
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Golfing Centurions celebrate!

History Group have written a new book on the history of the village - "Culcheth Characters."



Christmas Market cancelled again

CULCHETH's popular Christmas Market has again fallen victim to the Covid

19 pandemic.

The event has been cancelled for the second year running - as was Culcheth Community Day in May.

But Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Council is hoping both events will be

able to resume next year.

"Victory for common sense" as planners throw out Green Belt plan for new M62 Service Area

LOCAL councillors have expressed their relief after members of Warrington's planning committee rejected plans for a new M62 motorway service area and hotel development on green

Members voted 7-4 to refuse the

Members voted 7-4 to refuse the application for the controversial development on land to the north of Junction 11 – against officer advice.

Councillor Wendy Maisey said: "This is a victory for common sense and for the greenbelt in and around our ward."

our ward.

"There was a recommendation for the committee to approve the development subject to some conditions, so we are delighted with the result. Only last month we were elected on a promise to protect the green belt surrounding our villages

and we intend to keep that promise to our residents. We are fully aware that the applicant has the right to appeal this decision and will be keeping abreast of the case and any future developments. We will continue to work closely cross Party with Culcheth & Glazebury and Croft Parish Councils who also oppose this

development".

Councillor Val Allen added: "This development in green belt would have brought even more traffic to the area. We are still awaiting the results from the Parkside and Haydock public inquiry on the proposed developments, all these applications need to be considered together, air pollution is already high across the M6/M62 corridor without adding more vehicle movements'

The development was turned down by members of Warrington Borough Council's planning committee on the grounds that the very circumstances to building as the country of the for building on the green belt did not outweigh the harm caused by the development.

The development was opposed by Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Council and Croft Parish Council and there was a holding objection from

Altogether, there objections on the grounds of loss of Green Belt land, nearness of the existing Burtonwood Service Area (about six miles away), impact on local road network and loss of agricultural land.

There were also concerns because the site is located on peat soils which form part of the extended Risley- Pestfurlong, Astley and Chat Mosses which are said to provide a significant carbon reservoir to protect against climate change.

Officers had recommended the scheme be approved, subject to the HS2 objection being withdrawn and the Secretary of State not wishing to intervene.

It was estimated the development would create 228 jobs - although these were expected to be mainly low-paid jobs.



Old farmhouse to be replaced

PLANNING chiefs have given the go-ahead to demolish a Culcheth farmhouse and replace it with a new building.

Cawley Farm, in Holcrof t Lane, is said to be in a poor state of repair and will be replaced with a new farmhouse of similar size and design with a garage to the north west of the existing house and within the farmyard.

There will be a greater distance between the new house and traditional farm

Cawley Farm is not a listed building, nor is it in a conservation area. The remains of a former outbuilding or cottage will be removed.

The Parish Council are pleased to announce that Parish Council meetings are back in the Croft Memorial Hall, Mustard Lane on the 3rd Tuesday of the month. It is good to meet face to face with human beings (social distancing of course) again.

At our last meeting on Tuesday 15th June 2021 we had the pleasure of the Chief Executive Professor Steven Broomhead MBE of Warrington Borough Council attending to answer a number of problems that were happening in Croft village. Here are just some of the things that

Local Bus Service Number 19 which for the last 2 months had been reduced to every 2 hours this was causing problems for our residents travelling to shopping/work/study destinations. It is now back to every hour. We did press for a more frequent bus service in the evening.

Blocked Gullies - Recent floods have highlighted the need for gullies and drains to be kept clear, so as to minimise the effects of surface flood water coursing along roads and onto properties. WBC will provide us with schedule of work in our village. Interesting there has been more activity in the village over the last few weeks.

Footpaths - Two recent incidents on Kenyon Lane have highlighted what the Parish Council have been saying for a number of years, the danger of allowing pavement widths to be diminished by the encroachment of vegetation and undergrowth. WBC will look at putting our request on the 21/22 programme.

Fly tipping - Due to a large number fly tipping incidents around Croft village the Parish Council has requested to WBC that warning signs be posted (at its own expense) at locations where fly tipping has been a repeated problem. This will now be done.

Litter – The Parish council is supporting a local litter picking group with Poo bags, etc. They have just produced some findings from a survey they undertook in the village on dog fouling, which is becoming quite a problem in the village. What it did highlight that we do not have enough dog poo waste bins throughout the ward. We have requested WBC to provide more bins.

