

Colette takes the plunge for teenager left disabled after being starved of oxygen at birth

TO mark her 40th birthday year Colette Toynton is taking the plunge with a sponsored skydive to help raise funds for a teenage family friend left disabled after being starved of oxygen at birth.

Aaron aged 18, from Croft, was born full term after a normal healthy pregnancy but suffered lack of oxygen due to clinical negligence at birth and spent the first three days fighting for his life in Neonatal Intensive care.

His parents clung on to each other to find hope and strength whilst they tried to navigate the most unconventional uncertain

After three weeks Aaron was allowed to go home and at 4 months old he was diagnosed with Cerebral Palsy with MRI scans confirming irreversible brain

Aaron didn't meet his milestones and although he has developed into a happy, fun-loving sociable boy with the cheekiest sense of humour, a winning smile and a resilience like no other, he has been

severely affected physically.
Throughout his life he required various pieces specialist equipment to manage his postural needs. He is unable to sit unaided and is reliant on using a wheelchair.

The biggest challenge for Aaron is to control his dystonia where his tone fluctuates from very high to

tone fluctuates from very high to very floppy.

Aaron's parents sourced an all-terrain buggy so he could access beaches etc and has opened up so many locked doors. This buggy has a custom-made maximising comfort and support but he has now outgrown this. Specialist equipment for disabled people is a niche market and unfortunately, zero's are added onto the prices and parents are often exhausted in caring for their child/young person alongside having to source and fundraise this essential equipment.

Colette, who also lives in Croft

Colette, who also lives in Croft said: "All Aaron's parents want is for him to be comfortable, happy and relaxed so he can carry on to enjoy his life, socialise which he certainly does at our local pubs where he is a part of the community supported by so many lovely and caring people.

"I turned 40 this year and after years of watching Im a celebrity get me out of here' and the trial of jumping from a plane, I forever said to my husband....I'd easy do that! Only turning 40 gave my husband the bright idea to book and pay for a tandem skydive 12,000ft in the

a tandem skydive 12,000tt in the air!

"Working for a Care Provider –
Potens, I understand the difficulties many face in having the correct equipment to enhance their everyday lives and the funding involved to provide this.

"So I am braving it, putting my big girl knickers on and taking the dive! By doing so I would love to be able to raise funds for a very special young man...our friend Aaron.

PLANNING chiefs at Warrington have given the go-ahead for a change-of-use and refurbishment of the Birchwood Leisure and Tennis Complex.

The plans approved by Warrington Borough Council planners will allow for the relocation of Birchwood Library into the complex in Benson Road,

Birchwood.

A new studio and updated changing room facilities are included in the proposals and the library will be moved from the

adjacent Birchwood High School. The school will continue to have shared use of the leisure centre and also use the library which will be in an under-used bar and cafe space.

Heating and hot water repairs will be carried out together with minimal roof repairs and external cladding work.

The proposal is designed to meet a need to improve the existing building and facilities to enable the relocation of the library and increase the use of the building

with a studio space.

Plan to retain use of land for car storage

PROPOSALS have been put forward to regularise the existing use of land at Croft, as a car storage site.

The land at Manor House, Cross Lane, is a previously used brownfield site and has remained unchanged for decades, according to the applicant.

It is being used for car storage in connection with a business that does not operate from the site. The cars are simply stored on the land for later access.

But the site is surrounded by other businesses uses - including a golf driving range, which causes light pollution through the use of floodlights until late at night.

It is not accessed from Cross Lane but from Silver Lane.

Manor House is a two-storey house in domestic use – similar to

other houses in the area.

The applicant maintains that continued use of the land for storing cars will not have any impact on the Green Belt.

"Urgent" roof repairs approved – 12 months later

PLANNING chiefs at Warrington PLANNING chiefs at Warrington have given the go-ahead for roof repairs at Newchurch Old Rectory, Culcheth – some 12 months after an application was made for permission for the "urgent" work.

Officers have decided the

proposed work will not cause harm to the Grade 2 Listed

Dating from 1812, the building



Warrington Road was originally a rectory but is now a private dwelling.

The work will include removing

roof slates to allow new felt to be fitted, the slates then to be replaced, damaged or missing slates to be replaced with matching materials, relocation of an existing hopper and downspout and creation of a chicken wire system to prevent blockages on a sun room roof.

Coping stones and a lantern will be temporarily removed to allow the work to be carried out.

The building is in a semi-rural area with no other properties

A PUBLIC meeting has been organised at Culcheth to discuss remaining fears over the controversial HS2 Golborne Link.

