Editor's Comment

IT'S hard to put into words what the family and friends of Brianna Ghey must be going through following her shocking death at Culcheth Linear Park

As a former Culcheth schoolboy who grew up in the area, I am struggling to comprehend how this incident, which catapulted a small rural village into mational

headlines, happened.
With two teenagers currently awaiting trail accused of murder I can not write anything which could prejudice the case.

My thoughts are with Brianna's family and friends at this difficult

I sadly reported on the incident from within a few hours of it the following week - not the kind of local news I enjoy reporting on.

The overwhelming out pouring of

support from the local community, will hopefully bring some comfort to the family as they try and come to terms with their sad loss.

terms with their sad loss.

Meanwhile we are fast approaching the 30th anniversary of the Warrington bombing another dark day in the history of our town, when two young boys went out shopping, the day before Mother's day, never to return home, after the IRA placed two bombs in litter bins on Bridge Street.

It is a day I will never forget as a local journalist and pre-dated

a local journalist and pre-dated social media and online news - but still managed to make shockwaves not just around the country - but the whole world.

While it was a terrible atrocity, it did see some light in the dark, thanks to the bravery of Colin and Wendy Parry and their family, not forgetting Marie and Wilf Ball, and the late Bronwen Vickers and her family, as the town rallied to show

good could triumph over evil.

The Warrington Peace Centre became a legacy to the memory of the two boys, Tim Parry and Johnathan Ball and while it has faced a somewhat uncertain future I remain hopeful that it can continue to offer a safe space for young

people.
Wherever you are on March
20th spare a thought for all those
who suffered, while also looking
to the future with hope in such uncertain times.

Family overwhelmed with messages of support following tragic death of "beautiful, witty and hilarious" daughter

THE family of Birchwood teenager Brianna Ghey, have been overwhelmed with the messages of support they have received, following her death from multiple stab wounds at Culcheth Linear Park.

A fundraising appeal has already eached more than £100,000, to help cover funeral costs and support her family, as vigils took place across

her tamily, as vigils took place across the country in her memory.

The death of the 16-year-old on a Saturday afternoon, in a local park, rocked the community.

DCI Adam Waller, the Senior Investigating Officer in the case, said: "I would like to pass on my sincere thanks to the community of Culcheth for their support in relation. Culcheth for their support in relation to the investigation.
"We have been inundated with

pieces of information from members of the community wanting to help and assist the enquiry. Many of our

and assist the enquiry. Many of our officers have been approached to offer their best wishes to us and, especially, to Brianna's family.

"I know that the family have also been overwhelmed by the messages of support, positivity and the compassion across the country and beyond – and the thoughts of everyone at the Constabulary remains firmly with them."

beautiful daughter cruelly taken from them in the most shocking and heartbreaking way.

"Brianna was an outgoing, confident girl. She brought a lot of laughter to those who knew her. She was looking forward to taking her exams this year and beginning her journey into the adult world."

Following her death a family tribute read: "Brianna was a muchloved daughter, granddaughter, and baby sister. She was a larger-than-life character who would leave a lasting impression on all that met her. Brianna was beautiful, witty and hilarious. Brianna was strong, fearless and one of a kind.

"The loss of her young life has left a massive hole in our family, and we know that the teachers and her friends who were involved in her life will feel the same.

"We would like to thank everyone for their kind words and support during this extremely difficult time. We would like to thank the police for their support, and witnesses for helping with the investigation. "The continuation of respect for

rivacy is greatly appreciated."
Meanile two teenagers accused of the murder of 16-year-old Brianna at Culcheth are set to face trial in July.
The 15-year-old girl from Warrington and a 15-year-old boy

from Leigh appeared at Liverpool Crown Court.

The two defendants, who cannot be identified for legal reasons, appeared in court via video link from youth detention accommodation

The teenagers only spoke to confirm their names and dates of birth and sat during the hearing each separately accompanied by a member of the detention centre staff.

