



Development plan for disused care home site

PLANS to demolish an old and disused care home at Culcheth and replace it with nine new houses and a six-bed care facility have been submitted to Warrington Borough Council.

The proposals by Twiss Green Barns Ltd, of Culcheth, involve demolition of the former Radcliffe Meadows Nursing Home in Twiss Green Lane.

They seek to make use of a previously developed site currently in a poor condition by delivering a new, high quality residential development offering a significant enhance to the built environment.

Borough council planners have been told the existing nursing home building is in a deteroriating condition, contains asbestos and is unsafe to survey.

The new, two-storey care

facility will provide high quality accommodation to meet modern care standards and provide a good level of residential amenity for future occupants. It will have a roof-top garden.

The proposed new houses have been designed with regard to national space standards and there will be a set. there will be safe vehicular and pedestrian access to the site with no negative impact on the highway network. A suitable level of parking will be provided on the site.

If the scheme is approved, the new care facility would be operated by Warrington Community Living, a local charity that supports people with learning difficulties, physical disabilities, older people, people with dementia and people experiencing mental health issues.





Garage to be converted into two-bed home

PLANNING chiefs at Warrington have given the go-ahead for the conversion of a garage/storeroom into a two-bed dwelling at Croft.

The scheme is at Kenyon Farm, Heath Lane and will result in a small, family home with a parking space and an electric vehicle charging point.

charging point.

Outwardly, there will be little change in the appearance of the building, although a chimney will

be removed and two windows inserted in a side elevation where there are currently garage doors.

A back garden will be created using part of the residential curtilage of the existing farmhouse.

Warrington Borough Council planners say the development will not have any impact on the Green Belt

Woman who made councillor's life sentenced after breaching stalking

LOCAL Borough Cllr Wendy Maisey spoke for the first time publicly after a woman who breached a stalking protection order, made her life a "living hell," putting her in fear for her life.

The Crown Prosecution Service (CPS) said a stalking protection order had been granted in relation to Marta Paszkowska, 45, of Chicago Place in Great Sankey, Warrington, on 19 November 2021

This followed ongoing Instagram posts from Paszkowska, a former election candidate and parish Cllr at Westbrook, harassing Wendy Maisey – a Warrington Borough councillor for Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft.

Yet on 21 November and 22 November 2021, Paszkowska put further posts on Instagram about Ms Maisey and even mentioned the Protection Order, which had been imposed just days before and that the further posts were clearly in breach of.

The account "me_mp.why_not"

has a picture of Marta Paszkowska on the profile and it is clear that she runs this Instagram account.

Ms Maisey had reported these posts to the police and Paszkowska was arrested and charged with two breaches of the stalking protection

When questioned she told officers that she didn't understand When what the order was or what the words meant. She admitted being responsible for the posts but insisted she didn't realise she was breaking the law.

Ms Maisey told officers that the ongoing abuse was affecting her life and that she was anxious and felt nervous in her home. She said she felt that the threat from Paszkowska was escalating and that she feared for her safety.

Paszkowska initially denied the

offences but pleaded guilty on 13 October 2022 to a breach of the order. On 3 November 2022 at Liverpool Crown Court, she was given an 18-month community order and ordered to do 20 days of a rehabilitation activity.

The Crown Prosecution Service also applied for a restraining order

also applied for a restraining order preventing her from contacting Ms Maisey in any way. This was granted by the court and will remain in place for two years.

District Crown Prosecutor Laura Tipping, of CPS Mersey Cheshire, said: "Marta Paszkowska caused real fear and concern in Ms Maisey, who she has targeted with Instagram posts of a harassing and intimidating nature.

intimidating nature.

"Instead of stopping when the initial stalking protection order was issued, she carried on with the behaviour. Threatening and harmonia posts on social media harassing posts on social media can have a big impact on the victim's life – as has happened in

Wendy Maisey is a local councillor who is working on behalf of the people in her ward. Paszkowska has threatened her ability to do that and she is now paying the price.

Following the price.
Following the case Cllr Maisey said: "After 20 months of living hell, I'm glad to see that the CPS was successful in Court yesterday in sentencing Ms Paszkowska. Her behaviour forced me at one point to move to an undisclosed address

due to concerns for my life.

"No elected individual should have to go through this, the impact on my mental and physical health has been immense.
"I've remained silent throughout

this harrowing time to protect my three daughters, one who was also targeted by her.

She's previously been remanded in custody for breaking the terms of the Stalking Protection Order put in place for my safety and she has shown no respect for me as an individual or for the Law of our

Country.
"I'd like to thank the CPS and Cheshire Police for their ongoing support, in particular the Harm Reduction Unit who have been amazing throughout this ordeal. Without the wraparound love and support from my friends and family I probably would have reluctantly stepped down from public life.


Flies

Life on a narrowboat!

MEMBERS of Culcheth and Newchurch WI heard about life on a narrowboat at their November meeting.

The meeting at the Parish Hall began with Jerusalem, accompanied by Margaret Jones.
The two speakers, Chris and Barbara Kay, then began with an account of the lives of narrow boat families. families.

Both speakers are very much involved with the National with the Waterways Museum at Ellesmere Port and Chris began with slides showing the Museum's Indoor Exhibition Area and the outside landscaping, as well as views of earlier days before improvements. He showed sketches of the dreadful roads of the 18th century. This led to canal building on a huge scale-"canal mania" by the early 19th century.

The canal companies did very well but then slowly lost out to railways. Barbara talked about the narrow boat workers and their hard life. She wore a long skirt and pinafore and a wonderful frilled sunbonnet with "curtains" to the shoulders and Chris showed slides

of narrow boat interiors, compact and snug for a small family but later condemned as squalid by health and school inspectors and nurses.

In 1877 narrow boats had to be registered but it was hard to catch the children for school as they helped man the boats. Finally by the 1960s narrow boats had bécome a form of leisure.

Brenda Pinion thanked Barbara and Chris while Jane Bushby won the competition prize for "A Piece of Canal Art". Quite a few members had visited the Ellesmere Port site and had enjoyed their experience.
