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# Litter picking heroes break record collecting over 300 bags of rubbish

WARRINGTON'S litter picking heroes broke some new records recently, collecting over 300 bags of rubbish over two weekends!

Litter picking networks across the town now have more than 1,500 members and were recently joined by local Warrington Borough councillors and council officers.

It follows on from last year's "September 2020 Spring Clean". Yes, that's right, the Spring Clean . Yes, that's right, the Spring Clean was held in autumn, having been delayed by Covid-19 lockdown. Warrington held a cross-town litter pick which extended for 9 miles, from Whittle Hall to Grappenhall. You may also remember that the six teams of three volunteers gathered 60 bags of litter.

teams of three volunteers gathered 60 bags of litter.

This year for the 2021 Great British Spring Clean (a Spring Clean held in Summer – it is getting better), Warrington's litter picking groups organised three events. For Covid safety these were all open to the public by pre-booking only and used small, socially distanced teams for Covid safety.

The first was the Sankey Canal pick on Saturday June 5th, which extended for 15 miles along the full length of the Sankey Canal. The Sankey Canal extends from Carr Mill Dam in St Helens, via Winwick and the Sankey Valley Trail through Warrington to Sankey Bridges, then runs alongside the Trans Pennine Trail all the way to Spike Island in Widnes. A total of 9 teams (including two small cycling litter the property of the same for the Warrington and the same for the same teams (including two small cycling litter teams) from Warrington and St Helens, tidied the whole distance over three days. Most of those teams came from Warrington, organised by Clean Up My Community Warrington and its allied local Litter Networks teams (see litternetworks. org). A total of 160 bags of litter were collected, of which 102 were from the Warrington teams, so the final score was Warrington 102, St Helens 58. Special same-day bag collection was organised by the council.

On Saturday June 12th a second On Saturday June 12 in a second Cross Town pick was organised, this time from Birchwood to Walton. This was planned to be a continuous 9 mile route, largely traffic free extending through traffic free extending through parks and green spaces including Birchwood Forest Park, Victoria Park and the TPT. As well as the 32 volunteers in the six Litter Networks teams (gathering 42 bags of litter), other independent local teams contributed on the same day – these were Walton Parish Council

(6 bags) and Friends of Gorse Covert Mounds (10 bags). This extended the distance from near Junction 11 of the M62 towards the village of Moore, around 11 miles and the total of 58 bags of litter. Litter collection by WBC was pre-arranged – the organisers really appreciate their support!

Finally, on Sunday 13th June, Warrington Town Centre Loop a varrington town Centre Loop pick took place. Five more teams assembled before 8am (when traffic was quietest), and each tidied one section of a 10km town centre loop. The 42 volunteers had booked in advance through litternetworks organd came from had booked in advance through litternetworks.org and came from literally all over town, with large local contingents from Fairfield and Howley and Orford. The route included parts of the Mersey Way, Church St, Manchester Rd, Marsh House Lane, Cabul Close (Terry Flaherty's team of volunteers gathered 40 bags here), Battersby Iane. Lythaoes Lane. Orford Lane, gamered 40 bags nere), Battersby Lane, Lythgoes Lane, Orford Lane, Longford St, Kerfoot St, Folly Lane, Bewsey Road, Froghall Lane and Sankey St back to Riverside Retail Park. In total 141 bags of litter were collected, plus many filler were collected, plus individuals for filly-tipped items. Again same-day bag collection was supported by WBC preventing the waste from becoming a magnet for further rubbish.

The local litter picking movement is now growing apace from Clean Up My Community Warrington's (CUMCW) origins in Westbrook to an increasing number (currently 17) of Litter Network groups across the town now with over 1500 members. At the micro-level, these local pages encourage coordinated solo picks, or adopting a street, but also enable small groups to combine for larger events like these. Providing flexibility to make litter picking fit individuals day. litter picking fit into individuals' day to day lifestyles, while providing the means to coordinate and collaborate the clean-up of each

area of the borough.

Potential volunteers, please note organisers hope to return to the town centre early one Sunday in July and are considering routes

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
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
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# All the world's a stage for aspiring actress

The final podium place went to Warrington, claiming third place with a score of 6.9. Located in the North West of England, nestled between the major urban centres of Manchester and Liverpool, Warrington is an unassuming entrant to the list.

Methodology
SupplementPlace wanted to find out which towns and cities are the most chilled-out places in the UK, crowning the winner as the country's "Zen Capital".

To do this, they first built a list of

the 50 UK towns and cities with the highest populations using official

data sources.

