Editor's Comment

WE have to say that we regard the attitude of HS2 officials who came to Culcheth to outline their proposals for the local area as nothing short of arrogance.

An estimated 400 people attended the "information day" – about four times the normal turn-out for this sort of event - and the overwhelming majority of them were opposed to what seems an outrageous proposal

to close Wigshaw Lane permanently.

It will make travel between
Culcheth and Croft and Winwick
more difficult – virtually impossible on
foot – and will have an impact over a much wider area.

All for the want of one extra bridge!

bridge!

It would be reasonable to assume that most of the 400 people who attended the information day are not only opposed to the closure of Wigshaw Lane, but also to the entire plan to run an HS2 link through the Culcheth area.

But if the line is to be built then

But if the line is to be built then at least it should be built in the least damaging way to the local community.

It is regarded as a costly white elephant by many and nothing is likely to change that view. Yet all eleptiant by many and nothing is likely to change that view. Yet all the HS2 officials are able to say is, in effect: "If you don't like it, object to it."

The objections have been coming thick and fast ever since it was revealed that a spur line would cut Culcheth in half and little has

This does not mean, of course,

that there is no point in objecting in the next stage of the upcoming consultation. The more objections received the better and theoretically this should mean there is more chance of the plan being dropped.

But the manner in which the proposals have been set out so far does not exactly inspire confidence that local voices will be listened to.

ON a much more positive note, may we draw attention to a much smaller planning development which has just been approved at Rixton-with-Glazebrook. A plan for a new bungalow in the Green Belt.

Understandably, it was opposed by the local parish council simply

because it involved Green Belt land

But borough planning chiefs decided it could go ahead - and not just because it would remove an unsightly tyre storage building from the landscape.

We do not know who came up with the idea, but the bungalow will have a wildlife garden - on its roof.

What an imaginative idea and what a good way to make a new propoerty acceptable in the Green Belt.

Whoever it was, we wish he or she worked for HS2.

Green belt bungalow will have rooftop wildlife garden

PLANNING chiefs have given the go-ahead for a detached bungalow on land within the Green Belt at Rixton-with-Glazebrook.

The development can go ahead at Woodend Farm, Woodend Lane and will take the place of an existing tyre store.

Rixton-with-Glazebrook Parish Council opposed the scheme on the grounds it was in the Green Belt. But planners decided the scheme did not require the "special circumstances" normally required for development in the Green Belt.

Members of the borough's development management committee were told the science and building was regardly used for activities and parished building was regardly used for activities.

Members of the borough's development management committee were told the existing steel-framed building was originally used for agricultural purposes but had been used for tyre storage since 2000.

The new building would be a single-storey, four bedroomed property with a garage, carport and garden. It would have a smaller footprint and be lower than the existing tyre store and would have a rooftop wildlife garden. It was also likely to attract less traffic.

HS2 proposal will close Wigshaw Lane permanently

THE proposed new route of the HS2 railway line will make it almost impossible for people to travel between the villages of Croft and Culcheth on foot according to local campaigners.

The latest proposals from HS2 will close Wigshaw Lane at the junction with Glaziers Lane, between Croft and Culcheth.

The HS2 Golborne Link will cross Wigshaw Lane where no bridge over the line is proposed.

over the line is proposed.

Local campaigner Frank Allen says the road from Croft will turn and follow a new Glaziers Lane along one side of the line to Warrington Road. The road from Culcheth will be redirected along the other side of the line and also join Warrington Road.

Getting from Culcheth to Croft will involve going up the new road, joining Warrington Road, crossing the line on Warrington Road on a new bridge, and then coming back down Glaziers Lane to rejoin

back down Glaziers Lane to rejoin Wigshaw Lane.

This will make it much more difficult to travel between Culcheth and Croft by road, and practically impossible on foot. It will bring significant inconvenience and hardship to people in Croft who for example travel to Culcheth for shopping, medical facilities, schools, worship, and social events, an similarly people in Culcheth who travel to Croft and also to Winwick and North Warrington for similar reasons.

At the HS2 Information day

in Culcheth on July 2, HS2 staff estimated that over 400 people attended, four times the normal attendance at this sort of event, and the overwhelming majority were opposed to this proposal.

ne overwhelming majority were opposed to this proposal.
However, HS2 staff said that the up-coming consultation in September would be on these same proposals, ie without a bridge on Wigshaw Lane, and if local people still objected they should respond to the consultation saying so.

Parish councillors in Culcheth and Croft are strongly opposed to these proposals and have been making this known to HS2 for some

Councillors know their views, along with local MP Helen Jones.

They say the more people who make their views known, the better the chance of changing HS2's plans.

They are encouraging all local residents to respond to the consultation when it starts

in September, and also to let their local Parish and Borough
