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

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
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

End of an era as Waysiders closes after 70 years

ANOTHER of Warrington's long established family businesses - the Waysiders on Horsemarket Street, is calling time on trading in the town centre.

Just weeks after Whites Sports announced the end of 113 years trading in the town, Martin Hales, a second generation owner of the Waysiders, which was established 70 years ago by his father John and Uncle Tony, has decided it is time to retire, aged 61.

"It was a tough decision and I am sure I will shed a few tears when we close for the last time," said Martin.

"There have been a lot of changes in Warrington and a lot not for the better. People no longer want quality goods as we now live in a throw away culture - and I am not prepared to go down that route.

"But I have many happy memories and wouldn't change

Martin, who lives in Grappenhall, with his wife Morag and two daughters Francesca and Georgina, now in their 20s, joined the family business in his late teens, at a time when he excelled the part to the control of th

teens, at a time when he excelled at tennis, turning down the chance of a professional career after competing at Junior Wimbledon. The business, which Martin runs assisted by his sister Cathy, was originally situated near the old market but during the regeneration of the town centre in the 1970s relocated to the former Timothy

Whites store on Horsemarket

The shop was hugely popular with the GIs based at Burtonwood airbase and still occasionally attracts visitors from the States who are taking a trip down memory

The business has specialised in glassware and china goods, stocking many of the high end

As well as a change in peoples shopping habits Martin says out of

town shopping areas like Gemini had impacted heavily on town

centre trade.

"If the council looked at cheaper rent and rates there would still be the opportunity for private individuals to give it a go," he

Meanwhile the Waysiders now looks set to become a new home for town centre Italian Restaurant Cafe Caruso, which is looking to relocate from Time Square this summer.

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Council's 50 ways to save £50 million

WARRINGTON Borough Council has found 50 innovative ways to save money – and as a result has saved £50 million to help cope with losing almost a third of its Government funding over the past three years.

But the cuts mean the council is now getting "close to the bone" according to council leader Terry O'Neill (pictured below).
He said: "Councils continue to be asked to make savings and, overall, those in the north of England have taken a bigger hit than those in the south

south. "The "The difference in average spending power per head between councils in the north and those in the south is £69.

"While we do want to ensure local residents get value for money, councils over many years have had to salami slice budgets across a wide number of services, but now the long term impact of those cuts means we are getting very close to the bone.
"We are really concerned about

having to continue to take huge amounts of money away from services, particularly those for vulnerable people who rely on us to provide support in difficult times.

"That is why we have done our very best to find innovative ways of reducing our costs, attract new sources of funding and protect services

"But the figure - £50 million out of a revenue budget which now stands at £145 million - speaks for itself.
"It does feel like residents in the

north of England are being treated unfairly compared with those in the south. In Warrington, we start from a particularly low funding base where funding from council tax is around six per cent less than the national average".

The council's lead member for corporate resources, Cllr Bowden, said in December the Government produced a list of suggestions to save money without

having too much impact on services. Warrington had already Warrington had already delivered a wide range of savings, including many of the Government's suggestions.

WARRINGTON paralympian Adrian Derbyshire is on the road to success to help stamp out hate crime by going the extra mile with his hand-cycle marathon.

medal-winning multiple sword fencing champion embarked on his journey, with a launch outside Warrington Market, waved off by the Mayor of Warrington Peter Carey and Warrington Wolves' mascot Wolfie

Using a specially-constructed hand-trike Adrian is cycling the 355 miles from Warrington to Land's End via an awareness-raising tour of the North West - a total journey

of 1,000 miles.

His journey will take six months to complete during which time he will be visiting schools, colleges and universities to promote sport, health and wellbeing and disability awareness as well as educating children about hate crime and the affect it has on its victims. He will also be cycling the Isle of Man TI circuit.

Warrington-born Adrian has

won two gold and three silver medals for Great Britain in the sport

of wheelchair fencing.

Commenting on the launch and his journey so far, Adrian said: "The hand cycle launch outside the market was a great success; visitors to the town had the opportunity to talk to me about my campaign and also had a chance to sit on the hand cycle!"

The 'event attracted the Mayor Peter Carey, Cheshire police, who were security marking bicycles for free and various charities.

Adrian continued his journey by visiting Christ the King Primary School in Macclesfield where he was greeted by 177 enthusiastic

"I was completely exhausted but on a tremendous high," said

Adrian.
"Staff and children made me feel so welcome and they weren't shy and asked questions about Hate Crime and different types of disability."

