We and the vast majority of likewhere and the vast majority of inte-minded people don't want these people spouting their poison in our community – no doubt I will be called a dictator by some – but the groups and pages are part of our business – and I believe if all media

had similar principles the world would be a better place. Sadly some of those in high places have not been good role models but having experienced hateful comments myself and knowing others who have been on the receiving end of toxic posts and comments it is time to draw a line in the sand – and hopefully, this article will start the cleansing process.

I also work with amazing eco-friendly suppliers who also operate brilliant closed loop recycling systems".

Julia estimates since June 2020 over 2200 plastic bottles have been saved – "plus our products are eco-friendly and are cruelty-

We also stock a range of free. plastic free household extras, such as compostable kitchen sponges

and reusable food wraps". The Refill Round also wants to make refills accessible to everyone. "Even as a keen refiller myself I often forgot to take my empty bottles out with me or struggled to carry them all home when full. This way you can simply order through my website, refillround.co.uk, and I deliver them to you. Zero fuss and zero waste".







"We're lucky to live in a lovely village and we want to keep it that way, if we wait for other people to tidy it we could be waiting for years."

Formal clean ups have proven to be a difficult task within the area, Councillor Norman Partington, chair of the Croft parish council, said: "Trying to get anything done these days is difficult because of the austerity that's hit Warrington Borough Council."

"They've been hit by budget cuts since about 2010, we do really suffer in that respect and litter is a constant problem.

"People don't realise, they think the council can deal with it, but in a lot of cases, there's not a lot they can do because they haven't got the resources.

Parents launch appeal after teenage jogger struck by hit and run driver at Croft

AN appeal for information has been launched by the parents of a teenage jogger who was struck by a van in "hit and run" incident at Croft.

18-year-old Joshua Ainscough was struck so hard while he was jogging along Smithy Brow, Croft, the wing mirror came off the van and doctors feared he could lose

his arm. Now his parents Alan and Ellen are appealing for information from the public to help trace the driver and have already received reports that CCTV footage has captured images of a white van at the scene at the same time of the incident.

Alan posted an appeal on social media saying: "My 18-year-old son Joshua whilst doing his run was hit by a large white van on March 17 ground 16.25 on Smithy Brow, Cr<u>oft</u>.

"The van hit him so hard the nearside/passenger wing mirror came off the van, and the driver stopped looked back then sped off. Joshua was taken to Warrington A&E but due to the severity of his injuries to his right arm he was then

rushed to the Countess of Chester hospital as he had no blood flow in his arm no feeling in his whole arm and hand and the doctors were

concerned he might lose his arm. "At this point, they have managed to restore blood flow but he still has no movement or feeling at all in his arm. "I am asking if anyone has CCTV

or dashcam from the area to please come forward, also if anyone knows what buses that run the route on that road could let us know as there was a bus there. "The van driver swerved to pass

"Police are involved and they should be able to get the CCTV

from the bus company. "Any and all help is greatly appreciated and will if required remain confidential.

"To the driver come forward now before the police have to locate you."

Anyone with information can contact the police via 101 and should quote incident number IML-940795.

New package of the way at Cu

LOCAL councillors in Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft have reaffirmed their commitment to securing the future of Culcheth Library.

They say working with Warrington Borough Council will help deliver a package of improvements to the well-regarded community facility.

The Library was threatened with closure in 2016, when Livewire opened a consultation on its future. An initial meeting to discuss the proposals saw over 100 residents turning up to voice their concerns. Councillors Matt Smith, Ben Alldred and Jan Davidson, who were present at the meeting, understood the strength of feeling and were determined to retain the Library as an essential resource in the village. Cllr Davidson said: "There has

Cllr Davidson said: "There has been an exceptional desire by local people to maintain Culcheth Library as a resource for our whole community. Over the past few years, it has been heartening to see so many residents organising, supporting and developing the Library's resources and infrastructure."

Following the closure threat, Cllr Smith invested time to recruit local people to form the Culcheth Library Working Group, which later became the Friends of Culcheth Library.

Clir Smith said: "Local people have done an amazing job, organising and launching events at the Library, all of which have proved its value to our community. As a result, we were able to successfully lobby Livewire to extend the library opening hours in 2019, enabling more groups to meet there. Following the first Covid-19 lockdown, we accelerated the reopening of the Library by three months from the initial proposals. We stand by our commitment to Culcheth Library, and now we want to go further."

to go further." Chair of the Friends of Culcheth Library and Parish Councillor Alldred added: "For the past five years, local Councillors have been working with a wide-cross section of the community. This community focus has helped to shape a positive vision for the future for Culcheth Library. We are now working with Warrington Borough Council on plans to refurbish the building, both inside and out. We want to deliver a package of improvements to ensure that the library provides a resource for lifelong learning for the foreseeable future."

the foreseeable future." Wendy Maisey OBE, Prospective Councillor for Culcheth, Glazebury & Croft said: "I welcome LiveWire's commitment to investing into Culcheth Library. My colleague Cllr Val Allen spoke to LiveWire earlier in the year and put the case forward for more investment in Culcheth Library. Val was given assurances that funding would be made available and I am delighted that has happened.

that has happened. "The wider issue is that the Council has underfunded community facilities in Culcheth, Glazebury & Croft for too long

BOLD plans to restore a dilapidated building to its historic World War 2 roots have been submitted to Warrington Borough Council.

