What does the first interest rate rise in ten years mean for you?

After months of speculation, the Bank of England finally raised interest rates in the UK for the first time in over a decade. The increase from 0.25% to 0.5% might seem small, especially when you consider that the last time the interest rate was increased in July 2007 it was up to 5.75%, but the fact that interest rates are going up at all after more than ten years at rock bottom is significant.

The rates rise will have an impact on the finances of millions of people in the UK, with those on variable rate mortgages likely to lose out the most. 46% of households with a mortgage are on either a standard variable or tracker rate, which are likely to move at the same time as the official bank rate.

These mortgages have an average of £89,000 left to pay off, resulting in a monthly payment increase of around £12. Those with higher variable rate mortgages will of course see their outgoings increase by a higher amount: payments on a £300,000 mortgage will go up by about £39 a month. Homeowners with fixed rate mortgages meanwhile can expect their payments to remain the same for some time following the interest rate lift, as can those with loans and credit cards to pay off.

Savers are likely to benefit from the rates increase having seen little growth on their savings for a number of years. On average, an easy-access savings account currently pays interest at 0.14% annually, meaning that £10,000 worth of savings would generate just £14 every year. If providers choose to pass on the rates rise in full, this will add another £25 to earn £39 annually. A typical ISA meanwhile will see the annual growth of £10,000 increase from £30 to £55.

Pensioners who have purchased an annuity can also expect to benefit from the rates rise. Annuities follow the yields on gilts, or long-dated government bonds. In anticipation of a rates rise, these have also increased, meaning those purchasing an annuity for retirement will receive better value for money on their investment. In November 2016, a joint annuity bought for £100,000 would receive an annual income of £4,086. That figure has risen this month to £4,468 and could continue to go up depending on how likely further base rate increases are – something which the Governor of the Bank of England, Mark Carney, has indicated is likely over the next few years.

Editor's comment

WE are quite sure that Bridgewater High School is one of the best schools in the area and that Appleton College – its sixth form – is equally good.

So why do we have to publish this month the disappointing news that the college is to close because it cannot attract sufficient numbers of students?

Why do so many of the high school pupils who want to go on to post-16 education choose to go elsewhere?

There are probably a number of reasons – not least the proximity of the highly regarded Priestley College, with which, fortunately, Bridgewater has close links.

But another reason might be the failure, over the years, of Bridgewater to adequately blow its own trumpet.

Modesty in an individual can be a great virtue. But not necessarily so in an institution such as a school.

Bridgewater may have suffered through hiding its light under a bushel.

We don't doubt for one minute that significant efforts have been made in recent years to boost recruitment at the college, although whatever was done was not exactly shouted from the rooftops.

Nor do we blame the present leadership, nor the governing body, for the school's unassuming outlook is not of recent origin. More than 20 years ago, Bridgewater was the only high school in Warrington which steadfastly refused to publish its O Level results – a policy which may have led some to wonder if there was something to hide.

Whatever, Appleton College is, unfortunately, to close. The sad fact is that there are in Appleton and its wider catchment area, those who never even knew it was there.

Their ever popular log reindeers are also flying out and with supplies of wood proving hard to come by, they are sure to be out of stock by the time the big man arrives on his sleigh on Christmas Eve.

Assistant Manager Julie Groom said: "It has been fantastic how the local community has rallied behind us since the break-in. We have never been busier and we would like to say

a big thank you to everyone who has helped us.

"It is very much appreciated."

The charity provides work experience for adults with learning difficulties and their beneficiaries have been kept very busy helping make the Christmas Eve gift boxes and log reindeers.

Special wreath making workshops have also proved extremely popular.

Now, working in conjunction with Warrington & Vale Royal College, the charity will be focusing on new product design courses in the New Year.

Sixth form college to close



APPLETON College – the sixth form college at Bridgewater High School – is to close.

The decision – forecast in our online editions in September – was confirmed following a four-week consultation.

"Persistently low numbers" of students were blamed for the closure.

Students currently at the college will not be affected, but no new students will be admitted from September next year.

Bridgewater High is part of The

Challenge Academy Trust (TCAT) which also includes Priestley College, where many Bridgewater pupils have chosen to continue with their post-16 education for some years.

