
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Young BMX champion gearing up for World Championships in France

Other highlights from this year's event recognised Bents' oldest member of the 10+ Club still working at the Centre at 77 and its youngest member at 29 years old.



Controversial HS2 Golborne Link set to be scrapped

THE controversial HS2 Golborne Link, which was set to have a major impact on parts of Warrington including, Culcheth, Glazebury, Croft and Lymm, is set to be scrapped.

Minister Transport Andrew Stephenson has announced the proposal it a letter which has been welcomed by Warrington North MP Charlotte Nichols, Warrington South MP Andy Carter and local borough councillors at Culcheth,

Glazebury and Croft.

In his letter, the Transport Minister said Sir Peter Hendry's independent union connectivity review stated the Golborne Link did not resolve all the current constraints between Crewe and Preston and recommended the

Government consider alternative options.

As a result, the Government intends to remove the Golborne Link and take time to consider the most effective way to find the right balance between delivering the benefits, improving journey times, controlling costs and understanding the deliverability of alternatives.

Commenting on the letter Warrington South MP Andy Carter MP said: "This is movement in the right direction. Since before being elected I've campaigned to have the Golborne Spur removed from the HS2 plan so the announcement that Government will table their own amendment is really good news, it demonstrates Government is listening.

"I know it has been difficult for people living along the route of the Spur and the sooner we can lift all safeguarding the better so that families can get on with their lives. Better links through Warrington Town Centre, with a new highroute east to west are speed route east to west are needed along with improved bus services, that's my priority in line with the wishes of local people." Meanwhile, local councillors at Culcheth, Glazebury & Croft, the areas, most impacted are delighted

with the news.

Cllr Carol Benson said: "The negative impacts the Golborne link would have had on our affected Wards were well understood by everyone. Loss of many beautiful open spaces such as the Covey rishing lake at Partridge Lakes, Culcheth (pictured). Our residents would not have seen any benefit at all of the Golborne link as the trains all of the Golborne link as the trains would not have been accessible locally. After several years of Lobbying from our Warrington South MP, Andy Carter, local activists, and our own action groups, CADRAG with Frank Allen and more recently CLAG, who have all worked hard to raise the profile of this pointless Link, we can at last start to believe our voices

have been heard.
"Many meetings have been held, information events and even a Teams meeting facilitated by Andy Carter between Cllr Kath Buckley, Cllr Carol Benson and The House of Commons which was very helpful.
We are promised that safeguarding
of land and property along the
existing route will be maintained, whilst alternative options are considered. We truly welcome this good news and its massive victory

or common sense".

Cllr Valerie Allen added: "I am absolutely delighted at this announcement and for the residents. of Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft who along with Cllr Benson, Cllr Maisey and I have argued against

this from day one. It would have had done untold damage to wildlife and the greenbelt and effectively cut two villages in half"

Cllr Wendy Maisey added: "This is the long awaited news we've been looking forward to and proof that the Government is listening." that the Government is listening to the residents of Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft. As the former Parliamentary Candidate for Warrington North I fought the GE19 election on a pledge to oppose the Golborne Link, and have kept that promise. When I met and spoke with the HS2 Minister Andrew Stephenson in May, again he was made very aware of environmental disaster that is the Golborne Link."

Cut back your basket to give it a new lease of life - follow up by giving extra attention to feeding and watering



Power firms slammed over "unacceptable service" in response to Storm Arwen

POWER companies have been slammed by energy watchdog Ofgem over an "unacceptable service" in response to Storm Arwen last November, which saw nearly one million homes cut off, including villagers at Croft.

Three network operators – Northern Powergrid, Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks and Electricity North West – have paid to affected customers and agreed to pay another £10.3 million in "redress payments".

Storm Arwen saw nearly one million homes in Britain lose power in November 2021, with nearly 4,000 homes having to cope in appalling conditions without power for over a week. Villagers in Croft were left without power for several days.

Ofgem has today published its findings following a six-month review launched in December 2021 to establish what went wrong and what industry needs to change to provide a more effective response to severe weather events.

The review focussed on whether the power outages could have been prevented, whether correct and timely information was given to customers affected, whether power was restored quickly enough and how customers were supported after the storm including the processing of compensation payments.
Staff in all affected DNOs worked

hard in challenging circumstances to get customers reconnected, but Ofgem concludes that thousands of customers were provided with an unacceptable service. This report builds on the initial findings in the interim report and sets out clear recommendations for improvement. The main findings of the review

affected off 1.Some customers remained off power for unacceptable amount of time, received poor communication from their network operator and compensation payments took too

long.

