



# Call to be vigilant over Japanese Knotweed and Giant Hogweed

DESPITE improvements in tackling issues with Japanese Knotweed and Giant Hogweed, residents need to remain vigilant and report any sightings to Warrington Borough Council, says Cllr Nigel Balding, who raised concerns last year.

Last year Warrington Borough Cllr. Nigel Balding (Birchwood) campaigned for a better approach to dealing with the problems of Japanese knotweed. In Birchwood, two main patches of plants were of concern, one growing at J11 of the M62 and another beside the Rirchwood Brook footpath

Birchwood Brook footpath.
Councillor Balding recently also
reported an isolated giant hogweed

plant in Croft to the landowner Biffa (pictured below). This is the second case in two years, as he reported another plant in 2021 which the another plant in 2021 which he company successfully dealt with. He is urging residents to look out for the plants at this time of year and report them asap before they can cause any harm.

After discússions with council officers, he was pleased to report that Warrington Borough Council had updated its policies for treating Japanese knotweed and Giant Hogweed, with a new regime comprising of an annual four-

treatment plan.

The council has said that the costs of treating these two notifiable species on its land between 2017 and 2021 have increased from £2,430 to £6,885 stating increase in costs reflects increase in locations treated for the

two weeds".
Following a question from opposition Conservatives last year, WBC published locations where Knotweed and Giant Japanese Knotweed and Giant Hogweed had been identified. These locations are all on councilowned land and include places in council wards from Appleton to Rixton & Woolston.

Cllr Balding says costs reported for Warrington seem relatively low compared to the national picture.

In 2010 the estimated costs for treating Knotweed Japanese nationally £166m and it is widely reported to have cost £70 million to clear from the Olympic Park in East London during

building work for the 2012 Olympic Games. Cllr Balding thinks that with a more a more herbicide riaorous treatment programme Warrington in place, In place, Warrington locations should now gradually be cleared. However risks from spread from land not owned by the council or fly-tipping of building materials remain, even though it is an effective of the sub-time of th though it is an offence under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 to allow these weeds to spread onto anyone else's property.

With the growing

season now in full swing, Cllr Balding is asking residents to report any council locations which are not on the known list. The sooner they are identified the easier it will be

Of the two plants, giant hogweed (Heracleum mantegazzianum) is the one that is most dangerous. The sap of giant hogweed is phototoxic and causes phytophotodermatitis in humans, resulting in blisters and scars. It contains furocoumarin, which makes skin extremely sensitive to sunlight. If the sap gets onto your skin and it's then exposed to the sun, your skin can blister badly. Blistering can then recur over months and even years.

While Japanese Knotweed is not harmful to humans the plant's vast root system exploits weaknesses in building foundations and drainage systems, often making buildings structurally unsound.

#### **HS2 Hybrid Bill**

On the 6th June the Government announced its intention to remove the Golborne Link from the High Speed Rail Bill 2022. The Government has stated that it is committed to exploring alternatives that deliver similar benefits to to exploring alternatives that deliver similar benefits to the Golborne Link, within the £96bn envelope of the Integrated Rail Plan. The Government intends to maintain safeguarding along the Golborne Link while alternatives are considered. This means you will continue to have access to the full range of HS2 property schemes that are currently available to you if you own land and/or property along the area of the Golborne Link.

#### Defibrillators

The Parish Council has funded the purchase and organised the installation of a defibrillator at the ESSO petrol station on Warrington Road in Culcheth. It is intended that the machine will be in operation from August 2022. It is planned that another defibrillator, funded by the Parish Council, will be installed outside the Scout Hut in Glazebury, in the next few months.

The competition 'Your favourite jam or chutney recipe' was won by Janet Hughes 2nd Doris Friar and 3rd Barbara Taylor.



## Crime thriller inspired by church council minutes at Winwick!

LOCAL author Jackson Beck's third novel may be a crime thriller set in Cyprus - but its inspiration came from the minutes of the church council at Winwick.

"Nightfall in Famagusta" is a crime novel and, like Jackson's previous thrillers, feat detective Nathan Mason. features

This time he embarks on a mission to recover vital documents from Varosha, the part of Famagusta that remains annexed since 1974, when the Turkish military invaded.

If Nathan is unsuccessful he could potentially lose his life and an ecological disaster could strike

All three of Jackson's novels are influenced by the historic church of St Oswald's, Winwick. He said: "Before I started this

novel, I was looking through some old church council meeting minutes in the vestry. I came across an entry from the 70's which stated that a number of refugee children from Cyprus had been brought to the

"When I researched further into the war in Cyprus in 1974, I was taken aback by the movement of people on the Island. Overnight, lifelong neighbours became

enemies and communities isolated or partitioned, all due to the polarising effect that the fighting had on the two different religions.

"As a result many people lost their lives and some parentless children were welcomed into the UK. Land and property also became a big issue. Buildings that were previously owned by Greek Cypriots were suddenly occupied by Turkish Cypriots or citizens from mainland Turkey. Land that previously belonged to Turkish Cypriots was now being farmed by Greek Cypriots.

"The land issue in Cyprus is the

backbone of the story in 'Nightfall in Famagusta' and it all originated

from the church council meeting minutes at St Oswald's, Winwick." 'Nightfall in Famagusta' is currently available on Amazon in paperback or Kindle format.