Culcheth And District Rail Action Group (CADRAG) Chair Frank Allen, said: lit is becoming clear that the Government has not yet dropped it entirely from its plans for

its plans for HS2

Frank added: "We were all very relieved to hear that the Government has taken the Golborne Link out of the Hybrid Bill authorising the next stage of HS2 construction, from Crewe to Manchester. However, it is becoming clear that the Golborne Link has not yet been dropped entirely from the Government's plans. Although the majority of the Link has been removed, its junction with the HS2 line from Crewe to Manchester has been retained. This will allow the Golborne Link to be added at a later date if the Government so decides.

'We are naturally concerned about this and are holding an information and discussion meeting on Friday September 23rd at the Village Club, Wigshaw Lane, Culcheth, starting at 7.30 pm. Everyone is welcome to come along, hear more about the current situation, and let us know what you think."

Shaun captures images from outer space – as seen from Culcheth!

SHAUN Jones has lived in Culcheth for 21 years and although some may think he has his head in the clouds, he actually has his feet firmly on the ground.

He's a big fan of astrophotography – taking photographs

of the Moon, planets, stars and distant galaxies – and would like to encourage other locals to take up what he sees as a fascinating

hobby.
"I know there are people who are interested and would like to have a go but think that light pollution makes it impossible.

"But this is not the case. I'm only an amateur and I am still learning. But I think some of my pictures are quite good for an amateur."

Shaun has been interested in science and engineering since he was a youngster, now he is a ne was a youngster, now he is a graduate mechanical engineer, with a BEng in Automotive Engineering and an MSc in Mechanical Engineering.

He uses a Meade LX200 8" reflector telescope with a Nikon D3500 camera for his estrophotography.

astrophotography
This means the aperture of
the telescope is eight inches in
diameter and in astrophotography the larger the diameter, the better, as it allows you to collect as much light as possible.

Shaun is at the mercy of the weather, of course, and astrophotography is quite sensitive to any sort of atmospheric disturbance, whether it be cloud cover, wind or thermals in the upper atmosphere which can upper atmosphere, which can impact the final image. Because of this he uses a technique called "lucky imaging" where you take lots of short exposure frames with the hope that the atmosphere will be momentarily stable in some of them. The software then filters through them and selects the best frames to form the final image.

The Moon and the planets are

easier to photograph than the more distant stars – but Shaun will tackle

He has pictures of the Moon, Jupiter, Saturn and Venus as well as more distant stars and groups of stars and is hoping to capture Mars

share which recently provided the first clear evidence of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere of a planet outside the Solar System, but it does provide impressive images of outer space and it should not be forgotten that sometimes amateurs make discoveries that the big boys

Eric showed himself to be an extremely adept clarinetist. Essentially a traditional jazz enthusiast, he played many well known but also proved quite capable of moving into the classical genre by playing part of a work by Mozart.

After attending grammar school, which he didn't find at all stimulating, he was becoming bored with life, until a school friend took him to a local jazz club where he was fascinated by the clarinet player.

wonderful grandfather His managed to scrape together the £16 to buy him his first clarinet and he taught himself to play, eventually becoming a member of the band who first sparked his interest.

who first sparked his interest. After trying numerous occupations as a day job, he was really only interested in his evening and weekend gigs playing and touring the country with the band.

One of their gigs was at the Cavern Club in Liverpool and they were once on the same bill as The Beatles, who at the time were just starting out. Even in those very early days, Eric said the audience were really only interested in the were really only interested in the fab four and couldn't wait for the jazz band to leave the stage!

In 1962 he won a place at the Royal Northern School of Music and there learned to play classical music. Eventually he passed all his

exams and achieved the accolade of letters after his name. After leaving the School of Music he tried various occupations and related many hilarious tales of his many different jobs.

During a difficult time in his life, while aimlessly wandering around, he noticed a busker in the town centre and decided maybe he would give that a try, which proved a success and gave him a new interest in life. Busking has been a way of life for Eric over the years, even going as far a field as Australia playing in most of the major cities, in fact, up until the pandemic, he was spending six months of the year down under, staying with friends and busking during the day.

Back home, whilst watching marathon running on TV, decided he could do that whilst, at the same time, playing his clarine! He competed in the London Marathon, amongst 38 others, was interviewed for television, and raised £60,000 for charity! Unfortunately his days of marathon running are over, due to a heart condition, but playing traditional jazz and maybe the odd "busk" are still major parts of his life.
