

IT has been truly humbling to see the great work going on in the local community since we launched our Legacy Projects

The Warrington Litter Networks, who received the first Legacy Project grant, is going from strength to strength, recently collecting 170 bags of litter in eight locations over one weekend in September to mark

World Clean-Up Day.

Now a community centre that provided a lifeline for elderly local residents during the COVID-19 pandemic has become the second beneficiary of a Warrington

Worldwide Legacy Project grant.

Our Legacy Project involves a grant of £500 to enable local community groups and charities to continue their good work in the local community.

# Exhibition brings alive history of the Wire industry!

AN interactive exhibition outlining the history of Warrington's wire industry is set to take place in the town through a blend of sculpture, film, dance, poetry and real-life accounts.

The Wire Works, which runs from October 16 to November 20 is a Warrington Borough Council project funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Thé council has worked in partnership with Culture Warrington, artists Laurence Payot and Christine Wilcox-Baker and local media company, Ludovico.

local media company, Ludovico.

This project aims to highlight and celebrate one of the borough's most significant stories from Warrington's rich heritage – wire manufacturing.

rich heritage – wire manufacturing.
Lynn Radcliffe, the borough
council's Cultural Partnerships
Development Manager said:
"As arguably Warrington's most
important industry, putting the town
at the forefront of the Industrial

Revolution, wire production dominated the town's employment structure for over 100 years, employing an estimated 9% of all wire drawers in England and Wales and almost twice as many as its nearest North-western rival Manchester.

"The local Rugby became known as "The Wire" (shortened from "The Wire-Pullers"), indicating how important wire making was in the town

"Many Warrington residents are unaware of the significance of this industry to Warrington, think St Helens and glass or Sheffield and steel, even though Warrington wire has had and continues to have a variety of

uses throughout the world: from barbed wire used in the trenches of World War 1 to telegraph cables for communication; from scientific sieves to fencing masks; from suspension bridges to one of Lady Gaga's spectacular dresses. "The Wire Works exhibition will

"The Wire Works exhibition will be an interactive blend of heritage and art, representing the story of Warrington's wire industry through sculpture, film, dance, poetry and real-life accounts of what it was like to work in a wire factory in Warrington."

The Exhibition will run at Unit 31, Old Market Place, Golden Square, Warrington, WA1 1QB (The old Co-Op Bank, near Vintage Viola) from Saturday 16th October – Saturday 20th November.



# Changes to Breast Care Services across Warrington & Halton

## Where will I go for breast care?

Following our recent consultation there have been some changes to Breast Care Services. Here we look at where you will visit and why.

#### **Routine Mammograms**

If you need a routine mammogram our breast screening services remain the same and patients can choose to attend several locations. When you receive your appointment reminder the locations will be listed so that you can make the best choice for you.

#### Services following a referral

Our Assessment Clinics provide services after a routine screening mammogram has shown changes warranting further tests.

Patients who have found breast changes or lumps may be referred by their GP to our Symptomatic Service for more detailed tests including

including a mammogram, ultrasound scan or a biopsy.

These services, previously offered at Kendrick Wing Warrington Hospital, have now relocated to the new Breast Care Centre in the Captain Sir Tom Moore Building (CSTM) at Halton Hospital. The new centre has two new mammography rooms, two ultrasound clinic rooms, consultation and counselling rooms.

This forms part of our work to

create a Centre of Excellence which offers rapid access outpatient clinics and to ensure that patients receive the best specialist care in a dedicated, supportive setting.

The existing Burney Breast Unit at St Helen's Hospital will also continue to offer these clinics.

#### What happens if I am diagnosed with breast cancer?

Patients can choose where to have their treatment.

The new Breast Care Centre is co-located with the CanTreat Centre in the Nightingale building where chemotherapy services are operated by Clatterbridge Cancer

The Macmillan Delamere Centre is also adjacent to CanTreat and offers a range of support services including complementary therapies and information on financial and other support available to those diagnosed with cancer. Breast surgery is carried out at the Captain Sir Tom Moore building.

#### Travel - planning your journey

Patients required to attend assessment or symptomatic services will need to travel to either Halton Hospital, Runcorn or St Helens. A free shuttle bus operates between Halton and Warrington hospitals at regular times throughout the day. The timetable is available at www. whh.nhs.uk

Car parking is available at all sites, with a wide range of concessions and help to access the Hospital Appointment Scheme for those receiving benefits.

