Craft in Mind prepare to officially launch new store

COMMUNITY Help Hub Craft in Mind is preparing to officially launch a new store at the Cockhedge Centre in Warrington next month.

Following the success of the last 14 months, continually supporting the community through the Covid-19 pandemic by making masks to raise funds to buy food to give to individuals and families in need, the CIC has helped over 1500 families who have struggled due to job losses and awaiting benefits.

At Christmas, they handed out over 230 Christmas dinners along with presents and toys for children and adults who would have otherwise gone without. During the recent flooding in Dallam and Bewsey Craft in Mind were distributing food parcels, cleaning products, bedding and towels with a grant from Asda Cockhedge.

Funding from Torus helped those who suffered with larger items like white goods and essential items which were destroyed in the floods.

Now Craft in Mind is very proud to announce that they have opened a brand new store, Craft in Mind C.I.C Workshops, Craft Supplies and Hand Made Gifts.

Every week Craft Workshops will be held on most mornings. Crafts are a very useful and effective way of helping manage everyone's

mental health challenges and bringing people back together. Tea, coffee and biscuits will be provided. Every event is listed on the Craft in Mind Facebook page. Also being sold in store are craft supplies, all heavily discounted as well as locally crafted handmade gifts.

All proceeds are used to buy food for the Craft in Mind Food Bank so they can continue to help the community as the pandemic continues to cause economic uncertainty.

Craft in Mind Directors, Emma Green and John Wilson stated: "We would like to invite everyone to come to visit us on our opening day on the 11th September. We are very excited to be opening a new store which is located just inside the double doors next to Craft in Mind at Cockhedge Shopping Centre. This is a huge step for everybody after the last 18 months of lockdowns and isolation.

"To finally have some normality to get back to and with the main focus of mental health at the forefront of the shop's heart, it is so lovely to see the community being able to come back together."

Residents urged to use walk-in centres to ease pressures on A&E

WARRINGTON & Halton Hospitals is appealing to residents to use local walk-in centres to ease pressures on the A&E department at Warrington Hospital which continues to be under "extreme pressures."

With many people choosing to visit A&E with minor ailments the extreme pressures are causing lengthy waiting times.

Urgent treatment centres are a facility you can go to if you need urgent medical attention, but it's not a life-threatening situation. They're equipped to diagnose and treat many of the most common ailments people go to A&E for.

You may be referred to an urgent treatment centre by a GP or NHS 111 who can book time slots to attend at the centre. You can also just turn up and walk-in.

There is also an online facility whereby people can check the waiting times before turning up. <https://dashboard.whh.nhs.uk/ed/>

Dr Alex Crowe, Executive Medical Director, WHH said: "Our hospital Emergency Department is currently under extreme pressure and we need your help.

"We are seeing a rise in patients coming into the hospital which means much longer waiting times with increased pressure on staff who are working hard to ensure that they see and treat the sickest patients first.

"Please remember that Accident & Emergency is for life-threatening emergencies or accidents only. Lots

of patients that are coming to the department could be better treated or advised elsewhere.

"If you need urgent medical advice and are not sure where to go then please ring NHS 111 and the trained advisors will direct you to the right service.

"Your GP should be your first point of call, if it is NOT a life-threatening emergency or accident. Your GP is open and your practice can be contacted online, through an app or by phone so you can be assessed.

"If you need a face-to-face appointment you will be given one. Measures have been put in place to protect patients and staff from COVID-19, so it is safe to attend.

"High street Pharmacists are also qualified to give advice and dispense medicine for a range of illnesses including coughs, colds, stomach upsets and skin conditions. They can provide many treatments 'over the counter' to help you get better at home.

"We also have two excellent Urgent Treatment Centres which are open 8am - 9pm every day in Widnes and Runcorn. There is convenient parking and a free shuttle bus between Runcorn and Warrington hospitals.

"Our closest Urgent Care Centre is based at Halton Hospital in Entrance 2, Halton General Hospital, Hospital Way, Runcorn, Cheshire, WA7 2DA."

