evidence to influence other service providers and funders within the public and voluntary sectors to help improve service provision in rural areas



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
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Players prepare for first show at new home with Sleeping Beauty

Mike Pope after over 10 years as Clerk to the Parish has decided to retire and his last day was on October 31st 2021. He has been dedicated and efficient in everything he has done, and with his advice and experience has made Croft Parish Council, what it is today, a well run and financially sound council. Whist we are sorry to see him go, we realise that life must go on, so the council at its November meeting welcomed our new Clerk Helen Buckley. At that meeting the Chairman on behalf of his fellow councillors present Mike with a glass globe and a copy of his last meeting in October, which turned out to be his 100th. We wish him and his wife well in whatever they decides to do in the future.

In response to the illegal encampment on the CYAC site, the parish council had a meeting with officers of WBC with regard to making the grassed area more secure. One suggestion, which his being looked at, and being costed at the moment, is putting kicker wooden rails around the area. Unfortunately WBC say they have no funds to do this, however the parish council will be pressing for them to provide the funding. This needs doing sooner rather than later.

The Local Plan - The Parish Council are totally against the encroachment onto the Green Belt of a minimum of 75 homes in Croft Village. We have employed, along with Culcheth & Glazebury Parish Council a planning consultant, to put together our objections to the plan. This has now been submitted. We also held an information session for the residents, especially in the area most affected. The turnout was over 50 residents. Hopefully somebody in the council will listen to us and change it.

Bus Service 19 – We have had over the last month a number of Croft residents complaining that the 19 bus service is a total shambles Not turning up on time, not turning up at all, residents having to wait 2 hours for a bus, early morning in the cold. For far too long Croft has been cut off after 7.00pm and the council have written to the bus company and WBC to ask for urgent action to sort this problem out.

Dismay at Parkside decision from local councillors

LOCAL councillors have been left dismayed at the government's decision to allow the proposed development of the former Parkside colliery site near Winwick and its new link road.

The decision was made by Michael Gove, Minister for Gove, Up', Minister Housing and 'Levelling U Communities.

Croft Parish Councillor Norman Partington said, "The £40m Parkside Link Road will join the A579 Winwick Lane within our territory and has been a matter of particular concern to us, cutting through 93 acres of green belt."

A new roundabout is proposed at the junction, with a new dual carriageway to carry the additional

volume of traffic up to junction 22 of the M6.

Councillor Gary Farnsworth added: "Not only will this mean

ick and its new link road.

increased heavy vehicles and traffic queuing locally, it will also attract the development of warehousing/distribution centres in previously protected countryside."

The Parkside proposal was supported by St. Helens Borough Council but in 2018 Warrington Borough Council decided to object to it after a public outcry. Borough Council decided to object to it after a public outcry, including objections from the Parkside Action Group set up to oppose it. But they withdrew their objection two years later. Croft and Culcheth & Glazebury parish councils commissioned a planning consultant to oppose the scheme.

But then the government called

the proposals in for a public inquiry, which took place in January of this

government's inspectorate conducted the inquiry and a decision has been expected from the minister since then.

Cllrs Partington and Farnsworth say the decision will mean huge disruption with construction vehicles and roadworks going forward.



Police continue to appeal for information following machete incident

POLICE are continuing to appeal for information and video footage following reports of a teenager with a machete style knife following an incident at the Shaw Street Recreation ground.
At around 9.30pm on Saturday

13 November, police were called on Shaw Street, involving a group of around 20 youths who were shouting and causing a disturbance.

The caller stated that they had approached the group and asked them to leave.

During the incident one of the group, a teenage boy who was stood approximately six to 10 foot away, pulled a machete style knife out of his pants.

No threats were made towards the victim and the teenager ran off

over the playing field.
Inspector Ruth Atherton said:
"I understand the concern this

incident is likely to cause and we are doing all we can to establish what took place.

"We've not any reports of any incidents of a similar nature, however patrols have also been stepped up in the area to provide reassure local residents."

Officers investigating the incident have since arrested an 18-year-old

The teenager was arrested at around 12pm on Thursday arrested

18 November at an address in Latchford on suspicion of affray and possession of a knife.

He has since been released on bail pending further enquiries.



An audience at the Manchester heard how retired IT ssional Veronica has professional professional Veronica has volunteered to help organise Race for Life and other Cancer Research events across the North West for over 12 years.

Veronica first got involved with the events following the death of her Mother in law. Since then she has taken part in sees gases the North

cancer twice.

She said: "Receiving something like this is lovely and it feels really special. It was a wonderful day meeting all of the other volunteers

and hearing about what they do and how they raise money for Cancer Research.

"I've really enjoyed volunteering at Race for Life events. I first started helping out as it got to the point where I couldn't keep asking people for sponsorship money! So, put myself forward to volunteer.

