## Editor's Comment

### WELL the chance to have your say on Warrington Borough Council's Local Plan has now been and gone!

I do hope you submitted your feedback, because our precious green belt and green field sites are under serious threat.

With so many unknown factors on the horizon, with HS2, with some saying this project will never get off the ground any time soon, along with the Brexit factor, planning for the future is more difficult than eyer.

ne rurure is more difficult than ever. None of us have a crystal ball. But one thing is for certain our road networks and pollution are getting worse and I certainly can't see anything looming on the horizon to help improve these growing issues in this part of the borough.

While many see a North/South divide in Warrington, the whole town is surrounded by the motorway networks - so an accident on the M56/M6 in the south can have repercussions right along the network to the M62 at Birchwood and Winwick, creating traffic issues across the whole town.

So with the possibility of HS2 creating chaos in Croft and Culcheth along with possible huge new logistic centres on green belt land in the south close to the junction of the M56, we could face a huge amount of development in the coming years along with thousands of new homes being built on green field sites.

While I fully understand the

council has to produce a Local Plan, my fear is they are trying to deliver too much too soon, without knowing what lies ahead.

We certainly shouldn't be allowing any large scale development on any Green Belt land in the borough any time soon, because once we allow it in one area more is sure to follow.

Yes some small infill developments

Yes some small infill developments for housing will have to be tolerated but let's ensure every brownfield site and empty building is brought back into life before building on our precious green fields.

Local MP Helen Jones, has been

Local MP Helen Jones has been campaigning hard to have Peel Hall removed from the Local Plan to help protect the last major green lung in that area - but for some

reason the council is reluctant to do this, which is quite worrying to say the least

Development of this land would have a devastating impact on the local community and the road networks.

We need a Local Plan but we don't need more gridlock and pollution. Let's crawl before we walk and see what the future holds before ploughing up our fields!



### Surgeon in 500-mile cycle ride for child health charity

A PAEDIATRIC surgeon from Croft was a member of team of cyclists who took part in a 500-mile ride to raise money to improve child healthcare.

Harriet Corbett, 48 was among the cyclists touring six major children's hospital in five days who dropped off at Alder Hey hospital in Liverpool.

Miss Corbett didn't need to go training to prepare for the epic – she works at Alder Hey and frequently cycles there from her home in Croft.

Using funds raised via the "Thinking of Oscar" event the hospitals, including Alder Hey, will collaborate on innovative projects to improve child health care and well-being via technology with the

Speaking at Alder Hey Children's Hospital, having completed 200 miles of the mission, she said: "It was a special moment to reach Alder Hey and see some of my colleagues welcome us. It was a real boost and re-confirmed to me the importance of Thinking of Oscar and the need to help fund innovation in child healthcare.

"It's a big challenge to cycle 500 miles in five days, but we're managing the challenge well so far and really supporting each other along the way. We have some way go, but we're taking it one step at

## Appeal for witnesses after raiders break into Co-op store through roof

DETECTIVES at Warrington are appealing for information and footage from members of the public after a cash machine was broken into during a burglary at a convenience store.

The incident occurred at The Cooperative Food store in Common Lane, Culcheth, between around 11.30pm on June 9 and 12.30am June 10

The offenders broke in via the roof and stole a quantity of cash from the ATM and cigarettes from the store.

Enquiries in relation to the incident are ongoing and detectives are urging anyone who was in the area and witnessed anything suspicious to come forward.

They also want to hear from anyone who believes they may know who the offenders are or have CCTV or dashcam footage of them.

Detective Sergeant Tom Hall said: "We are determined to establish who carried out the burglary and bring them to justice.

Enquiries are ongoing and as

part of our investigation we are appealing for members of the public to get in touch if they think they have information or CCTV or dashcam footage that may be relevant.

"Perhaps you were in the area and witnessed something suspicious, or maybe you have CCTV or dashcam footage of people or a vehicle that may have been involved in the headers."

But there will be new attractions as well, including The Blackrock Llama Display team and clown act Bluey and Conk.


Towards the end of the afternoon the famous egg throwing competition will

### Overhwhelming support for Raven to re-open as pub

A SURVEY of residents of Culcheth and Glazebury has indicated that 90 per cent of people would like to see The Raven Inn re-open as a community pub.

