Editor's Comment

ONE would hope the Draft Local Plan, recently approved by Warrington Borough Council is not political.

We should all care for all our Green open spaces, wherever they are, right across the borough, as they are our green lungs for a town blighted with pollution.

Despite taking on board the comments of around 4,500 local residents, the Labour controlled Borough Council has ploughed on with its plan to release around 10 per cent of Green Belt for housing and employment needs over the next 20 years.

I don't know what crystal ball they are gazing in to, but our needs now and in 20 years could be completely different on the back of issues like Brexit, a declining birth rate and the cost of living. In my opinion (and many others)

it is far too soon to start ripping up our Green Belt for more housing and employment, when there are still plenty of infill and brownfield sites available

all over Warrington. One of the biggest concerns is the lack of infrastructure to support these developments, not just with highways but local amenities like schools, doctors, shops and leisure amenities e.t.c.

When I was growing up in Croft the village boasted a Post Office, a convenience store, a gift shop, a hairdressers as well as the local pubs. Now four decades on with many more homes and families living in the village, the number of amenities have actually decreased, with no shops left in the village due to the way the world has changed - and who knows what changes lie ahead.

Will Brexit ever happen? Will HS2 happen? Will pollution continue to worsen? Will our highways become even more gridlocked?

There are just too many unknowns to risk sacrificing our precious Green Belt.

I go back to my opening statement - I hope the Draft Local Plan is not politically motivated, although if you look at the way elected members voted, it was only members of the controlling Labour group who voted in favour of it and while there were six abstentions within the group, they were all members representing a certain area under threat from development at



Peel Hall, which hasn't been removed from the local plan, so it would have been a bit like turkeys voting for Christmas if they had supported it. But again why only abstain? If you don't believe in something

vote against it and represent your electorate properly. Have courage in your convictions and stand against the party machines.

As we have been witnessing on a daily basis in national government -democracy as we know it is broken. I have always said and I still say, politics should never come in to play

at a local level. So here is a clear message to all elected representatives - represent the people who have voted you into office - because they can quite easily vote you out come the next elections.

Winwick man takes on **Trans Pennine cycle challenge**

A WINWICK man is set to take on a difficult challenge, cycling the 346km Trans Pennine Trail to raise money for Cheshire and Merseyside Blood Bikes and Prostate Cancer UK.

CAMPAIGNERS fighting to save the historic Raven Inn at Glazebury have appealed to the prospective developer to "walk away" from the scheme. They want to see the building dwellings. We do need to wait and

rather than re-developed for housing purposes – and they hope to buy the building to enable this to happen.

Originally developers Osborne put in plans to demolish the black-and-white building and build 10 houses on the site.

They withdrew the proposal after

an uproar from local residents. But the campaign group, The Raven Inn Community Pub Project, are still concerned about the loss of local heritage.

Spokesman Peter Sturman said "We were expecting the developers to withdraw the current application, after what they said towards the end of February. We are now expecting an amended application, which we await with interest.

"We need to see what comes forward, but we are mindful of what the developer said last month : 'It is our intention (subject to planning consent of course) to convert The Raven into two residential units and keep the front and side elevations as far as possible in the original form'

"But the history and heritage of the Raven is in the entire building,

not just two external walls, at best. "On the information available to us, at best, we get a facade concealing two additional

"In the meantime we urge the developer to please consider walking away from this venture and allow the local community to preserve the entire building for the benefit of the local community.

"We expect an amended application but we cannot afford to just sit back and wait.

"It remains our firm intention to seek to purchase the Raven and make it a community pub. We are very mindful to show the proper respect and regard for the owners of the Raven. This is likely to be a difficult time for them and we intend

"We must observe any current agreements that may be in place at the same time as actively planning to move forward with our community pub plans. While this is a delicate balance let no one underestimate our commitment and

our resolve. "We are currently working with an organisation that has helped, or is helping, over 1,000 community businesses. It has a 100 per cent success rate with regard to

cent success rate with regard to community pubs - yes 100 per cent. "Ours is a positive campaign. We seek no arguments with anyone and really want to work with all interested parties in order to achieve a fantastic outcome for the local community.