It was then time to 'Go the Extra Mile' with the children who changed into fancy dress and either walked or ran around the school playground for a whole mile. Much fun was had by all in raising awareness.

Looking back over 2013

March 2013 was a milestone anniversary year for the families of all the people directly affected by the IRA's bomb in Bridge Street and was marked by a very moving ceremony at the exact place where the bomb detonated. Hundreds gathered to listen to people recount their memories of that terrifying day, but spirits were lifted by the singing of a children's choir

from Tim's old school Barrowhall Lane Primary & Great Sankey High School.

As the year unfolded, there were many other significant events to mark the anniversary, including the Annual Peace Lecture, delivered by the Deputy First Minister of the Northern Ireland Assembly, Martin McGuinness, who did so at my personal invitation. The lecture was a controversial occasion, and though it led to a small group of protesters gathering outside the Centre, the overwhelming response from those who attended and others who made their views clear, was extremely positive.

As Co-founder of the Foundation and its Chairman, I will always preserve and defend the principles upon which we established the Foundation....namely that we will be at the forefront of peace building and reconciliation within and between communities and individuals. Powerful intentions demand powerful actions if they are not to be just hot air, and real peace building demands that risks are taken.

Not surprisingly, the anniversary year presented not only challenges of the political kind, but also of the financial kind, and the threat of our Survivors programme ending after 12 years' of continuous delivery, was very real until Chancellor George Osborne's announcement in his Budget Speech, that he was pledging direct government supportproof of just how far we have travelled since that darkest day back in 1993

Nick Taylor CEO reviews 2013

Our history starts 21 years ago, a consequence of the Northern Ireland 'troubles' and at the end of 2013, is still dominated by the continuing daily journey towards a lasting peace related to that conflict. Not only was 2013 the twentieth anniversary since the IRA planted bombs in Warrington, but it was also a year in which the political parties in Northern Ireland have tried to confront and deal with the past as well as attempting to address contemporary conflicts relating to parades and flags.

At the same time, we are constantly reminded that our world is not immune to violent conflict - as the year ended, 14 people are killed in a trolleybus explosion, the day after 17 died in a railway station suicide attack in the same Russian city, Volgograd. From shopping centres in Kenya to refineries in Algeria to sporting events in Boston to the killing of Lee Rigby on a street in Woolwich, violent conflict and terrorism is a reality. As are the ideologies that underpin such actions, whether that be the militant extreme politics of the Far-Right through to al Qa'ida inspired acts or indeed anyone who believes they can further their aims through the use of violence.

proven - this is a world in which conflict, often violent, is a real risk not just to human life, but to the very fabric of society in upholding freedom and democracy and in creating a stable economy and safe environment. Prejudice and discrimination need to be challenged in our communities, schools, universities and prisons. There is no place for extremism or for those who seek to radicalise vulnerable people. Our health, social and welfare systems have to look after those affected, and the human cost - is just not something we can tolerate.

Funding announced in the 2014 budget

Chancellor of the Exchequer, George Osborne, confirmed that the Foundation's work with victims and survivors of terrorism and political violence will continue. In his statement, the Chancellor also commits to working with the Foundation to "finding a lasting solution" to help fund this work.

The announcement forms a part of the 2014 Budget Statement to the House of Commons on Wednesday 19 March 2014. The Prime Minister, David Cameron met Colin and Wendy Parry along with Nick Taylor, the Foundation CEO, to confirm his personal support.

The confirmation of funding came after a period of uncertainty over the future of one of the Foundation's programmes called 'Survivors for Peace'. This programme has helped UK victims, survivors and their families who have been affected by global terrorism, war and political violence over the past 12 years.

Nick Taylor said: We welcomed the news: "This announcement follows 15 months



of intensive discussions and shows the positive face of politics. The Government, senior members of the opposition and the Northern Ireland Executive parties are completely engaged and supportive. This commitment by the Chancellor will send a strong message to those in our society who have been affected by terrorism and political violence that they are not alone."

Colin Parry said: "We bring people to the Foundation who have suffered at the hands of terrorism, as Wendy and I have.



We help reduce their sense of isolation, we give them a point of connection, we introduce them to other people, they develop friendships and they begin to find their normal lives, where previously they may have felt lost. Terrorism can affect anybody, anytime, anywhere and Governments alone cannot intercept and prevent all terrorism. The work of organisations like the Foundation is absolutely critical and Wendy, myself and the people we work with are immensely grateful for the funding announced in the budget."