Closure of Appleton College is seen as strengthening the existing links with Priestley.

But former students, staff and governors have expressed deep sadness that the difficult decision to close had to be made while at the same time emphasising that it will be in the best interests of the students.

A REUNION is being organised for pupils who left Warrington's Bridgewater High School 50 years ago.

The 50th anniversary event is to take place at the Fir Grove Hotel, Grappenhall, on July 4 next year at 7pm.

Village hall receives £125,000 grant boost

A VILLAGE hall is to undergo a major refurbishment thanks to a £125,000 grant from funding bodies WREN and Biffa Award.

The money will be used to remove and replace the existing and deteriorating asbestos roof at Whitley Village Hall and refurbish the main hall and store areas.

Steve Moore, chairman of Whitley Village Hall Committee believes the improvements will make a huge difference to the lives of people living in the area.

Chris Everett, senior LiveWire advisor for reading, said: "We had a fantastic response to this year's Summer Reading Challenge with more children completing the challenge than in previous years.

"We have also seen the long-lasting effects of the challenge, as more than 100 children who signed up have now joined the library and kept on reading."

Chester Zoo visited a number of libraries to run a series of workshops to support children to learn more about nocturnal creatures or African animals.



When the opportunity arose at The Park Royal, already known for quality food and service, it represented a great opportunity for Dan to further his career and join Andrew Richards, Executive Chef.


Dan added: "We both share a passion for food and service excellence. My desire is to ensure a fantastic experience is had by everyone who visits The Park Royal. I know our

Residents angered by act of vandalism of bridleway

ANGRY residents have been left horrified by an "act of vandalism" on a bridleway at Appleton, Warrington.

What was an attractive countryside walkway has now been resurfaced with more than 100 tonnes of tarmac.

Local resident Bill Roberts said: "Local walkers, dog walkers were horrified at the outcome and we need answers as to why a local farmer has been allowed to do this by Warrington Borough Council?"

"It can only be described as a permitted act of vandalism," added Mr Roberts.

The public bridleway is between

Red Lane and Hillfoot farm on the Appleton/Walton border.

Mr Roberts added: "Instead of repairing the odd rut / pothole sensitively and in keeping with the rural surroundings the farmer has smashed circa 100 tonnes of tarmac road planings all over about 150 meters of the lane."

"When questioned he insisted he needed to do this for access to his fields!"

But a spokesperson for Warrington Council said: "The bridleway off Red Lane serves as a farm access road to fields."

The owner of the fields, which are farmed, has a right of access and

needs to keep the road maintained to a level suitable for farm vehicles. The Council has a duty to maintain for horse riding and walking but not vehicular use so would not maintain for the farmer's needs.

"On the last inspection by the Council rubble was found to be protruding from the surface and works were being planned to safeguard the public users. The farmer was informed and he noted that the rubble was the

base course of the road which had eroded down to this layer through use. He advised that it needed resurfacing and he was intending to do that.

"This event comes round every few years and the work involves scraping off the earth that has been carried onto the road by farm vehicles and the vegetation growing on it and surfacing to a suitable depth with a compatible crushed stone layer."



Should council increase precept to pay for PCSO?

STOCKTON Heath Parish Council is facing the decision of whether or not to increase the parish precept – the local element of the council tax – to keep a Police Community Support Officer in the village.

The council has been told by Cheshire Police that if they are to have a PCSO specifically allocated to the village next year they will have to meet the full £33,000 cost.

Currently, the parish pays one third of the cost of having their own PCSO and they have budgeted for meeting half the cost next year.

Chairman Cllr Peter Walker said: "We will have to make the decision of whether or not to increase the

parish precept.

"We do value having our own PCSO, but we also have to consider other items in our budget.

"If we decide to contribute only half the cost, we will presumably receive only half a PCSO. We are not sure how this will be done, but presumably we would share the officer with an adjoining area."

On the plus side, however, the council has been told they will not have to share their PCSO with the neighbouring parishes of Hatton and Walton.

The police have decided one officer will cover Stockton Heath and another will cover Hatton, Stretton and Walton.

Arley Hall's Christmas Floral Extravaganza

ARLEY Hall & Gardens is staging a Christmas Floral extravaganza from December 2-7.