The trial has been set for July 10

and is estimated to last three weeks.

The defendants were both further remanded to the youth detention accommodation to next appear at the court on May 2 when they are due to enter their pleas.

Health Minister sees first-hand why town needs a new £350m hospital

WHILE there has still been no update on a bid for a new £350m hospital in Warrington, health minister Helen Whately was in town to see first-hand the pressures on the frontline.

The Minister for Social Care visited Warrington Hospital following calls from Warrington South MP Andy Carter in the House of Commons, to address delays to patient discharges from hospital.

The Minister met with senior doctors and nurses and spent time looking at the pressures in the Accident and Emergency Department, Frailty Unit and

discharge lounge, where she spoke to staff about the challenges in finding accommodation in local care homes and providing support for residents in their own homes.

The Minister also saw the recently opened Same Day Emergency Treatment Unit which is helping to relieve pressure on A&E and reduce the number of people admitted to the wards.

Mr Carter said: "Our Hospital services are under significant pressure and I want the Ministers to know that we're facing particular challenges here in Warrington because the healthcare infrastructure isn't big enough to cope with the growth in the local population. We have too many patients spending too long in acute care, when they're well enough to leave hospital there are often delays in finding convalescence care and support for people returning home.

"Seeing the pressure I hope it will also demonstrate to the Department of Health why I'm so determined to secure a new hospital for Warrington. Working together, with NHS Leaders and the local authority we've made a strong argument for a £350 million which would allow us to secure a new purpose-built hospital for the town and improved parking, which is so often a criticism when patients and visitors go to the current hospital."

The Minister started the day

The Minister started the day at Warrington and Vale Royal College's new Health and Social Care Academy, which was funded with £1 million from the Government as part of Warrington's £25 million Town Deal. The Minister spoke to students and was given a tour of the learning centre which houses an Independent Living Flat, a Simulation Hospital Ward and lifelike early years settings, designed to train and develop the health and social care workforce.

Sword dedicated in memory of soldier killed in action 50 years ago



A SWORD that belonged to an Army officer killed in action in Oman 50 years ago has been dedicated at Peninsula Barracks, Warrington.

Major Paul Wright was a Royal Engineer who later joined the SAS, who was killed in action during the Dhofar War on February 6 1973 at the age of 27, while seconded from the SAS to the Sultan of Oman's Armed Forces.

For his actions, he was awarded the Sultan's Gallantry Medal, Oman's

highest military award.

A memorial service was also held at Major Wright's graveside at St Mary's Church, Rostherne, which was followed by the dedication of his sword at the barracks in Warrington.

As an ex-Royal Engineer, 75 Engineer Regiment (the Royal Engineer Reserve unit in the North

West) hosted the event. At the same time, Royal Engineers based in Oman conducted a similar memorial where Major Wright was killed.

The sword was recently gifted to the regiment and has already been

the regiment and has diready been used ceremonially by a member of 75 Engineer Regiment during the proclamation of King Charles.

Major Wright has no surviving immediate family but friends, veterans he served with, representatives of the Royal Engineer Association and Special Forces Association attended along with the Deputy Lord attended, along with the Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Cheshire, the Mayor of Warrington and members of 75 Engineer Regiment.

story featuring a sociopathic anti-hero who threatens to bring their lives down in his murderous search for retribution.





Starting at 4.30am in the mist and moonlight, James completed the challenge in 19 hours and 30 minutes in temperatures above 30C, clocking up 68 ascents and just over 8,900m at around midnight. James previously completed a challenge to cycle from Land's End to John o' Groats and has also raised over £5,000 for the charity.

There are many ways to support our charity including volunteering. In

late 2022 our WHH Charity Garden Crew of Volunteers were recognised for their hard work, within the hospitals Dementia Forget Me Not hospitals Dementia Forget Me Not Garden. They received a Level 5 Outstanding Award – the highest level – in the Royal Horticultural Society's Britain in Bloom 'It's Your Neighbourhood' competition. The award followed Bernard Pendleton wisit to the garden, Chairman of Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) North West in Bloom, where he witnessed the wonderful creative work the volunteers have achieved within this beautiful outdoor space, provided for the use of our patients.