Meanwhile, Dr Colin Wong says one of the significant Challenges is the number of children attending A&E/ ED in Warrington hospital for minor ailments, and taking up precious time needed to care for poorly patients who need to be seen by a doctor or nurse, in an Emergency.

He says that with the easing of lockdown more children have been mixing and coming into contact with viruses usually seen in the winter months.

These include a range of respiratory infections, bronchiolitis, para flu and rhinovirus, all of which produce symptoms of cough, runny nose and fever. These can often be treated at home.

He said: If your child has a temperature then giving them medicine or tablets containing either ibuprofen or paracetamol, should help to bring their temperature down.

"However, if the child continues to deteriorate, then concerned parents should get medical advice and help. If in doubt call NHS 111 and they will be able to signpost you to the right treatment in the right place.

"Concerned parents can also take their children to the Runcorn Urgent Treatment Centre, at Halton, which is open every day between 8am and



9pm or if you live in Widnes - there is also the Widnes Urgent Treatment Centre.

"Also, local Walk-in Centres, GP practices or your local Pharmacist are fully trained to give expert advice on how to treat minor ailments."

Conditions that can be treated at an urgent treatment centre include:

- sprains and strains
- suspected broken limbs
- minor head injuries
- cuts and grazes
- bites and stings
- minor scalds and burns
- ear and throat infections
- skin infections and rashes eye problems
- coughs and colds
- feverish illness in adults
- feverish illness in children
- abdominal pain
- vomiting and diarrhoea
- emergency contraception

NHS 111 is free and is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Depending on the situation, we can:

- Connect you to a nurse, emergency dentist, pharmacist or GP

Birchwood Park survey shows business is booming

NEW research conducted by Birchwood Park reveals business confidence and growth has skyrocketed, with 84% of Warrington businesses surveyed predicting a return to some kind of "normality" in the next 12 months.

According to the survey created as part of its Business Support Series, survey data has revealed that the future is bright for the region, with almost 50% of its occupiers experiencing growth in the last quarter (Q1 Jan to March 2021), and 60% stating they are optimistic about growth for the rest of the year.

The research, conducted with over 100 local Warrington-based businesses at the North's largest out of town business park – from SMEs to large global organisations spanning a range of industries from accounting and recruitment to engineering and energy – reveals an encouraging trend, with more than a quarter (28%) of local businesses sustaining output, despite experiencing a significant impact on their business due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The news comes as 84% of businesses are predicting a return to some form of 'normality' within the next 12 months, with the vast majority expected to return to the workplace in a flexible capacity within six months' time.

The research has also revealed other positive workplace trends, including an increase in employee-focused wellbeing initiatives, with 60% of employees taking learnings from the past 18 months and now taking advantage of popular incentives such as flexible working, access to healthy refreshments, weekly team meets and access to complimentary exercise and treatments.

Martin O'Rourke, Commercial Director at Birchwood Park, said: "There's no denying that the pandemic has impacted businesses – over the past 18 months being flexible and adaptable has been vital. However, what some may find surprising is that as we acclimatise and move forward through the recovery period, the business outlook is very positive, especially here in Warrington and indeed at Birchwood Park.

"A greater focus on the environment and wellbeing seems to be having a positive impact on businesses, this combined with the benefits of flexible working and of course access to business support,

incentives and initiatives such as those provided at Birchwood Park, our occupiers seem to be offering a robust blueprint for future business success across Warrington."

Twifix is a family-run business that has been designing and manufacturing Roof Glazing and Canopies from their premises on Birchwood Park for the past 30 years.

Vicky Evans, Director at Twifix, comments: "Despite the many challenges this pandemic has brought for our business, it has definitely helped us move forward as

a business, allowing us to automate and digitalise, getting rid of manual processes where possible. It's also helped with time efficiency, utilising Teams keep connected, supporting homeworking while also highlighting the benefits of actually being in the offices – so we will utilise all of this knowledge going forward as we work to reach ambitious growth targets for the year ahead."

Olympic effort for recovery and growth!