The Breast Care Centre at the

Halton Hospital can be accessed by road from Warrington by using the toll-free roads with no need to cross the toll bridges. A new bypass at Slutchers Lane near Bank Quay station has considerably shortened travel time to Runcorn and is free



As is normal for a construction site in a Town such as Warrington that has a long and eventful history, well battles to be precise, any excavation is accompanied by a watching brief from an archaeologist. MP urges residents to have a say on

future of Fiddler's Ferry site

WARRINGTON South MP Andy Carter is urging residents to have a say on the future of Fiddler's Ferry, the former coal-fired power station which will now be included in the Council's Draft Local Plan.

The MP recently visited the site to see for himself the areas that will be included in the plan, meeting with the owners of the site, SSE, who are

responsible for the demolition of the turbine hall and colling towers.

The site's inclusion in the Council's Draft Local Plan comes after years of campaigning from Mr Carter, who wants to see Brownfield sites such as Fiddler's Ferry be prioritised over building

on the green belt.

Mr Carter said: "Fiddler's Ferry is a vast area, and travelling across the site there's already a huge amount of demolition and remediation work taking place and work has already begun to clear the ash piles where homes and

businesses can be built.
"One of the benefits to using this site over others is that Fiddler's Ferry access to railway connections with a line which is currently used only for freight. Linking homes with good public transport infrastructure is really important. Any plans need to ensure that there is the necessary infrastructure for schools,

and community centres. I'm very pleased to see that these outline proposals would protect lagoons as part of a nature park as

well as allowing them to be used for activities such as sailing. "Warrington Borough Council will launch a 6-week consultation in early October into the draft local plan and I would encourage residents to look carefully at what's being proposed by the council as

these plans are going to impact on all our lives ."

The site will undergo major remediation works which will see the demolition and removal of the power station and its eight cooling towers that has dominated the local skyline for generations. In its place will arise a new employment hub and two new urban villages set within an extensive parkland landscape, that will sensitively with the engage riverside and link with the Widnes Waterfront area.


of residents and colleagues during very challenging times.

# Updated Local Plan approved for consultation after "open and honest" discussion says leader

WARRINGTON'S updated Local Plan has been approved for consultation following "open and honest discussion with local people" says council leader Cllr. Russ Bowden.

The revised plan was approved for consultation at a meeting of the full council and got the backing of the Lib Dem group, who were applauded by Labour councillors, while opposition Tories opposed it, saying it had been produced with too much haste.

The updated plan to deliver the

homes, jobs, transport infrastructure nomes, lobs, transport intrastructure and community facilities Warrington needs has now been approved for consultation.

Warrington's updated Proposed Submission Version Local Plan was given the go-ahead paving the

way to a six-week period of public consultation, which will begin on Monday, October 4.

The consultation period will give everyone in Warrington the opportunity to have their say on the updated plan, by completing an online response form, or by attending the public consultation events – details of which will be released in the pear future.

released in the near future.
Warrington Borough Council
Leader, Cllr Russ Bowden, said:
"The development of our Local Plan has always been based upon open and honest discussion with local people. We have committed from the start to taking on board people's views and, where necessary, views and, where necessary, refining the plan in partnership with our communities. We have listened to, and acted upon, many of the

to, and acted upon, many of the key issues raised.

"This, along with the significant changes we have seen since our Proposed Version Submission Local Plan was published in 2019 – not least the Covid pandemic and new Government housing methodology – mean it has been right to pause, take stock re-evaluate and revise take stock, re-evaluate and

our plan to make sure it is the best fit for Warrington now.

"Our updated Local Plan – in a changing world – continues to be fully focused on driving forward Warrington's ambition and need for development, while protection

Warrington's ambition and need for development, while protecting the Green Belt wherever possible "It's vital that the plan continues to be shaped by the people of our borough. Now Full Council has given the go-ahead to consult, we will once again be talking and listening to local people, and we will be holding a number of consultation events from October to give everyone the chance to share their views on the updated plans."

The council received more than

The council received more than 3,000 responses to its initial, 20-year Proposed Submission Version Local Plan in 2019, and has taken on board many of the views of local people, much of which focused on how brownfield sites should continue to be prioritised ahead of

This, along with the profound impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and changing Government housing methodology, has meant that, in preparing the updated Proposed Submission Version Local Plan, the council is proposing some big changes. These include:

A reduction in new housing from 945 a year over 20 years, to 816 a year over a reduced plan period of 18 years (2021-2038

 Under the updated plan, the amount of land proposed to be removed from the Green Belt is removed from the Green Belt is 580 hectares, equating to 5% of the total amount of Green Belt land in the borough. This is significantly lower than the 1,210 hectares proposed in the previous Proposed Submission Version Local Plan which equated to 11% of the total amount of Green Belt.