10 Downing Street Meeting

On Monday 31st March, The Foundation met with The Prime Minister, David Cameron, to discuss the recent announcement in the budget to support the Foundation's programmes called 'Survivors for Peace'. George Osborne committed to a grant of £150,000 and promised to look at future funding to ensure victims are supported.

The meeting followed a question tabled by Tessa Jowell MP who, under the previous Government, established the Humanitarian Assistance Unit and was the responsible minister following incidents such as 9/11, the tsunami and London 7/7. The unit was closed down in 2010 and the Foundation is now the only organisation in Britain providing specialist assistance to victims of terrorism.

The meeting was also attended by Warrington South MP, David Mowat, Founders Colin and Wendy Parry, Nick Taylor, the Foundations Chief Executive, survivors of the London 7/7 attacks, Thelma Stober and Sudhesh Dahad who spoke about the benefits given to them by the Survivors programme, and the

Minister for Policing, Justice and Victims, Damian Green.

The Foundation will continue meetings with the Government to take these matters forward.



Home Secretary's special visit to Peace Centre

HOME Secretary Theresa May made a special visit to the Peace Centre to see firsthand the pioneering work of the Foundation.

The visit was organised by local MP David Mowat as part of his on-going support for the work carried out by the Foundation. They were able to talk about their vital work to prevent violent conflict and support victims and those affected by terrorism.

Colin and Wendy greeted Mrs May and gave her a tour of the building before hosting a lunch at which the Foundation team presented their work.

Nick Taylor, Chief Executive said: "We are very grateful to David Mowat for arranging this visit and for the Home Secretary taking time out of her busy schedule to visit us. Our work to prevent, resolve and respond to violent conflict is vital to creating the conditions for a secure, safe and peaceful society. As an independent charity, we hold a distinctive ability to influence change by



supporting victims, survivors and those affected by terrorism and in countering violent conflict."

Warrington South MP, David Mowat said: "I was delighted to be able to welcome the Home Secretary to Warrington to

show her the positive contribution the town is making to tackle radicalisation. What Colin & Wendy Parry have done at the Foundation is superb and I always enjoy showcasing it to my ministerial colleagues."

Baroness Warsi works with religious and community leaders to promote faith, religious tolerance and stronger communities within the UK so we were delighted to be able to present our work to her."



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Remembering Tim, Johnathan and Bronwen on the 21st Anniversary

On Thursday 20th March 2014, The Mayor of Warrington, Councillor Peter Carey, alongside the Council Leader Terry O'Neil and Deputy Leader Mike Hannon and other civic and faith leaders joined the families and survivors of the Warrington bombing to pay their respects at the 'River of Life' Bridge Street memorial.

Wreaths and flowers were laid including scores of single daffodils placed by family members and local people. There was a minutes silence and reflection at 12:27 which was the time the second bomb exploded.



The Mayor of Warrington spoke of his personal experiences on the day and the way such a tragic event had influenced the peace process as well as the continued work that reaches across the world. Colin Parry, the Foundations Chairman and Co Founder, spoke on behalf of the families in memory of Tim, Johnathan and Bronwen.

Water taken from the River of Life fountain was transported back to the Peace Centre and at a private ceremony, it was poured on the Peace Tree that grows in the grounds of the Peace Centre.

Wendy Parry, has been awarded an OBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours list for her charity work.

Wendy is the co-Founder of the Tim Parry Johnathan Ball Foundation established in the boy's memory supported by her husband Colin who received an OBE in 2004.

Wendy was the inspiration behind the creation of the international Peace Centre in Warrington, opened in 2000 to help support people affected by political violence/ terrorism and promote programmes in the prevention and resolution of violent conflict.

Wendy said: "I am very proud and honoured to be included in the Queen's birthday list. Everything we have done over the past 21 years has been to keep Tim and Johnathan's names alive and this is one of those occasions. Dominic, Abbi and Colin came so it was a real family affair and I took a picture of Tim in my pocket so it felt like we were all together."

Colin Parry said: This honour was very well deserved and I am delighted for my wife. You should never forget a life, no matter how short. My son Tim will be proudly smiling for his Mum and her OBE".