Finally a big thank you to Carole, Martyn and Merril for all their hard work and dedication during their terms of office and a warm welcome to our three new Parish Councillors Phil, Gary

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The No Hoper! Lockdon former Croft jour

LOCKDOWN meant different things for different people but for local journalist David Skentelbery it gave him time to write the book he had been threatening to write for years.

"The No Hoper" tells the hilarious story of his rather unusual school

story of his rather unusual school days at an independent boarding school for boys at Knutsford.
David, a former resident of Gosling Road, Croft, when he launched his freelance business, believes his parents chose to send him to Knutsford College because he was extremely shy as a youngster he was extremely shy as a youngster and they thought he would have an easier time there than at the local

secondary school.

They didn't realise they were sending him to a school that had been compared to Dotheboys Hall, the infamous boarding school described by Charles Dickens in Nicholas Nickleby.

His introduction to the school was to be thrown head first into a holly bush. He was ridiculed because of his unusual surname. He was driven to the verge of a nervous breakdown by a maths teacher. And he lived in fear of a

headmaster who used a riding crop

headmaster who used a riding crop to beat boys who misbehaved.

Knutsford College was described as a school for the sons of gentlemen. Its motto was "Hope is the anchor of Life" – which sounds pretty impressive until you learn that it was run by a

man named Hope


It closed in 1954 after a history of 27 years. David arrived when it was still in its pomp and was still there when it closed. He then embarked on when it closed. The line ellibrated on a career in journalism, most of it in Warrington, where he founded Orbit News Ltd, publishers of Warrington-Worldwide.co.uk in 1968, now run

by his son, Gary. A number Warrington business figures, or their sons, also attended Knutsford College, including John White, of the long-running John White sports shop, Barry Cooper, who founded the coach business bearing his name, Peter Himsworth, whose family ran a jewellery business in the old Golden Square, David Bate, the old Golden Square, David Bate, who ran a greengrocery business on Warrington Market for many years, Brian Bowe, whose father ran a men's outfitters famous for its oft-repeated advert "Tom Bowe's trousers down again" and Adam and Frank Lythgoe, of the Adam Lythgoe agricultural fertiliser business.

Were David's parents right to

Were David's parents right to consider their shy son a "No Hoper" and were they right to send him to Knutsford College?

David says: "If you had asked me


that on the day I started there I would probably have been too terrified to answer. But, looking back, it was probably the best thing that could have happened to me.

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Aldi eyes up Culcheth for new store



CULCHETH is being eyed up for a new Aldi store.

The village is named on a list of locations across Cheshire which the supermarket giant says it is studying.

Birchwood is also on the list – despite the fact that it already has

Culcheth and Glazebury parish councillor Keith Bland said: "I have been trying to think of a site in Culcheth that would be suitable, but nothing immediately springs to

"But I think Aldi have a policy of locating on the outskirts of towns or village centres rather than in the

Aldi says it is looking for 16 sites in Cheshire.

The company has some 900 stores across the UK and has been expanding rapidly in recent years, opening a new store almost

every week to meet demand from custómers.

It says it is looking for sites of about 1.5 acres, able to accommodate a 20,000 sq ft store and parking for 100 cars.

Ciaran Aldridge, national property director at Aldi UK, said: 'We have been investing in Britain for more than 30 years now, but we know that there are still areas that either do not have an Aldi at all, or that need another store to meet customer demand.

"Shoppers are increasingly looking to get unbeatable prices on their weekly shop without compromising on quality.

"That is why, more so than ever, we are keen to explore all opportunities to open new stores across the country.

A warning to fly-tippers

WARNING signs are to be erected at fly-tipping blackspots around Croft village.

The signs, which will warn offenders of the likely consequences, will be erected by Warrington Borough Council following a request from the Croft Parish Council

There have been a large number of fly-tipping incidents in the village in

recent months.

The parish council is also to support local litter-picking groups by providing

equipment, such as dog poo bags.

Dog fouling has been identified as an increasing problem in Croft and one of the causes is said to be a shortage of dog poo waste bins. The borough council is to be asked to provide more.