Next, they used ONS data to find how well the locations on their list ranked for quality of life factors such as happiness, life satisfaction

and anxiety.

They also used these figures to calculate the rate of change since the figures from five years ago, which were available in the same data set.

They also found the number of annual Google searches for several keywords which relate to the ideas of peacefulness, calm, and 'zen", using Google Ads Keyword

The keywords used were "green spaces", "meditation", "parks near me", and "yoga". Once they had the figures for each of these search terms, they divided the search volumes by the populations of each volumes by the populations of each

city to give a proportionate score.

Finally, they gave each town and city a normalised score out of ten for each factor, before taking an average score across all of the factors. This allowed them to produce an overall ranking and crown one location as the UK's zen

capital.

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

## Future secure for historic Drill Hall

THE long-term future of the historic Drill Hall which is part of Warrington's Town Hall complex now seems secure following a decision by borough planners.

Members of Warrington borough council's development management committee have given the go-ahead for the re-roofing of the Grade 1 Listed building which is part of the East Annex of the Town Hall.

They were told urgent work was necessary to prevent water leaking into the building, which was used by the military until 1975 when it was taken over by the council.

In recent years the Drill Hall has been considered for conversion to

a theatre but the proposal never went ahead and it remains in use for offices and storage by the council.

Warrington Town Hall was built in 1750 as a family home for successful businessman Thomas Patten. It was regarded as the finest building of its type and period in what was then Lancashire

It was purchased by the borough council for use as a Town Hall in

1872. Its grounds became Bank Park.

The Drill Hall was built in the late 19th century as the headquarters of the 1st Volunteer Battalion of the South Lancashire Regiment. It was decommissioned around when the successor regiment, the 5th/8th (Volunteer) Battalion The King's Regiment moved to Peninsula Barracks at Orford.

The roof of the building will be re-slated to match the existing roof which is now letting in rain. There will also be a heritage-approved will also be a nerriage-approved glazed roof light system and new rainwater goods. The scheme has been drawn up by the council itself. Planning officers recommended the scheme go ahead and were confident the work would not cause

confident the work would not cause harm to the structure and would

"This will include guidance on how people can keep themselves and others safe as restrictions ease and life starts to return to normal, as well as myth-busting and providing factual information to ensure people know the facts about the vaccine and how it will benefit their health.

The Champions will form a vital link with people who may have been disproportionately affected by COVID-19 and the feedback they receive will be used to develop ways of supporting those in greatest need."

A range of materials will be provided for Community Champions

to use to communicate timely and accurate information and they will receive relevant training and regular updates so they are able to support communities.

Thara Raj, Warrington's Director of public health, said: "Over the last year, our priority has been to protect our residents as much as possible, providing clear and up-to-date information, particularly to those most at risk from the virus.

The new Community Champions have really hit the ground running and will be a fantastic resource to expand on this work, which will help us to reach more people who may be worried or concerned and need a little extra guidance or support.

"We know so far the vaccine roll-out in Warrington has been a resounding success, but we also know that for each eligible cohort, there are some communities and residents that we struggle to reach.

# Working from home, how this affects expenses

Last month we looked at how the Covid-19 lockdown has changed the way that many of us work, and how this has affected the expenses that employees can claim against tax. This month we will look at other expenses. Firstly, however, remember that where employees work from home as part of a home working policy, an employer can pay an un-receipted allowance of up to £6 per week (£26 per month) from 6 April 2020 to cost the additional costs of working from home, where certain tests are met. Alternatively, HMRC has confirmed that employees may claim tax relief to the same value directly from HMRC while the current situation continues. For further details please refer to our article last month.

Now let us look at some other items that may be of interest.

#### **Equipment costs**

There is a specific tax exemption applying to 'employer-provided' supplies and services in the employee's home. The exemption applies where, firstly, the sole purpose for the provision is to enable the employees to perform the duties of their employment and, secondly, any private use is insignificant. 'Employer-provided' means the employer arranges and pays for the item (ie, monitors, keyboards, desks and chairs, etc) and the equipment always remains the property of the employer. If ownership is transferred to employees, a taxable benefit will arise.

Ordinarily, where any items are purchased by employees and the cost is reimbursed by the employer then this exemption would not apply and the reimbursement would

be taxable. However, in May 2020, the Treasury announced the introduction of a temporary tax and national insurance contribution (NIC) exemption that will cover any home office equipment purchased by employees and reimbursed by employers as a result of the coronavirus pandemic. This measure applies retrospectively from 16 March 2020, but ceased at the end of the 2020/21 tax year.

