NOT for the first time, nor indeed the second or third, there is much talk in Frodsham of the possibility of the town getting a swimming pool.

The recent public consultation carried out by the Town Council predictably threw up numerous requests for a pool. There is ongoing debate on the issue in the social media.


And there was a lengthy debate at the monthly council meeting resulting in an invitation to Sport Cheshire to attend a future meeting to outline the necessary procedures - and obstacles.

All of which is fine - providing it leads to something.

During the council meeting, several councillors rightly warned that the public would take a dim view of yet another failed attempt to

provide a swimming pool. Some 25 years ago it nearly happened. The old Vale Royal Council, we are told, was ready to fund construction but the project collapsed when it proved impossible

to fund ongoing running costs. That is the problem with swimming pools. They are phenomenally costly to maintain yet their users, in the main, expect them to be inexpensive to use. Over the years, we have reported on numerous pools which have fallen into disuse and then dereliction



So yes, we applaud the efforts being made to provide a swimming pool in the town and we believe the Town Council is right to get the facts before pressing ahead.

But we caution against raising false hopes. We do not want the initiative to fizzle out like the last one.



New trees to be planted

A PLANTING plan has been approved for 25 new trees in the community orchard in Frodsham's Hob Hey Wood.

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David fights off cancer – by climbing a mountain

A 51-year-old Frodsham man is climbing Mount Kilimanjaro to raise money for a little-known pre-cancerous condition – Barretts Oesophagus.

David Luckett lives in the town with his wife, Margaret, and three dogs and runs a training and consultancy business at Runcorn. He was diagnosed with Barrett's

more than five years ago and, after carrying out a considerable amount of research, became annoyed to find that very few people had heard of it.

He said: "Oesophageal cancer is relatively unheard of, yet one person dies of it every hour in the

pre-cancerous condition – can be recognised as an early stage before cancer.

before cancer. "They are not lumps or bumps or blood etc. - but acid indigestion, aching back, sensation of food sticking when swallowing. Something that is well known as a discomfort by most people, but not thought of as life threatening. "The amount of money raised

"The amount of money raised by my climb has already become my second concern. Raising the profile of this condition is number one. If I can save one life, then any

monetary figures are irrelevant."

David has been doing 10-mile walks and has climbed Snowdon a few times in preparation for the Kilimanjaro climb.

He has never done anything like it before so will find the climb a challenge.

"Why Kilimanjaro? I needed something big to make a statement and give me a vehicle to promote awareness of this condition.

"Why climb a mountain?.... because it's there!"

David is being sponsored by his own company and himself so all monies raised by his climb will go to the charity, the Barrett's Oesophagus Campaign.

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Council webcasts boring' says resident

FRODSHAM'S ground-breaking webcasts of the monthly Town Council meetings are "boring" according to local resident Terry Dillon.

He should know – he has watched every one of the videos since the council started its webcasts earlier this year. He has also attended most of the meetings

You might think it a bit sad," he said. "But sometimes you can't take it all in at the meeting and you can always skip through the video to the part you want.

"But it's boring. Half the time, you can't hear the councillors speaking. They have buttons to press to switch on their microphones but often they

forget. "There's also a lot of static noise which makes it difficult to hear what people are saying. They've not got it right." Mr Dillon started attending council meetings when the controversy over the sale of the Park Lane Play Area first arose. Put he is wondering whether to continue watching the webcasts.

"They tend to be boring – particularly when you can't hear them. I'm told the static noise might be caused by councillors using their laptop computers. But whatever it is, they need to get it put right." Frodsham is believed to be the only town or parish council in Cheshire


West - and possibly the country - to broadcast its meetings on the web.

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

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Castle Park gem sparkles again

FRODSHAM'S Castle Park Arts Centre is set to enhance its image as a unique venue to engage with the arts and hopes to firmly establish itself as the largest independent art gallery in Cheshire.

The Centre's Gallery 2 and adjoining room have undergone extensive refurbishment over the last three months and formally reopened at the beginning of October.

