group receive funding from the DCMS

STEPS was formed in 2006 by victims, survivors and veterans of the Northern Ireland 'Troubles' who are involved with the Foundation. Group membership is now open to those affected by other conflicts / acts of political violence. We aim to raise awareness of the needs of victims and survivors and empower people affected by trauma to live positive lives.

The booklet was written by the group in the hope that it will assist others affected by trauma, bereavement, physical and/or psychological injury, to take STEPS towards empowerment and positive survival and to realise there is life after trauma or conflict. We are extremely grateful to the DCMS for the funding and their endorsement of the booklet as being a valuable tool for individuals and others to support victims of traumatic incidents. This is a challenging but exciting time for the 'journey of STEPS' as the outcomes of this work will help empower victims, survivors and others.

Our members have also taken up the offer of training at the Peace Centre under the Survivors for Peace Programme. Courses



include Exploring the Causes of Conflict, Leadership Development and Advocacy Skills. These courses enable us to not only come together but help us in our learning and motivation, to be an effective and organised group.

New members joined us at our April residential and this is a positive achievement for STEPS. Our presentation at V-Net conference, organised by the Foundation in September 2008 inspired many people to get involved with the group. We all want to make a difference to improve lives and welcome anyone who wishes to assist us achieve our aims. STEPS membership is open to all victims and survivors of conflicts and acts of political violence living in the UK. Each member decide their own involvement and commitment.

Personal taxation, corporation tax and benefits

WE are writing this column a couple of days into the new tax year and we would like to be able to give you definite details of your taxation obligations. Unfortunately, we still have two weeks to wait for the budget which has been delayed to wait for the outcome of the G20 summit. It has been suggested that this delay suggests that we are not in for any major surprises, and if this is not the case then we will look at it next month. Meanwhile, what do we know?

Personal Taxation

The personal allowance is now £6,475 (previously £6,035). This is the amount that you can earn before you start to pay tax. The enhanced allowances for people over 65 have increased pro-rate, as has the income above which these enhanced limits are progressively withdrawn.

Tax rates are unchanged. Basic rate remains at 20%, and higher rate is still 40%. The amount that can be earned before higher rate tax is payable has increased to £40,875 (including personal allowance). Nothing, however, has yet

been done to reduce the marginal rate of tax for those older citizens whose total income exceeds the relatively modest amount of \$22,900. These continue to pay tax at jaw-dropping 70%!

Most other allowances and rates are unchanged. However, one other change worth mentioning is that payments on account will now only be required if tax payable under self-assessment is £1,000 or above (previously £500).

Corporation Tax

The small company rate of Corporation Tax was due to rise from 21% to 22%. This increase has been deferred, currently for one year. This means that there is no change this year in Corporation Tax.

Tax on Cars and Car Benefits

The maximum mileage rates payable if you use your own car on your employer's business remain unchanged at 40p for the first 10,000 miles and 25p per mile thereafter. The amount which can be paid before tax being applied in respect of

business mileage in a company car if you personally pay for fuel has been reduced. For instance, if you are provided with a car with a mid-sized petrol engine then the amount you can claim for fuel used on business journeys has been reduced by 3p per mile to 12p.

Penalties and Late Payments

There have been substantial changes to the way that penalties are calculated if you make a mistake in making your return, as well as penalties for late payment of tax. However, these are too complex to go into here and we may revisit these in a later article.
