#### IT was talked about for years before anything was done. Now it's almost finished and most people seem to agree that, despite the enormous cost, it hasn't been the problem that some predicted.

We are, of course, talking about the restoration of the Sutton Weaver Swing Bridge, which despite dire warnings, has been carried out without destroying Frodsham's economy.

But the project has continued to be surrounded by controversy. Fortunately, Cheshire West and Chester Council's plan to dispense with the traffic lights which eased

the flow of traffic over the bridge prior to the bridge works starting, has been dropped.

Faced with opposition from Frodsham Town Council, Sutton Weaver Parish Council, Halton Council and just about everyone else, they have agreed to reinstate the traffic lights and keep three lanes of traffic on the bridge instead of two.

This is a victory for common sense. We have used that bridge regularly for years and never found having three narrow lanes caused any problem. We cannot see that improving and strengthening the bridge will do anything other than make things better.

But the story is not over. What are we to make of a suggestion, from private developers, that a roundabout, conveniently accommodated on land which they own near the bridge, would be the answer to any traffic challenges in the area?

They have consulted local people who, apparently, overwhelmingly support their ideas.

But that was before Cheshire West and Chester dropped their plan to remove the traffic lights.

According to highway planners, the cost of such a roundabout system could be £2 million – which means it is unlikely to happen.

Unless, of course, some other development is proposed in the immediate vicinity.

# Support group for people with lung diseases

Britain's first integrated fertility hospital is officially open

A SMALL support group is bringing help and comfort to people in the Frodsham area suffering from various Interstitial Lung Diseases, their family and carers.

Interstitial lung disease (ILD) is a group of lung diseases affecting the interstitium – the tissue and space around the air sacs of the lungs.

The Frodsham group is run by Sue Stephan, whose Mum, Sally, suffered Idiopathic Pulmonary Fibrosis (IPF) but sadly died in February after a seven year battle

IPF is a serious disease where

the alveoli (the tiny air sacs of the lungs) and the lung tissue next to the alveoli become damaged and scarred.

The main symptom is shortness of breath that gradually worsens.

The exact cause is not known and treatments include steroids, and other medicines. Increasingly lung transplantation may be offered. Sue can be contacted by emailing susiestephan1267@aol.

Elaine is one of eight sisters who are turning their passion for baking into fundraising for cancer charities.

Elaine, aged 57, from Frodsham, raised more than £700 from a MacMillan Coffee morning she helped organise at St. Laurence's Church Hall in Church Street last year - and now she is at it again at the same venue on September 20 from 11am.

She will again be joined by her sisters Wendy, aged 53, who has Ovarian Cancer and Brenda, aged 56, who has had breast cancer twice.

Now youngest sister, mother of three Gillian, aged 50 has been diagnosed.

The lump was discovered during a routine mamogram - she had no idea she had a breast lump and couldn't feel it. She's had this removed along with some lymph nodes and the indications are really favourable that all the tumour was removed and it has not spread. She will have radiotherapy

and, perhaps but not definitely, chemotherapy. The outlook for Gillian is very favourable because the cancer was discovered very early

Elaine said:"Being from a large family of eight sisters and two brothers, our mother was always baking for the family."

"It is a worrying time ahead ad we find that baking cakes and and holding fund-raising events is a good way of dealing with the anxiety," she added, "I would like to thank everyone

# Air quality good – except for parts of the A56

AIR quality in Frodsham is good, with the only significant pollution being from traffic on parts of the

A56. This is clear from existing monitoring data in the town. But recently a local panel took advice from Professor Duncan Laxen from the company Air Quality Consultants and it was recommended that further data be obtained in the Frodsham area. obtained in the Frodsham area.

As a result, an air quality monitoring station has been set up at Frodsham Manor House School by Cheshire West and Chester Council (CWC)

This facility will record the levels of three different pollutants as well as weather data every 15 minutes, around the clock.

around the clock. It follows concerns raised by CWC's Frodsham councillors Lynn Riley and Andrew Dawson, about whether existing and proposed industrial developments and their emissions, could have an impact on the residents of Frodsham. Data produced by the monitoring

Data produced by the monitoring station will provide invaluable information on local air pollution and its likely causes.

