


community with a funding appeal to make up the shortfall or hold some fund-raising events.

# Time for consolidation as Raven Inn team prepare for next big push

AFTER a few fairly hectic months the cooperative that will be running the Raven Inn, helping save it from demolition, is taking stock and preparing for the next big push.

The Raven raised  $\pounds200,000$  with its community shares offer, then secured a grant of just over  $\pounds100,000$  from the Community Ownership Fund, which is part of the government's levelling up scheme.

Spokesperson, Peter Sturman said: "So much has happened over the last three months, all of it positive.

"It is a time to refocus then make the dream of our community a reality. It is worth noting that not only was our share offer a tremendous success, but our share prospects was awarded the 'Standard Mark', acknowledging it as the best it could be.

"Following on from that we have been recognised, by the government, with the award of a very prestigious grant.

very prestigious grant. "The committee responsible for the Raven has always said that we represent and reflect our community.

"The heart and soul of the Raven lies with our local community. We are only where we are because of that support.

"We' fully recognise our responsibility in dealing with funds entrusted to us by our community and the government. "We have been putting procedures and safeguards in place, not only to ensure everything is done properly, but to evidence and demonstrate that is so.

"Those structures are now in place."

Peter added: "We still plan to have the Raven open in time for Easter. We recognise that is challenging, but we prefer a hard deadline. To take a quote from elsewhere, "If you aim at nothing, you will hit it every time." "It has taken a while for the

"It has taken a while for the owners and our dedicated volunteers to ensure the building is structurally secure. That has been of paramount importance. For example there was one wall where you could literally rock it from side to side, by hand. "All that painstaking, detailed

"All that painstaking, detailed and important work has now been completed. We are now renovating the pub and the kitchen, turning a shell into our community pub.

shell into our community pub. "Whilst our fundraising is done, we are keeping the Founders & Supporters wall open until just after Valentine's Day.

"What better way to declare your undying love than to demonstrate it on the wall inside the Raven forever more?"

## Four weeks of road closures

#### HIGHWAY planners are proposing to close a stretch of road at Culcheth for up to four weeks for road and footway resurfacing works.

The road closure will take place on Broseley Lane from the entrance of Leigh Golf Club to Wilton Lane between the hours of 9;30 am and 3;30pm Monday-Friday. Warrington Borough

Council

Warrington Borough Council has given notice it intends to make an Order under Section 14 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984. The effect of which will be to introduce a prohibition of driving on Broseley Lane at the bend at the entrance to Leigh Golf Club (Broseley Avenue to Wilton Lane). The Order will be effective from 31st January 2023 for 4 weeks,

between the hours of 9:30am and 3:30pm, Monday to Friday, as and when the signs are in place on site. Access will be under the control of the relevant Contractor for the duration of the works.

The alternative route will be via B5207 Broseley Lane, Common Lane, A574 Warrington Road, A580 East Lancashire Road, A572 Newton Road, B5207 Kenyon Lane and Wilton Lane.

The closure is required to allow for the installation of safety kerbs and resurfacing of the carriageway and footway.

# National speed limit to be reduced to 30mph due to safety concerns following six collisions in five years

HIGHWAY planners have given notice that the national Speed Limit on Alder Root Lane at Winwick is set to be reduced to 30mph due to safety concerns following six personal injury collisions in the past five years. Warrington Borough Council highway planners say Alder Root Lane is a rural lane that links Alder lane in Warrington to Wargrave Road at the boundary with St Helens.

Helens

The boundary follows the route of Newton Brook. The characteristics of Alder Root Lane which is subject to the National Speed Limit are predominantly narrow in width, lacking footways and having tight bends either side of a low, narrow bridge beneath the main West Coast Railway line. It also serves Alder Root Golf Club with the club house, professional shop and parking to the west of the road and the golf course itself to the east. This arrangement generates many pedestrian crossing movements throughout the day. Interrogation of the collision database shows that six reported personal injury collisions have occurred on the of Alder Root Lane which is subject

collisions have occurred on the route within the past five years, one of which resulted in a seriously injured casualty at the access to the golf club.

In addition, a number of bridge strikes have occurred despite the existence of a low bridge being signed from both directions. In the interests of safety, it is therefore deemed necessary for the speed limit to be reduced from the current National Speed Limit to 30 miles per hour.

This action will leave a short length of road called Wargrave Road which will still be subject to the National Speed Limit from the Borough Boundary heading in a northerly direction to a point just to the south of Vulcan Village where the speed limit changes to 30mph. For consistency and in order to maximise the safety benefits of the proposed 30mph speed limit, St Helens Borough Council will be continuing the proposed 30mph from the boundary with Warrington through into Vulcan Village and beyond.

Notice is hereby given that Warrington Borough Council proposes to make an Order under Sections 1, 2, 4 and 84 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 and of all other enabling powers. The effect of the Order will be to introduce a 30 miles per hour

"The funding received by the Town Council will be allocated to cover general inflation in operational costs and the cost of services supplied to the town council and will enable Birchwood Town Council to continue to provide the current level of services within the area, including the additional grass cuts between those undertaken by cuts between those undertaken by the borough council.