2. Whilst companies initiated their emergency plans before the storm hit, the plans were not sufficient to deal with the scale of damage that resulted from Storm Arwen.

3.One DNO, Northern Powergrid (NPg), did not directly contact vulnerable customers enrolled on its Priority Services Register (PSR) prior to Storm Arwen. This should have been carried out as part of its planned winter preparedness

4.NPg accepted the performance of its call centre fell below the standards it should have been able to meet during a severe storm. This could be a potential breach to licence condition, SLC 8.3(b) & (c), which relates to the availability and operation of their call centre.

5.Limited remote monitoring on the lower voltage networks hindered

DNOs from understanding the full scale and complexity of faults, impacting the number of resources they initially deployed to undertake repairs, restore power and support customers.

6.Most network faults during Storm Arwen were caused by strong winds or trees and branches falling onto power lines. Ofgem additionally found some correlation

between poles that were damaged and their age, although this needs

further investigation.
7. Customer research and stakeholder feedback told Ofgem that many customers had to endure a very long wait to have their power restored, had to deal with poor and sometimes inaccurate communications with the network operator, and had to endure long delays in receiving compensation, which is not acceptable.

8.28% of customers were given a restoration time that was not within 24 hours of their actual restoration time, and some affected customers did not think that the support available was made clear to them.

In recognition of this, three DNOs – NPg, SSEN and ENWL – paid nearly £30million in direct compensation to affected customers after the storms. These network operators have agreed that they will pay a further £10.3million in voluntary redress payments to the affected communities through contributions to community funds and in departicular to well-are the supportability. and in donations to vulnerability support charities. Progress against recommendations will be tracked and Ofgem will act as necessary to ensure compliance.

Jonathan Brearley, chief executive of Ofgem, said: "Distribution network companies faced challenging conditions in the aftermath of Storm Arwen, and I pay tribute to the many colleagues in those companies supported customers and worked to get them back on power as quickly as possible. However, it was unacceptable that nearly 4,000 homes in parts of England and Scotland were off power for over a week, often without accurate information as to when power would be restored. "Network

companies need to do better, not just to prevent power disruptions, but to ensure that when power is off, they work smarter to get people back on power quicker, and keep customers informed with accurate and timely information. This is the very least customers should be

able to expect.
"The frequency of extreme weather events is only set to increase so it is really important that industry, and those involved more widely, learn from Storm Arwen to better respond in future.

The key recommendations are: 1.DNOs should submit t 1.DNOs should submit their winter preparedness plans to Ofgem so the regulator can be assured that DNOs have taken the necessary steps to ensure that all customers, especially vulnerable customers, can be supported effectively during

power disruptions. 2.DNOs should stress test their websites and call centres to ensure adequate capacity during severe weather events. Additional reporting metrics for communication channels will fit within the next RIIO-ED2 price control settlement that will be determined this year.

3.DNOs to develop more robust mechanisms to enable the delivery



compensation scale, enabling timely and accurate compensation to those eligible.

will review Standard (GSoP) for 4.Ofgem Guaranteed Performance (GSoP) for severe weather to identify amendments that should be made to better reflect the impact of extended power cuts. And the meantime, we recommend DNOs should voluntarily lift the cap for future storms as they did during Storm Arwen.

5.Current network infrastructure and guidance including vegetation

management and overhead line designs should be reviewed to increase network resilience to severe weather events.

6.A standard-based approach to organisational resilience should be considered by E3C to improve the speed of customer restoration during severe weather events. It is noted that current standards and guidance that support the DNOs in providing a reliable network are more focussed on preventing outages rather than how to respond during a power

After leaving the Guards Regiment of the army, he started work as a driver for a private detection agency in Liverpool and, after observing the detectives at work, decided that was the career for him

After lengthy training, he eventually graduated to became a private detective.

George related the history of private investigation, which was started by a British man named Alan Pinkerton, a Cooper by trade, who in 1875 emigrated to the U.S.A. and founded the famous

U.S.A. and founded the tamous "Pinkerton Agency".

The capture of many of the outlaws of the old west such, as Jesse James and Butch Cassidy were instigated by the Pinkerton Agency and the company is still in operation to this day.

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












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