'Once you've been involved for so many years you can really step into any role and help the event

"It's wonderful to be involved with. I'm retired now and I love working with younger people and seeing so many families and groups of friends coming together

beginning again next year. "I can't wait. I'll probably do around 10 next year across the North West. We need to do the fundraising.



Rising Jazz star Chelsea releases her debut album

FORMER Culcheth schoolgirl Chelsea Carmichael – now a rising star in the jazz world – has released her debut album.

"The River Doesn't Like Strangers" is the first album to be released by new label Native Rebel Recordings and it features Chelsea on tenor sax, guitarist David Okumu, bassist Tom Herbert and drummer Edward Wakill-Hick.

According to the London Jazz
News website, the album "sounds
pretty special – modern, dubby,
spiritual and vital. Carmichael's
playing has the strength and
personality to make the most of the
highly produced soundscape and is
at the centre of everything."

Chelsea first learned to play at Culcheth High School, where she was a member of the school's

swing band.

She originally asked her Dad, Winston, to buy her a violin. But he didn't fancy the sound of someone practising violin around the house so bought her a piano instead. But as she found herself drifting towards jazz, she switched to tenor saxophone although she still plays

saxophone although she still plays piano for composing.

After leaving school, Chelsea studied at Trinity Laban Conservatoire in London and, after graduating, became a professional musician in London. She had toured widely and played with many of the leading interpretations of the day. the leading jazz groups of the day, including Jools Holland's Rhythm and Blues Orchestra.

She has also established herself as an educator and was musical director of the National Youth Jazz Orchestra Jazz Messengers, a group that toured the country helping to develop new jazz talent. Du ring this time, she returned to her old school at Culcheth to help and encourage young music students.

The 10-minute title track of her album was inspired by something her Dad, Winston, said about the river, which flows through the centre of his home village, Grants

Level, in Jamaica.

Chelsea said: says, "I feel the way that I play on this record draws inspiration from the lineage of black music making and the Caribbean Diasporas. It only felt right to reference my own lineage, and what has always been inside me even before a saxophone was

put in my hands".

The London Jazz News review of her album ends: "What will be interesting is what comes next, as judging by her work with others there are more aspects of her musicality than are apparent here. But if a record is truly a snapshot in time, this will serve her well and, whatever happens, Chelsea Carmichael is surely on her way.'



Green Belt homes plan likely to go ahead

PLANS to build two dwellings on land at Barrow Farm, in Kenyon Lane, Croft are likely to go ahead following the refusal by Warrington planning chiefs to grant permission for three dwellings.

The planners have ruled that a development of three properties would be

inappropriate in the Green Belt.

But an earlier scheme, approved in 2018, involving only two dwellings, remains valid and will probably go ahead, according to applicants Andrew and Bettina Sharpe.

Both schemes would involve the demolition of modern, steel-framed agricultural buildings of no historic or architectural interest.

Barrow Farm itself is a Grade 2 Listed building.

Glazebury Traffic

A meeting has been held between members of the Parish Council, Matt Smith (representing Glazebury Traffic Working Group) and Steve Jones (representing ChALC Cheshire Association of Local Councils) regarding a trial of an average speed camera system in Glazebury Village. The Parish Council has put Glazebury forward as a trial site. There were over 20 applicants for this scheme from sites across Cheshire. The Parish Council will fund the trial if Glazebury is picked as one of four sites to test the impact of this technology. It is expected that we will find out the results of this application in the next few months.

Glazebury Play Area
It was agreed at October's Parish Council meeting that the Parish Council would contribute towards the updating of the green play area in Glazebury. The contribution will come from the windmill fund and will partially fund the installation of new logs in the children's play area adjacent to Bent's allotments.

Law and Order

Speed enforcement has continued on Warrington Road in Culcheth and Glazebury. Several offenders were caught near Mee Brow. There has been an increase in requests from local schools for the Police to engage with young people. This is a positive opportunity for community policing after 18 months of online working. Crime generally was low in Culcheth and Glazebury over the past month. the past month.

Local Plan

The Parish Council in conjunction with Croft Parish Council funded a response to Warrington Borough Council's Local Plan from a Planning Consultant. This was submitted ahead of the November 15th deadline. Parish Councillors attended a briefing for the Local Plan which was hosted by Planning Officers from Warrington Borough Council. Parish Councillors questioned Officers on the implications of the Local Plan for Culcheth and Glazebury. There has been a display of the Local Plan in the Library in Culcheth.

Remembrance Sunday

Parish Councillors attended remembrance services in Culcheth and Glazebury Churches on Sunday 14th November. Wreaths from Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Council were laid on the war memorials at the Churches. This was a poignant opportunity to remember those lost during conflicts, especially on the 100th anniversary of The Royal British Legion.