Helen Higginson, Head of Fundraising at WHH Charity, said, "Warrington and Halton Teaching Hospitals Trust is fortunate to have so many excellent volunteers and those who work on the garden

certainly make a difference. This "Outstanding Award" is recognition of the wonderful work of the garden volunteers linking with the nursing and support staff on the Forget Me Not Dementia ward to provide a delightful outdoor oasis for patients, staff, volunteers, and visitors alike."

Introduction

Chairman and Chief Executive's Report

Welcome to our latest annual report. As a charity focussing on disabled and older people, the effects of COVID-19 have sadly continued to adversely affect our services throughout the past year. This did not deter us from delivering to our purpose, which is "to improve the lives of people affected by disability and long term health conditions".

We continue to work with our clients and partners to find solutions to a range of problems, including expanding our Long-COVID Support Service in collaboration with Warrington and Halton Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust. We also worked with Torus to launch the Springboard Employment Support Service that focusses on people affected by the pandemic.

Our "Leader Accreditation" for the national Disability Confident Scheme has enabled us to share our expertise, supporting a range of small, medium and large employers, including delivering awareness training to over 300 senior managers from United Utilities and Royal London Insurance.

Information, advice and guidance remains at the heart of our work, underpinning our values as a "user led" organisation. We were delighted to have received re-accreditation of the nationally recognised MATRIX Quality Mark.

Feedback we receive from our clients, customers and partners confirms that our services enhance the lives of tens of thousands of disabled people; locally, regionally, nationally and internationally, giving them hope and opportunity. We continue to promote a "can do" culture focussing on "what disabled people can do", which helps to dispel myths and misconceptions.

Our social enterprise, the Disability Trading Company continues to grow in popularity, attracting many new suppliers including AKW Medi-Care who installed their first Onyx Care Pod at our Liverpool showrooms. We were excited to hear that we are now the 15th largest medium sized Motability dealer of mobility scooters and powered wheelchairs, in the UK.

As we look ahead to 2023 and beyond, the cost of living crisis will be high on our agenda, as disabled people are disproportionately affected, balancing the costs of energy, food, care and support. In addition to higher use of standard household appliances such as washing machines, tumble driers and heaters, disabled people are often faced by additional costs of necessary equipment, wheelchairs, scooters, hoists, stair lifts, suction and

feeding pumps, and ventilators. This led us to collaborate with Warrington Community Energy, successfully bidding for funding to operate an Energy Efficiency Scheme, which will commence after Easter.

Finally, we would like to thank everyone who shares and supports the WDP dream, especially our volunteers, our trustees, our staff, our supporters, our clients/customers and our partners. We are proud to say that during the past 31 years, we have created, one of Warrington's most loved charities that is recognised nationally and worldwide for delivering life-changing services.

WDP Services

Who we are and what we do

Warrington Disability Partnership (WDP) is an internationally acclaimed user-led charity. With over 30 years of experience in developing and delivering mobility and independent living services, we aim to support disabled people and those living with long-term health conditions. We are proud of our wideranging services, which include:

Promoting Independent Living

Visit our Centre for Independent Living (CIL) - located on Beaufort Street; the Disabled Living Centre at the Lifehouse on Brunswick Dock; and two Mobility and Independent Living Stores (MILs) in Sankey Street and Birchwood Shopping Centre. We offer showrooms full of the latest equipment from baths, showers and kitchens to beds, wheelchairs and stair lifts. Advice is available from our team of trained staff and volunteers, and a short-term hires service for various equipment.

For further information, advice and guidance, we have our "Smart Flat" demonstrating the latest assistive technology solutions, based at the CIL. Our popular Disability Helpline (01925 240064) offers advice and support about local support groups and services, accessibility, transport, and more as does our Over 55's Disability Information Officer, in addition to attending local events.