To be eligible the reimbursed expenditure must meet two conditions. Firstly, the equipment is obtained for the sole purpose of enabling the employee to work from home as a result of the coronavirus outbreak, and secondly, the provision of the equipment would have been exempt from income tax under the existing exemption had it been provided directly to the employee.

Under this temporary exemption, a taxable benefit will not arise if the equipment is retained by the employee rather than being given to their employer.

### Mobile phone costs

As employees will not have access to their work phone, they may have to use their mobile phones more frequently during 2020/21. Where the mobile phone has been provided by the business, and the contract is between the employer and supplier, no taxable benefit arises.

Where employees are using their personal mobile phone then:

 where an employee is claiming for itemised business calls, texts and data only (and this is evidenced), the cost reimbursed is not taxable;

- where an employee is claiming for their fixed call plan (say £30 all-inclusive calls, data, etc), the cost will always be taxable;
- where an employee is claiming for costs over and above the fixed call plan, if they can demonstrate that the additional cost relates to 100% business use, the cost reimbursed is not taxable:
- where there is no justification for the costs being claimed, and so the business use and personal use cannot be determined, the total claim will be taxable through payroll.

## **Broadband**

If an employee needs a broadband connection installed as a result of needing to work from home during the pandemic, and the business arranges this, then any costs are tax free. However, for employees that have an existing broadband connection, if it is not possible to split the business use and personal use, any reimbursement will give rise to a taxable benefit, and the whole payment will be taxable. As with mobile phones, if the employee can split their bill and claim only for the business use element, eg, additional data requirements, etc, a reimbursement can be made with no tax implications.

#### Unused company cars

HMRC originally took a firm line on cars, saying that a benefit in kind continues as they remain available for private use during the Covid-19 lockdown if they are still with the employee (regardless of whether or not the car is actually used). However, during the coronavirus pandemic, where a hire contract

has expired, HMRC will accept that the benefit ceases immediately if the keys are returned to the employer/ hire company (at the employer's instruction) so that it cannot be driven

## Employer-provided Covid-19 testing for employees

The costs of such tests are not to be treated as a benefit liable to tax and NIC. Similarly, the cost of PPE provided to employees relating to their work is non-taxable and need not be reported on P11Ds. In contrast, where employers reimburse the costs of a normal flu vaccination, this is a taxable benefit in kind that must be reported.

## Travel and subsistence expenses - temporary workplaces

HMRC has advised that if an employee was furloughed when they were travelling to a temporary workplace, the period of furlough is classed as a period of continuous work. A period of working from home will also be classed as a period of continuous work – ie, the clock continues to run for the 24-month test.

However, the workplace stops being temporary from the date that attendance there is expected to be more than 24 months. Tax and NICs will then become liable and reportable on any payments of travel and subsistence expenses.

## Death of Warrington born Australian Immortal Bobby Fulton

WARRINGTON born Australian Rugby League legend Bobby Fulton has died after a short and private battle with cancer, aged 74.

One of the original four Aussie Immortals, Fulton was born in Stockton Heath before moving to Australia with his family.

Following the 1969 NSWRFL season after a decade with Manly-NSWRFL Warringah, Fulton accepted an offer to play a season with his 'home town' club Warrington in the 1969-70 English season.

Fulton played 16 games for Warrington, scoring 16 tries and kicking 1 field goal before returning to Australia and Manly for the 1970 season.

He returned with the touring Australians in 1979 and played at Wilderspool on the night Warrington pulled off a shock victory

The legendary Manly, NSW and Australian representative is survived by wife Anne, sons Scott, Brett and

daughter Kristie.

His long-time mate and radio colleague Ray Hadley announced Fulton's passing saying: "It is with great regret and sadness that I report Bob Fulton has passed away just a short time ago after a battle with cancer that was kept very private," he said.
"He was surrounded by Anne

and his children and dear friend

Royce Ayliffe when he went. "He was first diagnosed some time ago and obviously those close to him knew of it and myself and

Peter Peters were advised by Bob at the time. Sometime during that later part of last year he was given weeks to live.

"He fought and fought and fought. One of the things he promised me he'd do he came to my wedding on the 27th of March even though he was not in the best of health.

"I received a message from Anne four days ago that things were not looking too good and that he'd be in contact with me shortly. That never occurred because he's passed

away this morning in hospital."
Fulton had worked alongside
Hadley for 32 years, forming an
unbreakable bond on and off the

airwaves, before he retired from radio at the start of 2020.

"He was the first of those Immortals and I always thought he would be immortal, I just thought he will be for the start of those Immortals." he'd live forever."

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## **Hayley Wilkinson**