Planners reject mobile 'phone mast

PLANS for a 25m high mobile off Spring Lane, Croft, have been thrown out by planning chiefs.
The application by WHP Telecoms, of Leeds, led to objections

from nearby residents and farmers.

It would have involved a 25m high lattice tower mounted on a concrete base with six antenna apartures and four dishes.

apartures and four dishes.

Objectors claimed the development was inappropriate in the Green Belt, would be a "blot on the landscape" was too close to residential properties and would be a health hazard.

One objector said: "We have

the M62, landfill by Silver Lane, HMP Risley and the proposed HS2 in our area. Another eyesore and increased traffic while building the proposed mobile 'phone mast is not what we want in our local area."

Another said: "This proposed

tower is too close to the road, the neighbouring farm and an eye-sore to people walking and driving past. A more suitable position should be found that's less intrusive.

The plan was rejected because the proposed tower, because of its location on the highway, did not represent permitted development.



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Parishes concern over ongoing traveller problems

MEMBERS of Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Coucil, Croft Parish Council and Birchwood Town Council have all expressed concern at continuing encampments on Silver Lane, Risley, by groups of travellers.

Cllr Keith Bland, chairman of Croft Parish Council and a member of Culcheth and Glazebury, said: "Something has got to be done. It really has got to stop.

"No sooner has one group of travellers moved on than another arrives. And what is particularly annoying is that after each group moves on, the borough is left with a bill of around £1,000 to clean

"We were surprised to hear that one group of travellers was given temporary position by the borough to stay on the site because of non-Covid health issues

"This is an issue that has been dragging on since for years and it isn't going to be solved until the borough council finds an official site where travellers can stay.

"We realise it is a difficult problem to solve, but the borough

council says it needs more time to solve it. How much time do they need? It has been dragging on for 15 years and we are still nowhere

near solving the problem."

The Silver Lane site has been protected by a barrier to keep travellers out for some years. But it is repeatedly broken - and borough chiefs say they can do nothing about it until someone is actually

caught in the act of breaking it. Cllr Bland retorted: "It baffles me - the barrier is broken and there is a group of people on the site. It is pretty obvious who has caused the damåge - yet nothing is done.

One possibility being considered by the parishes is a more secure barrier to prevent unauthorised entrance to Silver Lane.



HS2: More consultation pledged - but it's still coming

HS2 Ltd - the company driving forward the controversial high speed railway set to cut through the Culcheth and Croft areas -have again pledged to consult with local people throughout the process.

As well as leaflets sent to local councillors and other residents, there will be more consultation events at Culcheth Library. But no indication has yet been given of when the events will take

Local campaigners, including Culcheth and Glazebury Parish

Council and CADRAG - the Culcheth and District Rail Action Group - are still hoping that the Golborne Spur, the off-shoot of the main HS2 line, might still be withdrawn from the scheme.

They believe there is no proven case supporting the controversial spur, which would cause immense environmental damage in the Culcheth area.

But Cllr Keith Bland, after studying the new leaflets, said:
"There is nothing to suggest

"There is nothing to suggest that the Golborne Spur is to be dropped."

Campaign spokesman Peter

Sturman said: "'The support from our local and national politicians

has been strong and unwavering.
"As we continue the fight to save the Rayen it is very important to have that cross party support. It both helps to bolster our resolve and emphasises the total strength of feeling, across the board, that the Raven must be saved.

Controversial plans to demolish the pub, which dates from 1562, and build houses on the site, have been submitted but are still being considered by the borough council's planning department.

Mr Sturman added: "The wait

continues. The campaign goes on. As we await the decision of the planning department the resolve of our local community remains

as strong now as it was when the campaign started in January 2019.
"It is right that this application is determined by the development management committee in the event of planning officers recommending approval."

It is an extremely popular app where neighbours can report on news and events in their local area, find local tradesmen, report lost pets and basically communicate with each other. During the pandemic it has been a godsend for many vulnerable people unable to leave their homes.

Members were shown a video of how the app can help, where a black man moved into a white neighbourhood in the US and felt awkward and isolated. He posted on Nextdoor and had an immediate response from his neighbours and became integrated and felt welcomed into the community.

Sarah was pleased to answer a number of pertinent questions from members and at the end of her talk president Anne Lamming thanked her for allocating time in her extremely busy schedule to talk to Croft WI.

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