Our two **Shopmobility Schemes** in Legh Street Car Park and Birchwood Shopping Centre offer scooters and wheelchairs for use within the Town Centre. They are available for hire to both members and day visitors, Monday to Saturday (9 am to 5 pm). A six-month membership costs just £10.

COVID recovery can include symptoms that can last weeks or months after the infection has gone. This is sometimes called Long Covid. Our Long Covid Support Service is available specifically for Warrington residents and those registered with Warrington practices. Access to workshops, groups and services is not possible without the inclusion of Warrington & Halton Long Covid Support Service via your GP.

Our Independent Living Team provides a support service for Warrington residents who use the Direct Payments scheme from Warrington Borough Council, assisting with all aspects of employing a Personal Assistant including assistance and advice regarding recruitment, DBS checks, pension schemes and contracts, with support from our in-house payroll team.

Our Care and Support Advisor promotes Personal Health Budgets (PHBs) for individuals with complex health needs throughout Warrington and Halton. PHBs aim to allow greater choice, flexibility and control over how and when NHSfunded care is delivered. The Advisor works with the clients to produce individual Care and Support Plans, liaising with NHS Cheshire & Merseyside concerning individual budget allocations.

The Disability Trading Company Limited

WDP's trading arm - Disability Trading Company (DTC), offers high-quality, independent living products at competitive prices. Running as a Social Enterprise, all profits are donated to WDP to support many of our unfunded services. For further details of services, please see page 6.

Employment & Training

Our **Employment Team** specialises in supporting local disabled people, people living with long-term health conditions (including mental health), ESA claimants and those in receipt of incapacity-related benefits; as well as those with diverse and complex needs and barriers who have been affected, either directly or indirectly, by the Covid pandemic. The team support individuals through all stages of the employment process, job searching, CVs, application forms, preparing for interviews and when gaining employment. We also support people who are in work, as well as employers, by giving information about reasonable adjustments in the workplace.

Learning and Development

Visit the Marjorie Griffiths Learning Centre on Beaufort Street and take advantage of a whole host of courses designed to educate and inspire. Many courses are held in the Discover IT Suite and include 'Computers for the Terrified', vocational OCR qualifications and pre-employment IT. In addition, several other courses are available, which include flower arranging and creative writing.

We work closely with numerous local charities and voluntary organisations including the Stroke Association and After Silence, to provide a place for groups to meet and offer support to their members. Our well-equipped meeting and training rooms are also available to hire at a reasonable cost, with a catered option, from our on-site Galleries Community Café. The **OWCH Pain Management Support group** helps and supports local disabled people with the self-management of Chronic Pain.

WDP delivers a variety of training, including Equality & Diversity, Disability Confident and Disability, and Sex Matters. Half-day training sessions are available to service providers, voluntary organisations and individuals to build knowledge and insight on these issues.

Accessible Holidays & Days Out

Our fully accessible holiday home in North Wales and our adapted, accessible narrowboat The Wizard are available for hire at competitive rates. With a range of options, they allow a bargain break or a day out on the water!

Opportunities to Socialise

We run multiple Luncheon Clubs for individuals looking for friendship, activities, fun and lunch! Our over 55's club meet every Wednesday from 10am to 2pm. As well as enjoying a two-course lunch and drinks, attendees also enjoy playing bingo, games, quizzes, chair-based exercises, and guest speakers. Our Monday Club caters to under 55's with a variety of social activities, including crafts, bingo and films. There is a £7.50 charge for the sessions and individuals are required to attend using their own transport.

Our Galleries Community Café offers a wide range of hot and cold meals, snacks and drinks in a warm and friendly atmosphere. The Café is open to members of the public and visitors to the Centre and Support Groups.

Listening and Advocacy

Get your voice heard locally by attending our monthly 'Staying Connected' meetings via Zoom, which provides a forum to exchange ideas and information about local services. Sessions are open to all who have been affected by long-term health conditions or disabilities, carers and representatives of support groups/organisations and statutory services.