The Survivors programme for me is about finally getting help after being traumatised for the majority of my life. It is about meeting people who understand that losing someone to terrorism is not the same as losing someone to illness or accident. Even though the pain may be the same, the response of family, friends and community isn't. I am no longer alone with my feelings. I have met people who have helped with the isolation and depression just through our shared experiences.

The Survivors programme has changed my life. I now feel I can do something to change a situation, which might otherwise have damaged me much more than just the physical results of losing my hearing to a terrorist bomb. The Foundation has played a huge part in my sense of doing something meaningful out of an otherwise very damaging and negative experience.

On the morning of 7th July 2005 I had a normal life. After 8.51am nothing was ever going to be normal again.

The Foundation reached out and we held on gratefully, dragging our broken lives with us, bewildered but desperate to put the pieces back together and, somehow, get beyond just existing to find a new 'normal'. I have now gained perspective and a new 'normality'. It isn't what it was but I'm functioning and grateful to be here and, because of the Tim Parry Johnathan Ball Foundation, there is hope.

A Carers view

Conflict affects many people, not least the families and friends of those who give care and support. This is the view of one of those carers.

I am a carer to my partner who was diagnosed with Combat PTSD in 2009. We have had a traumatic five years with little help or treatment from our GP or the local hospital.

At times life has been particularly difficult for us both. My partner has had numerous stays in hospital and suicide attempts.

We first heard of the Peace Centre about four years ago and were invited to their 'Families Living with Trauma Day', part of the Survivors of Peace Programme. Until then everything we knew about the illness we lived with was self-taught. I had never sat and talked to others and neither had my partner.

The day was enlighting. The atmosphere was so relaxed. At last there were likeminded people with the same illness, but from very different circumstances. One thing in common is they understood how each other felt and shared their symptoms. I found people to talk to who understood how difficult it was for me at times, even though I am not one to look at my own difficulties. I was happy to muddle on by, although inside I was falling to bits.

The Foundation and their work has been inspirational to us both. We have attended numerous events and met new people each time. We learn new coping techniques from others and share how we feel. What we share is confidential and we feel confident with those we share with.

We have learnt so much more about the illness than anyone has ever given us. We now recognise triggers earlier than we did in the early days. I know when to ask for help before the situation becomes an emergency. The staff are remarkable, understanding, supportive and keep in touch with us in between events. The Foundation has been our lifeline.

Lisburn Leadership Development Programme, February – April 2014

March 2014 saw the Foundation working once again with Lisburn City Council delivering our acclaimed Leadership Programme to a group of young adults from Lisburn, Northern Ireland.

This partnership with Lisburn City Council came about after a Civic Lecture delivered to the city's political leaders in May 2011 by the Foundation's Programme Manager, Kelly Simcock. This led to the development of a programme designed to work with some of the future leaders from the area.





accredited 'Open Awards' programme works with groups on all sides of divided communities and gives them the skills to manage conflict and become leaders in their homes and communities. The group of fifteen was made up of a mixture of youth workers, volunteers, unemployed young adults and students, aged 17 - 25 who had shown an interest in developing their skills and knowledge further.

This programme included young people from the Glenavy Youth Project and the Old Warren Resurgam Trust amongst other groups. During the programme they debated issues of identity, prejudice and discrimination with a focus on some of the disputes that are current in Northern Ireland including the recent 'Flag protest' as well as some of the more contemporary challenges facing some communities around racism and xenophobia.

Focused on the three key themes Leadership, Conflict Resolution and Prejudice and Discrimination, the programme began with two residential weekends in Northern Ireland in February and March. The March

workshop took place in the surroundings of the Ardnabannon Outdoor Education Centre in the shadow of the Mourne where thev Mountains learned techniques for identifying and dealing with the underlying causes of conflict. This was followed in April by a weekend at the Peace Centre in Warrington which saw them develop their ideas further and included a field trip to see the kinds of work being carried out by leaders in different communities. The opportunity to meet with other leaders to exchange best practice and lessons learned was valuable for participants as they reflected on how these could be taken back to their own situations.

"Follow the Women"


The Foundation works to tackle the root causes of prejudice and discrimination in communities through a range of innovative programmes. We have just received funding to deliver a new project called, 'Follow the Women'. This project is designed to give groups of women the skills, confidence and capacity to understand and manage conflict and play active roles in tackling the issues facing them in their lives, their homes and their communities

Terry O'Hara from the Foundation said: "Although they may not think of it in these terms, women have always played a crucial leadership role in society, as mothers, wives, partners and advisors. Women have always suffered as a result of the conflicts that divide people and yet, given the skills and confidence, they have the potential to influence the course of conflict and enable communities to respond positively".