Solicitors for the Elderly (SFE) member urges local residents to check eligibility for LPA refund

Rebecca Stringfellow of Dootsons Rebecca Stringtellow of Dootsons solicitors is urging people to check their eligibility for a lasting power of attorney (IPA) fee refund, after almost two million people were overcharged by the Office of the Public Guardian (OPG) between 2013 and 2017. Claimants can expect to receive a refund of up to \$54 with any accurated interested

expect to receive a rerund or up to £54, with any accrued interested since the registration was made. So far, only 200,000 of the 1.8million people owed have claimed their refund, meaning that there's £77million still owed to customers.

To apply for a refund visit: www. gov.uk/power-of-attorney-refund. The exact amount will depend on when the registration was made, and claims must be made by 1st

February 2021. An LPA is an important document that gives a loved one the power to make decisions on your behalf when you can no longer do so. There are two types of LPA: a health and welfare LPA, and a property and financial affairs LPA.

Recent research from SFE found that there are only 7% of LPAs in place across the UK, meaning that place across the OK, meaning that millions of people are currently unprepared for later life. SFE urges anyone planning for their future to consider setting up an LPA and seek advice from a specialist lawyer. Lakshmi Turner, Chief Executive of SFE, said: "Whilst it's comforting to know that people are motion

to know that people are making provisions by putting in place LPAs, millions of families, many of whom may have been going through a tough time with elderly relatives, will have been needlessly overcharged.

"It's good to see the OPG addressing the error, and with the deadline for applications approaching, we're urging people to check their eligibility for a refund soon."

Rebecca Stringfellow said: "It Rebecca Stringtellow said: "It takes about ten minutes to claim online. You'll need the donor's bank details and a copy of the LPA, if you have it. If you need help or more information about making a claim, there's a Refunds Helpline you can contact either via Helpline you can contact, either via telephone on 0300 456 0300 or email poarefunds@justice.gsi.gov. uk."



Family seek bone n funds to help save

A desperate Culcheth family is urging people to become bone marrow donors and donate funds to help save the life of local man John Ollier who has been diagnosed with a rare blood disease.

John is well known on the local music circuit as the lead guitarist of Warrington's local classic rock covers band Black Thursday. In October last year he felt ill

In October last year he felt ill with high temperatures and 'flu-like symptoms. A doctor's examination told him that he had a virus, and to 'sit it out' with paracetamol and sore throat lozenges. After two more weeks, he was told that it could be tonsillitis and was given antibiotics, and on the third visit an appointment was arranged for a blood test. He didn't make that appointment, as on 4th November he was admitted to A&E in Warrington with a racing heartbeat and other serious symptoms. The next day he was

told that he had leukaemia, and was rushed to Whiston hospital in

was rushed to Whiston hospital in St Helens by ambulance. A further diagnosis at the hospital confirmed he had Acute Myeloid Leukaemia and would need three courses of chemotherapy over several months. At that stage he was very poorly, with widespread pneumonia and other infections, and no immune system at all

and no immune system at all. After the first course lasting six weeks he was out of danger and allowed home to recuperate before the next course early in January. He was home for Christmas, and he and his fiancée, Anne Daybell, were married in Warrington at the end of December.

more Two courses of chemotherapy followed, with some good news at the end of the third session. He was in good remission, session. He was in good remission, and would only need to be a day patient for a few months, and then three-monthly checks at an outpatient clinic for a year. However, the week before he was due to be discharged from Whitten his grave his

Whiston his specialist gave his family some bad news. It was already known that John had a genetic mutation that caused the leukaemia, but a further genetic test had flagged a new mutation, of which John's is a rare form. Up until then his leukaemia was under control but it turned out that the chemotherapy wasn't enough and now he desperately needs a bone marrow transplant, as soon as possible.

In his doctor's words, this is 'big treatment'. It's far more toxic for his organs, and there are many risks along the way which will be life threatening. His care will be transferred to Liverpool Royal Hospital under a new team of specialists.

