#### IS Frodsham Foundation's e-newsletter and Facebook page worth £10,000-a-year to Frodsham Town Council?

The question was asked at a council meeting by Cllr Mike Pusey, wearing his recently acquired wearing his recently acquired Frodsham Foundation director's hat.

Perhaps the question should have more accurately been: "Is it worth £14,167 a year" for what the Foundation was seeking was an extra  $\pounds4,167$  to keep its communications work going until the end of next May. It had received a £10,000 fee from the council earlier in the year. The council decided – albeit

not too convincingly, as the vote was  $5^3$  – to pay out the extra money. Councillors who are also Foundation directors did not, of course, vote.

Now, we have no problem with Now, we have no problem with the council paying fees for services provided by the Foundation. Indeed, we have said in this column previously that we believe the Foundation has done some magnificent work for the benefit of Foundation and we have Frodsham and we have no reason to believe it won't continue to do SO.

But one thing it is not good at is communicating, and if it intends to rely on a Facebook page and an e-newsletter it is difficult to see how it will become so. Certainly not to the tune of £14,167 a year,

as anyone can set up a Facebook page for free and an e-newsletter

costs virtually nothing. Of course, the Foundation says it plans to make its online communications sustainable, so it should not be necessary to ask the council for more money. If this proves to be the case, then the Foundation will have discovered the Holy Grail. It will have achieved what huge, multi-national media companies have been struggling to do for years – made money from the internet.

But let's ignore money for moment. Let's ignore what we think, or what the Town Council thinks. Let's ask the people of Frodsham what they think. Well, they have already been asked, in the town-wide survey

carried out by the council itself.

Asked if they ever viewed the Foundation Facebook page or e-newsletter, 74 per cent said "no" and only 26 per cent said "yes". Asked if they had ever used either to look for a job, a massive 97 per cent said "no." Need we say more?

# Council agrees to fund top up fee for internet newsletter

### FRODSHAM Town Council has agreed to pay a "top up" fee of $\pounds4,167$ to Frodsham Foundation to keep its internet newsletter going until the end of May.

The payment was approved by five votes to three and follows a £10,000 fee paid earlier this year after the newsletter was launched.

Cllr Mike Pusey – a director of the Foundation – stressed that the payment being sought was a fee tor a service, not a grant. The newsletter had been set up

by the Foundation at the request of the Town Council but its costs had to be met if it was to keep running.

It was for the council to decide if the newsletter was worth £10,000-a-year, although the Foundation was seeking only £4,167 to keep it running until the end of May.

Eventually it was hoped that newsletter would generate an income for the Foundation, would become self sustaining and that they would not need to come back to the council for another £10,000. Cllr Graham Bondi questioned whether the newsletter represented

value for money. "There are quite a lot of Frodsham residents who do not use computers or tablets and do not use this form of communication," he said.

He also queried whether the council should be adhering to its policy of seeking three competitive quotes for a service. Town clerk Jon Wild said the

New trees to be planted

A PLANTING plan has been approved for 25 new trees in the community orchard in Frodsham's Hob Hey Wood.

In addition, five trees will be planted to replace dead trees, the Town Council has decided.

But the orchard will still occupy less than half of the meadow area in which it was originally planted, in line with the previously agreed policy of the council.

The trees are to be provided by Frodsham Transition Initiative.

newsletter was a "specialised service" and as such was exempt from the requirement of three quotations.

Cllr Lyn Riley – also a Foundation director - said it was doubtful if three quotations could be obtained locally as she could not think of anyone who could supply the service.

She said the service provided Frodsham with а wonderful



## 'Fantastic' response to survey!

#### FRODSHAM Town has released the Council results of its major, town-wide consultation exercise carried out earlier this year. More than 4,000 consultation forms were distributed across the

town and more than 30 per cent were completed and returned to the council – probably making it the largest measure of public opinion in the town gathered in recent times.

the town gathered in recent times. Members of the council described it as a "fantastic" response rate. Many of the findings were predictable – others less so. But they will form an invaluable resource for the council as it works towards formulating a strategy for the future of Frodsham. the future of Frodsham.

The consultation was launched the proposed sale of the Park Lane play area – and the results show that a majority of those responding – 63 per cent – supported the sale. An even larger majority – 71 per cent – would support the sale of the closed Ship Street play area. The same number support the sale of

unused or surplus council land. A significant 81 per cent supported improving play areas – but 72 per cent were opposed to

increasing council tax to pay for the improvements. A massive 96 per were in favour of protecting the green belt around Frodsham. The popularity of the annual Christmas Festival was underlined with 02 per council of the annual the term

with 93 per cent of respondents wanting it to continue. But opinions differed as to how it should be paid for with 73 per cent believing retailers who benefit from it should make up any funding shortfall and only 38 per cent thinking it should be funded through council tax. Sixty two per cent said they attended last year's festival.

Only 26 per cent said they used the Frodsham Foundation Facebook page and only three per cent ever use the Frodsham Foundation e-newsletter or website to look for

a job. But the Foundation's initiative to preserve The Goods Shed was supported by 58 per cent – and 80 per cent said they would like to see

per cent said they would like to see it renovated for public use. A massive 96 per cent think it essential for Frodsham to have a waste recycling facility, and 73 per cent were happy with the existing one by Frodsham railway station. A total of 72 per cent would not travel up to three miles to go to a recycling centre

recycling centre. Currently, Frodsham is expected to have 250 new houses built by 2030 and almost half the respondents – 48 per cent – thought this was too many. Eight per cent

though ti too few and 44 per cent though the figure about right. Most respondents favoured a home-owning community. Affordable housing for first time buyers and older people wishing to downsize were favoured by 79

per cent and 61 per cent supported new houses at market prices. Private sector\_rented homes were opposed by 77 per cent and social housing for rent was opposed by

57 per cent. A major 5/ per cent. A majority of respondents showed concern over speeding traffic. Sixty per cent supported a 40mph limit on the A56 between Castle Park and Helsby High School and 53 per cent supported a 20mph limit on residential roads. Permanent enforcement of the speed limit on Fluin Japa was the speed limit on Fluin Lane was supported by 62 per cent and on Bridge Lane by 55 per cent.