'Follow the Women' explores conflict at a local, national and international level examining specific topics including identity, prejudice and issues 'back home', as well as creating increased confidence to respond to issues such as hate crime.

"Crucially, our workshops examine the impact of these events on the women, their families and wider communities.





On 11th March, representatives from the Foundation attended the official 10th Anniversary memorial following the 2004 Madrid train bombings and were present at the European Commission's 10th European Day on Remembrance of Victims of Terrorism.

Programme Manager Jo Dover, was joined by John Gartside, a Foundation Board Director and Trustee and Graham Foulkes who works in support of the Foundation. Graham's son, David, was killed in the London 7/7 bombings.

The Madrid bombings occurred on the morning of 11 March 2004 on the

Cercanias commuter train network and killed 191 people and injuring 1800, affecting many thousands of people.

During the morning of the memorial event, a Catholic Mass took place in the presence of the Spanish Royal Family at the Almudena Cathedral. This was followed by the official memorial services at Retiro Park, where flowers were placed into the 191 Cypress trees planted for each of the victims.

A special plaque from the Mayor of Warrington to convey the town's thoughts to the people of Madrid was presented to Ana Botella, the Mayor of



Madrid, by John Gartside who was the Council Leader in Warrington during the time of the 1993 IRA bombings in the town.








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Warrington - a 'garden city


garden will be open on Saturdays and Sundays July 26 and 27, July 2, 3, and August 9 and 10, from 10am to 5pm.

Nicholas was a member of the Warrington Wembley teams in 1973-74 and 74-75 and coach or team manager of the Wales Rugby League team since the

1980s.

He is currently President of Wales Rugby League. He played club level rugby union for Aberavon. In rugby league he played for Warrington and the Cardiff Blue Dragons, and at representative Rugby League level for Wales and Great Britain, playing as a Front Row forward or Second Row.

Ten years later he topped the try scoring at Barrow RLFC with 20 Tries and he also equalled Warrington's "Most Tries In a Match" for a Forward record with 5-tries scored in the 36-15 victory over Blackpool Borough on Sunday 12 December 1982 1982

He finished his career at Warrington with 119 tries over a nine year stay.

National Minimum Wage

Whether you agree with it or not, the National Minimum Wage (NMW) has been with us for 15 years.

Failure to comply can result in an employer not only having to make up the difference to the employee, but also substantial penalties. However

also substantial penalties. However, that does not stop some employers from ignoring their responsibilities and they then often attempt to find an excuse when caught out. The tax office has recently published 10 of the more elaborate ones given in the past year.

- One employer said a woman on the premises was not entitled to NMW as she was his wife. When asked what his wife's name was the employer responded "err, her name? err, what's your name love?"

 Another said "I don't think my workers know anything about the NMW because they don't speak
- English."
- A third said that he always increased wages when the NMW goes up even if the total pay was still below the NMW. He added "I don't think its right to ignore the rises in NMW."
- Several employers paying rates below NMW suggested that

- accommodation they provided workers made up for their shortfall in
- Another one responded "I know I am paying them too little, but they are happy to work for this amount because they are getting experience.
- In another case, an employee claimed to be just working for a few days with a view to buying the business. However, his name was found on historic records over a substantial period.
- One employer said that he knew he was not paying employees NMW and had just increased their wage. However, the new rate was still below NMW.
- Another claimed "It wasn't a conscious decision to say 'I'm not going to pay this', but I've never really considered doing it because I've not had people come to me and say, 'I'm not getting paid enough' or 'Is this the minimum wage?'"
- In another case, an employee ran out of the premises when HMRC arrived to check NMW. He then returned pretending to be a customer.

 • Finally, an employee claimed to be a



friend of the owner and said that he was only in the restaurant on a visit. However, HMRC returned a few days later only to find that the person was


in the kitchen preparing food.
Anyone who believes they are not being paid the National Minimum Wage can call the Pay and Work Rights Wage can call the Pay and Work Rights Helpline, in confidence, for advice in over 100 languages on 0800 917 2368. Currently, calls to the helpline from interns who are working for nothing, or for "expenses only", are being tast-tracked to HMRC enforcement officers for investigation.