John, Anne and their family are in shock, and completely devastated. "It was hard to accept the first time he was diagnosed, we couldn't believe it was happening, says Anne. "But now John is facing an even bigger battle. His treatment will be so difficult for him. This journey is far from straightforward, and far from being over. Without a bone marrow transplant the disease will prove fatal for John."

There are two other barriers to his successful treatment and adult children are being tested as possible donors, and either may be a half match, but a full 100% match donor is preferable for John. He's on the bone marrow recipient



register, but it may take time to find a good match for him. In the meantime, there is a drug that may help, which will inhibit the gene that has mutated, but this isn't available on the NHS for John's rare form of leukaemia. One dose, lasting one month, costs £11,000, and he may need several doses. It's been shown that it could help to bet him in a better position before his treatment, as it will curb the development of more mutating cells which could give him more time for a suitable donor to be found. This drug has also been shown to improve prognosis for recovery after treatment.

John is currently relying on a fourth (initially unplanned) course of chemotherapy at Whiston hospital during the next few weeks to help him stay alive before undergoing the bone marrow transplant as soon as a donor can be found, but time is running out, this is John's last

chance of survival. Seventy five per cent of patients won't find a matching donor in their families. More bone marrow their families. More bone marrow donors are required, not just for John, but for the 2000+ people who are in need of bone marrow or stem cells in the UK every year. Getting on the register is simple. If you're aged between 17 and 55, just register at www.dkms.org.

uk and request a cheek swab. This will be sent in the post, and you can do it in seconds in the comfort of your own home. It's a much simpler process to donate than it used to be, and donors are usually back to work the next day. The best match is a white Caucasian male, of which there are plenty around Warrington.

Warrington. As a family, they can't raise the £11,000+ on their own so they are looking for individuals and businesses to help save John's life. So far they have managed to raise over £3,000 towards their £5,000 target. To donate, please go to www. justgiving.com/crowdfunding/ john-ollier

Warrington's Draft Local Plan 2017 to 2037

The consultation on this starts in April. Information can be found on the Parish Council Website, on www.warrington.gov.uk and in Culcheth Library. There is a link on the front page of this Borough website to the consultation document. There is also a link to further background information through "planning and building control" further down the front page, and then "Planning policy".

Green Belt :- At the time of writing the proposal for Culcheth is for at least 200 houses to the East of the village, on land proposed to be taken out of the Green Belt. There are no Green Belt changes for Glazebury. We will be making a detailed response to the whole document.

Wider Consultations

Our Parish shares boundaries with Greater Manchester's Wigan and Salford and what happens there can affects us- as do proposals for land along the M6 in St. Helens. The main impact is on traffic through our villages and so we comment on their plans. Restrictions to lorry use along Winwick Lane are already having an unacceptable impact, particularly on Glazebury . Residents have formed a working group with the Borough Council and Councillors ...

We also commented on a national consultation on housing projections, as Warrington has to develop in line with national policy. We argued for the more recent lower figures to be used.

Government consultations are found on www.gov.uk/government/consultations

The Raven Inn - we are continuing to support the residents' campaign and prevent demolition. The history of our villages is important.

Law and Order- we are working with the police/ PCSO to address the issue of ASB in our villages.

HS2 - we have a new person liaising with our area. For contact details see the Parish website or ask a Councillor.

Smart Motorway Works Compound. There is a works access to the M62 where Holcroft Lane goes over the Motorway, but the works compound will be closer to Culcheth in a field with an existing entrance between the motorway and Hanging Birch Farm. The traffic associated with this will operate practically 24/7 so please be careful, look for changes in the speed limits, and report any problems to the Borough Council.

Publication of information

The Parish Council has adopted a publication of Information scheme. Residents urged to have their say on Draft Local Plan

RESIDENTS of the Culcheth and Croft areas are being urged to make sure they have a say on the proposals for the two villages the Warrington's Local Plan when it goes out for public consultation.

Consultation. Cllr Val Allen and Cllr Keith Bland, who are Conservative members of both Culcheth and Glazebury and Croft parish councils, spoke out following approval of the Local Plan by the baround council's avacuity bard

borough council's executive board. Clir Allen believes the level of building proposed for the Green Belt is too high and the proposed site in Croft will lead to more traffic in rural village. She said: "The inclusion of a

proposal to build up to 75 homes in Croft, in Green Belt, is totally unacceptable.