A precept requirement of £376,816.00 has been submitted to the borough council by Birchwood Town Council for the 2023/2024 financial year.

### **Tories see red over playgrou**

A political row has broken out after Labour parish cllrs. at Culcheth welcomed  $\pounds 200,000$  funding for a new play area in the village – after Tory Borough Cllrs helped secure some of the money from Warrington Borough Council.

The three Tory Borough Cllrs. representing the Culcheth area, Wendy Maisey, Carole Benson and Valerie Allen, saw red when Labour Cllrs issued a press release and photograph heralding the funding success – especially after "promised" funding from the



borough council had been cut by nearly half.

In a joint statement they said: "Whilst any funding offered by the Warrington Borough Council (WBC) is welcome, it is disappointing that the funding that was promised has already been cut by half. This was an ideal opportunity for all Parish and Borough Councillors to work together to maximise funding and to get the best possible play equipment for the children of Culcheth.

"It is hypocritical and opportunist of Labour Parish councillors to parade themselves in front of a playground which has received a funding cut from Warrington Borough Council. The decision regarding the funding announced by WBC has yet to be ratified by all ten Parish Councillors or the Borough Councillors and their press release was without doubt premature and lacked consultation trom other stakeholders.

"Conservative Borough Councillors were asked by Culcheth & Glazebury Parish Council to speak to WBC on their behalf, as the parish had hit a stalemate and were getting nowhere with the Council. After several representations, Conservative Borough Councillors were initially promised £140k match funding by WBC.

"After a period of silence, we were notified that only £72k would be made available to supplement the money allocated by the Parish Council. This is a funding cut and yet another example of Labour giving with one hand and taking with another.

"Labour councillors are strangely silent about where the further £68k originally promised from the Borough Council has gone. It seems obvious that Labour Parish councillors do not talk to their Borough counterparts and seem to be completely at sixes and sevens on this matter. They don't seem to be able to communicate with their own portfolio holders because Labour locally seems factional, divided and utterly dysfunctional. All of this results in Culcheth being awarded less than we are due, and we risk a playground being developed that is not fit for purpose. Labour councillors should stop settling for second best and join local Conservatives in demanding

"Children from Newchurch Newchurch Primary School spent a lot of time drawing pictures of their desired new playground, resulting in a list of the top 10 items they wanted to see in their new playground. The Children of Culcheth have been waiting far too long for a decent replacement playground and deserve a playground that is fit for future generations to come.

"The amount being contributed by WBC falls far short of what is needed and is far less than previous

needed and is tar less than previous playground budgets locally. "Questions need asking and they certainly will be! Why?" In response to the criticism, Cllr Neil Johnson, Chair of Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Council said: "Any initial discussions that took place between WBC and the took place between WBC and the

Parish Council were prior to the economic and financial turbulence that has impacted all in recent months. Ultimately, the decision over the size of funding provided by WBC for the play area was a decision made above Parish Council level and we acknowledge the difficulties all councils have had with their budgets in recent years.

"We are grateful for the funding that has been provided and the additional agreement for the borough council to pay the project management fees, which can be substantial. There is no "cut" to funding for the play area, because there were no monies allocated or confirmed by WBC at the start of this process.' Monies granted have only recently been agreed upon and awarded to the project."

#### Defibrillators and Phoning 999 for Location and Access Details

The Parish Council have bought and installed three Defibrillator machines over the last few months. One at Esso Garage, Culcheth, one at Victorian Tea Rooms, Glazebury and a replacement for the one at the Scout Hut, Culcheth. These machines are on outside walls so accessible 24/7. The procedure for accessing a defib machine is firstly to phone 999 and ask for an ambulance. Tell them your location and that you have a patient who appears to be in cardiac arrest or has severe chest pains. The administrator will check the system to find the nearest Defib machine to your location and will give you directions and a code to open the cabinet to access the defib machine. They also will ensure an ambulance is actioned.

# Puppy "meet and greet" area rejected by planners

### BOROUGH Council planning chiefs have thrown out an application for a new building to provide a puppy "meet and greet" viewing area at a Croft farm.

The scheme involved demolition of an existing agricultural building - said to be in a significant state of dilapidation - at Brookside Farm,

and planion - an encouside Farm, Lady Lane, Croft. It would be replaced by a new building with a mixed use of agricultural storage and the "meet and greet" viewing area. Applicant Kelly Fenney has been told the scheme has been refund because, it is considered

refused because it is considered inappropriate in the Green Belt and that there are no very special reasons outweighing the harm it would cause to the openness of the Green Belt.

Nine objections were received by the borough council on the

grounds that a retail business was operating at the farm without permission, that a significant permission, that a significant number of vehicles were visiting, that no provision was being made to expand parking space and that on-street parking in the area would be hazardous. Planners said there had been a

number of other objections which were not relevant because they were not planning issues.

One objection was received from Warrington Animal Welfare.

The "meet and greet" area was said to be needed to enable potential purchasers to see puppies in the presence of their mothers.

