Having already attended a delayed Lymm May Queen event in September and plans for the annual Dickensian Day scheduled to go ahead in Lymm next month, I am sure many will be left wondering why the decision was made to cancel the event in Culcheth.

To be fair to the parish council there is still a lot of reluctance,

especially from older people, to attend large public gatherings and with rates still relatively high in the

area it was probably the right call.

Thankfully after several weeks of rises COVID-19 infection rates in the area appear to be on the way down again, although with winter ahead none of us have a crystal ball knowing what the future holds.

But with Christmas tree festivals planned at local churches and Christmas fayres in local schools I am sure there will still be plenty of festivities to enjoy.



Closure of community leisure facility is a great disappointment say campaigning councillors

CAMPAIGNING local Cllrs say the permanent closure of leisure services at Culcheth Community Campus has come as a great disappointment to local residents.

After 18 months of speculation, Warrington Borough Council (WBC) confirmed that the facility run by community interest company LiveWire, will not re-open after closing at the start of the pandemic

Now local councillors say that with the longstanding work needed with the longstanding work needed for Birchwood Leisure Centre and Library the east of Warrington has been left with a distinct lack of support from the WBC and that the closure of Culcheth Community Campus will have a knock-on effect in areas like Glazebrook and Hollins Green, where many and Hollins Green, where many residents use these facilities rather than travelling into Cadishead or

Culcheth, Glazebury Croft councillors Wendy Maisy, Val Allen and Carol Benson, are raising issues about the lack of leisure services in the area when compared to the new facilities at Orford Jubilee Hub, Great Sankey Leisure Centre and the newly

opened Bewsey and Dallam Hub.' Cllr. Maisey said: "Warrington's Labour-run council always insist

that their investments fund front line services. However, after a very loose consultation period, it is now confirmed that Culcheth will lose its Livewire services. This is really bad news and concerning.
"Culcheth's borough councillors

requested a meeting with Culcheth High School a couple of weeks ago to facilitate a survey with their students to see what services they want and need. We will do everything to help the youth in our villages.

She added that the latest strategy or leisure services was included in Warrington's new Draft Local Plan and public consultation on the new plan started on Monday 4 October.

Cllr Maisey says Conservative councillors feel that the strategy needs a lot of improvement and

they are urging residents to get involved in the consultation and to make their views known about local services.

We know how important the Culture and Leisure offer in Warrington is to local people, so these savings will help to maintain and safeguard LiveWire services for the future.'





Remembrance Day parade saved after parish council agree to fund road closures



THE 70th annual Remembrance Day parade at Culcheth will now go ahead as planned after a campaign by local councillors and residents.

After four weeks of "turmoil and uncertainty," it was confirmed at a recent meeting of Culcheth & Glazebury Parish Council that the Royal British Legion procession to the Cenotaph in Newchurch would have the funding available to enable it to take place.

Warrington Borough Council was advised by Cheshire Police in 2019 funding would be withdrawn but no firm plans were put into place to ensure it went ahead.

However, a breakthrough at the Parish Council meeting saw funding allocated to ensure the cost

of the road closures would be met.
Parish Cllr Keith Bland
commented "Labour-run Warrington
Borough Council's decision not to fund the traffic marshalling required was met with outrage in our village.

"Despite WBC having two years notice from Cheshire Police and ensuring there were provisions within the budget for this event, no action was taken.

There was no consultation with the Parish, and it was looking very likely that the procession would be cancelled.

"At the Parish Council meeting, it was unanimously agreed that cost of £1,350 required to ensure the procession safely went ahead would be made available from the Parish Council budget.

"We now have time to train up volunteers to assist us in 2022 and are looking forward to Remembrance Sunday with our Veterans and local residents in attendance." attendance."

Ward Borough Cllr Wendy Maisey added: "I'm thrilled that after a local campaign the 70th annual procession will now take place in Culcheth.

"It's the Centenary year for the Royal British Legion and we were all determined to see it come together. I made the case with other residents and councillors requesting funding be made available from the Parish Council. It's frustrating that there has been no provision made by Warrington Borough Council for such an important day when we all pause to honour our fallen and give thanks to all those past and present

from the armed forces.
"I come from an armed forces family, both my parents were Royal Signals so the campaign was really

close to my heart.
"It's been a difficult couple of weeks, but we're all delighted with the outcome and hope we won't meet similar issues in the future."

FORMER councillor Chris Vobe has launched his debut novel, "The Water Tower" which he says was inspired by the loss of Warrington's historic Garnett Tower from the town's skyline.

The Culcheth based author's The Water Tower is a two-volume epic and both parts have been released


simultaneously The novel has been highly anticipated since the beginning of the month when a dedicated Facebook page in support of the book reached over 1,600 people in the first 24 hours.

Described as "equal parts heart-breaking and life-affirming", The Water Tower clocks in at over 500,000 words. It is being released in two volumes, which combine to tell a powerful story that offers a candid exploration of the way we deal with

The Water Tower's primary setting is Little Bassington; a fictional village located somewhere between Hampshire and the South East coast. The story follows reluctant journalist Adam Chapman who returns home after the death of his great aunt to find a community on the cusp of war with a development company, whose plans to construct a sweeping estate of luxury homes would result in the demolition of the iconic Water Tower.