So who won – USA or San Marino? It's not the start of a bad joke, but if like me you have finally warmed to an Olympic Games with no crowds it has caused me to ponder the real ranking of countries considering their size and financial clout.

I also quite liked the new sports in the Olympics; surfing, skateboarding, BMX riding. Whilst some may say these are not sports and are modern affectations to pander to a younger audience, I would disagree and point to the Olympic games in Paris (1900). In their wisdom the organisers saw fit to include the sports of Live Pigeon Shooting and Pistol Duelling and St Louis (1904) brought us the riveting but completely bonkers - Plunge for Distance (dive into a pool and see how far you can get without swimming). I promise I am not making these up. And I am slightly disappointed to say that the sport of poodle clipping didn't quite make it in 1900 being a demonstration event – the gold medal was 17 in 2 hours if you are wondering. But, of course, we know

better now and only introduced High Jump for Horses in 1960 and solo synchronised swimming in 84, 88 and 92.

I'll be honest. I quite like high jump for horses.

So without detracting from the achievements of 4, or in this case 5 years of hard work to be expended in 10 seconds or several hours depending on your sport, you will have probably looked at the medal table during the final week or so to see how we were doing. Although GB came fourth, the ranking by gold medals was a bit annoying, so I looked for medal tables ranked by overall medals and of course disappeared down the rabbit hole of rankings by other measures. If you look at total medals then the USA wins (113) if you look at total medals

per capita then San Marino wins (1 per 11,310). If you look at total Gold Medals then US wins again but per capita Bermuda wins. In terms of medals by GDP San Marino comes out top again and so on and so on. Even better when you think they only sent 5 athletes to the games and won 3 medals. So in my opinion San Marino won the Olympics.

We always feel a need to compare ourselves and tabulate things so if you do the same for Warrington where do you get to? The Centre for Cities data (and in this case large Towns, so there are 63) is the best league table we get and at the moment and depending on your preferred measure our rankings vary quite a lot. Business Churn is very low and we come 2/63. Employment rate is good at 19/63 but conversely Housing Affordability Ratio is lower at 29/63 and for GDP per worker we come 36/63.

So what's the point of this. Not sure really, other than it reiterates that recovery and growth are complex but that our strong business base gives us an overall recovery rating which is quite good at 73/100 and spend index is increasing compared to last year. So not quite a USA but not quite a San Marino either.

Whilst we have had the Olympics, there is the equally as absorbing,

A&E to be extended at Warrington Hospital

PLANNING chiefs have given the go-ahead for a two-storey extension to the emergency department at Warrington Hospital.

The proposals put forward by Warrington and Halton Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust will provide improved facilities within the emergency department in Appleton Wing to enable the hospital to cope with present and future demand.

Clinical and staff areas will be separated where possible to provide clear, legible accommodation for patients and staff and an improved assessment/treatment area to provide better patient experience.

An enclosed plant space will be located on the flat roof of the new building.

The extension has been designed in consultation with hospital staff and

user groups.

It will be to the south of Appleton Wing in an area currently covered in tarmacadam where there are six disabled parking spaces and an ambulance drop-off area. Some re-routing of traffic routes within the hospital grounds will be necessary.

Appleton Wing was built in the early 1970s to provide outpatient facilities. Over the past 50 years there

have been a number of alterations and additions, the most notable being a single-storey extension to the A&E department in the early 2000s







FORMER pupils and staff of a Woolston High School which closed nine years ago are being invited to a special "all years" reunion.

Woolston High School closed in 2012 following a lengthy battle by the school community to keep it open.

It had been judged "good" by OFSTED – the Office for Standards in Education – only a year before its final closure.

Now former pupils and staff are being invited to attend the special reunion by a local group headed by the school's last head boy, Jonny Scotland.

He said: "This is going to be Woolston High's biggest ever reunion. It's open to all former students and staff. It's £5 a ticket but it is limited to a maximum of 125 and when they gone, they are gone!"

The event is being held at the Monk Sports and Social Club in Hillock Lane, Woolston, on Friday, September the 17th at 7pm.

The price includes a buffet and any profits will go to Warrington's St Rocco's Hospice.