They have also said they would be likely to use the pub if it re-opened – and 82.7 per cent of them would like to see home cooked food served at lunch and dinner times.

More than 200 people have so far taken part in the survey, organised by the Save the Raven

campaign group.
A total of 210 responses have been "positive" and only four

'negative. The group has also applied to Warrington Borough Council for the pub to be designated as an Asset of Community Value (ACV)
Spokesman Peter Sturman said they believed the council would

take their application seriously.
"An ACV will help protect the
Raven, help to ward off any future developers, allow us to bid for the Raven in any future sale and stipulate a six month moratorium to allow us to raise the funds to do so, when it becomes available to purchase."

The campaign group still await news of what the developer plans to do next. The original plan, to demolish the Raven and build houses on the site was withdrawn.

Developers Osborne and Co later indicated they were proposing an alternative that would retain the pub building, converted for residential use. But as yet there has been no second planning application.

Mr Sturman added: continue to call on the developer to withdraw and allow the opportunity for a community purchase

The group stress that their campaign is not simply about saving the Raven now, but for future

Aim of the survey of residents is to assess the viability of the Raven as a community pub at some time in the future.

The responses suggest the

- A total of 90 per cent indicated they would patronise the Raven, at some time.
- The most popular "service" would be, Home cooked food (dinners and lunches) on 82.7
- There were a large number of additional "community services" suggested, of which, being dog friendly, was the most popular, on 38.6 per cent
- The most popular food is traditional pub grub on 90.2 per
- There were 53, varying "other"
- food related suggestions A total of 142 people answered "they, or someone in their household, would be interested in helping The Raven Inn Community Pub Project" (66 per
- There were four negative responses and 210 positive responses, so a 98.1 per cent

positive response.

The survey shows overwhelming support for the Raven being preserved as a community pub. Within that there is an appetite to

there "Interestingly, were number of comments asking for the Raven to be returned to the pub it used to be. To reinstate the events that used to be a regular feature of

the Raven. "One "One innovative suggestion was that the Raven should support local "up and coming" chefs / restaurateurs, by providing the facilities and venue, via a "pop-up" restaurant. A total of 61 per cent of

respondents were in favour of this."
Mr Sturman added: "We are now five months into our campaign. It is a huge positive boost to see such an array of dynamic and constructive ideas.

"The resolve of our community is as strong, as ever, to save the Raven and preserve it for future generations. What's more, for that to be done by the community, for the community"

### WI walkers raised £200


MEMBERS and friends of Glazebury WI raised £200 for the Royal National Lifeboat Institution with a walk around the village.

Speaker was Diane Hawkins who gave a very interesting talk on a women's refuge she is involved with in Bolton. The name given to the refuge is Fortalice, which translates to "place of refuge" in French. It was first formed in 1977 when a young abused mother contacted the Samaritans for help. The lady she was referred to soon became aware that little or no provision was offered in Bolton for abused women and started to campaign for a safe house. Bolton Council offered a small two up and two down house, with very basic amenities, and 12 women and children moved in! In 2008 a new refuge was built and rented from Safford Housing Trust and with the a new refuge was built and rented from Salford Housing Trust and, with the backing of the Outreach Support Centre and Irwell Valley Trust, continues to offer 25 individual self contained units for distressed families. Art therapy is offered to the children and a Freedom Programme offered to the women who's ages range from teens to late 60's!. Three years ago Fortalice was granted the Queen's Award for Voluntary Services and, because the funding from Bolton Council has reduced, they are having to rely on fundraising and voluntary donations to keep the refuge running, the yearly costs being £1 million a year.

Mary Latchford gave the vote of thanks.

### 'Dog on dog' attack led to owner appearing in court

DOG owners need to be more aware of a relatively recent amendment to the Dangerous Dogs Act which puts them at increased risk of prosecution if they fail to keep their pets under control.

This is the view of a Culcheth woman whose two black greyhounds – Samba and Lexie – were recently attacked by a black Staffordshire terrier.

Pia Johnson was returning home from a walk with the two greyhounds on their leads when the "dog on dog" attack took place.