The campaign to save the Tower provokes a charged debate over issues of identity and heritage – while dark secrets long since consigned to



memory are poised to come to light. The novel's style is unusual, in that it incorporates a wide variety of written styles. The Water Tower tackles a number of social issues – including the class divide; poverty; domestic abuse; drug addiction; self-harm and the consequences of infidelity, whilst include the consequences of infidelity.

simultaneously retaining a heavy focus on the nature of relationships. Following The Water Tower's release, Chris explains how the epic

novel came to be:

"Picture the scene. There I was in the summer of 2018, standing in Palmyra Square – approaching the anniversary of my grandfather's passing, in the wake of a friend's untimely death, talking on the phone to a colleague who was about to fly

away to pastures new, and watching the Garnett Tower fall.

"That moment led me to start thinking about loss. How we deal with it, how we respond to it, and

how it changes us.

"I wanted to explore the concept of 'losing something' not just through the prism of grief, but what it means to face losing your identity, or your sense of place. That was the genesis

of the story which eventually became
The Water Tower.

"As our principal cast come
together to save their beloved Water Tower in the slipstream of their own private tragedies, they discover that Little Bassington is a village which harbours secrets. It's down to a reluctant journalist and the woman with whom he falls unexpectedly in love to bring the deepest of those secrets to light - for better or for worse..

In addition to the fictional setting of Little Bassington, The Water Tower will propel readers into the London districts of Mayfair and Bloomsbury for some "pivotal flashback scenes", whilst the denouement to one storyline thread takes place on the

Brighton seafront.

Despite not setting out to write a "political" novel, Chris reveals that readers can expect to find themselves immersed in the trials and tribulations of an "unconventional political romance", which serves as the "beating heart" of the story.

"We're looking at a number of initiatives at Parish level too to alleviate the problems there. There is no quick solution but we're delighted that there is now CCTV on the car park and whilst it's there for a trial period we're hoping it will become a permanent fixture.

Plant Area Specialist

- There are a surprising number of plants that perform well over the winter period, often they are well scented - examples include Sarcococca, Hamamelis and Mahonia

- Cut down any herbaceous plants that have finished flowering and that do not have a strong winter structure. Weed and fork gently between them

Make the right choices

WI pair raised £400 for cancer research

Burtonwood Heritage Centre which
is located next to Gulliver's World
in Warrington, itself situated on part
of the old RAF Burtonwood Airbase.

RAF Burtonwood opened in 1940

RAF Burtonwood opened in 1940 to supply and maintain Spitfires and then in 1942 Gls arrived when the US joined the war. At its height there were 18,500 Gls at the base, which was the bisection of the supplemental to the supplemental the supplemental to the supplemental the which was the biggest in Europe. After the war the Americans went home but in 1948 they were back for the start of 'Operation Vittles' when supply routes to West Berlin were blockaded by the Russians. During the airlift planes carrying coal and food were landing in Berlin as often as every 90 seconds. After 200 hours flying time each plane needed full maintenance checks and these were carried out at Burtonwood with up to eight planes a day being processed.

In the 1950s Burtonwood was used for commercial night flights and it was a base for the V bomber, Britain's nuclear deterrent. US soldiers were based there in the 1960s but the base closed in 1969.

One story concerned Gail Halvorsen who was a pilot during the Berlin Airlift. One day Gail met a group of young children. He only had two sticks of gum in his pocket and when he gave them to the children he was moved by the way they shared it out amongst themselves. themselves.

He began dropping candy from his plane via miniature parachutes as he was coming in to land and this became known as "Operation Little Vittles". He had no authorisation from his superiors but over the next year he became a national hero with support from all over the US Halvorsen's operation over the US Haivorsen's operation dropped over 23 tons of candy to the children of Berlin. He became known as the "Berlin Candy Bomber" and went on to serve as commander of Berlin Tempelhof Airport. He later said "Two sticks of the wind and the said and the said "Two sticks of the wind and the said and chewing gum changed my life"





Green Belt plan refused – two years after being approved

PLANNERS at Warrington have thrown out proposals to demolish Green Belt farm buildings and replace them with three dwellings – two years after approving a similar scheme on the same

Borough council planning officers have ruled that the development at Barrow Farm, in Kenyon Lane, Croft would be inappropriate in the Green Belt.
The 2018 scheme involved only

two dwellings.

Submissions to the planning department stated the scheme would involve demolition of modern, steelframed buildings, conversion of a brick-built Dutch barn to form two dwellings, conversion of another building to form a detached dwelling and construction of two detached garages.

The Dutch barn was the only

building of any significance but had been "swamped" by mid-late 20th-century outbuildings of no architectural or historic interest.

Essentially the new scheme was similar to the one approved in 2018 other than the conversion of a vehicle shed to form a new dwelling.

lt was considered the development would enhance the setting of the listed building.

But planning officers said the proposals would result in harm to the setting of the listed building

because of their layout, design and scale and the incongruous design of


the detached dwelling.

The overall quality of the design had been diminished from that of

the earlier, approved scheme. In addition, the public benefits were minor and would not outweigh the demonstrable harm caused to the setting of the listed building.

It became a bestseller on Amazon – which encouraged Paul to produce his second book in rapid time. "Light of the Sun" again involves

David Reece and his team, this time

trying to stop a terrorist plot to set off a dirty bomb in London.

Although both books are fictional, they benefit from the authenticity Paul is able to provide drawing on his own Special Branch service in the RUC. Both are available in print and as e-books from Amazon'.
