Parish to oppose farm house demolition

CROFT Parish Council is to object to plans to demolish a 172-year-old farm house and replace it with a new house.

The proposal, involving Eaves Farm House in Cross Lane, is also being opposed by nearby residents.

It is due to be considered by the borough council's development management committee on August

The parish council's objection is based on the fact that work has already started, that a newly built wall is causing problems for a nearby resident and that a cobbled drive has been taken up.

Cllr Keith Bland said an earlier had application also been

opposed but had been approved. But problems with the foundations of the building meant another full application was necessary. The house is understood to date from 1847.

Croft Parish Council has raised the matter with the borough council, which seems sympathetic to the idea


successful at reducing speeds in Mustard Lane, near the schools.

Raven Inn designated "Asset of Community Value"

CAMPAIGNERS fighting to save the Raven Inn at Glazebury, have won an important battle.

They have been informed by Warrington Borough Council that the authority has accepted the 450-year-old pub as an Asset of Community Value.

This means any developer who wishes to demolish or alter the building must give the local community up to six months to raise the funds necessary to buy it themselves.

A spokesman for the campaign group said: "We are absolutely delighted with the decision made by Warrington Borough Council. "The council has obviously

taken time to both consult and fully consider the merits of protecting the Raven in this way.

"The registration underlines the commitment of the local community

to saving the Raven. It also highlights the commitment of our council to protect the unique history and heritage associated with this iconic building."

The application to have the building designated an Asset of Community Value was supported by 22 comments of support from the local community. There were no objections.

The campaign group also claim the developer who wanted to redevelop the pub site for housing purposes has withdrawn from his contract with the owners of the

building.
"Without doubt, this is because of the level and the quality of the objection from our local community, the spokesman added.

"In its 450 year history, this is a good day for the Raven Inn."






Continue to feed and water tomatoes regularly, making sure that the plants are evenly moist.

- Dahlias will be at their best now and will need feeding, watering and dead heading to keep them performing for as long as possible

The Local Plan and Transport Plan

This is the Proposed Submission Version Local Plan. This and the comments made will go to a Public Inquiry with a Government Inspector who will decide if the Plan is "sound" and complies with Government and existing local policies. This Inquiry could be next year- we will pass on details when we get them. The Draft Local Transport Plan, known as LTP4, does not have a separate inquiry but has to be considered as part of the Local Plan.

Earlier this year we joined with Croft Parish Council to engage a planning consultant to comment on the two plans. In addition to objecting to Green Belt loss, wider issues such as traffic congestion on local roads and motorways, and the environment were commented on.

HS2 phase 2b

A design refinement consultation is ongoing until September 6th. The 11 changes do not include the route North of the Ship Canal but we understand that discussions on the issue of the closure of Wigshaw Lane are continuing. The 11 refinement proposals include passive provision for two junctions at High Legh. This is to enable future use of the HS2 line into Manchester for potential Northern Powerhouse Rail services.

Traffic through Glazebury

There has been an unacceptable increase in traffic, in particular HGVs, since Wigan Council imposed a temporary weight restriction on Winwick Lane. A group of residents, Councillors and Council Officers are working together to collate information and consider options. The Borough Council has produced a traffic survey and residents have organised a leaflet drop.

The old Garden Centre site on Church Lane

Warrington Borough Council granted planning permission for 10 dwellings on this site in October 2016. The only issue remaining as a "reserved matter" was landscaping. At the time of writing an application for the landscaping, ie planting, has been made. Surrounding residents and businesses have been consulted

Over paid and over here – US servicemen in WW2


MEMBERS of Lowton WI were encouraged to wear red, white and blue at

Adventures aboard ship in the 19th century

SPEAKER at the monthly meeting of Croft WI was Ian Bellard, who gave a fascinating talk based on his great grandfather's journal "The 19th Century Sea Voyage of Joseph T Rowland.

This described adventures as a merchant sailor on the tall ship, the Cloch, from 1897-1899.

The Cloch was a three masted barque with a steel hull, used for carrying mixed cargo over long

voyages.

They set sail from Liverpool bound for San Francisco with 25 men on board plus two stowaways who were quickly discovered and returned to shore by one of the tugs. Life on board was harsh; the men worked a four hour watch followed by four hours sleep which must have by four hours sleep which must have amounted to an 84 hour working week. The ship's carpenter, cook and sail maker didn't have to work watches and were called "idlers"!

The voyage took 152 days and the ship docked in San Francisco for saveral weeks.

several weeks. Sailors in a foreign port were vulnerable, unscrupulous ship owners paid gangs to entice them off the ship with promises of a better life. Then their drinks would be laced and they would wake to find themselves heading out to sea on a different ship. Sailors were only paid on return to their home port so this saved the ship owners money.

Joseph sailed on the Cloch for two years, sailing to Port Elizabeth in the Transvaal and Taltal in Chile to collect a cargo of saltpetre fertilizer. He rounded Cape Horn four times, only once encountering a storm which nearly capsized the ship due to the cargo of grain shifting in the hold. He spent two Christmases on board, celebrating with a ration of grog, biscuits and cheese.

On returning home to Runcorn, Joseph never went to sea again but worked on the canals for the rest of his life.

Childhood travels with the Army

MEMBERS of Glazebrook WI heard a fascinating adventure story entitled "Childhood travels with the Army" from speaker Camille Bradford.

It began long before Camille was born, with her father, born in 1913

As a young man he joined the Salvation Army and later went on to join the regular army, and was posted to Egypt then Singapore and eventually Madras in India.

While attending Georgetown Methodist church in Madras he met his future wife, Camille's mother, whose family had lived in India for generations.

They moved to Rangoon in Burma to start their married life. However, shortly after this war broke out and life changed forever. To try and avoid the conflict, Camille's mother moved to Mandalay and was taken in by a New Zealand girl. During this time Camille's mother went into labour and after a long treacherous journey through the jungle she eventually arrived at hospital half an hour before Camille was born.

Unfortunately the Japanese invasion continued and for the first

few weeks of her life, Camille and her mother spent every night in a trench to avoid the bombing. They were forced to move on and all the mothers and children were taken to a safer place by lorry. When they arrived all the troops had been relocated and the families were left without provisions, forced to boil water and add an Oxo cube for sustenance.

They were then moved onto Calcutta where a member of the colliers' club took them into their home and looked after them. They remained friends for the rest of their lives. Their next destination was Rawalpindi in the Himalayas where the temperature was below freezing; a far any from Calcutta. Fortunately a far cry from Calcutta. Fortunately they acquired a sewing machine and made coats from blankets, and kept warm by all living in one room.

Eventually they were sent to Bombay to board a ship to take them home. But this journey proved to be every bit as dangerous as the previous years as the ship was hit by a cyclone. Everything was lost including lifeboats, and they were reduced to living on biscuits. However after many months they arrived back in Bristol where they were reunited with Camille's father

were reunited with Camille's father who had survived the war.

After the war ended Camille's father joined the military police, and the family, Camille and new baby brother moved to Brussels, where unfortunately they were burgled and lost everything once again! Later they all moved to Germany to settle for a

Camille's was an amazing story of bravery and strength, going from the luxury of living with numerous servants and comfort, to existing with

only the clothes on their back.
