# Saving for retirement: what's the magic number?

It's easy to push saving for your retirement to the back of your mind. Future events have a habit of feeling very distant, until they arrive. It can be a difficult thing to keep track of too; with nobody helping you along the way or checking up on your savings, putting a retirement plan in place can be a lonely experience.

The fact is, most of us are simply not saving enough to enjoy a similar lifestyle to our working days in retirement. A 'retirement reality' report from insurer Aviva shows that nearly I in 4 employees believe that retirement will be a financial struggle. There are plenty of legitimate reasons why we don't save enough — more immediate financial concerns will naturally take priority.

You can't save for tomorrow, for example, if it means forgoing your mortgage payments today. A lack of financial education also plays a big role. 85% of young adults, when surveyed, revealed that they wish they had been taught more about finance management through their school and university careers.

The Government's auto-enrolment workers' pension initiative has helped and there are around I million people saving for their retirement for the first time ever, as a result, but how do the numbers add up? The minimum auto-enrolment contribution rate is 5% of annual income, and despite more than half of workers believing this is the recommended rate of saving, it's far from it. The generally accepted figure among experts, if you wish to maintain a similar lifestyle in retirement, is a

contribution equal to 13% of your annual income. Some of this deficit will be made up by employer's pension contributions, however, we're still looking at a wide gulf between actual savings and those that are required.

Investment house, Fidelity, has devised a system it calls the 'Power of Seven', consisting of a number of savings goals. Ultimately, it suggests that to comfortably retire at 68, you should have saved the equivalent of 7 times your annual household income. So, if you were to retire with a household income of £50,000, you'd want a pension pot saved of £350,000. The exact figures will differ from case to case, so it's recommended to use an online pension calculator to understand your personal situation and check it regularly to keep yourself updated.

There are steps you can take to bolster your pension pot. It's down to you to take responsibility for your finances, and even small steps like being a member of the works pension scheme and using tax friendly Savings Accounts can be helpful. If you receive a pay increase, perhaps allocate half of it to your savings or investments and enjoy the other half now.

As tempting as it can be, it's important to foster self-control to turn down opportunities for frivolous spending – think about tomorrow and give yourself more options in your golden years.

## Editor's comment

## Disappointment over Green Belt plan

THERE has been much disappointment expressed locally regarding the decision by Eddie Stobart to submit a new planning application to create a National Distribution Centre on Green Belt Land at Appleton Thorn, while also appealing against the refusal of planning permission.

I suspect few are surprised at the decision, given that planning officers had recommended approving the original application, despite the numerous

concerns and objections raised locally. What is surprising is the speed of the appeal and new application - at a time when we are still awaiting the outcome of the borough council's Preferred Development Option (Local plan) - which we are now told could be announced by the end of March.

The original application was rejected for amongst other reasons, being premature - so I struggle to see what has changed.

One thing that hasn't changed is the ongoing pressures on our local roads and the environment with pollution and litter problems.

A few months ago the borough council went to the expense of clearing roadside litter on the roads leading up to the existing Stobart HQ. Sadly the litter has now returned and another clean up operation is required.

Maybe Stobart and other businesses in the area could show their commitment to the local community by helping towards the cost of clean up operations in the area, or liaising with the council to help organise litter picks.

I am not saying they are responsible for all or any of the roadside litter in the area - but we all have a responsibility to ensure our neighbourhoods are kept clean and tidy.

We also have a responsibility to try and protect what remains of our Green Belt land, particularly in areas which suffer from pollution caused by traffic congestion.

The existing road network up at Appleton Thorn and Poplars Truck Stop, even with modifications, would struggle to cope with any more traffic.

Each time I travel through the Poplars Truckstop roundabout at meal times, there is nearly always horrendous traffic congestion and you sometimes have to take your life in your hands to cross the entrance to the facility.

What South Warrington urgently requires is more health and recreational

If, and that's a big if, we have to lose any Green Belt land it would be much better seeing it used for recreational use and to meet growing health needs.

There is also a huge demand for sports playing surfaces in the town, especially in the south of the borough.