The revitalised gallery will enhance the Arts Centre's exhibition facilities and thereby attract a greater number of emerging and established artists throughout the region and beyond, who wish to promote their artworks.

The refurbishment project was funded from the Biffa Award; a multi-million pound environment fund managed by the Royal Society of Wildlife Trusts (RSWT), which utilises landfill tax credits donated by Biffa Waste Services) and from the Cheshire West and Chester Rural Support Funding Grant Award.

Gallery 2 was formally opened by The High Sheriff of Cheshire; Susan Sellers, followed by an evening of celebration.

evening of celebration. Approximately 150 invited guests, including The Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress of Chester, representatives from Cheshire West and Chester Council, Frodsham Town Council, the sponsors plus Centre volunteers and members, attended the reprepaired attended the reopening.

Peter Vickery – Chairman; Castle Park Arts Centre" - said, "The refurbishment of Gallery 2, will herald in a new chapter in the Arts Centre's quest to be in the Arts Centre's quest to be recognised as a unique venue for engaging with all aspects of the Arts. We are now able to accommodate, not only more artists wishing to display their artworks, but also host more art workshops, lectures, demonstrations plus a diversity of art groups and musical entertainment.

In keeping with the Art Centre's



tradition of hosting a six week rolling programme of exhibitions, Gallery 2, once reopened, will display a collection of artefacts, photographs and documents chronicling the impact of the Great War on Frodsham's local

The monthly meeting of the council decided to commence the process, subject to the views of neighbouring councils. Cllr Andrew Dawson said if the council wanted to influence future developments in the town, a Neighbourhood Plan was essential. First it would course the

First it would be necessary to define the area the plan would cover. It seemed logical that they should adopt the parish boundaries as they would be from May next year but before deciding on this it would be a good idea to ask neighbouring parishes to see if they wanted to be involved. Chairman Cllr Mark Warren said a Neighbourhood Plan steering group should be formed consisting not only of members of the council but also representatives of the local community.

Cllr Lynn Riley said a Neighbourhood Plan would involve the whole community and should reflect the town's big ambitions. Superfast fibre broadband for Frodsham

NEARLY 600 properties in Frodsham are among the latest to join Connecting Cheshire's fibre broadband fast lane – bringing the total across the county to more than 36,000.

It's not just about a faster internet experience or doing one thing quicker, it's about everyone being able to do their own thing online, all at the same time. Users can work or play - smarter, faster, better - whether from a smartphone, tablet or computer.

Frodsham residents and businesses can check availability of fibre broadband by visiting the website www.connectingcheshire.org.uk. If it is available, they should contact their internet service provider, shop around for the best deal and order an upgrade to fibre broadband – it doesn't happen automatically. Connecting Cheshire is a

Connecting Cheshire is a partnership of four councils – Cheshire West and Chester, Cheshire East, Halton and Warrington – and BT, with additional funding from BDUK and the EU. The £28.5m project will provide fibre broadband to more than 80,000 homes and businesses. This builds on BT's commercial investment so that 96 percent of Cheshire - around 400,000 premises - will have access to speeds of up to 80Mbps by the end of next year

Old telephone kiosk could house defibrillator

FRODSHAM Town Council is to look into the possibility of taking over a telephone kiosk which BT intend to

decommission. The kiosk is at the junction of Howey Lane and the A56 Chester Road – and Cllr Andrew Dawson thinks it would make an ideal location for one of the town's defibrillators.

He told the council: "BT wish to decommission this kiosk and this presents an opportunity for it to be taken over for community use. It could be a location for a defibrillator.

"More than 30 kiosks across Cheshire West and Chester are in the same position and there may be others due to be decommissioned in Frodsham."

Dawson said telephone had the advantage of Cllr kiosks having electricity laid on and being available 24 hours a day. But he warned that taking over the kiosk

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would not be cost free. He was not suggesting the council should spend money at present. But they should

express interest. Chairman Cllr Mark Warren said there was a general lack of information about the location of defibrillators in Frodsham and using the kiosk could help the situation.

