WARRINGTON'S Draft Local Plan has been approved by the borough council – but that does not mean it is too late for people to have a say.

We are now in a period of public consultation which runs until June 17 and alongside it is the draft Local Transport Plan.

Residents can comment on either by visiting the council's website - www.warrington.gov.uk/local plan for the Local Plan and www. warrington.gov.uk/LTP4 for the Transport Plan.

In addition, the council is organising six consultation events at the Halliwell Jones Stadium, south stand concourse, WA2 7NE on May 8, 14, 16, 20 and 22 from 2-8pm and on June 8 from 11am-

I would urge anyone interested in the future of Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft – and surely that means everyone? – to pass comment, whether or not they are able to attend any of the consultation

The local parish councils will be making their views known to the borough but their views will carry more weight if they are backed by the opinions of local residents.

As things stand at present, some 200 houses are proposed at Culcheth and 75 at Croft – all on Green Belt land. But as has already been suggested by some local councillors, this could be the thin end of the wedge. Major developers have their eyes on the area and want to build thousands, rather than hundreds, of new

This would completely change the character of our villages and attract even more traffic onto our already overloaded roads.

Do we want this? Most people

say "no" if you ask them. But when it comes to making that view known as part the official consultation process, all too many often can't be process, all 100 bothered or forget. Culcheth

Meanwhile Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Council's Community Day is just around the corner, taking place on Bank Holiday Monday, May 6.

This is a fantastic community event giving many community organisations and charities the chance of raising much-needed funds and raising their profiles.



Residents urged to respond to Local Plan consultation

MEMBERS of Culcheth & Glazebury Parish Council are urging local residents to respond to the Local Plan consultation whether it is for or against proposals.

The Local Plan consultation has already started following the Borough Council's decision to approve the Draft Local Plan and information will have arrived, or

will be arriving, on local doorsteps.
Margaret Webber, Chairman Margaret Webber, Chairman of Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Council, said:" It is very important to take part in this, as all comments will go forward to a Public Inquiry. "What happens in Warrington will be decided by a Government Inspector, in line with Government policies.

"This is about not only losing Greenbelt, and where to put houses and employment land, but Transport, the traffic through our villages and other issues.

"It is important not only to make objections, but to support proposals that you do not object to."

Cúlcheth and Glazebury Parish Council will be making a detailed response to the Plan.

Čllr. Webber added: "Our aim is to protect the Green Belt and minimise the impact of traffic on residents. We 'are already working on this with neighbouring authorities.

"Government planning policy requires that Councils produce a Local Plan covering a minimum of 15 years. We are disappointed that after a national consultation in which we took part, the government decided to use the higher 2014 figures rather than the more up to date, and lower, 2016 figures.

Information on the Local Plan is in Culcheth Library and Councillors will be there every Saturday Morning from May 4th 10.00 till 12.30 to discuss it and obtain opinions and information, or alternatively contact your local councillor.

Return of Croft Beer, Gin & **Prosecco Festival**


FOLLOWING the success of the first ever Croft Beer, Gin & Prosecco festival last year, organisers have decided to do it all over again in 2019!

Becka tells of her three-year 'amazing experience'

A MEMBER of the 7th Culcheth Guide Unit senior section, Becka Banks, recently completed her Duke of Edinburgh's Gold Award.

She describes the three year scheme as "an amazing experience" which she would encourage any young, motivated person to do.

In an article written for Culcheth Life she says: "I have dedicated three years of my life completing all three DofE awards - Bronze, Silver and Gold - and I wouldn't change

a thing.
"Duke of Edinburgh is made up of four main components: Volunteering, Skills, Physical and Expedition. Each of these components contributes to achieving your DofE Award and

provides experience for later life.
"For my Bronze and Silver
Awards I volunteered at my local
church café, serving hot drinks
and teacakes to the elderly. This helped my social skills as I got to interact with people who I normally wouldn't in my life and provided me experience in a café which now

looks good on my CV.

"For a change, on my Gold Award I volunteered at my local charity shop which helped me gain experience in a shop and grew my confidence as I had to speak to customers whenever I was there you have to do an hour a week but because I enjoyed it so much I

did more.
"For the Skill part I learnt how to play the guitar throughout all of my Awards. I had lessons once a week

and regularly practiced which led up to me performing with a band at a summer concert. This was a ar a summer concert. Intis was a big step for me as, before DofE, I had never played the guitar and performing to a mass audience petrified me. The Skill part of DofE is my favorite as it helps develop skills or be introduced to a new one. Skills can be learning a new instrument, like me, or something creative or even baking which I can imagine would be very tasty

The next component of DofE is the Physical section. I am not a very active person so I took up walking for my Bronze Award to help me train for the Expedition and also ease myself into exercise. Then for my Silver and Gold awards I went to the gym which benefited me in my Expedition part of DofE.