"Not only is this a large development in what is a small, large under-facilitated village, with limited public services and



transport, but a significant amount of the proposed land lies directly behind Croft Primary School.

"When my children went to this school, they enjoyed fields on three sides, with horses grazing - this is how they remember their school days. Several years ago a housing estate was built on one side, with houses right up to the school

boundary. "Today, the school enjoys this open vista on two sides and the children are settled in their school in a rural village setting. This is one of the reasons why the residents of

or the reasons why the residents of Croft have chosen to bring their children up in this lovely village. "The proposal to build a large number of houses, right up to the rear boundary of the school will have the effect of closing in the school on two sides, with houses overlooking the playground and playing field, leaving our children vulnerable during construction through to occupation.

'We cannot allow this to happen "We cannot allow this to happen. Our Green Belt is precious, and the village is under siege already with HGV's trundling through narrow country lanes, narrowly missing our children on footpaths that are hardly wide enough for a pram. This development will only exacerbate this problem and

put the future of our children and grandchildren at risk". Cllr Bland said: "I am opposed to development in the Green Belt – and in Culcheth and Glazebury

Cllr Allen will be seeking election to the borough council in the local elections next year. She will be joined by fellow Tory Wendy Maisey and together they are already consulting local residents about producing a response to the Local Plan.

House plan approved despite local objections

PLANNING chiefs at Warrington have given the go-ahead to a plan to build a house on an old garage

to build a house on an old garage site at Glazebury. Members of the borough council's development management committee approved the scheme in Hurst Mill Lane, despite opposition from Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Council and a number of local recidents local residents.

local residents. The scheme will involve removal of a group of three garages. Neighbours have objected, citing danger from asbestos in the garages, Japanese Knotweed on the site, highway safety and lack of parking, the risk of flooding, loss of

protected trees, etc. The parish council opposed the scheme on the grounds of the wider impact on land and existing watercourses to the south, the possibility of flooding, parking difficulties and the size of the proposed house.

Officers recommended the scheme be approved. They said most of the site had previously been developed and the scheme would assist the borough council in its aim to deliver 80 per cent of new homes on previously developed land. They said the site is in a sustainable location, in a residential

area.

Behind the scenes at television studios

MEMBERS of Croft WI were taken behind the scenes at television studios when speaker Judith Popley gave a talk on "My Life at Granada TV". Judith worked for Granada from

1973 until 1984 starting in the Press Office and subsequently graduating to production. During that time she met many of the now famous actors when they were first starting their careers and also her future husband who was a camera operator.

Granada television was founded by two brothers Sidney and Cecil Bernstein in 1956, who at that time owned Granada theatres and cinemas in the south of England, choosing the name Granada due to their fondness for the city in Spain.

They became involved in commercial television, a competitor to the cinema chains, through the launch of ITV. Sidney bid for the North of England franchise, which he believed would not affect the company's largely southern based cinema and theatre chain. The North and London were the two largest regions. Sidney preferred the North because of its tradition of home-grown culture and because it offered a chance to start a new creative industry away from the metropolitan atmosphere of London and of course he also looked

at the concentration of population in the North. They purchased a 21 acre brown field site from Manchester City Council located on Quay Street in Manchester for £82,000 and built studios and offices on this site, which, if the enterprise failed, could be converted into a hotel (actually happening in 2019, due to the unification of ITV and the move to Media City, Salford Quays). Granada transmissions began on May 3, 1956 and that was the first time adverts appeared on British television

Over the years countless famous dramas, quizzes and soaps were produced by Granada and Judith's presentation included very interesting stories and photos of her time working with numerous now famous stars including Emma Thompson, Kenneth Branagh, Colin Firth, Hugh Grant, Hugh Laurie, and members of the original cast of Coronation Street, plus many more. One photo was of particular interest showing Judith earnestly chatting to a young Cliff Richard!

President Anne Lamming gave a vote of thanks for a thoroughly enjoyable presentation.