The scheme involves the former Glazebrook Country Club, in Bank Street, Glazebrook.

Street, Glazebrook. It has recently been plagued by vandals and police have been called to the scene to deal with antisocial behaviour.

But during the war it was a significant location for British, American and Canadian troops rehabilitating after active service.

Work has already started on tidying up surrounding land but the new application is to restore the derelict building to its original use as a rehabilitation centre for exmilitary personnel.

military personnel. A further phase would involve restoring the building – which is of historic significance – as a centre for the display of artefacts and military memorabilia.

According to the applicants, the building has retained its significance and still attracts many ex-services personnel and their families who visit to see the place

PARISH NEWS

Community Day cancelled This was announced earlier this year. It is a great disappointment for us and everyone concerned to have to cancel it again because of the pandemic. More detail was in the March Culcheth Life, found in magazine downloads on Warrington Worldwide, and in other media in other media.

HS2 In November/December 2020 we encouraged residents to respond to the HS2 Design Refinement consultation. Since 2013 when the first route for HS2 was made public we, working with CADRAG, the Culcheth and District Rail Action Group, and our elected representatives, have put in detailed objections to the Golborne Link at each stage. Reasons are the impact on residents, businesses, traffic both in our villages and wider Warrington, the environment plus underestimating the cost and the difficulties involved. We continue to oppose the Golborne Link and will keep residents informed at the next stage.

The 2a route to Crewe has approval, but 2b, North of Crewe, has not. At the time of writing we are waiting for decisions on Northern Powerhouse Rail which concerns rail from Liverpool to the other side of the Pennines and is tied in with HS2.

The Play Area on Culcheth Green

Refurbishment was the next stage after the Mee Brow Play Area, but It was interrupted by Covid. We are now returning to discussions with the Borough Council.

Reporting Please continue reporting pot holes, floading, fly tipping, etc. Use the Borough Council website, www.warrington.gov.uk or phone, or contact councillors, or our Parish Clerk. Note that occasionally everyone assumes someone else has made a report and in fact no-one has.

Law and Order

There have been some criminal incidents recently and again report them to the police as well as warning others. The police have been doing speed checks on our local roads.

Traffic in our villages

We continue to work with the Borough Council and Police to make improvements as well as opposing major planning applications that put more traffic on our roads.

Culcheth Library

A refurbishment is being planned.

Leisure Services

Parish Councillors have met with representatives of Livewire and Culcheth High School about the proposal to close the gym and facilities and made clear that this would be a serious and unwanted loss to our villages. We are waiting for their response.

We wish you all a better year than last, and again thank those who work so hard to make us safe. Take care, keep safe and follow the rules.

At the recent Croft WI Zoom meeting, speakers Linda Montgomery and Vicky Blackmore gave a wonderful, informative talk on the charity "Dogs for Good". The charity was founded in 1988 by Frances Hay as a result of her personal experience with her own dog helping her overcome her own disability. In 2000 a successful application to the National Lottery resulted in the building of a training centre in Banbury, Oxfordshire, which, over time, expanded to centres in various parts of the UK. The charity breed and train dogs to help adults and children with physical and learning disabilities, children with autism and adults with dementia. These highly intelligent dogs help adults and children lead more independent lives, at home and in the community around them.

in the community around them. Puppies are placed with volunteer families who look after them and take them to basic training centres which focus on socialisation to enable them focus on socialisation to enable them to become happy confident dogs and where they are taught to respond to various commands, including obedience, pushing buttons, for such things as traffic lights, pulling, retrieving, alarm barking etc. At the end of their training, which lasts approximately 12-16 months, they are assessed to see if they have the right disposition to become "help." right disposition to become "help" dogs and if not are found alternative homes, or they stay with their original

family. About 20 per cent of the puppies are found to be unsuitable. There are about 80 puppies in

Intere are about 80 pupples in socialisation every year and most are Labradors, Golden Retrievers, Spaniels or Poodle crosses. Linda, who is herself disabled, described the process of getting her own dog "Obi" in 2014 and all the amazing tasks he is able to do to enhance her independence do to enhance her independence. Such things as collecting the post, bringing the telephone, pulling off socks and boots, reaching items from supermarket shelves and much more, enriching her life which previously had been very limited, in fact she hadn't been out of her home alone for 17 years before getting "Obi". It's not just the dogs who have to pass a test in fact optential clients have a test, in fact potential clients have to pass a test to show they will be responsible owners for the dogs

responsible owners for the dogs. In the case of autistic children, Linda explained how owning a dog helps the child to get up and do things like feeding and walking, where, in the case of walking, the dog is placed between an adult and the child and both hold a lead from a barners around the dog Owning a harness around the dog. Owning a dog helps the child integrate more with the world around them.

Fund raising, so essential to the charity, was touched on, such things as sponsoring a puppy for £5 per month, making donations etc., and how, by giving talks, Linda feels now, by giving talks, Linda teels she is giving something back to help pay for the extremely expensive costs of training the dogs. Vicky, Linda's colleague who works for the charity, answered the many questions raised by members. Croft WI President Anne Lamming thanked the ladies for a thoroughly enjoyable precentation a thoroughly enjoyable presentation.