Our Your Voice young disabled person's forum aims to provide young people a safe space to communicate their views and the opportunity to grow, learn and socialise with other like-minded individuals.

We organise the Warrington's Appreciation of Efforts Awards, which provide an opportunity for disabled people and carers to nominate local employers, businesses, service providers or individuals who deserve recognition for promoting independence, delivering accessible or inclusive services or maintaining exemplary employment practices for disabled people and carers.

Development of Warrington Disability Partnership's Social Enterprise — The Disability Trading Company

In April 2011, Warrington Disability Partnership launched a social enterprise 'the Disability Trading Company'. Their first retail service was launched from the Warrington Centre for Independent Living, and in October 2011 they opened the Mobility & Independent Living Store (MILS) in the Golden Square Shopping Mall.

In early 2013 DTC opened a large Mobility Workshop & Service Centre which provides servicing and repairs for individual customers, and businesses including Warrington and Halton Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, nursing homes and local Shopmobility Schemes. In late 2013 DTC launched a service aimed at recycling mobility equipment, scooters, wheelchairs and power-chairs which are sold from WDP's Shopmobility service located in Warrington Town Centre.

In October 2016 WDP and DTC, in partnership with St Mark Universal Care, launched 'the Phoenix Project', refurbishing and shipping wheelchairs and other mobility aids to countries including Egypt, Thailand and Syria. So far over £1million worth of equipment has been salvaged and donated.

In 2017 DTC joined the British Health Trades Association, underlining their belief in the BHTA "Buy with Confidence" scheme that is accredited to Trading Standards. Receiving "approved dealer" accreditation to the national Motability Scheme was also achieved, which allows disabled people to use the enhance mobility component of DLA or PIP to lease a powerchair or mobility scooter.

In 2018 DTC added two new services with a retail store at the rear of Warrington Hospital and the Smart Flat, assistive technology showrooms located at the Warrington Centre for Independent Living.

In 2019 in partnership with the Golden Square Shopping Centre, DTC moved their Mobility & Independent Living Store (MILS) from inside the Centre to a larger brighter store in Sankey Street.

In 2020 in partnership with Birchwood Shopping Centre, DTC open a Mobility and Independent Living Store (MILS) in the Centre, it also includes Birchwood Shopmobility Service.

In 2022, DTC launched a new online shop designed so customers across the UK can purchase high-quality mobility & independent living products from the comfort of their homes. All our products can help increase your ability to live independently. We pride ourselves on a fast delivery service, and promise to pick up and send you your order before the end of the next working day. If you are unsure what products best fit your needs or have any questions, visit our website's contact us page.

What makes DTC unique?

- DTC has no private shareholders, 100% of its profits go to support WDP's charitable services which include subsidised Lunch Clubs for disabled people, accessible narrow-boat offering daytrips on the Bridgewater Canal and an accessible caravan in North Wales,
- DTC staff do not receive any incentive bonuses, which results in us providing advice verses high pressure selling.
- Free impartial home and work assessments based on the philosophy of information, advice and guidance, not just sales,
- DTC is a user led social enterprise; many staff and all volunteers have used their experience of living with a disability or longterm health condition to develop the services and ensure they sell the right products
- Nearly £2,5million has been saved by disabled people who have purchased mobility and independent living products from WDP's Mobility and Independent Living Stores (MILS) rather than from commercially driven businesses

Warrington Disability Partnership have over 20 years' experience of running a fully inclusive Santa's Grotto, which can be visited by all.
- WDP's Santa and some of our elves can communicate with deaf children and parents through British Sign Language.
- After listening to parents, WDP have included Quiet Hours, where the individual needs of children, parents and grandparents can be met, including Autism, Dementia and Alzheimer's.










"Mersey Flat" provides glimpse into town's historic past

RECENT works on the River Mersey, resulting in lower water levels, revealed a glimpse into Warrington's historic past when the remains of a "Mersey Flat" came into view.

