Saviour of Rotary Club of Lymm a "phenominal success"

THE campaign to save Lymm Rotary Club has been a "phenominal success" with membership already reaching 26.

When Lymm Life broke news of the impending closure members of the community, including five former members, rallied ensuring the club, which has served the community for

84 years can carry on.
President Neville Davies
explained: "It is pleasing to report
the phenominal success following the announcement that Lymm Rotary Club was to close after 84 years serving the people of Lymm and Thelwall.

'A rescue bid was launched and together with five past members, a further 13 people have joined the Club including 7 ladies, taking the total membership to 26.

"The average age is now significantly reduced with most of the new members being 40-50 yeas-olds.

"The beneficial expertise within the Club has expertise within the Club has been further strengthened by the new members, who are all also very active with various voluntary groups within our area.

"One member has followed his father into the Club and another, who

who also followed his father, has been joined by his daughter as a member, making history for the Club by being the first three generations to become members."

Lymm Rotary Club was founded in 1936 at the Lymm Hotel, moving to the Spread Eagle in 1939. The population of Lymm was 8,500 in 1936 and it was thought that this

1936 and it was thought that this was not sufficient inhabitants to form a successful Club.

Membership of Rotary is based on Friendship and Fellowship and they strive to ensure everyone enjoys their membership whilst giving invaluable help and support to others – the Motto of Rotary being 'Service above Self'.

This entails volunteering their

This entails volunteering their time, talents, professional skills and energy towards improving lives of people in the Communities of Lymm and Thelwall.

The final move was to Statham Lodge in 1967, when it was a Casino. Members had to join the Casino to be allowed in for their

meetings. Neville added: "Owners Mr and Mrs Walker have been so generous

to the Club over many years and we are very grateful to them and their staff for making us so welcome and looking after us

Lymm Rotary Club erected the first Christmas Tree on Lymm Cross in 1952 and are best known for their Christmas Float which has toured Lymm and Thelwall for over

fifty years.

Over the past five years, this has enabled them to donate almost £50,000 to charities. They almost £50,000 to charities. They also traditionally hold the Senior Citizen's Party for 130 people, donated £500 annually to the Cyril Bell Award recipients Charities (including MacMillan Nurses, MacIntyre, Camsley Grange RDA, Childrens Adventure Farm Trust, Nathaning and Malanama) Alzheimers and Melanoma).

Youth Awards have gone to Lymm High School Young Musician, Rotary Young Writer, District Youth Speaks Competition, Lymm Adivas

and MedEquip4Kids.

The club has also donated to Contact the Elderly, Diabetes UK, Russell Trust, Porridge and Rice Kenya, Stroke Association, Lymm Youth & Community Centre, Flood Relief in the SW, Polio Plus, Jaipur Limbs and the Salvation Army. Neville added: "We really do appreciate all the help from our

appreciate all the help from our collectors on the Float, who are volunteers from over 20 local groups with over 90 helpers. Whilst not wishing to put anyone off for next year, one of our collectors wore a fit-bit and clocked up 9,000 steps one night, which shows the commitment they give to support all our good causes. We do put these people into 'Friends of Rotary' category, who are people not wishing to become members, but who wish to help us fulfil our commitments.

None of our Christmas Float collection money goes to overseas, we raise these amounts by other means.

The club also started a RotaKids Club at Little Bollington Primary School in 2017. Their first project was organising a Shoe Box collection, a Rotary scheme known

A French visitor's postcard from Lymm – "An industrial town with a lot of smoke!"



WHILE picturesque Lymm village is seen by many as a highly desirable place to live it didn't leave much of an impression on a French visitor in 1902.

Local postcard collector Dr Mark Cottrill discovered a card posted from the village by a French visitor which translates as: "Very little of interest here. An industrial town with a lot of smoke"

The card came into the possession of Dr Cottrill who discovered it on a European website.

Dr' Cottrill was born in Lymm 70+ years ago and collects Lymm related postcards and memorabilia.

He said:"It was sent by a French visitor to Lymm in 1902. The caption is interesting; my translation as follows:

"Very little of interest here. An industrial town with a lot of smoke"

"How times have changed!

He added: "There is a companion card of Warrington Park Gates (Golden Square) written by the same gentleman which gives the 1902 date.

"Many of the old postcards of

Lymm were produced by C.E.Arden whose shop, 'The Bazaar Library' was on Eagle Brow. However, his cards were mainly produced a

decade later.
"He produced a booklet on Lymm in 1913, dedicated to his mother, Mrs Wheeler, a native of Lymm who taught at the Village school.

"She led the singing in during the rebuilding of the Parish Church in the 1850s. Her father fought under the Duke of Wellington in the Peninsular War and at Waterloo!"

Fortunately the French visitors impressions of the village had little impact on Lymm's relationship with

three subjects.

Similarly, Amelia Smith deserves a special mention for her double starred distinction in BTEC Fashion to go alongside her A* in A' level Textiles; as does Abigail Bellass for her triple starred distinction in BTEC

Sport.