I recently heard that Warrington Town

FC now have to train outside the area due to lack of training facilities in the borough.

Wouldn't it make more sense for our council to invest in providing facilities in the south of the borough, where local sports clubs could train, than allowing more distribution centres and

warehousing?
After all floodlit 3G training pitches can provide a good return on investment.

At the same time Warrington Hospital is urgently looking to relocate some of its services to other areas of the town. Again I am sure this would be more welcome by local residents.

WHILE Brexit continues to dominate the headlines it is more important than ever that we remain positive in Warrington during these uncertain times.

Uncertainty is damaging to the



economy at any time and while it is easy for people to blame Brexit for various issues, the amount of time and energy it is taking up is clearly proving to be a huge distraction.

It is impossible to please all of the people all of the time and Brexit is clearly still dividing opinion.

While I make no secret of being in the Remain camp prior to the referendum, I now would just like to see the whole issue resolved as soon as possible, whether that be leaving with a deal or even a no deal. We certainly can't let the current

situation drag on and on. Whatever views our politicians hold personally, they must respond to the will of the people and if in the long run that proves damaging to our country, we all then need to pull together and work that bit harder to make things better.

Everyone needs to pull together for the sake of our town and country so we

can all move forward in a positive way. Positive energy will deliver positive outcomes – the sooner Brexit is consigned to the history books and we can all move forward together, the better!

#### Volunteer leaders needed to keep Guide units open

TWO Rainbow units and a Brownie unit are in danger of closing because Girlguiding Appleton is short of volunteer leaders

All Rainbow, Brownie, Guide and Ranger units are run entirely by volunteers and Girlguiding Appleton currently has more than 200 girls and young women as members from the Appleton, Stretton, Stockton Heath and Grappenhall areas.

They also have long waiting lists

for all age groups.

But they are desperately short of volunteer leaders.

District Commissioner Rosemary Wright said: "This is where you come in! If you can give a couple of hours of your time each week you could change the lives of girls and young women in your local community. You do not need any prior experience or to have been a member of Girlquiding in the past. You will be given on the job training and as much support as you need from other local volunteers.
"The roles we are currently recruiting for are:

Browner Leaders - A Brownie Leader is part of the volunteer team which runs a Brownie unit, a group of about 20 girls aged seven to 10. You will plan and run weekly meetings, and there will be opportunities to take the girls to residentials, trips and even camps.

Rainbow Leaders - A Rainbow Leader is part of the volunteer team which runs a Rainbow unit, a group of up to 15 girls aged 5 – 7. You will plan and run weekly meetings and there will be opportunities to take the girls out on exciting trips or even on a Rainbow sleepover.

### New bid for airport parking at Thelwall

A NEW plan to use a former nursery site for parking up to 700 cars at Thelwall has been submitted to Warrington planning chiefs.

controversial scheme been put forward by Cheshire Airport Parking Ltd and involves the former Caddicks Clematis Nursery in Lymm Road, Thelwall.

It was only last August that the borough council threw out the firm's earlier proposals to use the site for airport parking associated Manchester Airport.

Subsequently the council was granted a court injunction prohibiting the unauthorised use of the site for airport parking.

The original scheme was opposed by Grappenhall and Thelwall Parish Council, Lymm Parish Council and borough councillors Ian Marks and Anna Fradgley. More than 130 local residents also lodged objections.

Main objections related to traffic and impact on the Green Belt.

The new scheme involves retention of hardstanding on the northern part of the site, laying additional gravel for use as open air car parking, retention of the access and two single storey buildings.

New features including laying out a playground, assault course and public amenity area. Most of the other buildings on the site would be demolished and cleared.

The planning application states

there would be negligible change to the site and only minor visual change as the site is hidden by boundary

# Disappointment over Eddie Stobart decision to press on with Green Belt plan

WARRINGTON South MP Faisal Rashid and local councillors have expressed disappointment at Eddie Stobart's plans to press on with a new National Distribution Centre on Green Belt land opposite their existing HQ at Appleton Thorn.