The monitoring station has been funded in part from the member

budgets of ClIr Riley and ClIr Dawson as well as a contribution from Frodsham Town Council. ClIr Riley said: "We take our public and environmental health

role very seriously and we are working hard across the borough to ensure that our air quality is good. "This monitoring station is an

important step in ensuring we have evidence of the state of air quality

in Frodsham." Cllr Dawson said: "Having the data to show how good our air quality is, is vital in providing community assurance and reassurance.

"lt also helps industry demonstrate how well they are performing.

Chairman of Frodsham Town Council, Cllr Mark Warren said: "The council believes this is important work and is pleased to be able to support it financially, alongside colleagues from Cheshire West and Chester Council." Anyone who wants to find out

# £4.5m bridge works nearly finished – but the talking goes on

WORK is nearing completion on

WORK is nearing completion on the £4.5 million restoration of Sutton Weaver Swing Bridge – but the project continued to be dogged with controversy to the end Frodsham Town Council objected to Cheshire West and Chester Council (CWC) proposals to do away with the traffic light controlled junction when the bridge re-open, on the grounds it would cause traffic chaps traffic chaos.

traffic chaos. Similar objections came from Sutton Weaver Parish Council, Halton Council, bus companies and others – and as a result CWC backed down. The traffic lights will be retained – along with three lanes of traffic on the bridge. Then Helsby-based developers Steppingstone injuned in the debate

Steppingstone joined in the debate by launching a consultation in Frodsham and Sutton Weaver Frodsham and Sutton Weaver about their own proposals for solving traffic problems at the bridge by introducing a new roundabout system. They, in turn, were taken to task by Frodsham councillors Andrew Dawson and Lynn Riley who demanded answers to a series of searching questions.

searching questions.

Steppingstone claimed 72 per cent of Frodsham residents work outside the town and the majority of them use the Sutton Weaver bridge. They said they own several parcels of land near the bridge which could accommodate a new, full-sized roundabout which would provide a solution to many of the traffic challenges.

trattic challenges. According to Steppingstone, more than 750 people responded to their consultation – the majority of them supporting their proposals. They said they were ready to discuss their proposals with CWC, Frodsham Town Council, Sutton Weaver Parish Council and the community.

community. But Cllr Dawson and Cllr Riley (pictured) say the company has failed to answer the questions they have posed.

These are:

\*Has Steppingstone costed the proposed works, which according to a CWC estimate, could be around £2 million?

\*Is Steppingstone offering to carry out the highways work or pay for it, or is it expecting CWC

pay for it, or is it expecting CWC to pay? \*As CWC does not currently have £2 million available, how are the works to be carried out and who is going to pay? \*Is Steppingstone offering to transfer the land on which the roundabout would be sited to CWC, and if so on what basis? \*Does Steppingstone link its

\*Does Steppingstone link its roundabout proposal with the development of surrounding land

it owns and, if so, what kind of development is in mind?

\*As the land is in Green Belt, how does Steppingstone seek to demonstrate the "very special circumstances" that would be necessary?

\*What discussions Steppingstone had with CWC planners on development proposals in the vicinity?

\*Does Steppingstone have a timetable in mind for the construction of the roundabout and any linked development?



#### New domestic violence law will help abuse victims

PROPOSALS for a new crime of domestic violence will help hundreds of Cheshire people suffering in abusive relationships, says a local family law expert.

Ruth Hetherington, who is a partner at FDR Law, in Frodsham, welcomes the Government's plans to create a new law which will empower the police to intervene

in domestic abuse situations more easily.

Last year there were nearly 270,000 domestic abuse-related crimes in England and Wales, representing 8% of all calls to the police\*. Although existing laws already cover acts of violence, stalking and harassment, none of them specifically refer to personal

relationships or domestic situations.