Following a tip-off members of the New Cut Trail group, including local history enthusiast Mike Kenwright, went off to investigate after the Mersey Flat had come to light at Howley Lock while the river level was dropped to allow maintenance work.

The flat could be viewed from the stern with the rudder still attached along with what remained of the stem, a metal strip and hook which is attached to the stem at the anchor point for the mast forestay.

Mike said: "If I have got it right the angled metal bar would have been bolted over the prow and the hook that is fixed to it may have been part of the gear for holding the mast stay. The masts of the vessels could be lowered allowing them to pass under low bridges. They would have needed a secure anchor when they were upright with the vessel under sail, hence the metal bar over the prow. Of course I could be totally wrong with my ideas!

He added: "Most of the flats

He added: "Most of the flats were single-masted but some of them carried two masts, and were often called "Jigger Flats". These Jigger Flats were sea-going vessels and were regularly worked on the Irish Sea, some of them sailed round the coast to London with cargoes of Cheshire Cheese.

The last sailing flat to be built was the Santa Rose. It was built for the United Alkali Company Ltd.

Mike added: "These sailing barges were named Flats due to the fact that they had very little keel and a rounded flat bottom.


"In areas where there was no harbour or wharf but there were flat sandy beaches the vessels could be sailed into shallow water at high tide and allowed to settle on the beach as the tide ebbed. Horse-drawn lorries and carts could then pull alongside and the cargo would be discharged into them. Depending on the type of cargo it could often take more than one tide to finish the unloading. When the job was done the flat would lift on the tide and could be sailed away. When sat on a good level beach the Flatmen reckoned that they sat upright like a church steeple. On inland waterways, masts and sails were often dispensed with and the vessels towed for the whole journey. In the early days when towpaths were poor or even non existent in places teams of men did

the hauling.

"Later when proper towpaths were constructed horses were used, sometimes in pairs. The Mersey and Irwell Co built stables for their horses at Runcorn, Manor Lock at Latchford, Cadishead and Barton," added Mike.



The dance call was delivered by Beth, while the monologue or singing section of the auditions led by Dan, another talented member of the team who is both an actor and a musician. All workshops were overseen by Ben, a member of Liverpool Empire's Community Outreach Team, who works with partner schools and

colleges.

The purpose of the visit was to give students a real insight into the industry and how intense the audition process can be. Both Beth and Dan have experienced first-hand the highs and lows of the industry and so they were able to provide students with real and honest feedback on their performances. Rosanna Rigby, Performing Arts Tutor at the college, said: "The session provided an essential experience for students to develop the skills that will be assessed throughout the academic year. They need to understand the expectations that will be placed on them in the industry, so this session will be invaluable."

Those participating in the dance call were taught a routine by Beth, who chose the student she believed performed best and explained what they did well, compared to those who weren't chosen. This was incredibly authentic to how a real dance call works and was an amazing learning experience for our students. Students participating in the singing and monologue auditions faced Dan, who assessed their performances and gave valuable tips for improvement, such as how to use pauses effectively.

AFTER a decade as the first-ever non-singing Chairman of Warrington Male Voice Choir, the original "Silver fox" Bob Williams is saying a hearty farewell following a 30-year association with the group.

Bob has stepped down from his role as Chairman of the 'award-winning' choir, a position he has held for the past 10 years.

The association began around 1991 when the then secretary, Angus Thorburn, a work colleague at British Nuclear Fuels Ltd (BNFL), introduced him to their concerts. Bob, involved with Community Relations at BNFL, jumped at the chance to help the choir, so much so that by 1996 he had become the choir's regular compere at major concerts and compere at major concerts and their Press & Marketing Officer, principally in charge of concert programme design.