The removal of the South West Urban Extension from the Plan (1,600 homes), the housing Phipps Village allocation for in Burtonwood Lane homes), and the Massey Brook Lane site in Lymm (66 homes).

Moving away from the Garden Suburb concept in South Warrington (4,200 new homes), and instead including new proposals for a South East Warrington Urban Extension, with a reduced allocation of 2,400 new homes during the

The removal of Port Warrington (75ha employment land) and the Business Hub (25ha employment land) from the plan.

In addition, recent changes have enabled the council to include proposals which further maximise the opportunity to repurpose land, through the inclusion of the Fiddlers Ferry site for development. The closure of the power station in March 2020 has given the council the opportunity to bring the site into the allocation this time. This site was the subject of a high number of responses to the previous consultation.

Speaking after the meeting, Liberal Democrat Planning Spokesperson, Cllr Ryan Bate (below) said, "Warrington must have a sustainable Local Plan and not one that is damaging to the Borough. Delaying it makes no sense at all. Two years ago, thanks to significant efforts by councillors,

Group Leader, Cllr Bob Barr, said "Delivering the right Plan can be summarised as having the right homes in the right places with the right jobs and the right infrastructure. We need sustainable development where most residents can walk or cycle to shop, be schooled, receive care, take exercise and socialise in twenty minutes or less. The beauty twenty minutes or less. The beauty of Warrington's best green spaces must be respected, biodiversity enhanced and buildings designed to minimise energy use. What is unacceptable is large cardependent housing estates that serve only as dormitories but are quick and profitable for developers to deliver to deliver.

"We acknowledge many of the changes, but we need a greater emphasis on regenerating the town centre, more genuinely affordable housing, the maximum use of brownfield sites and the timely



delivery of physical and social infrastructure

The South East Extension makes no sense socially, economically or environmentally. The proposed road-based logistics facility in the south east is not sustainable. We need high quality jobs that promote Warrington as an area of scientific expertise.

After the meeting he added: "The Liberal Democrat Group voted for the new draft of the Local Plan to the new draft of the Local Plan to be put out for public consultation. It did NOT vote for the plan as the Conservatives are alleging. "Currently Warrington does not have a 5 year supply of housing land so is torced, by Conservative

Having passed out of BRNC in April, I studied radar, sonar, communications, and weapons systems in detail, before joining HMS Prince of Wales in September. the different departments on board."
When asked why she wanted to join the Royal Navy, Beth said: "I



wanted to apply my Engineering degree to solving real life problems, whilst being able to embark on adventures and hopefully make a difference in the world.

Known as Common Fleet Time, Beth's time on board is a prerequisite for progressing on to the next stage of her training. As such, Beth has been getting stuck in to all aspects of life at sea. She said: "This deployment is an essential step forward in my training as a Young Officer. Being exposed to Carrier Sea Training is an experience that I am lucky to be a part of. Seeing the ship under strains and stresses, allowing me to fully appreciate the importance of everything we do, has been invaluable."

# Days of the New Town exhibition opens at Padgate Library

A fascinating insight into the area's 1970's heritage is being offered at a new photographic exhibition "Days of the New Town" which has opened at Padgate Library.

The new photography exhibition tells the story of Warrington's New

Town expansion in the Padgate area in the 1970s.

The exhibition uses photographs from the Warrington New Town Development Corporation archive and residents' own photos.

The photographs recall the years Padgate and surroundings changed forever as they became

changed forever as they became New Town expansion areas in the early to mid-1970s

These show how the architects and planners imagined Padgate's expansion, and how residents from both 'old' and 'new' Padgate experienced this significant and lasting change to the area.

The photos are accompanied by an exhibition guide that

features a foreword and specially teatures a toreword and specially commissioned poem from acclaimed poet lan McMillan, whose first poet-in residence gig was at Padgate Library when it first opened in 1982.

It is the first time the public has seen images from the Warrington New Town Development Corporation archive and builds on

New Town Development Corporation archive and builds on material from the Days of the New Town: Birchwood at 50 exhibition of 2018/19 hosted by Warrington Museum and Art Gallery.

The exhibition is curated by university lecturer Su Fitzpatrick,

who grew up in Birchwood, one of Warrington's New Town Development areas. Su became interested in telling Warrington's New Town story after designing a module for her students looking at the New Town building programme in the UK.

Su explained: "When I realised how few references existed to Warrington's New realised how tew reterences existed to Warrington's New Town story, I began looking at ways to bring about a more public acknowledgement of this key stage in the town's history. Working with Howard Cockcroft from the group Friends of Padgate Library and LiveWire, I hope the Padgate exhibition will allow people to explore the period when people to explore the period when Warrington expanded into a New

Su is currently looking to secure research funding to develop educational resources which will help Year 9 students around the country find out more about the later New Towns that were built in the UK, and the material shown in this exhibition will form an

important part of those resources.