The terrier, which was not on a lead, ran at Mrs Johnson's dogs, running up behind Samba and biting him in the groin causing him

to cry with pain.

Her owner was calling her back but the terrier ignored her.

Mrs Johnson was screaming at the other dog owner to get her dog off. But the terrier then attacked her other dog, Lexie, biting her

shoulder. Both the Both the greyhounds were screaming with pain and fear and Mrs Johnson, who was still hanging on to their leads in case they ran onto a main road, was jerked back and to violently and eventually fell

The terrier was right in front of

her.
"I was terrified she was going to bite my face, which was at her level, as she was snarling and growling at me as well."

Samba managed to pull his lead out of Mrs Johnson's hand and ran The terrier's owner was trying, unsuccessfully, to control the

dog.
Eventually she managed to catch the dog, told her she was a "bad dog" and repeatedly said: "I will pay, I will fix it."
The whole incident lasted less

than five minutes.

When Mrs Johnson got home she realised both her dogs were injured – Samba particularly so. The wound in his groin was four inches deep.

Both dogs were taken to a vet who operated on them the same evening and kept them in overnight. Samba's wounds took 60 days

to heal and Lexie, who had nine stitches in her shoulder, took 20 days to heal. In total, the vet's fees were £3,000.

Mrs Johnson contacted the local dog warden and the police and the terrier's owner was subsequently prosecuted under the Dangerous Dogs Act for allowing a dog to be

dangerously out of control. The court imposed a control order on the terrier for life and gave her owner a 12 month suspended sentence. She also had to pay costs – although her insurance had paid

the vet fees prior to the hearing.
The control order requires Lily to wear a muzzle, a body harness,

both attached to a double lead not more than 1.5m long, and not be walked by anyone under age 16 in public for the rest of her life.

The owner has to attend dog

training classes and ensure her house and garden boundaries are

Mrs Johnson said the whole incident had been unavoidable had the terrier been on its lead.

As it was, the dog's owner now had a criminal conviction and her dog could potentially be seized and put down if there was a breach of the control order.

Mrs Johnson said: conviction was possible because of a relatively recent amendment to the Dangerous Dogs Act - dog owners should be more aware than they are of this amendment and what is means - which is that if you do not control your dog properly and it hurts or badly frightens people, or hurts another dog you can get in a lot of trouble.

"Dog attacks are something the police are willing to take proportionate action over now

"İrresponsible dog owners should not think (as many do) that just saying 'sorry' is sufficient no matter what your dog does."



### WI members learn about the birds and the bees!

officer **EX-POLICE** George Pilkington gave a talk to members of Croft WI about the "Birds & Bees." George had always been bees. George had always been interested in nature and while serving with Cheshire police gave in-house lectures on the subject and after retirement took up his interest in earnest, intently studying scientific journals etc. He now travels all over the country teaching organic wildlife gardening. He also designs bird and bee boxes, which have been shown on the TV programme "Springwatch" and programme "Springwatch" and have even been bought by Kew

Members enjoyed a very

interesting and amusing computer aided presentation, which dispelled some of the myths surrounding birds. Apparently we like to translate animal behaviour into human terms, but actually some long held beliefs are not actually true. For instance most people true. For instance most people think mute swans mate for life, but in fact they only stay together for as long as the female is tertile, once her fertility fades the male goes looking for a new partner. This behaviour applies to most of the bird population. Also many of our common birds are extremely promiscuous mating with various partners and even the smallest

birds are exceedingly territorial. George explained how different breeds of birds use varying items to make their nests, from moss, twigs, feathers taken from hawk twigs, feathers taken from nawk and road kills and cobwebs used to stick everything together, some nests can take weeks to build. Male Birds sing and female birds just call. The dawn chorus is when the males have the most energy to sing and the sound carries the furthest to listening females saying "I am fit and strong, know the best food sites" and the females can determine the males fitness to mate from these songs.
Interesting facts were related

regarding bees, in particular Tree Bumble Bees, whose activities are truly amazing. The queen will crawl into birds nest whilst the nest is empty, burrow under the nest material and during the night start loudly buzzing, which scares the birds off and leaves the nest for them to colonise! Numerous other fascinating bee facts were explained by George and President Anne Lamming thanked him for a most enlightening evening.