Woolston High School only closed after a fiercely fought campaign to keep it open.

It had opened in 1957 and served three generations of families in Woolston and neighbouring areas of Warrington. The closure followed the borough council identifying a significant surplus of school places in Central and East Warrington. At the time, Woolston had 970 pupils.

In its final years it was judged to be one of the top 40 most improved schools in the country and was awarded specialist Science College status.

Showjumper and horse defy the odds by both bouncing back from brain tumours

SHOWJUMPER Jenny Keepe has defied the odds, winning a national competition, after both she and her horse bounced back from life-threatening brain tumours!

Jenny, aged 29, from Warrington, feared she would never ride again when a very large brain tumour was discovered in June last year.

Her consultant Mr Yousaf from Walton hospital commented that the operation would probably be one of the largest ones he would ever have to do and she would have to have MRI scans for the rest of her life.

After a 10 hour craniotomy in July 2020 and a second operation in October, only a certain percent of the tumour was able to be removed.

Equestrian Jenny, loves her horses and it was feared that after her operation she might not be able

to ride again.

After a few months gently getting herself back to health she started riding, but her horse Quinn, after developing a nose bleed, was diagnosed with exactly the same tumour as Jenny!

Now worried that Quinn might have to be put down he was taken to Rainbow equine hospital to have surgery through his skull and his tumour removed.

Her beloved dog was then also diagnosed with a brain tumour ... talk about coming in threes !!

After coming 2nd in an earlier competition at Cheshire Royal Show she was one of ten chosen in the country for a puissance competition to be held at UK Nationals, Arena

UK recently.

The competition consists of 5 rounds where the a wall is built bigger and bigger and the winner is the one that jumps the highest without knocking it down.

£5m improvement project for nine-storey Kingsway House gets green light

A major £5 million improvement scheme for the nine-storey high Kingsway House in Latchford, Warrington, has been given the go-ahead by town planners.

With the project now approved by Warrington Borough Council's (WBC) planning department, North West housing and regeneration group Torus visited the site, speaking to existing residents to seek their views on the proposed works, providing information, sharing plans and answering questions.

As part of the ambitious investment programme, the ageing 1960s block, which contains 51 one-and two-bedroom apartments, will be fitted with new windows, kitchens, bathrooms, front doors, lifts and balconies, as well as converting current storage areas into two additional residential apartments, asbestos removal, improved insulation, landscaping and improvements to the entrance area.

The plans also include increasing the number of parking spaces from 10 to 44, by removing the unused garages.

Torus Group Stock Condition and Planning Manager, Debbie Stewart, said: "Residents at Kingsway House have been in limbo for several years with a question mark over the future of their homes, so we are delighted to announce that our major improvement and modernisation scheme is now finally about to start. "This is an exciting development for Torus and our residents, and

we are confident that this long-awaited refurbishment programme will not only benefit the residents who live here, but it will also contribute to the aims of WBC's Central 6 masterplan, contributing to achieving a cleaner, greener, healthier Warrington.

"It was great to be able to discuss the plans with the residents and get their views and we look forward to working with them, as they will be an important part of the project team."

The external of the building will benefit from a new external wall insulation system, with external walls finished with non-combustible render, incorporating stone wool insulation which will improve the

energy efficiency of the building and reducing carbon emissions.

Torus Assets Project Manager, Ste Simm, added: "The £5 million investment in Kingsway House demonstrates our commitment to investing in our existing homes and providing social and affordable homes.

"The refurbishment will create a modern block that will not only look great, but will also help to reduce carbon emissions, whilst benefiting tenants by improving energy efficiency, lowering fuel bills and making their homes warmer."

Though already fully compliant, the refurbishment of Kingsway House will also include enhanced safety features, featuring a full sprinkler system, apartment front doors replaced with fire doors, upgrading the fire alarm with

upgraded and increased number of detectors and though not required by law, Torus are also installing a Fire and Rescue Service evacuation alert system.

Kingsway House resident of 10 years, Maureen, commented on the plans; "The plans look brilliant. I am looking forward to my new apartment, especially the balcony, it will nice to have some outside space."