Parking was also an issue. Sixty three per cent of respondent's would like the Town Council to buy land near the town centre for parking and 52 per cent opposed time restrictions on free parking. A total of 42 per cent thought parking should be left as it is now.

Residents' parking schemes with residents having to pay an annual fee - were opposed by 75 per cent. According to 67 per cent of respondents, business people should voluntarily park away from Main Street to leave it free for shoppers and 67 per cent think residents should park off road where possible.

### Driver caught at 57mph -in High Street


A MOTORIST was caught travelling at 57mph in a 30mph zone area at Frodsham.

The incident was in High Street while police were carrying out a speedwatch operation. PCSO Neil Flanagan said: "It was the fastest I have ever seen anyone

driving in a 30mph area. "But later on the same day, another driver was checked at 53mph." Police have carried out Speedwatch checks on a number of roads in Frodsham in recent weeks, including Fluin Lane, Manley Road and Main Street.

They have also starting training volunteers for a Community Speed Watch. So far, 13 people have come forward and undergone training and another training session is due to take place on January 24. PCSO Flanagan said in their first session on duty, the volunteers had caught 48 drivers travelling at more than 34mph and all the offenders had been sent warning letters.

been sent warning letters. He added: "It has been a big success. "But the real success will be when they don't catch anyone, because that will mean drivers have learned the lesson and are no longer speeding."



### Defibrillator installed at sports club

#### HELSBY Community Sports Club now has a new, Club now has a new, lifesaving defibrillator – donated by the Have a Heart Foundation.

Weaver Vale MP Graham Evans joined former St Helens Rugby League player Tommy Frodsham and Have a Heart founder Dr Chris Hale when the equipment was handed over.

Dr Hale, a former Helsby High School student and professional rugby player and his brother, Eric, set up the foundation following

the diagnosis of a serious heart condition in 2012.

They are now dedicated to raising awareness of heart disease and heart failure in young people

and young athletes. Mr Evans said: "I am delighted that Helsby Community Sports Club now have this life-saving piece of equipment which can be used even by people with no training. This is a fantastic initiative to save lives." Public access defibrillators

(PADs) give voice instructions and are completely safe to use.

Dr Hale said: "The defibrillator works out if the person needs a shock, so you can't give a shock to someone who doesn't need one.

"People are often afraid to use them, but people should use one if they need to as it can be the difference between life and death. Anyone who has collapsed and is not breathing needs a defibrillator

"It has been proved that strategically placed defibrillators can significantly increase your of survival following chance`

cardiac arrest. "The Have a Heart Foundation is committed to being the difference between a life lost and a life saved and this project is helping us to

save lives. "With more defibrillators in public places, we can significantly reduce this tragic loss of life".

The charity is working to raise funds to buy defibrillators and also new cardiac diagnostic machinery for local hospitals through the recycling of unwanted clothes and shoes.

#### Football link with South Africa

FOOTBALL is providing a link between Frodsham and a village school in South Africa – thanks to the generosity of Frodsham Junior Football Club.

#### Halton Curve

Dear Editor.

I found your editorial in November's edition of Frodsham Life very interesting as it put a different perspective on the pros and cons of the proposed Halton Curve and subsequent implications for car parking in the town.

Should the Curve bring extra visitors to the town,I would urge those who have responsibility for car parking, demand better practices from the company which currently manages Eddisbury Square car parking. I had a very unpleasant experience with this company.

Éarlier in the year, I was sent a fine notice for having apparently parked in the Eddisbury Sq over the permitted number of hours. The evidence sent was two photographs of my car clearly showing my registration, apparently entering and leaving the car park. What was actually photographed was my car entering and leaving the car park on two completely different journeys, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. When I challenged the company to produce all four photographs, they did not , and simply said in a rather ungracious letter they would ignore the fine on this occasion. (!)

I found the tone of the original letter intimidating and am sorry to report that neither a local councillor or the town council have been of any support in taking the matter up with the company. If the company that runs the car park continue to behave in this way and remain unchallenged there will be no need to worry about visitors to the town, Halton Curve or not. I wonder if any of your readers have had a similar experience.

#### **Frodsham Remembers**

It's been wonderful to see the many different ways that people and groups around Frodsham have marked the 100year anniversary of the start of WW1. It has been our pleasure and privilege to have been able to attend so many of these events, including the laying of poppy wreaths at St Laurence's Church and the war memorial on the hill. Congratulations to Cllr Allen Wales, Frodsham Town Mayor and his town team, together with everyone who has made the many local stories about local lives part of the rich programme of events. We have and will continue to remember them all in Frodsham.

School registers from Cheshire's 166 county schools – dated between 1870 and 1914 – are now available on line at the FindMyPast website. Details include pupil's names, date of birth, address and dates of entry and leaving, as well as Parents' names and occupation. Our Town tradition of reading out the names of those who feature on the war memorial makes us all think about "who you really are"- if you want help tracing your family tree there are lots of sources in Frodsham.

Remembrance Day was also the day when CWaC added to its Community Covenant to support our Reservists serving alongside Armed Forces personnel,ex-service personnel and their families across the range of public services.

#### **Christmas Switch-on!**