Lymm village centre blocked as lorry gets stuck on bridge

FOR the second time in less than a month a HGV brought traffic to a standstill at Lymm after an articulated vehicle carrying a crane became stuck on a humpback bridge in the village centre.

As a result local bus services were delayed as the bridge over the Bridgewater Canal in between the Bulls Head Pub and Golden Fleece was closed to vehicles and pedestrians for around five hours.

Local Cllr Ian Marks said "Yet again we have a problem with a vehicle being where it shouldn't be causing traffic chaos. There are signs forbidding access but some drivers choose to ignore them.

Historic site gets a makeover

THE theme of the National Heritage Open Day scheme this year (Sept 11-20) is "hidden natural heritage".

But one of the Heritage Centre team, Roger Hannam, realised that the historic Slitting Mill site was getting just a little too hidden.

He and a team of helpers gave

up their bank holiday weekend to clean up the site of the water mill in Slitten Gorge. The vegetation was making it difficult to see what was there and tree roots were threatening the structure. Wading up to the top of their wellies and sinking into the soft mud were volunteers from the Heritage Centre, Keep Lymm Kleen and Lymm Environment Working Group. Tim Baker from the Borough Council's Ranger Service oversaw the work and Paul Urmston from the Parish Council also helped with the clean up.

In the 18th century, the mill was used to slit iron bars, (imported from Russia!) into thin rods that could be used to make nails and cask hoops. In the 19th century,

it was buried under tons of earth to create a garden feature. The remains were rediscovered by local archaeologist Barry Johnson'in the 1960s and further excavated in 2005.

Lymm Heritage Centre is planning an exhibition about the slitting mill in the autumn. It is keen to see signposts to this important monument, which along with the gorge itself is a "hidden gem". Yet it is probably the best-preserved example in Britain of what was cutting-edge technology at the beginning of the industrial revolution.

SARAH Ali, age six from Ravenbank Primary School in Lymm has been crowned national champion of Medicspot's primary school handwashing competition.

She impressed the judges with a song about how to wash your hands

properly.

Digital health provider Medicspot launched the initiative earlier this year in a bid to encourage households across the UK to practise proper hand hygiene.
The competition

primary school pupils across the country to showcase handwashing by putting their creative skills to the

Hundreds of primary school pupils aged 5–11 from 158 schools in the UK took part in the challenge.

The home challenge was launched as primary schools closed to help prevent the spread of COVID-19 for all but children of critical workers.

Children were encouraged to complete the challenge while at home by making a poster, filming a video, recording a song, doing a science experiment or writing a poem, to name a few.

In their entry, pupils were challenged to get creative and include some key points about proper



handwashing, including washing hands for at least 20 seconds and frequently throughout the day.

Ravenbank was one of 10 primary schools who were awarded £100 to go towards school supplies including books, software and art supplies.

Dr Johnson D'souza, medical director at Medicspot, said: "It's never been more important to practise proper handwashing. We designed this challenge for children to complete at home to help promote frequent hand washing and help

rrequent nand washing and neip prevent the spread of coronavirus."

"We hope the creativity from primary school pupils inspires households to practise handwashing regularly", said Dr D'souza.

Appeal launched after high value bikes stolen during burglary

POLICE are appealing for information and CCTV footage following a burglary involving the theft of high value bikes and associated equipment from the garage of a property at Lymm.

Sometime between 9.30pm Wednesday 12 August and 8.50am on Thursday 13 August, unknown offenders are believed to have forced entry into a garage on Sandmoor Place.

Ancient Lymm Rushbearing tradition kept alive with socially distanced morris dancing!

THE ancient tradition of Lymm Rushbearing festival was kept alive with a mini socially distanced event on the car park of St Mary's Church in the village.

In a closely guarded secret, to ensure members of the public did not attend, a mini Rushbearing went ahead on a glorious sunny afternoon.

Lymm Morris, Parish Council Chairman Cllr Geoff Hawley and his wife Alison , Eileen Mundy representing the local history society attended with "cameraman" Rev Bev Jameson and event organiser Chris Limb.

Chris decided not to let the coronavirus pandemic bring another halt to the tradition after stopping it four years ago due to the rising cost of road closures before reviving a scaled down version in 2018.

Lymm Rushbearing was originally re-born in the early 1970's (having probably died out in the early years of the century, possibly during the First World War) and has been held on the second Sunday in August, although it has over the years been held on other days. For many years in the twentieth century Rushbearing Monday was a local bank holiday.

Ormerod's late Victorian history of Cheshire refers to the festival taking place in many communities on or near to the feast of the parish's patron saint - hence tradition of having the festival during the summer holiday period and close to the feast of the Assumption of Saint Mary.

Although the carrying of fresh rushes to church (normally on a horse-drawn cart) was a central feature, and the replacement of the old rushes upon the earthen church floor a very practical necessity in former days, this gathering of locals also involved festivities including not only the procession and Morris dancing but also sports, fairground stalls, and very full public houses!