"The dreaded Expedition: the length and difficulty increases

length and difficulty increases through the awards starting at two days, one night for Bronze to four days, three nights for Gold. We plan our own walks (with guidelines ourselves and cook for ourselves.
This helped me gain independence
and a sense of accomplishment
when I got to the top of the hill with a sense of joy indescribable.
Throughout the Expeditions I walked in Snowdonia, The Lakes and Peak District whilst battling all the weather conditions the earth could throw at us. I met loads of

amazing and inspirational people and have made friends for life.

and have made friends for life. "I wouldn't have been able to complete this award if it wasn't for Girlguiding and Simon and Pam from Challenge Expeditions - a big thank you to you! I also want to say a big thank you to my family who supported me through this with all the highs and lows. The biggest thank you goes to Sara Isles, from Girlguiding Culcheth District who made all this happen.

She organised all this and helped me maintain my DofE (where you put your evidence to complete your

award).

"Finally, all I can say is if you're
14-24 and are yet to do DofE, what

are you waiting for?"

Police station to be relocated to nearby fire station

POLICE bosses have decided that Risley Police Station, Warrington should be relocated to Birchwood Fire Station.

The decision, following a six-week consultation, is the latest of a number across Cheshire in which police and fire services now share premises.

Currently, Risley police base is located on Delenty Drive, which is a no-through road in a quiet residential area of Birchwood. It provides a base for suspect interviews, meetings and for local PCSOs to book on/off their shifts. It also operates a help desk Monday to Friday between 10am and 3pm.

But it is no longer considered suitable for today's policing operational needs. The building is too large, it requires considerable investment to upgrade its facilities and has limited visibility and public

As part of the public consultation, police asked for local peoples' views on the proposals to re-locate Risley police base to Birchwood Fire Station, just 0.4 miles from its current location and to move the current help desk functions to

Warrington police station which is open Monday to Saturday 8am to 8pm and Sunday 8am to 6pm.

The police community base at Birchwood library will continue to operate as a point of access for members of the public.

Police and Crime Commissioner David Keane said: "The relocation of Risley police base will provide an increased police presence for local residents in a more accessible location. It will also provide improved facilities for officers and PCSOs to work from and conduct meetings with members of the public. The relocation of the help desk to Warrington will ensure local residents can access more services

during longer opening hours.

"As part of this decision, I have asked that the Constabulary put in place a plan to ensure the new police base offers even more opportunities for residents to have face-to-face interaction with

officers.

The change is also expected to save £493,000 over the course of 10 years, which will be reinvested

In years, which will be remissional into front line policing.

Assistant Chief Officer Julie Gill said: "The decision supports the force's commitment for a police estate that is fit for the future based and to have on operational need and to have a police service connected with its local communities. The decision will retain a police base within the local community at Birchwood Fire Station and achieve cost savings that can be re-invested into neighbourhood policing."

An implementation plan for the move is currently being drawn up.

Help Save Raven Inn campaign group stepping up activity

THE Help Save the Raven Inn campaign group is now stepping up its activity in a bid to save the historic pub at Glazebury, Warrington.

They are appealing to both the developer and the owners to work with them to save the Raven Inn and secure this historic building for future generations.

In the meantime they have to be

very structured in their approach.
A spokesperson said: "We intend to conduct surveys, within the community, to get a feel for exactly what the community wants from the Raven Inn of the future.

"We will start this off with a sample survey. It will be available both 'electronically' and via printed questionnaires, which will be available on our Help Save the Raven Inn stall on Culcheth Community Day on May 6 - please come along to chat with members of the steering group!
"Once we have collated and

analysed this information, we will hold another public meeting. We were hugely impressed with the turnout at the first public meeting, together with the mobilisation of the local community to help save the Raven Inn.

'As' part of our fundraising efforts we are also holding a car boot sale at Partridge Lakes Fishery May 27, so start that spring clean!"

Further details will shortly be published via the 'Help Save the Raven Inn' Facebook page and posters in the villages.





Rotary club members prepare for the carnival season

LOCAL Rotary Club members will be out and about at local carnivals again this summer.