Days of the New Town is delivered by Friends of Padgate Library with funding from Poulton-with-Fearnhead Parish Council and York St John's University, and in partnership with LiveWire, which

manages Padgate Library on behalf of Warrington Borough Council.

Emma Hutchinson, Managing Director of LiveWire, said: "I know how much hard work has gone into the staging of this exhibition by Su, the Friends of Padgate Library and LiveWire library staff. I very much hope the local community takes the expectation to the said of the composition of the compositi the opportunity to come along and learn more about a unique period in the area's history.

Howard Cockcroft from the Friends said: "The Friends of Padgate Library, who are all volunteers, give their time to constantly promote the library to the local community and attract people to the building. We are especially grateful to Poulton with Fearnhead Parish Council, and York St. John's University, without whose financial support this exhibition would not have been possible."

Warrington Borough Council's Cabinet Member for leisure and

community, Cllr Tony Higgins, said: "The Days of the New Town exhibition will provide a fascinating insight into Padgate's past, giving a people a rare opportunity to see photos from Warrington New Town Development Corporation archive. It's a great example of the work we are doing to make our libraries rich, vibrant community resources which offer history, heritage, culture and

# You may be affected by a proposed change in the way that your tax liability is calculated

If you are self-employed, either as a sole trader or in a partnership, and your accounts are not prepared to a date between 31st March and 5th April each year, then the following will apply to you. It does not apply to people who are employed or who operate through a limited company.

Income Tax is charged in respect of each tax year, or **fiscal year**, which is the year to 5th April in each calendar year. In each fiscal period, tax is calculated on all income received during a **basis period**. For most sources of income, the basis period is the same as the fiscal year, namely the year ending on 5th April in each calendar year (for this purpose, 31st March is considered to be the same as 5th April). The one exception is profits from self-employment.

The **basis period** for selfemployment income has varied over the years, the last change being with the introduction of self-assessment in 1996. Since then, the basis period has been the **accounting period** ending in each fiscal period, with special rules applying at the start and end of the business and if the accounting period is not 12 months in length. Therefore, if someone prepares their accounts to 31st December in each year then their tax on this income for the tax year ending 5th April 2021 will be based on their profits to 31st December 2020. This tax will be calculated by adding this income from self-employment to 31st December 2020 to any other income from other sources, such as rental income, dividends, interest, etc received during the tax year to 3st March 2021 and applying the appropriate tax rate to the total income.

#### PHEW!! Complicated? Well, the government thinks so, and they are proposing to change it.

As part of the Making Tax Digital initiative the government is proposing to change the basis period for all taxpayers, including the self-employed, to coincide with the tax year. Once enacted, this means that tax will be calculated on the profits earned in each year to 5th April, or 31st March. Whilst this may seem fairly straightforward in the future, the complications arise in the year that the change takes place.

Originally due to take place on April 2022, this change in the basis period was originally delayed until April 2023. Due to the uncertainties created by Brexit and Covid it has now been further delayed until at least April 2024. Assuming that it occurs without further delay at that date then, with the example previously given, taxation will be based as follows:

- 2023/24: Profits for the year to 31st December 2023
- 2024/25: Profits for the year to 31st December 2024 plus Profits for the period to 5th April 2025 less overlap relief
- 2025/26: Profits for the year to 5th April 2026

The amount of **overlap relief** available varies from taxpayer to taxpayer, and depends on the taxable profits in 1996 or, if later, in the first years of the business. However, the effect in the period of transition can be dramatic. If, for instance, the business is currently very profitable but was less so in the early years, which is not uncommon, then this could create a 40% tax liability in that year.

It is important that if you are affected by the above you consider this transition now. For instance, Covid had reduced

the taxable profits of many taxpayers in recent years. In fact, some clients may even have suffered losses. This may create a window during which you can transition to the new system by changing your yearend under more tavourable circumstances.

It is not possible to generalise as the circumstances of all taxpayers are different. However, if you feel that you may be affected then you should consider this now. To summarise, you **may** be affected if:

- 1. You **carry on a trade** either as a sole trader or in partnership; and
- 2. Your accounting period is not 5th April, or 31st March, in which case
- You should review your profit profile to see whether any adverse effect of this change can be reduced.
- 4. If you do not trade then this will not apply to you. So, you will not be affected if you are in employment, and/or receive a pension, and/or receive rental income, interest, dividends or any other form of investment income.