With Bob's assistance the choir secured a substantial 8-year sponsorship deal from BNFL which, in combination with other fundin combination with other runaraising activities, kept the choir financed for many years and enabled them to go on fabulous tours around the world, with Bob accompanying the choir on almost all their visits to Ireland and Northern Ireland, helping to

promote peace.
In March 1997, Bob became an associate member of the choir and in 2013 he was elected to become 'non-singing' choir's first chairman since its formation in 1898

When Bob joined the choir, it had a membership of approximately 80 men and at its Centenary fittingly achieved 100 men singing on the Parr Hall stage. These days the choir membership is in the 40's with plans to increase this to 50 by the end of the year.

At concerts, most people recognise Bob by his distinctive silver locks and his red-compere jacket. Make sure you have checked your NI National Insurance record before 5th April

If you are planning to claim the UK state pension at any time in the future then you should check your National Insurance (NI) record before 5 April 2023.

Currently, if you have a shortfall in your contributions record then voluntary contributions can be made to plug gaps in your record as far back as April 2006, but this will be curtailed from April.

National insurance contributions are typically made by employed and self-employed individuals based on their earnings in any tax year. Individuals may also receive National Insurance credits if they are eligible. These NI contributions or credits make up that individual's NI contributions record, and that may affect their entitlement to the state pension as well as other benefits, such as employment and support allowance.

In general, to qualify for the maximum 'new state pension' (received by those retiring on or after 6 April 2016) a person must have at least 35 qualifying years of NI contributions. If you cannot reach that number of qualifying years then you may receive a reduced pension. For part payment of the 'new state pension' a person must have contributed for at least 10 years.

Please note that the new State pension was introduced on 6th April 2016, and if a person's NI record started before that date then different rules may apply; the number of required years of NI contributions/credits to obtain the full state pension may be higher.

If individuals have not contributed for sufficient years prior to reaching state pension age then they may not be able to claim state pension, or to receive the full state pension amount. However, it is possible to top up their record by making voluntary contributions. To protect state pension and other benefits it may be beneficial for people to make those voluntary "Class 3" NI contributions to top up their contribution history, potentially increasing the amount of state pension they will receive.

At this point we must make the usual disclaimer. Specific financial advice is recommended when making that decision as it requires predicting, to an extent, what contributions will be made before state retirement age and the risk of future changes in the rules.

Normally, it is only possible to make voluntary contributions for the past six tax years. However,

currently there is an extension in place. Individuals can fill any gaps in their NIC history from 6 April 2006 to the present date by making voluntary contributions. However, from 6 April 2023 this extension is withdrawn. and the timeframe for making voluntary contributions will revert to the normal six years. This means that in the 2023/24 tax year, it will only be possible to make contributions going back to the 2017/18 tax year.

Individuals should therefore take the opportunity to check their NI record to identify any shortfalls in their NI history during the period 6th April 2006 to 5th April 2017. To help with this then you can go to https://www.gov.uk/check-national-insurance-record where you will be able to enter your details to view your record. To make use of this link then you will need a Government Gateway User ID and password.

Taxpayers should also check that their contribution record includes all NI contributions paid through PAYE and self-assessment, aa well as any NI credits earned. If you find any errors then you will need to contact HMRC at https://www.gov.uk/government/organisations/hm-revenue-customs/contact/

national-insurance-enquiries-foremployees-and-individuals to have any errors corrected.

A summary of actions for taxpayers to take before 5 April 2023 is as follows:

- Check your NI record
- Identify any discrepancies between NI contributions paid and those showing on HMRC's system
- Identify any NI credits that are missing from periods in which they should have been received (eg, on receipt of universal credit or child benefit)
- Identify any shortfalls in contributions
- Contact HMRC if you think there are any errors
- Decide whether to make voluntary NI contributions

Please note that self-employed taxpayers who do not make sufficient profits in any tax year to pay sufficient NI contributions can avoid a gap by making an election on their self-assessment tax return to voluntarily pay Class 2 NI contributions. This can be a less expensive way of avoiding a gap then paying voluntary Class 3 contributions.