Torus is working alongside experienced construction firm, HMS, who have been appointed to remodel the building. The refurbishment works are set to start in September 2021 and is likely to take 18 months to complete. Residents are being kept fully informed as the scheme progresses.



Warrington Worldwide Legacy Project No.1 – Litter Networks

VOLUNTARY group Litter Networks has become the first recipient of Warrington Worldwide's Legacy Project with a £500 donation towards their ongoing work in the community.

The Litter Networks started in September 2020 in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic and now reach out across the town involving more than 1,500 volunteers.

The networks were started by volunteers Paul Connor and James Coates who have been presented with a £500 donation to help them continue to grow the litter networks and make a positive ongoing difference in the local community.

They jointly developed the "Litter Network" concept, and co-founded

the Litter Networks organisation, which simply connects and empowers local communities to pick up litter.

The first Litter Network was launched in Lymm in 2020 and the concept has rapidly spread to with various networks across Warrington.

We very much look forward to working with you more and more over the coming years to transform Warrington with support from local residents and anchor institutions into a safe and clean place to live, work & visit!"

Paul added: "Key to each Litter Network is an emphasis on empowering, motivating and bringing together the community to solve environmental problems themselves. A fundamental and priceless part of this is the ideas, camaraderie and selfless drive of the volunteers themselves. Many are solo and family pickers who communicate via our Litter Network Facebook Groups. Some people run formal and informal Litter Picking groups who also use each Litter Network to publicise their events, find out where their

members report problems that might need a group effort, and recruiting new members. This funding will help all those fantastic people to not only have the kit they need, but also seed-fund some of the fantastic community project ideas that spring up all the time. With ideas ranging from alley clean-ups and wildflower planting to information boards and novel equipment purchases, we are confident that this award will be put to very good use!"

Despite the challenges of COVID Priestley's Class of 2021 ready to fulfil their dreams

THEY had an experience like no other with the challenges of COVID, but despite the pandemic, Priestley's 2021 cohort have left college ready to fulfil their dreams and ambitions following their A level and BTEC results.

Around 1,000 Year 13 students received their results and looked forward to the next stage of their lives whether that be university, an apprenticeship or employment.

For Thomas Shaw, who is heading to the University of Oxford to study Chemistry, it was a day to celebrate as he collected four A*'s in Biology, Chemistry, Maths and the Extended Project.

"I was nervous that even if I got good grades they might not be enough to get into Oxford," said the former Cardinal Newman High School pupil. "The pandemic changed my mind as to what I wanted to do and now I want to go into research and possibly teach at a high level."

Uniquely for results day grades were being revealed for A-Levels and vocational options such as BTECs. That meant students on courses as diverse as Architecture, German and Public Services all found out the results of two years' hard work.

Among the cohort at Priestley College were future medics, lawyers, vets, entrepreneurs and civil engineers.

Phoebe-Leigh Van Embden, a former pupil at St Nicholas Catholic High School, collected a triple

distinction* in Performing Arts and will be continuing her studies at University of Chichester.

"Covid has made it a stressful time because we didn't know what would be happening with exams, but I'm really excited to be going to university now," she said.

Priestley's Class of 2021 achieved a 100% pass rate in 31 A-Levels with 79% of all grades awarded at A* to C.

Across vocational courses there was a 100% pass rate in 56 Level 3 subjects and a high-grade rate of 78%.

Overall the cohort received 361 offers from the Russell Group, which are considered some of the UK's finest universities.

Principal James Gresty said he felt immense pride in students, their families and college staff for all that had been achieved despite the challenges posed by the past year.

"This cohort has shown a resilience and determination to fulfil their potential in the most testing of circumstances," he said.

"They were supported throughout by their families, carers and our community of staff who all pulled together to ensure the education – and therefore the futures – of these young people didn't suffer."



One of the Covid-19 schemes introduced during the pandemic was a temporary reduction in VAT charged in the hospitality trade on most sales. This reduction is being withdrawn over the next few months.