Commenting on Eddie Stobart's decision to appeal against planning refusal, while also submitting new plans, Mr Rashid fears release of the land for development could set a "worrying precedent."

Meanwhile local councillors are also disappointed that they have not been consulted with by the logistics giant. In a letter to Warrington Borough

In a letter to Warrington Borough Council giving notice of the decision to go to appeal, Eddie Stobart Chief Executive Alex Laffey said:" I was, of course, at the meeting and whilst I am naturally very disappointed at the outcome, I respect the authority of the Committee to make the decision.

"The proposal was put forward to Committee with a full and robust recommendation from your officers and no objections from any Statutory Consultee, with whom we had been in dialogue for over a year. Our team worked exhaustively with your Officers and all consultees, to ensure this was the case.

"Nevertheless, some concerns were aired at the Committee, which going forward we will address.

"Some aspects will simply require clarification, as concerns expressed only needed further explanation. However, some of the matters will be addressed in the spirit they were put forward and acted upon.

"Warrington is now the home of our Company and we definitively do need this new facility, to strengthen and grow our existing activities in the Borough.

"To this end, I write out of courtesy to advise you that we have instructed our team to Appeal this decision, through the normal Appeal process. "However, we think it incumbent

"However, we think it incumbent upon us also to attempt now to work in a consensual manner, with both yourselves and your Officers, to make a fresh planning application, that can be brought to Committee in due

"This will enable us to not only reinforce all the development management issues that have been comprehensively worked upon and overcome, but also give us the opportunity to further evidence the credentials of our proposals to you, accepting some of the comments and observations made at Committee. We will therefore be in touch shortly, to brief you further.

"We are committed to Warrington and to growing our business in Warrington, creating over 730 jobs and in the longer term, even more. We would very much like to work with

you, to effect this vision."

But Warrington South MP Faisal Rashid said: "I am disappointed to hear that Eddie Stobart have taken the decision to appeal against the refusal of planning permission on Green Belt Land at Appleton Thorn and submit a new planning application for the site.

"Locally there is opposition to these proposals due to the loss of countryside, impact on local ecology, traffic congestion, noise and air pollution. I share these concerns. "I have real concerns about proposals which seek to earmark significant areas of the Green Belt for large scale development. And, I am concerned that the release of this land could set a worrying precedent for the future of other areas of our protected green space, opening the floodgates for further changes to our town's Green Belt policy.

Green Belt policy.

"National planning policy on development in the Green Belt is clear. This land should only be developed in the most exceptional of circumstances and it must be protected from development wherever possible. I do not believe that exceptional or very special circumstances have been demonstrated in these proposals."

Borough Cllr Ryan Bate said: "I have only in the past few days been contacted by Stobarts, or rather by a consultant acting on their behalf. It seems this is a new initiative and as the borough councillors for the area Mike (Biggin) and I will be listening to what Stobart have to say. I am disappointed that Stobart have not sought to consult with Appleton Parish Council alongside Mike and myself.

"Given the scale of challenges surrounding the development, it will be interesting to see what Stobart and their representatives have to say."

Appleton Parish Council Chairperson Cllr Sharon Harris said: "Parish Councils have not been contacted and as Chair of Appleton Parish Council whose residents and neighbouring residents will be profoundly affected by such a big operation in and around Appleton Thorn, I find this disturbing and somewhat disrespectful."

Local parish Cllr Gerry Palmer added: "It's extremely disappointing that Stobart's have chosen not to respect our Council's decision to preserve this large stretch of Green Belt. They made their overwhelming decision on solid, rational facts and planning law. Nothing has changed since then, and Stobart's still haven't had the common sense and decency to consult with residents or the local Parish Councils. It's a matter of respect.

"By their own statistics, around

60% of Stobart's workforce commute from other boroughs to their current facility on Warrington, so their promise of quality jobs boosting the town's economy is very much overstated.

"Profits for Stobart's is simply not a strong enough reason for the destruction of some of our town's last and very precious stretches of Green Belt."