The Government's consultations. will look at strengthening the law by explicitly stating that domestic abuse includes coercive and controlling behaviour as well as physical harm. The move comes after the way

police respond to domestic abuse was condemned as "alarming and unacceptable" in a report by Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary in March.

Constabulary in March. Ruth Hetherington said: "I have seen so many local women and men who have suffered abuse, mental as well as physical, before their relationship breaks down. This is a universal issue and affects both genders, across all sections of sociate society. "The

"The psychological damage caused by a controlling, bullying partner can be just as harmful as a black eye or bruised ribs. Some people are fearful for their lives, but for many, domestic abuse manifests itself as psychological terror; constant undermining, threatening behaviour; isolation from friends and family; and a loss of financial control. psychological damage

control. "To the outside world, the perpetrators often appear charming but behind closed doors, they can be violent, volatile and seek to control every aspect of their partner's life, making them feel worthless and isolated."

In support of the domestic abuse consultation, Home Secretary Theresa May said: "The government

is clear that abuse is not just physical. Victims who are subjected to a living hell by their partners must have the confidence to come

must have the confidence to come forward. I want perpetrators to be in no doubt that their cruel and controlling behaviour is criminal. "We will look at the results of this consultation carefully in order to continue providing the best possible protection and support for victims of domestic abuse."

# **Talking Frodsham**



#### Welcome

This is the latest news about what is happening in our busy community. From your local Cheshire West and Chester Councillors, Andrew Dawson and Lynn Riley.

It's been great to see so many people sharing their views about a whole range of local issues over the summer period. It's usually a quiet time, but not this year. One of the reasons we write this page along with the blog, website and other social media is to try and get as many people aware and involved in all that's going on.

The Swingbridge is just one example where over the last month we've not been backward in coming forward with local views on a proposed road layout once the road re-opens!

To make sure as many people had the opportunity to have their say officers from the Council's Rural Localities team took to the streets on Frodsham's market day. Lots of people formerly replied to the consultation and many more had a chance to better understand the proposal.

You may remember in early 2013 our community came together to make the case for a temporary bridge whilst the swing bridge was renovated! The project team at CWAC and C&RT responded to this groundswell of local support by delivering the temporary bridge alongside the long awaited upgrade. Totalling a £4.5m investment in the area!

With work due to complete in a matter of weeks, the question about what happens next is out there. Moving the traffic back onto the refurbished bridge and the junction on the Sutton Weaver side has been out to consultation. Not only has this triggered many of you to write in with your comments about whether to retain the arrangements on the temporary bridge or not, but its also brought forward a new suggestion from a private developer and we are all interested to know more. We've both been asking questions of the developer!

Obviously any new scheme has along way to go and in the meantime we'll soon be driving, walking and cycling over the much improved Swing Bridge. There were more than 300 responses to the consultation about what road junction we should have - with the vast majority of views received being overwhelmingly in favour of reinstating the traffic lights. This is in spite of the success of the free flowing traffic over the temporary bridge. Objections to keeping the temporary arrangements were raised by Halton Council and the parish councils of Frodsham and Sutton Weaver as well as Sustrans, the Blue Light Services and all the bus companies. So the traffic lights will return and we've been able to persuade the highway engineers to return the 3 narrow lanes even though they wanted just 2.

Thank you to everyone who contacted us with their views – it really can and does make a difference since new Government thinking, both nationally and locally allows greater flexibility in being able to sort local issues, locally.

In much the same way, we are proposing a new crossing by Weaver Vale primary on Ship Street to encourage more children to walk and cycle safely to school. In the past, this popular and sensible idea has never met national criteria, but now that same "new local thinking" is allowing us to use our members grants to fund this alongside Frodsham Town Council. The formal consultation will be starting soon so we'd love to hear from you.

#### **Frodsham Business Incubation**

Do you work from home or are you a small business or sole trader? We are currently developing an idea around creating an incubation space in Frodsham, where you can share an open workspace for an hour, day, week or longer. You can share ideas and business opportunities with other professionals or small businesses.