The council agreed to make inquiries about a possible take over of the kiosk.



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Castle Park 'neglect' claims

SOME parts of Frodsham's Castle Park are in a "disgusting" condtion through neglect, a concerned member of the public told the Town Council.

Terry Dillon, who lives near the park, said the problem appeared to be occurring because gardeners were being diverted to carry out

work in other parts of Frodsham. Although the lawns and flower beds close to Castle Park House were well kept, other areas were not. He singled out the children's play area, the American Garden and the area surrounding the tennis courts as those being neglected.

The pond in the American Garden was in a disgusting condition with bottles, cans and old footballs floating in it and an outbreak of

blanket weed. Mr Dillon also complained that the gates into the park at the top end of Park Lane were being closed early. "This is a public tootpath and the

gates are supposed to be open from dawn to dusk. But sometimes they are closed as early as 4.30pm which means that people can't get into the park."

Chairman Cllr Mark Warren pointed out that Castle Park was not the responsibility of the Town Council but of Cheshire West and Chester Council (CWC).

Clir Lynn Riley, one of Frodsham's representatives on CWC, said she would raise the issues highlighted by Mr Dillon with the appropriate department.

But local residents could report any matters of concern themselves -either at the library or on the internet.

Swimming pool dream revived

IT has been Frodsham's dream for more than 40 years - a community swimming pool.

Some 25 years ago it nearly came true when funding and a site were available to build one. But it didn't happen because money could not be found to run it once it was built.

Now the dream has been revived following the Town Council's recent town-wide consultation showed strong demand for a pool still exists. The council is to ask Sport Cheshire to attend a future meeting to give a presentation on all aspects of providing a pool – including funding through grant aid.

Councillors debated the issue at length at their monthly meeting after Cllr Darren Kelly put forward the idea of employing a specialist consultant to advise on the feasibility of a project to build and maintain a pool.

on the feasibility of a project to build and maintain a pool. He believed the council did not have the expertise to progress the idea and would "keep going round in circles" unless it sought expert advice. Members explored a number of possibilities including setting up a working group to draw up proposals, seeking advice from the parish council at Penketh, Warrington, which already has a pool and involving neighbouring parishes such as Helsby, Kingsley, Manley, etc., whose residents would also benefit from a swimming pool at Frodsham. Cllr Lynn Riley said a pool would be costly to provide and even more costly to maintain. Frodsham had not chosen to have a wind farm built on its doorstep. But now it was going to get one, money from the community benefit fund promised by the developers could perhaps be used for a swimming pool. If a neighbourhood plan was drawn up it could include a pool and the whole community could become involved. But if grant funding was to become available

community could become involved. But if grant funding was to become available the proposal would have to be seen to be sustainable.

The meeting was told one possibility was for a pool adjacent to Helsby High School. But a possible obstacle to obtaining grant funding wherever the pool was located was the presence of pools at Northwich and Ellesmere Port – only eight miles away.

It was finally agreed to ask Sport Cheshire to give the council a presentation on the likely "funding landscape" if it was decided to go ahead with the project. Cllr Riley said: "We are very much at the starting gate on this."

Connecting Cheshire, our local scheme to boost Superfast fibre broadband availability, has arrived in Frodsham. We were out on market day to raise awareness and encourage more people to plug into the high-speed technology that can transform lives and businesses.

The £28.5m project funded by the EU, Government and CWaC will provide fibre broadband to more than 80,000 homes and businesses and by Spring 2015, over 875 miles of fibre-optic cable will have be laid and more than 400 new roadside cabinets installed.

Recently installations have seen broadband speed rise from around 5Mbps to over 35Mbps, bringing a real boost to local businesses and residents.

Andrew an early adopter of Superfast Broadband said - 'you can imagine what it is like in my house, all 5 of us have every conceivable connected gadget - its only the dog that isn't connected to the internet - and that will only be a question of time. Once Superfast Broadband came to Frodsham I was bound to be one of the first to get it.'