A spokesperson for Eddie Stobart added:" We remain committed to

growing our business in Warrington, bringing jobs and investment, along with improvements to local roads and transport."

"We have taken a long, hard look at the comments and concerns raised when the previous planning application was turned-down by councillors. Over the coming weeks we will be consulting fully with local councillors and residents before submitting a new planning application for the National Distribution Centre."

#### Accelerated house building brings its problems

A CLAIM by Homes England that housebuilding at Pewterspear Green Road, Stretton was being accelerated to meet the needs of a growing population drew some wry smiles from local people.

While the Government agency was trumpeting the success of its agreement with house builder Barratt Homes in increasing the pace of housing development, local residents and councillors said the workt was breaching planning conditions.

Cllr Judith Walker said lorries were going through residential areas to get to the site rather than using the approved access point.

Cllr Sharon Harris said although it was accepted the problem would only be temporary, residents felt they had been "sidelined".

The development had not started well and residents were worried about what was yet to come before the development of 180 houses was completed.

Duncan Inglis, head of accelerated delivery for the North West, at Homes England, said: "Our strategic plan has set out the ambitions to increase the pace, scale and quality of housing delivery and our partnership work with Barratt Homes is an example of this. The approach at Pewterspear will increase the pace of delivery beyond the market norm, leading to more quality homes being accessible in an area that has shown strong demand.

"Working together to deliver 180 new homes in Warrington will provide much needed homes for the local community, 30 per cent of which are

affordable."

The project is due for completion in 2021.

Barratt Homes apologised for any disruption caused and thanked residents for their patience.

They said the approved route had been temporarily closed for safety reasons.

But the borough council launched a planning enforcement investigation and served a breach of condition notice due to construction traffic failing to stick to the approved route. They have also looked into noise complaints in the area.



# Railings need painting — and that's in black and white

STOCKTON Heath Parish Council is investigating who is responsible for maintaining the Cheshire Railings at the junction of Lumb Brook Road and Grappenhall Road.

The council has received a complaint from a member of the public that the traditional black and white railings are rusting and require painting and restoration – but it is not the council's responsibility.

Cllr Peter Walker said: "We are looking into this. It could be the borough council's responsibility or that of those responsible for maintaining Lumb Brook.

"But the complaint is certainly justified – the railings are in a poor condition."

Cheshire Railings, steel, painted black and white and with a gently cured top, are common throughout the county and are often seen at road junctions where hedges were originally planted.

It is believed they date from shortly after the Second World War, although they may have existed before that, only to be removed to meet the need for metal to make armaments.

## Why the bells of St Wilfrid's are silent just now

IT is believed to be 300 years since it last happened, but the bells of St Wilfrid's Church, Grappenhall are currently silent.

In fact, they are not even in the village – they are away at a foundry in Loughborough being refurbished after a successful £175,000 fundraising campaign by the church.

When they return, probably in June, there will be 10 instead of the peal of eight bells which has served the parish

for so many years.

Tower captain Mike Thomson said:
"The extra bells will bring about a big improvement and will give us some smaller bells which we will enable to train younger ringers – we hope to be able to train some children from St Wilfrid's Primary School.

Wilfrid's Primary School.

"We can never have too many ringers and with two extra bells we will need more."

The removal of the old bells was the focus of considerable interest during January as they were moved by a team of specialists and volunteers. Scaffolding was erected on the north face of the Tudor bell tower to enable the work to be carried out.

Mr Thomson said it had been hoped to trace relatives of a Grappenhall ringer who died during the Battle of the Somme in World War 1.

Second Lieutenant John Lancelot Smith, of the South Lancashire Regiment, died on August 8, 1916 and is commemorated on a plaque in the church.

"We would have loved to have heard from the descendants of John Smith – they could even have followed in his footsteps as bell ringers. But we have searched in vain and it doesn't look as if we will trace anyone now. However, we would like to dedicate one of the new bells to John Lancelot Smith and the other Grappenhall residents who fell in the First World War."

While the bells are missing, the ringers are keeping their hands in rehearsing at Stockton Heath and Stretton churches.