Since 15 July 2020 hospitality businesses have charged VAT at 5%. This reduction applies to most supplies made by cafes, restaurants, pubs, hotels, members clubs, caravan parks, tourist attractions such as zoos and many others. Unfortunately, it excludes alcoholic drinks, so the following does not apply to your weekly (or daily) visit to your local for the odd pint.

This 5% rate will increase to 12.5% on 1 October 2021, and will subsequently rise further to the standard 20% rate on 1 April 2022. Normal tax point rules will be applied to these rises. This means that VAT will be charged at the rate applying at the earlier of

- The supply of the goods or service,

- The date of invoice, or
- The payment date, whichever comes first.

Therefore, hospitality businesses which take advance bookings and payments before 1st October can charge 5% VAT rather than 12.5%, thus providing both a saving for their customers and a boost for their sales.

It would have been possible for the government to have included anti-forestalling provisions in the legislation. If there had been anti-forestalling legislation in the equation, the supply date would have been relevant. However, with all of the recent rate changes, the government has not applied any anti-forestalling legislation. In other words, if a business receives an advance payment before 1 October for a supply being made on or after this date, it will still be 5% VAT based on the payment date. HM Revenue and Customs have confirmed last year that the absence of anti-forestalling legislation was intended to help the hospitality industry. They said that the intention was to accelerate receipts as the advance payments would

provide important working capital to cash-stretched businesses.

This means that if you are organising a function that will take place after 1st October, such as a birthday bash, but book and pay for it before 1st October then you will pay VAT at 5% rather than 12.5%. If, for instance, the cost of the evening is £50 plus VAT per head, then it will cost you a total of £52.50 if you book and pay early, but this will increase to £56.25 if you do not pay before the increase.

Prices are, of course, frequently quoted at a VAT inclusive rate. If you operate a business that charges on this basis then during September you have the opportunity to promote your business in a way that will benefit both yourself and your customer. For instance, suppose you operate a guest house and charge £300 per room per week. At a 5% VAT this equates to a sales value of £285. Once this rises to 12.5% then your sales value will drop to £266. Why not, therefore, offer a 2.5% discount on Christmas or next year's bookings. This will mean that your customer only pays £292.50, saving

£7.50, whilst providing you with a sales value of £278. Not only, therefore, will you get your money quicker but you will also get £12 more than you would if you received the money after 1st October.

Of course, if you are yourself VAT registered, and the expense is a properly deducted business expense such as staff travel, or the annual staff Christmas party, then this will not apply to you as you can reclaim any VAT paid. However, even VAT registered businesses will save if the expense is not wholly deductible, such as if they invite customers to the party.

And finally, we repeat that it does not apply to alcoholic beverages. Therefore, if you are a member of a pub quiz team and go to your local every week then you will not make any savings by offering to pay up front for your next 12 months alcohol intake!

Peel Hall decision could be anytime say campaigners

THE Save Peel Hall Campaign Group's Rule 6 Party has confirmed it has received notification that the future of North Warrington's last natural green space now lies in the hands of the Secretary of State.

Campaigners recently received notice that the Public Inquiry Inspector Christina Downes had submitted her report to Robert Jenrick, Secretary of State for Housing, Communities, and local Government, and that a deadline for the decision announcement has been set by November 9th.

The report was expected to be submitted in July, but this was delayed to allow parties to comment on the revised National Planning Policy Framework which came into force on July 20th.

The inquiry came after a legal battle when landowner Satnam Millennium Ltd appealed against Warrington Borough Council's Development Management Committee's refusal to allow the developer permission to build a 1,200-home 'multi-neighbourhood' on the former farmland site. Although this appeal was eventually dismissed by the Secretary of State, it was overturned by the High Court, forcing the council, Satnam and the Save Peel Hall campaigners into the complex inquiry ring again.

The inquiry opened in September 2020 but was promptly adjourned. It then reopened this year and officially closed in March giving Ms Downes time to re-visit the site and to compile her official report.



We are keeping everything crossed. This will be a tense waiting game, but to be honest, even though we are anticipating some wait, an announcement could break at any time between now and the November 9 deadline."