# Plan to replace shopping centre car park with mixed commercial and residential development

A PLAN to replace a shopping centre car park at Culcheth with a mixed-use commercial and residential development has been submitted to Warrington Borough Council planners.

The proposals by Shavit Haminim Capital Limited involve replacing the existing CPS car parking area at the junction of Jackson Avenue and Common Lane with a two-storey mixed-use building consisting of commercial units at ground floor level and three residential units at first-floor level, new public realm and ancillary works.

The existing area contains 22 car parking spaces, two of which are designated for disabled users. The existing vehicle route allows vehicles to enter from Common Lane and exit onto Jackson Lane.

The Proposed Development would require the removal of all of the 22 car parking spaces. In their place would be a two-storey building. The building line on to Common Lane would correspond with the existing eastern extent of the Sainsburys Supermarket. On the Jackson Avenue frontage, the building line would respond to the extent of the existing building, the furthest extent of which

is the entrance to the solicitors. The southern and eastern extent of the proposed building would reflect the existing commercial units that front onto the car parking area. The building would be sited to allow for a pedestrian walkway between the Proposed Development and these existing commercial units.

THE January meeting of Croft WI concentrated mainly on voting for the NFWI Resolutions for 2023 and members were asked to vote on which of the Resolutions they wished to be adopted.

Members voted on one resolution, the results go to National Federation. The results of the vote were not announced at the meeting.

These consisted of:

Resolution 1 - Save our water every drop matters

As global temperatures rise, there is a risk drought will become more frequent in the UK. This will place increasing strains on the UK's water supply and endanger our natural world. The NFWI calls on government and water companies to work together to develop robust plans that would ensure the UK's long-term water security, including addressing water leakages from pipes. The NFWI calls on WI members to take immediate personal actions to value and conserve water. Resolution 2

Women to women - turning over a new leaf in the lives of women tea workers

While in the UK we enjoy our daily cuppa, the mostly women tea workers who produce our tea struggle to access living wages, decent housing, sanitation or education for their children, due to the low prices paid to producers for tea. The NFWI calls on UK tea companies and retailers to take action to fix the broken tea buying system to enable plantation owners

The proposed walkway would be approximately 8.3m at its widest point. The route would be well landscaped with areas of soft landscaping and trees. The intention is for a public space for people to interact, and benches would be provided.

At the ground floor level would be two Class E-commercial units. Unit A would be 108 sqm in area and have frontages onto Jackson Avenue and Common Lane, as well as the newly created walkway. Unit B would be 66sqm in area and would have one frontage onto Jackson Avenue and two onto the pedestrian walkway. Between the two units on the Jackson Avenue elevation, there would be a bin store

At first floor level there would be three residential units accessed from a central hallway. Unit 1 would be a 1 bedroom 2'person (1B2P) unit measuring 51sqm. It would be dual aspect with a balcony measuring 5sqm. Unit 2 would be a 1B2P unit aspect and have two balconies of 5sqm and 3sqm. Unit 3 would be a 2B3P unit measuring 75sqm.

Whilst the Council considered that the scheme presented at the preapplication stage would detrimentally affect the vitality and viability of the Culcheth Village Neighbourhood Centre this is disagreed with by the applicant.

They say the loss of car parking has been demonstrated to not cause a problem for those wishing to use the existing car parks.

They also say the Local Plan seeks to reduce dependence on car use anyway, and there is public transport access to the CPS Centre, adding that the new public space would enhance the existing CPS Centre rather than detract from it by creating a space for people to walk and sit.

# **Call for council** update on transit site for travellers

### A councillor has called for an update on the latest situation regarding a transit site for travellers in Warrington following the latest illegal encampment on Silver Lane at Risley.

Cllr Wendy Maisey has written to council leader Cllr. Russ Bowden, requesting an urgent update on the progress of a transit site in the town

Cllr Maisey said: "I received a call from Parish Cllr Sue Bland advising that an illegal encampment of caravans has again sprung up on Silver Lane and reported this immediately to the Police and Warrington Borough Council. "This is the third encampment in

Warrington since the New year. Silver Lane is a hot spot for this activity and a decision is needed by Warrington Borough Council as to the location of the permanent traveller transit site. I feel that progress is not being made quickly enough, there is no meeting set this year for the committee to reconvene and Councillors are not being updated on the status of the transition site.

"I've written to the Council Leader requesting an urgent update. It's false economy to keep kicking this issue into the long grass. The cost of clearing up and other damage far outweigh the cost of the transit site, the funds for the site have been

ring-fenced for many years. "I've repeatedly asked Warrington Borough Council for the cost of clear up at Silver Lane since 2021 but have never received this information. We need to all work together to resolve this matter once and for all for the residents of Warrington".

The council has ring-fenced money to set up a permanent travellers site in the town but has been unable to find a suitable site,

despite extensive searches. A Warrington Borough Council spokesperson said: "We are fully committed to the delivery of a suitable transit site within the town and recognise the benefits for both the travelling community and our residents.

"We are continuing to work with our partners to identify a suitable traveller transit site in the borough. The need for this is fully established in the submitted proposed local plan that was subject to examination in public in September.


